Earlier I wrote a submission suggesting an all-urban riding for Grande Prairie. I am still in favour of that, however, I realize that not all of the City of Grande Prairie would be able to fit in one riding. The average population of a riding is 49,000 and Grande Prairie's population is 68,000. So some of the city would be left out and included in a mostly rural riding. However, being guaranteed one MLA from the City of Grande Prairie would be of value to me. Also the meeting that you had scheduled for Grande Prairie was cancelled due to weather. I found out that the size of Grande Prairie's two ridings was to be discussed. Both GP-Wapiti and GP-Smoky have about 57,000 people, well above the average of 49,000, and reducing both ridings to a number closer to the average might be helpful in making everyone's vote more valuable, regardless of the urban-rural distribution. I would assume that rural areas in both ridings would be reduced, giving the city voters more weight. That would be a bit of a compromise between what I want (an all-urban riding) and the status quo, which I am aware some of the rural politicians and residents want. I feel that rural Alberta is overrepresented in the legislature, and the rural residents and politicians want to keep it this way. As a city resident, I use public transit and walk to get around - which are urban modes of transportation. Rural residents drive everywhere, so these are issues that are not important to them. Affordable housing and other social programs are also issues affecting cities that do not affect rural areas. Grande Prairie needs an MLA who will speak up on these issues. Our two rural MLAs largely ignore these issues.

I would like to offer the following observations regarding electoral boundaries and representation of the population for your consideration.

Healthy representation is a must in a democratic system; however, as I am sure you are aware, unbalanced representation can occur when only taking population into consideration.

Large cities tend to overwhelm the rural areas when only taking population into consideration. Rural areas generally contribute higher Gross Domestic Product to the Province while enjoying fewer amenities than those in larger centers. Examples are: Public Transportation, Health Care Facilities and Public Services

Now, I do not dispute the fact that all these services cannot be provided in rural areas, however, rural citizens are entitled to expect their fair share of services. Following is my submission to your request for comments that I received in the mail. I am located in the Edmonton Mill Woods riding, and our current representative MLA is Christina Gray.

1. The number of constituencies in Alberta needs to be REDUCED and not increased.

The total program expenses in Alberta for Government services, Education, and Health Care is extremely high, and out of proportion to other similar sized provinces such as British Columbia. BC's total program expenses are \$9,651 per capita (*source data link below) compared to Alberta's \$12,176. That is a difference of 26%, and on an annual basis the dollar difference of \$2,525 per capita totals \$10.5 billion. That is more than enough to balance our budget today. Alberta does not need higher royalties, a carbon tax, a provincial sales tax, higher corporate tax, or higher personal tax. What Alberta needs is lower spending, at a per capita rate equal to BC. Start with cutting the number constituencies in Alberta, and the number of MLA's in our Legislature.

2. Carefully evaluate the impact of political party membership and support on the electoral boundaries.

We all know that political parties use sophisticated computer programs to determine exactly where there support is geographically, and where it isn't. A vote in a riding that you are never going to win is a lost vote from a political point of view. It would be easy to draw up boundaries using this political support data that would bias the voting and election in favour of one party and against another. My request is that you subpoen this computer data from each of the political parties, and use it as the basis for determining if any changes in electoral boundaries are fair to all parties.

Thank you for the card in the mail just received inviting submissions to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission.

The Commission should attempt to determine, particularly by way of discussion with MLAs (and MPs) and party leaders whether it is more effective for individual members to represent a mix of urban and rural constituents as opposed to representing one or the other.

As our province continues to grow it's reasonable to assume most of this growth -- and general redistribution -- is in the two major cities. Are MLAs (and MPs) more effective in initiating legislation, in serving on committees and in contributing to debate in the House if they serve a mix of rural and urban constituents? If draft legislation or budget deliberations appear to favour rural over urban or vice versa would it not be more productive for members of the House to have to personally learn of the often contrasting views of their constituents through direct contact?

Of course, practical considerations would limit the number of combined urban-rural ridings. I'm really only suggesting the idea merits increased

consideration around Edmonton and Calgary, and to a lesser extent the other cities. But I do believe the Commission has to do more than merely adjust boundaries to attempt to render the number of constituents per member more closely consistent.

To illustrate the undesirability, within the larger cities themselves, of moving in an opposing direction, it would be unfortunate to delineate or circumscribe one urban riding, for example, with one immigrant ethnic group and another riding with a different ethnic group. It could lead to a member of that community being elected with a narrower focus than consideration of the overall provincial interest would demand. Chinatown and Little Italy precincts may have seemed acceptable and rich in character in past years but with large numbers of immigrants being welcomed from parts of the world with very different cultures both intellectual and physical integration are to be encouraged, and security aspects should not be overlooked. Electoral boundaries have the potential to have a beneficial effect in this regard.

In essence, I'm suggesting consideration of conflicting views of constituents be moved as much as possible down from the level of the House, its committees and the government of the day to individual members. This would increase individual members' accountability, and that would be a good thing.

Lastly, with a population of under 37 millions, our country is grossly overgoverned. Each province and territory is required to provide the same services but intergovernmental autonomy has led to needless administrative differences and the cost of the overall administrative burden is intolerable. Notwithstanding the growth in the provincial population, the least we can do is to not increase the number of seats in our legislature.

Although you're allowed to have a 25% variance in pop. size, that doesn't mean you should accept that large a difference. I would suggest a 10% variance would be better. In addition, making exceptions for large geographic areas should be significantly constrained. These days with easy electronic communications, there are few reasons why an MLA can't represent their constituents conveniently and fairly without needing to do lots of travelling.

When you're considering "community interests", it's important that you don't use, or even have access to, any data that might suggest how a group of people might vote. No data on how a community or even the entire constituency voted in earlier elections. No data on incomes,nationality,race, rural/urban, etc. Your data should only consist of population information.

Your job should be relatively simple - figure out how 4+ million people can be fairly represented by a few.

I believe it should not take 87 MLAs to do this representation. A better number would be about 40-50. This would save money, still allow the MLAs to do their job, and allow the elected government enough people to govern.

Dear Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission:

Democracy as a concept can be interpreted in different ways, but we believe there are several fundamental elements that are basic to strong systems of democracy.

In particular, we believe that at its heart, democracy is grounded in the principle of political equality

– the idea that citizens must be seen as equal in terms of having a say in the political system and

must have equal rights under the law.

Closer attention to that principle has led to recent improvements in our system, including provincial

legislation to eliminate corporate and union contributions to candidates and parties and to reduce

contribution limits to ensure that citizens determine the outcome of elections rather than wealth

and institutional power.

But political equality requires something more specific in terms of electoral boundaries – the electoral districts must be solidly based on representation by population, the principle that elected

representatives must represent approximately equal numbers of constituents to ensure that no

person's vote is worth more than that of another.

For example, if one constituency has 20,000 eligible voters and another has 40,000 voters, the votes

of those in the first constituency are effectively worth twice that of those citizens in the second

setting.

Advocating for a Better Alberta for All

Obviously, not only does such a situation dramatically subvert the principle of political equality, but

it also has the clear potential to undermine the democratic principles of majority rule and

minority

rights, particularly if there are large departures from representation by population.

However, this does not mean that constituency sizes must be exactly equal; small variations will be

needed to take into account particularly problematic and compelling local circumstances in some

instances. But the key is that the default position must be that of approximately equal populations

for constituencies, and the variances should be minimal as a consequence.

C. Electoral boundaries in Alberta: the current situation

Unfortunately, Alberta has allowed substantial, unwarranted, and unnecessary departures from

representation by population in terms of our electoral boundaries, to the extent that our current

system can be described as one of "unfair variance by design." In the process, we have sacrificed

important aspects of political equality and have unfairly advantaged some groups of voters and

disadvantaged others.

The current system has been fostered by several factors, most notably in allowing an initial variance

of 25% (above and below) from the average population per constituency. This, in effect, translates to

a situation where some constituencies can sit at 75% of the average constituency size, while others

are 125% of the average, a variance equal to 50% of the population in an average constituency. For

example, if the average population per constituency is 48,000, with a 25% variance allowed both

above and below the average, that leads to an acceptable variance of 12,000, so that the lowest

would be 36,000 and the highest would be 60,000 – in this situation, the larger constituency is 1.667

times the size of the smaller one.

The initial situation is then made worse over time by subsequent population shifts, often involving

increases in rapidly-expanding urban and suburban settings and declines in rural areas.

As a result, Alberta has dramatic and troubling departures from representation by population, leaving many Albertans significantly over-represented or under-represented. These problems are

clearly illustrated by the numbers of eligible voters in constituencies in the 2015 provincial

election:

Edmonton-Whitemud had approximately 37,000 eligible voters, while Spruce Grove-St. Albert and

Calgary-South East both had approximately 46,000. In contrast, Lesser Slave Lake had roughly 20,000

eligible voters, Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley had approximately 16,000, and Fort McMurrayConklin

had just over 15,000.

This means that in 2015, voters in Fort McMurray-Conklin had three times the "voting power" of

voters in Calgary-South East. One Alberta MLA speaks for three times the number of voters represented by another Alberta MLA. This is not consistent with political equality.

Voters in these heavily-populated constituencies have a diminished voice in the legislature and the

issues that matter to them do not carry the weight they should. More importantly, the fundamental

principle of political equality has been dramatically sacrificed – and to what end?

The usual explanation for resorting to these types of inequalities in the past was that it was difficult

for MLAs to effectively represent voters in constituencies that had large areas and more sparse

populations, so those MLAs were given smaller numbers of constituents to deal with.

The problem from the beginning was that this expedient involved substantially undermining the

principle of representation by population, and that difficulty has grown dramatically in recent years,

as demonstrated in the inequitable population of constituencies in the 2015 election – a situation of

conspicuous unfairness.

Rather than allowing for such wide population variance, a better solution would be to stick much

more closely to representation by population and political equality, and then recognize that different

types of constituencies have different circumstances and representational challenges. Instead, effective representation requires different levels of support for different types of constituencies. If

so, the Legislative Assembly should respond accordingly and ensure MLAs can effectively serve their

constituencies. This can be done by increasing the nature and extent of supports to meet these

challenges, but without subverting the principles of democracy in the process.

Of course, rural areas with sparse populations are not the only constituencies in which MLAs face

unique challenges when providing effective representation. For example, MLAs in densely populated

urban constituencies with larger numbers of voters face serious challenges related to representing

populations with higher poverty rates and more diverse language groups. Moreover, recent improvements in communications and information technology have made it much easier to reach

constituents and provide effective representation in rural areas.

In the end, however, the Electoral Boundaries Commission should not be addressing these representational challenges. That is the responsibility of others. The Electoral Boundaries Commission should focus on enhancing political equality and fairness through representation by

population. Currently, the situation is unfair because constituency populations are far from equal.

D. A democratic approach to redrawing Alberta's electoral boundaries It is not our intention to suggest specific changes to the boundaries of particular constituencies.

Rather, we believe that it is important to outline the key principles and overall changes that we hope

will guide the Commission's work. If these basic elements are adopted, the specific changes to boundaries will be grounded in and guided by a strong commitment to ensuring political equality

and representation by population.

1. Reduce the current 25% variance in the constituency population size to 5%.

The current legislation allows variances of 25%, but that was meant to serve as an outside limit.

Clearly, the goal should be to have constituencies of equal population size, but due to the desire

to take into account some local circumstances (for example, existing community and municipal

boundaries) some modest degree of latitude is necessary. The proposed five per cent variance would actually amount to ten per cent, since it would allow five per cent above and below the average.

In addition, the Commission should not make use of their power to create any of the four "special exceptions" constituencies of even wider variance as allowed under the legislation, since the particular circumstances of these areas can be better addressed through other means,

such as by providing more assistance and support to MLAs.

2. The Electoral Boundaries Commission should call for increased support to MLAs to assist them

in effectively representing their constituents and addressing their varying needs While acting on a commitment to political equality and representation by population, the Electoral Boundaries Commission should point out that they are no longer using population variance to address the challenges of representation. In doing so, the Commission should call on

appropriate bodies to ensure that all MLAs have the necessary staff and technical support to address those their representational challenges.

Such additional support is not only justifiable, but long overdue. It will mean that the Legislative

Assembly must revise and enhance the formula for providing support, with the goal of allowing

all MLAs to more effectively represent their constituents and their unique circumstances in rural,

urban, and suburban constituencies throughout the province.

The increased costs are an investment in strengthening democracy in our province and a necessary complement to the move to more political equality and representation by population.

Population of electoral divisions section 15(1) should be revisited. By allowing a deviation of up to 25% of the average population, certain constituencies voters have more or less actual voting power than residents of another electoral boundary. 25% is far too great of a deviation, possibly allowing for one constituency to have double the amount of representation by population of another. An acceptable deviation would be closer to 5%.

15(2) Notwithstanding subsection (1), allows for even greater deviation for dubious reasons. In certain cases we allow up to a 50% deviation in 4 electoral divisions, making the difference in voting power by population even greater. Sub-sections b), c), and e) are not relevant in a modern society.

Electoral boundaries should have as close to an equal population as is possible in order to ensure all Albertan votes are counted equally.

As an Albertan living in a growing urban centre, I feel as if my vote is worth less than those living in rural Alberta. Many ridings in rural Alberta tend to have a lower number of residents than urban ones, particularly larger ridings like my own. That provides rural Albertans a larger representation in the legislature than is deserving of their population. This results in Albertans living in denser, urban centres to have less of a voice in the legislature, and the policy issues confronting our province.

This Commission must ensure equality between rural and urban Albertans. It must distribute ridings in a manner that ensures each riding has approximately the same number of residents. My vote should have the same worth as other Albertans in this province, regardless of where I choose to live.

In the past, rural ridings were drawn with a smaller number of residents than urban ones due to the large distances between population centres in rural Alberta. However, communication technologies have erased those distances, and the rationale for smaller rural ridings is no longer valid. Instead of drawing rural ridings will less residents than urban ones to overcome distance issues, resources would be better invested in these communication technologies.

As someone who works with data in a professional capacity on a daily basis, my concern is that the 2016 population estimates provided by the EBC for the first round of public hearings by the EBC for electoral division populations are not accurate.

I knew something was wrong when I saw the EBC's 54,804 population estimate for my own ED of Highlands-Norwood for 2016: http://abebc.ca/about/stats/#contact

The combined population of the neighbourhoods making up Highlands-Norwood according to the 2016 City Census was 43,199, or 11,605 lower. I have not updated the other 18 Edmonton electoral divisions as it is somewhat time consuming.

The City's total 2016 population according to the EBC estimates is 973,409, 73,962 higher than the 899,447 Edmontonians counted in the 2016 City Census. The 2016 federal census results are likely to be closer to the City Census number than the EBC estimate.

These are my questions:

Why did the EBC not wait another month to hold public hearings until the population counts from the 2016 federal census are published, rather than relying upon estimates?

Why did the EBC not use the most recent municipal census data where it is available? Both the cities of Edmonton and Calgary conducted a municipal census in 2016 that included neighbourhood level population data.

One of your answers in the "FAQ" section is incorrect, in my humble opinion. While the Commission cannot cause the legislature to amend the number of constituencies and MLA's, it can, under the broad interpretation of s.3 of the Act, recommend this, and possibly even, if it had the guts to do so (?), submit an alternate revised electoral map based upon same to the legislature. Alberta has far too many MLA's, by any measure, and very clearly by comparative measure to the other more populous provinces (way more, per capita, than BC, ON, or PQ, in fact 2 more than BC!!). The less populous provinces are in some cases even worse, but one supposes there is sort of a minimum required to support a full provincial over-administration (?). I suppose this is kind of like asking the fox to renovate the henhouse, but, in fact, the jobs of MLA's in terms of the effectiveness and efficiencies of representation, per capita, have become less, not more, difficult with the advent of communications technology. But, as apparent with all things "government", the tendency is to increase numbers, and thus expense to the taxpayer. Alberta would be adequately served with as "few" as 60, and certainly no more than 70, MLA"S. I don't have any major concerns about the actual boundary revisions, as the system seems geared to ensure that no one party or group can get away with too much "gerrymandering". What I object to is the political featherbedding of continuously adding more unnecessary representatives at huge expense. -10 "rural" ridings have less than 40,000 residents; 2 of these have less than 30,000; 31 of Alberta's 43 "rural" ridings do not meet the average of 48,000+ residents - that is over 75%; 11 ridings (not Calgary and Edmonton) have over 50,000 residents, but most of these are within the Metro areas of Edmonton and Calgary, or include parts of all of Alberta's "2nd tier" cities - e.g.: Red Deer, Grande Prairie, Fort Mac etc; 11 of Edmonton's 19 ridings have over 50,000 people, one as many as 66,000; 14 of Calgary's 25 ridings have over 50,000 residents, one, Calgary South-east, nearly 80,000; that is twice as many as the riding of Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater - effectively, the people of Calgary South East have to cast 2 ballots for each ballot cast in Athabasca. That is just plain wrong. The eight largest communities in this province, notably Edmonton and Calgary, representing nearly 70% of the province's population, deserve greater and fairer representation. -Considering 50% of Alberta's population reside in Edmonton and Calgary, there is no excuse they should not be allotted 50% of the seats in the Legislature - approximately 55% of that number going to Calgary and 45% to Edmonton.

philosophical viewpoints into the legislative process. That is the purpose of the Legislative Assembly. Voters are individuals with endless variation of needs and interests. Thus a simple population measure should be the one and only determinate of riding boundaries, not residence, lifestyle, economic or ethnic parameters.

If the average population per constituency is 49,000, then the highest constituency could have 61,750 people in it while the least populated constituency could be 36,750. Allowing rural areas to have disproportionate influence in democratic representation is not only unfair to urban citizens, but also does not reflect trends in demographics, population migration, economic priorities, etc.

There should be no more than a 10% discrepancy between the size of the largest and smallest riding by population. Geographic size is no longer a limiting factor in the ability to engage with constituents and should no longer be a factor in determining the boundaries of constituencies. Furthermore, the boundaries should not be subject to political manipulation and so they should also be subject to a rule on how much variance there can be on the distance of a boundary edge from the geographic centre of the constituency.

The Boundaries Commission should seek to ensure the greatest possible population parity between constituencies. This should be its primary objective.

While preventing unfairly large rural constituencies is important, this should be approached by having a couple constituencies with lower populations than the rest. It should not result in rural ridings generally being less populated than urban ones. Ideally it should be possible to identify which constituencies are purposefully less populated, and have all other constituencies excluding those exceptions be approximately equally populated. There should not be a sliding scale of population levels in relation to geographic size. Rather, a reasonable limit to size should be identified and every smaller constituency's geographic size should not be regarded as a significant factor.

Rural-urban split constituencies should also be avoided, to ensure that neither urban nor rural voters are able to overpower the other in any given constituency. Splitting is of course unavoidable, but it should be minimized. For example, a riding that encompasses Grande Prairie and surrounding areas is more reasonable than a riding that wedges off a section of Calgary suburbs into an otherwise rural constituency.

I am writing to you on the subject of Common Community Concerns and Effective Representation. I am from India and have lived in Calgary for the past 10 years. Based on my personal experiences, I wish to share my concerns. Thanks for the opportunity.

While I appreciate your efforts in reviewing Alberta's growth in population, I do hope that this will be for the benefit of people's health and wellbeing, beyond governing and political purposes. My concern is about a "colonizing" mindset similar to the "divide and rule" policy that broke up India.

I am concerned about the growing homelessness and poverty, rising prices, deteriorating values, ethics and morality, growing crime, social isolation and mental health issues in Calgary. Casino funding is the norm in the social sector, and gambling and addiction is being encouraged in the name of Charity. Those who question dishonesty and corruption are "dismissed" as a form of bullying, which I have faced personally in the corporate and social sector.

Having lived in Deer Run Community the past 3 years, I have had to build a fence around my property to protect myself from my neighbor's dog pooping on my front and back yard, and I have trapped 3 cats last summer through a cat trap allocated by Animal Services Calgary. These cats were pooping on my property.

Eggs were thrown at my house. It is possible that I may be facing a backlash for having complained. Calgary Police, Animal Bylaw, Alberta Health Services, Calgary Mental Diversion Services, and City of

Calgary, are aware of my difficulty. However, they seem helplessness in the face of the growing mental health issues in Calgary.

Caring for dogs and cats (pets) seems to have taken precedence over caring for people in communities and society. Barking and growling dogs in residential communities and provincial parks, accumulating dog poop on provincial park pathways, greenery, and garbage bins is a queer sight. It is a queer to see dogs roaming free in areas meant for people to enjoy safely. It is also queer to see people hanging on to their dogs, while holding a bag of poop in their hand!

It has been quite shocking for me to experience dogs running across while I roller blade in Fish Creek Park, or barking at me while I learn cross country skiing, which causes a feeling of helplessness and anxiety. I have registered a complaint with Alberta Parks who share my concerns.

It is indeed quite tragic and sad to see a society being destroyed by people desperately and blindly seeking their value through dogs and money. For the sake of people's health and wellbeing of society, I do hope you will consider enabling a Canadian identity of relational values and caring. This perhaps may be a vital aspect in considering Alberta's population growth.







In essence, it is a method where the lines are drawn purely according to math and no other factors. This would eliminate any concerns of boundaries giving a particular advantage to one party or another, as no influence other than numbers would be had on the shape and size of electoral districts. The way the shortest split-line algorithm works is that the shortest line is found that divides the population into two districts of equal population. 

According to 2011 Census figures from Statistics Canada, 83% of Albertans live in urban centres. 

I have for a long time been unhappy with the electoral boundaries in both the major cities and in particular my riding of CALGARY-SOUTH EAST. It seems that the previous government had gone out of its way to short change the cities of Calgary and Edmonton on their representation to the Legislature. To understand why I am concerned I will present to you the following statistics that support my position.

Information has been taken from the elections alberta website; (http://www.elections.ab.ca/reports/statistics/list-of-electors/ 2016).

- 1. The district I live in has the largest number of registered voters of all districts in Alberta (46,555). This makes myself and others that live in South-East Calgary <u>inferior</u> at least in the eyes of the province.
- 2. This district has almost 3 ½ times the smallest district (FORT MCMURRAY-CONKLIN 13,709). The province appears to be <u>prejudice</u> by more than 3 to 1 against my constituency's citizens compared to some others.
- 3. Calgary South-East has more then 1 ½ times the provincial average (30058). In the end my vote is reduced in value by 50% from the provincial average.

Submission to Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission – January 2017

A. Introduction

Public Interest Alberta has advocated for a broad range of approaches to strengthening Alberta's democracy as a top priority since our organization was founded in 2004.

Public Interest Alberta's Democracy Task Force sees the current work of the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission as a rare opportunity to make important changes to strengthen the key democratic element of representation by population, where the need for improvements is particularly pressing in our province.

We are very pleased to have the opportunity to offer our observations and recommendations to the Commission and will be focusing on three main issues and areas of concern:

- 1. What are the key democratic principles that should guide the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission as they do their work?
- 2. To what extent do Alberta's existing electoral boundaries reflect the principles and practices of strong democracy?
- 3. What approach to electoral boundaries redistricting is most compatible with strengthening Alberta's democracy?

B. Democracy and electoral boundaries

Democracy as a concept can be interpreted in different ways, but we believe there are several fundamental elements that are basic to strong systems of democracy.

In particular, we believe that at its heart, democracy is grounded in the principle of **political equality** – the idea that citizens must be seen as equal in terms of having a say in the political system and must have equal rights under the law.

Closer attention to that principle has led to recent improvements in our system, including provincial legislation to eliminate corporate and union contributions to candidates and parties and to reduce contribution limits to ensure that citizens determine the outcome of elections rather than wealth and institutional power.

But political equality requires something more specific in terms of electoral boundaries – the electoral districts must be solidly based on representation by population, the principle that elected representatives must represent approximately equal numbers of constituents to ensure that no person's vote is worth more than that of another.

For example, if one constituency has 20,000 eligible voters and another has 40,000 voters, the votes of those in the first constituency are effectively worth twice that of those citizens in the second setting.

Obviously, not only does such a situation dramatically subvert the principle of politicapequality,-but it also has the clear potential to undermine the democratic principles of majority rule and minority rights, particularly if there are large departures from representation by population.

However, this does not mean that constituency sizes must be exactly equal; small variations will be needed to take into account particularly problematic and compelling local circumstances in some instances. But the key is that the default position must be that of approximately equal populations for constituencies, and the variances should be minimal as a consequence.

C. Electoral boundaries in Alberta: the current situation

Unfortunately, Alberta has allowed substantial, unwarranted, and unnecessary departures from representation by population in terms of our electoral boundaries, to the extent that our current system can be described as one of "unfair variance by design." In the process, we have sacrificed important aspects of political equality and have unfairly advantaged some groups of voters and disadvantaged others.

The current system has been fostered by several factors, most notably in allowing an initial variance of 25% (above and below) from the average population per constituency. This, in effect, translates to a situation where some constituencies can sit at 75% of the average constituency size, while others are 125% of the average, a variance equal to 50% of the population in an average constituency. For example, if the average population per constituency is 48,000, with a 25% variance allowed both above and below the average, that leads to an acceptable variance of 12,000, so that the lowest would be 36,000 and the highest would be 60,000 – in this situation, the larger constituency is 1.667 times the size of the smaller one.

The initial situation is then made worse over time by subsequent population shifts, often involving increases in rapidly-expanding urban and suburban settings and declines in rural areas.

As a result, Alberta has dramatic and troubling departures from representation by population, leaving many Albertans significantly over-represented or under-represented. These problems are clearly illustrated by the numbers of eligible voters in constituencies in the 2015 provincial election: Edmonton-Whitemud had approximately 37,000 eligible voters, while Spruce Grove-St. Albert and Calgary-South East both had approximately 46,000. In contrast, Lesser Slave Lake had roughly 20,000 eligible voters, Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley had approximately 16,000, and Fort McMurray-Conklin had just over 15,000.

This means that in 2015, voters in Fort McMurray-Conklin had three times the "voting power" of voters in Calgary-South East. One Alberta MLA speaks for three times the number of voters represented by another Alberta MLA. This is not consistent with political equality.

Voters in these heavily-populated constituencies have a diminished voice in the legislature and the issues that matter to them do not carry the weight they should. More importantly, the fundamental principle of political equality has been dramatically sacrificed – and to what end?

The usual explanation for resorting to these types of inequalities in the past was that it was difficult for MLAs to effectively represent voters in constituencies that had large areas and more sparse populations, so those MLAs were given smaller numbers of constituents to deal with.

The problem from the beginning was that this expedient involved substantially undermining the principle of representation by population, and that difficulty has grown dramatically in recent years,

as demonstrated in the inequitable population of constituencies in the 2015 election election conspicuous unfairness.

Rather than allowing for such wide population variance, a better solution would be to stick much more closely to representation by population and political equality, and then recognize that different types of constituencies have different circumstances and representational challenges. Instead, effective representation requires different levels of support for different types of constituencies. If so, the Legislative Assembly should respond accordingly and ensure MLAs can effectively serve their constituencies. This can be done by increasing the nature and extent of supports to meet these challenges, but without subverting the principles of democracy in the process.

Of course, rural areas with sparse populations are not the only constituencies in which MLAs face unique challenges when providing effective representation. For example, MLAs in densely populated urban constituencies with larger numbers of voters face serious challenges related to representing populations with higher poverty rates and more diverse language groups. Moreover, recent improvements in communications and information technology have made it much easier to reach constituents and provide effective representation in rural areas.

In the end, however, the Electoral Boundaries Commission should not be addressing these representational challenges. That is the responsibility of others. The Electoral Boundaries Commission should focus on enhancing political equality and fairness through representation by population. Currently, the situation is unfair because constituency populations are far from equal.

D. A democratic approach to redrawing Alberta's electoral boundaries

It is not our intention to suggest specific changes to the boundaries of particular constituencies. Rather, we believe that it is important to outline the key principles and overall changes that we hope will guide the Commission's work. If these basic elements are adopted, the specific changes to boundaries will be grounded in and guided by a strong commitment to ensuring political equality and representation by population.

1. Reduce the current 25% variance in the constituency population size to 5%.

The current legislation allows variances of 25%, but that was meant to serve as an outside limit, in very different times.

Clearly, the goal should be to have constituencies of equal population size, but due to the desire to take into account some local circumstances (for example, existing community and municipal boundaries) some modest degree of latitude is necessary. The proposed five per cent variance would actually amount to ten per cent, since it would allow five per cent above and below the average.

In addition, the Commission should not make use of their power to create any of the four "special exceptions" constituencies of even wider variance as allowed under the legislation, since the particular circumstances of these areas can be better addressed through other means, such as by providing more assistance and support to MLAs.

2. The Electoral Boundaries Commission should call for increased support to MLAs to assist them in effectively representing their constituents and addressing their varying needs

While acting on a commitment to political equality and representation by population, the Electoral Boundaries Commission should point out that they are no longer using population variance to address the challenges of representation. In doing so, the Commission should call on

appropriate bodies to ensure that all MLAs have the necessary staff and technica ተያበልተቸው 74 address those their representational challenges.

Such additional support is not only justifiable, but long overdue. It will mean that the Legislative Assembly must revise and enhance the formula for providing support, with the goal of allowing all MLAs to more effectively represent their constituents and their unique circumstances in rural, urban, and suburban constituencies throughout the province.

The increased costs are an investment in strengthening democracy in our province and a necessary complement to the move to more political equality and representation by population.

E. Conclusion and Next Steps

Public Interest Alberta's Democracy Task Force is encouraged by the opportunity for strengthening our democracy that is being provided by the work of the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission, and will be taking advantage of further opportunities for engagement as well as encouraging other individuals and organizations to be involved.

We wish the members of the Commission well in their important work, and look forward to the next steps in the coming months.

Submission to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission

As the Commission undertakes its review of Alberta's electoral boundaries, I submit that the primary goal should be to maximize democracy. As democracy is simply political equality, this means approaching the ideal of one citizen/one vote as closely as is reasonably possible.

In the past, this ideal has been consistently violated by making urban ridings more populous than rural ridings. This was usually defended on the basis that rural ridings were so large as to make representation much more difficult. This was never justified. Any problems arising from size should have been alleviated by providing rural representatives with whatever extra assistance was required to mitigate additional challenges. Effectively discounting the value of urban citizens' votes was undemocratic.

In any case, there is little substance left in the argument. Modern communications allow constituents to contact their representatives instantly. I can communicate with my MLA in Edmonton as easily as attending her constituency office or having her knock on my door.

Unfortunately, the bias toward rural ridings persists. In its 2009/2010 report, the Commission stated, "This raises a question about how large a division can be before it involves so many non-common interests that it is impractical for the disparate interests of the electors to be represented, and for the MLA to represent them." In fact, a profusion of non-common interests is much more likely in an urban riding than a rural one. Cities are characterized by variety. In some urban ridings, an MLA will have to communicate with constituents who speak a dozen or more different first-languages. In fact, disadvantaging urban ridings disadvantages ethnic minorities as most immigrants settle in our cities.

In the report, deviation from the average riding population (except for two special divisions) ranged from 23.4 per cent below in West Yellowhead to 16.65 per cent above in Calgary-Hawkwood. In effect, a citizen in West Yellowhead got one and a half votes, a citizen in Calgary-Hawkwood one vote. (A voter in the "special" division of Dunvegan-Central Peace, has almost two votes relative to a voter in Calgary-Hawkwood.) The situation is now likely worse as urban populations have grown much faster than rural populations. Our sister province, Saskatchewan, manages to keep the range within plus or minus five per cent. We should do no less.

I urge the Commission to ensure every Albertan has an equal vote. I see no reason why my voice should count for less than any other Albertan's simply because I live in the city.





I think the Commission should have waited until the results of the new federal census were released prior to soliciting feedback. Incorporating that data will be vital for the Commissions new boundary proposals. Beyond that:

- 1. Ridings should be kept as close together in population count as possible. I would encourage the commission to try and keep ridings within a tighter range than even the current laws require. Keeping each riding within say a 5% variance from the average population, to either side, helps to preserve the idea that all votes are equal. Use the up to 4 special districts as required, but beyond those, strive for equality in population count.
- 2. Do away with all riding names that involve politicians or other historical people. I often meet voters who are confused about which provincial riding they live in, and if the names of the ridings were drawn from the towns or communities, people would have less of this problem. I live in Edmonton-Mill Woods and almost no one in my community is confused by this name. However Edmonton-Decore, Manning or McClung are meaningless to people, in terms of where they live. I hope the commission will suggest to the Legislature the elimination of riding names that are not clearly descriptive of the places they represent.
- 3. Specifically for my home riding of Edmonton Mill Woods, the community of Knottwood, which is made up of neighborhoods known as Satoo, Ekota and Menisa, is currently cut in half. This strange boundary down the minor roads of Mill Woods Road W and 80th Street should be switched east to the major route that is 66th Street, so that the entire Knottwood community is represented by the one Mill Woods MLA, and not divided. The current boundary divides a singular community for no clear reason, I suspect it was

done previously to make the #s work, but it needs revision.

- 4. Likewise, for Edmonton Mill Woods, I would suggest the inclusion of the Bissett community. Currently Bissett is part of Mill Creek, which creates an odd boundary where Mill Woods has the eastern tip of the Minchau community, all the way east to 34th St, but just south of 38th Ave the boundary moves west again. This results in split mail routes with Canada Post, and people in these communities receive political literature from MLAs who may not represent them. Moving Bissett into the Mill Woods riding would solve for these difficulties, and given the age of the Bissett neighborhood, it is more in line with all the communities in the Mill Woods riding, rather than the many newer communities inside the Mill Creek riding.
- 5. Currently the Mill Creek riding has all of the commercial space directly north of the Mill Woods riding. I would suggest that this space be divided evenly between Mill Woods and Mill Creek, so that Mill Woods would extend north of its current boundaries, along Gateway Boulevard and along 50th street, with 63rd ave/Argyll Road/Sherwood Park Freeway acting as the new north boundary. All the commercial space east of 50th street would stay with the Mill Creek riding. The justification for this is that it doesn't change either ridings voter count, as almost no one lives there, but many of these commercial properties north of Mill Woods are frequented more by Mill Woods residents than they are by Mill Creek folks. People I've met with businesses near Gateway and Argyll sometimes wonder why their MLA is someone whose voters reside in far away places like Tamarack and Laurel.

Hello,

I am a student of political science and geomatics at Carleton University. My hometown is Bonnyville, and I have also lived in Lac La Biche, Sexsmith, Grande Prairie, and Red Deer. In this submission I wish to address several points with regards to representation in Northern Alberta (which I note is not represented on the Commission).

I will also preface this submission by noting that any private citizen participating in this process would be empowered to make a much more substantial submission if the deadline for this round of feedback were extended past Statistics Canada's scheduled release of population counts from the 2016 Census. While I realize this information will be available in time for the feedback on the Commission's initial proposal, I strongly urge the extension of the February 8th deadline to allow for better quality submissions in both rounds of feedback. It is simply not reasonable to expect private citizens to give the Commission quality information about their communities without access to the statistics it will use in its proposal.

Firstly, the Commission will find that the current districts in Grande Prairie require revision. Although Northern Alberta in general is (in my opinion, deservedly) over-represented, Grande Prairie-Wapiti was one of the most populated ridings in the last census and the estimates show that Grande Prairie-Smoky may have even grown larger. The census numbers will probably prove that the County of Grande Prairie and the communities within it could be divided into two ridings that each fall approximately at or above the provincial average, enabling areas further east and south to be transferred to other ridings, preferably West Yellowhead and Whitecourt-Ste. Anne, which are both well below average population. This would solve the problem of having two urban/rural ridings, and the Commission could create an entirely urban

riding containing most of Grande Prairie — the MLA for the rural riding would not have an exceptionally large distance to travel, which was the justification for abandoning such an arrangement at the last redistribution. If the Commission chooses this configuration, it would make sense to place the Grande Prairie neighbourhoods north of Highway 43 (and perhaps those west of Highway 40, if necessary) with the rural riding to balance their populations and ensure connectivity. This arrangement would also distribute the anticipated growth areas of the city into both ridings, which should be an important consideration for the Commission since Grande Prairie is projected to outpace growth elsewhere and it is not desirable to create ridings like Calgary-South East, which end up causing painful underrepresentation well before the next redistribution. (As an aside, I believe the Commission should attempt to do a better job than previous Commissions when considering outer suburbs of Edmonton and Calgary.)

I would also urge the Commission to preserve the two current special ridings, Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley and Lesser Slave Lake, because of their remoteness, small communities, and unique needs. Lesser Slave Lake is also the only riding in Alberta that is majority-Aboriginal, which the spirit of the current legislation would certainly encourage preserving. The Commission should not consider placing Sexsmith in D-CP-N given its degree of interaction with Grande Prairie, although it could consider moving Valleyview into either special riding if need be. Of course, this creates the problem of not being able to radically enlarge Peace River, but if the available estimates are accurate, its population will fall well above the 25% threshold.

More importantly, the Commission must carefully consider how it will ensure effective representation for Fort McMurray. While the boundary within the urban service centre should be adjusted to satisfy equal population, keeping two MLAs for the region is absolutely essential, even if best estimates show they would fall under the 25% threshold and the Committee is required to create one or two new special ridings (which it would be entitled to do, given the distance from Edmonton, that both ridings touch the provincial border, and both contain Indigenous communities). The Commission should even consider transferring some communities south of Fort McMurray to another riding in order to ensure representation is effective and not simply equal. This should be done for several reasons:

- 1. available data cannot possibly be as accurate as in the rest of the province, given the circumstances, so the Commission should err on the side of more representation rather than less.
- 2. the Commission should consider the region's transient population, especially since it is usually larger than at present, and the potential for its permanent population to grow quickly during the next 8-10 years.
- 3. the rebuilding process will be difficult and will put extra demands on the workload of the city's MLAs and their offices, threatening the effectiveness of local representation.
- 4. the Commission will avoid an air of partisanship if it preserves the two current (NDP-held) special districts, but also makes special consideration for Fort McMurray. (This is especially true since the urban/rural ratio is probably changing.)

In addition, since the Commission will most likely need to adjust other areas of Northern Alberta in order to ensure equal representation across the province, I would recommend that the Commission abolish the riding of Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills, which is geographically unwieldy. If Lac La Biche County is transferred to Bonnyville-Cold Lake, the Commission should consider naming that riding Beaver River — this would be geographically accurate, restore a former riding, and avoid the bad habit of triple-naming. The Commission could also consider the name of Lakeland, either for this configuration or a riding that combines St. Paul with Bonnyville-Cold Lake. It is also undesirable to preserve Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater's current configuration as a riding that stretches from remote communities like Calling Lake right to the edge of Edmonton. Of course, I will also point out that the estimates put all the ridings in northeastern Alberta above the 25% minimum, if the Commission can find a way to preserve them.

As a final aside, please fix the Crime Against Geography that is Calgary-MacKay-Nose Hill. I have no personal knowledge of the area but there can be absolutely no excuse for squeezing two ridings between the two populated parts of another riding. I can't tell who might have been advantaged, but it smacks of gerrymandering.



I relocated to Alberta in 2005, and was lucky enough to settle in St. Albert. In 2014, I moved out to Spruce Grove. Despite these two cities both being in the Capital Region, and despite being located within the same provincial constituency, these cities have very different issues, and due to this, the provincial constituency, as it is, is ineffective.

Spruce Grove is a small city, about half the size of St Albert, with what is still a largely rural feel to it. St Albert is a fairly wealthy bedroom community of Edmonton, which feels as if it's just another suburb of Edmonton.

Here in Spruce Grove, our municipal government often cooperates with that of Stony Plain and Parkland County, two similar municipalities in what has been deemed the "Tri-Region". Together, our municipal governments have completed some amazing projects, the most prominent of which may be the Tri-Leisure Centre on the West end of Spruce Grove. More recently, Spruce Grove and Stony Plain came together on a plan for a new RCMP detachment, to be located in a convenient location to serve both cities. Spruce Grove rarely, if ever, works with St. Albert on these kinds of projects.

St Albert often works with Edmonton on projects, much as Spruce Grove works with Stony Plain. Currently in the news is a plan in the works to amalgamate the transportation organizations within these two cities.

One common issue that I've noticed, having lived in Spruce Grove for the past 3 years, and in St Albert before that, is that Spruce Grove's issues often go ignored by the provincial representitive, typically hailing from St Albert. This has become a serious issue, where we have little access to our MLA, and our

MLA places us as a second priority. This is regardless of party, as the same issues existed under the previous government.

What I would like to propose is the creation of a new riding, to be named "Parkland", which would encompass the City of Spruce Grove, the Town of Stony Plain, and much of all of Parkland County. Meanwhile, St Albert could be split into two separate ridings, along with part of Sturgeon County, conveniently split along St Albert Trail.

This would ensure that the people of the Tri-Region are properly and fairly represented in the Legislature, and would likely make the current relationship within our region even stronger. St Albert's needs, as a very quickly growing city, would be better represented as well, as the MLAs in the city would be able to focus on the issues that face their portions of the city without having to also focus on another city located a half-hour away, which has a very different set of circumstances to deal with.

I appreciate the time taken to review my submission, and I hope that the Electoral Boundary Committee will accept this submission when drawing new riding boundaries for the 2019 election.

Dear Commission Members:

Town of Hanna Council at their January 10, 2017 Council meeting passed a Resolution authorizing the Mayor and Chief Administrative Officer to prepare a submission to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission identifying the concerns the Town of Hanna has with any potential changes to the Drumheller Stettler Constituency Boundary.

Town Council is aware of the legislated time period of review and support the requirement for such a review to insure that the electoral boundaries are working well for everyone equally across the Province. Council however, did want to make the Commission aware of their concerns if the boundary is enlarged or divided into other electoral regions. These concerns include:

- A potential loss or representation from our region.
- The existing Drumheller Stettler constituency is roughly 200 km east to west and 150km North to South. If the boundary is increased in size it becomes even more challenging for the MLA to understand and represent the residents within his constituency primarily as a result of the large geographical distance.
- There are significant challenges for rural Alberta currently and if the cities receive more constituencies it most likely means it comes at the expense of the rural ridings.
- If changes are being made to the Drumheller Stettler riding it is important to keep the Special Areas and the municipalities within it together. The Special Areas and the municipalities within it have a tremendous cooperative relationship with a number of regional agreements and working relationships. These cooperative agreements allow the region to operate effective fire and emergency services, regional water

I wish to submit a comment with regard to my boundary. I wish to be put back within the boundary of the MD of Bighorn for the following reasons.

I now live in Canmore, but the Town will not include my neighbours and I within it's Urban Growth Boundary, which we object to. We have approximately 4.42 acres between us.

In 1991, this land was in the MD of Bighorn, which we would prefer. However, the Town of Canmore negotiated a contentious deal with the MD to get Harvie Heights Hamlet enclosed within Canmore. The Harvie Heights people objected voraciously and so it was decided that this small strip of land, about 1 kilometre of road be included within the Town of Canmore Boundary, Canmore claiming that they needed the land for future development. This was all recorded in the local papers. However, I leased this land (the old Forest Rangers' Station - 2.44 acres) from the Provincial Government in 1992 and subsequently purchased it a few years later. My neighbours bought theirs from the current owner as it had been sold a few years prior to my moving into my half of the Ranger Station.

We have tried to have the land subdivided and developed into medium priced and subsidised housing for low income workers several times over the course of 25 years and have been told by the Mayor at the time, Ron Casey, and his friend, John Borrowman, who is now the mayor that we will never be able to develop it as long as he is around.

It has cost us thousands of dollars, we are not on a wildlife habitat patch or breeding ground or wildlife corridor. The planning department say they do not intend to have the land developed and therefore I request that we be put back within the MD of Bighorn, where we were before.

I would be glad of your feedback to this frustrating problem.

Submission to the Electoral Boundaries Commission 2017 January 16, 2016 By Irene Hunter and Marie Pang

Together, we come as representatives of an Edmonton Women's Breakfast group who meet monthly to discuss the political situation in Alberta and Canada. Our membership hails from nearly every riding in the City of Edmonton.

Most of us women take a keen interest in the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission of 2017. We encourage the size of the Alberta Legislature to remain at 87 seats and we look forward to the 2017 proposed Electoral Division Areas to be more equal in population.

First, I'd like to explain to anyone who does not live in the large metro cities of Calgary or Edmonton, the way we live. Our community leagues though the sizeable 3000-8000 residents do not isolate us; we rely on our entire city for our needs and services. Like the Breakfast Club women who come from all corners of the city, Edmonton residents use the entire city to shop, play, attend religious and spiritual groups, take part in leisure and recreation activities, attend educational facilities as well as attend to our medical needs.

Our electoral districts do not provide all services either, for example Edmonton-Riverview, population of 45,517 residents where I live does not have a post office, no library, no swimming pool nor a high school however, Riverview has a university and an ice arena. Our junior high and high school students ride the public transit to school. City dwellers often ride bus or take rapid transit to work since rush hour traffic in the morning and evening can take 2 hours each way. Our cities are prone to traffic jams and gridlocks.

Like city residents, Metro MLA's often travel outside of the riding boundaries to reach and support constituents and act as provincial representatives for City, Province, National and Global events. Metro MLA's can be seen at International events, National Health Councils, Global Conferences, City Festivals and greeting visiting dignitaries. They are also seen presenting funding cheques to various organizations since headquarters are often in Edmonton.

Personally, I have seen urban MLA's at Ghandi dinners, Alberta Global Council conferences, International Speakers event, International Peace Day and Daughter's Day, at Gay Parades, Women's Marches, Environment week, Heritage Days and Book talks. Most often these events are out of their ridings.

Urban MLA's face similar traffic and parking problems as metro residents. To avoid traffic snarls and find parking spaces which are both a premium financially and numbers one leaves earlier. Once I witnessed Rachel Notley before becoming our new premier circling the block in apparent desperation to find street parking so that she may give the opening speech at a Women's Day March at the University of Alberta which is out of her riding.

Urban MLA's are extra ordinarily busy so they don't need extra large ridings.

We also are supportive of using the Federal 2016 census stats that are to be released in February of 2017 rather than Municipal surveys which have been challenged by Alberta Municipal affairs, specific to the issue of permanent residents versus non permanent (shadow) residents. For our calculations we will use the provided best estimates from Alberta Treasury Board and Finance and Statistics Canada anticipating the differences to be slight. If stats are disportionate, may we have the ability to adjust? 1.

Our Recommendations

1. That the size of the Alberta Legislature remains the same.

The 2009/10 Alberta Electoral boundaries Commission failed to do the hard work of redrawing the provincial boundaries to reflect the increased population in cities and simply increased the number of seats and continued making hybrid rural-urban ridings. The 2006 Canadian Census (Stats Canada) used was 4 years old.

The table below compares the number of MLA/MNA's in the 4 largest Canadian provinces.2.

According to the table, Alberta has the most MLA's per population and per land size. The cost of adding more MLA's is not feasible or reasonable.

2. That Good Governance and the Laws of election be followed to meet needs of ALL Albertans

That good governance and electoral rights as defined in the Charter of Rights and Freedom be followed to meet the needs of all Albertans. 2.

Indicators of unfair representation:

- When government legislation differs from public opinion
- When entitlement sets in 44 years of one party governance
- When the right to fair transition of government is thwarted

Historical Progression of democratic rights for Albertans

- In the late 1980's, the Alberta Government challenged the Electoral Rights of the Charted of Rights and Freedom. In April 1989, *Madame Justice McLaghlin* granted an order stating that the British Columbia provincial election boundaries were inconsistent with the right to vote in section 3 of the Charter. A population variance of 25% above or below the norm should not be tolerated. At the time, Alberta had 51 constituencies over or below the acceptable variance. 3.
- In December 1990, the government introduced legislation to reform the discrepancies and the challenge was dropped. It provided for 43 urban and 40 rural ridings. To overcome the discrepancies, it created 'hybrid constituencies' consisting of urban and rural votes, and thereby diluting the urban voice. 4.
- Since 1990, Alberta has decreased the number of constituencies which are outside of the acceptable variance from 51% to 11.4%.
- 2010 Boundaries, the largest discrepancy was Dunvegan-Central Peace population 24,584 and a variance of 40% and Calgary-Hawkwood 47,686 and a variance of 17%. The voting disparity between the 2 ridings reached 57%.

Today in Alberta. Alberta Electoral Boundaries Website 2017 used for following calculations:

- 26 years later, Alberta has 87 constituencies. Edmonton (19) and Calgary (25) together have 44 constituencies with the rest of Alberta accounting for 43 constituencies. Respectfully the totals are 973,409 and 1,317,772 for a total of 2,291,181 and for the rest of Alberta the population total is 2,291,181.5.
- In 2017, Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley will have a population of 25,192, whereas Calgary South-East will be at 79,034. In terms of individual voting power, Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley vote would count 3 times to Calgary-SouthWest.
- Manitoba allows for a variance of 10% except for the region above latitude 53 and BC is proposing a variance of 15% for 12 constituencies. The Province of Manitoba allows for a variance of 10% except frt regions above the 53 parallel.
- The Province of British Columbia is proposing a variance of above /below 15% for 12 electoral districts. 6 The 2017 Alberta Electoral Boundaries commission has 29 electoral districts above/below a variance of 15%.

To provide fair and just representation the current variance of 25% should be decreased. Based on 48,883 provincial quotient, Edmonton should have 20 constituencies and Calgary would have 27 while the rest of Alberta has 40 constituencies.

My main comment would be **that we do not increase the number of MLA's from the present number**. My argument is based on the following criteria.

The State of California and the Province of Alberta have very similar demographics in that both jurisdictions have their population based in a few large metropolitan areas. Both jurisdictions' populations are primarily urban.

Basic Statistics:

	California	Alberta
Population	39,140,000	4,500,000
Legislature/MLS members	80	87
Senators	40	
Total Representation	120	87
Representation per member	326,166	51,724

Based on the above statistics I feel it would be prudent and fiscally responsible to adjust the boundaries to reflect a larger number of members per constituency as opposed to increasing the number of MLAs.

In this age of new modes of communication our MLAs now rely on electronic modes of communication more and more. Thus, by increasing the number of members in a constituency the ability to communicate would not be adversely affected.

As far as trading areas go, the population is now very mobile and people now work, shop, worship and socialize outside the area they live in more than ever. I feel that using the above criteria (work, shopping, worshiping, socializing, etc.) to increase the number of MLA's is no longer a valid argument. The population will soon adjust to new constituency boundaries.

The ability to represent 50,000 or 100,000 constituents would have little effect on services, provided the MLA has the ability to have staff to match the required work load. More MLAs does not necessarily mean better government.

I feel the present number of MLAs is adequate for them to carry out their fiduciary responsibilities to govern the Province of Alberta in a responsible manner.

To Whom it may Concern Jan. 13, 2017

Somehow, all levels of government must come up with a formula for fair representation of all Canadians at the 3 levels of government but **this event is for provincial boundaries.**

(I do not know the urban versus rural representative count for Alberta provincially at this time. Can't seem to find this stat on the internet).

There is **no need** for MORE REPRESENTATIVES coming out of the URBAN centers, yes, the high concentrations of voters, but really the diversity of their needs is LESS within the small area of the city, compared to the **diversity of needs** in many RURAL areas with must less populations.

We also need to note, that some urban communities have DECREASED their populations since the last census 2011.

How about constructing a system in ALBERTA that:

Urbans:

- ---- for every incorporated city with a population of 1,000,000 or more eight representatives
- ----for every incorporated city with a population of 500,000 to 999,999 six representatives
- ----for every incorporated city with a population of 100,000- 499,999 four representatives
- ----for incorporated cities 50,000 to 99,999 three representatives
- ----for incorporated cities 20,000 to 49,999 **two representatives**
- ----for incorporated cities up to 20,000 one representative

Going by the 2015 population census of Alberta's 18 listed cities, the above table would see elected 46 representatives of urban centers. That would leave 87-46 = 41 rural representatives. Not quite equal, but there are seven (7) cities of populations under 20,000, five (5) of which are under 15,000. One could state that these cities are RURAL centers.

Rurals:

- ----there should be a limit to the total miles from one constituency border across to the next, say; ? 400 km (how are the rural boundaries selected now?)
- ----similar geographics should be included in each constituency, say: foothills and mountains; prairies; parklands; forests;

Redistribution: - Redrawing the electoral map for greater fairness

The purpose of redistribution is to redraw the riding boundaries so as to give all voters an equal say. Your task is to readjust the constituency boundaries so as to put the same number of voters in each, and avoid gerrymandering for the benefit of one party.

Should Rural Constituencies Have Fewer Voters?

The number of voters in a rural constituency should be the same as the number of voters in an urban constituency. Both deserve the same degree of representation.

I do not accept that rural constituencies should have fewer voters because the distances are larger. The population density is decreasing in rural areas, and the remaining population is concentrated in the towns. When one farmer farms thousands of acres, there are few truly rural voters. Rural constituencies will have to get bigger.

In today's world, we no longer need to meet face to face thanks to the internet, email, and Skype. Young people are used to conferencing via internet devices. Everyone has a cell phone. MLAs can just as easily contact voters in Edmonton as in Fort Vermillion. Distance is no longer an issue. The size of the riding does not matter. Each MLA must be representing the same number of voters.

The smaller cities, like Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie, and Vegreville have the same box stores and curved sub-divisions as Edmonton. Why are the 23,000 voters of Dunvegan-Central Peace and the 26,000 of Fort McMurray-Conklin twice as worthy as the 52,000 voters of Spruce Grove-St. Albert and Calgary-Northern Hills?

Anticipate Future Population Changes

We should also try to anticipate future population changes. We know that the outer rims of Edmonton and Calgary are scheduled for continued development, and the new homes are going to result in a large population growth. Unless these constituencies start with fewer voters, in ten years they will be grossly under represented.

In the same way, by looking at recent trends, we can predict which areas will continue to decline in population. In these regions, we should start with extra voters, so that in ten years there won't be a large disparity.

Who is Against a Fair Redistribution?

- Rural areas that presently have more power than their numbers warrant.
- Rural MLAs who might lose their soft jobs and large travel allowances.

In conclusion, the citizens of Alberta do not want more M.L.A.s. Both the Wildrose and New Democrats represent rural ridings, which will have to become larger in the interest of fairness. I have voted in every election since the late 1960's and have felt for many years that the disparity in size between most urban and rural constituencies was unfair and anti-democratic creating a considerable amount of political inequality in the province. Until the last election this has created a political advantage for the party in power. 

I understand that there is a significant discrepancy between the various rural constituencies and urban ones with respect to the population in the different ridings. My concern is that the rural constituencies have many more government bodies such as school boards, municipalities, Indian reserves, metis settlements as well as many service and religious boards to be dealt with. For example in the Peace River constituency there is over 10 municipalities that the MLA has to attend, 4 school boards (I believe) a metis settlement, 3 reserves, and of course each community has numerous churches, and other service bodies that require the attendance of the MLA for their annual meetings or such political meetings which are required for the MLA to do the job required. One must always consider the distance that the MLA has to travel from Edmonton to the constituency and then travel to the various communities in order to attend that meeting. Please look at the size of some of the northern ridings and for that some of the southern ridings to review the distance between various communities together with the distance from Edmonton. A MLA from the city area does not have those obligations, and in fact may not attend the various council meetings or board meetings. The former MLA Al Adair and MLA Frank Oberle always commented how they missed their children growing up since they were always on the road. Check with the rural MLAs to determine the kilometres they drive each year to serve the constituents of their riding. Various submissions will say it is only fair that one vote equals one vote however as the Supreme Court of Canada has ruled one must look at the various facts that constitute the duty and requirements of a MLA. To increase the area size of a rural constituency will only discourage potential Albertans from seeking office, and also will affect the rural populace in the fact that it seems that the government is not taking their viewpoints into account.

Be very careful before altering the boundaries of the large rural constituencies.



STP (Same Ten People)

As I watched the presentations to the Alberta Electoral Boundary Commission yesterday in St Paul, I was struck by the unified message coming from the municipal leaders and other presenters about the possible threat to Rural Alberta. All presenters thought the current boundaries should be left alone even though they were getting out of whack with Alberta's electoral ratios that provide equal representation. Over and over, the municipal leaders referred to the challenges of distance and the need to communicate with our people and deal with the problems that arise.

I reflected over my time working in the entire region, trying to get many projects to move forward both in my working life, my volunteer projects and my family life. I feel the core of the issue lies in the concept of STP (or Same Ten People) that underlies all rural life. In the urban world most organizations are large and have many members. Duties are spread out. Sports are run by large community leagues. Charities are run by large organizations with staff and resources.

Most rural organizations are run by small organizations with little or no staff. In my experience very small rural locations have up to 10 people who run everything. In Tulliby Lake (a community of 100) the School Board, the arena board, the 4 H and everything else was done by the same 10 people. In Ashmont, we have the fire department leading many community projects. Mallaig (a community of 300) has a few core groups as STPs that manage many aspects of the Community. This arises from the wants of the community to have all aspects of a modern community, but not the resources to accomplish their desires. It is hard on these volunteers and they need much more support from their municipality and, as they grow, from the province, whose role is centralized in the office of the MLA. Whatever the political persuasion of the STPs, they are supported and encouraged by their municipality and any other levels of government they come into contact with.

As communities get larger and their wants become greater they get more groups of STPs often

interlinked. Their service clubs take on many roles but often with only 10 people active and working. In Elk Point (a community of 1200) there may be 30 to 40 organizations, often with multiple roles, and yet there will not be 300 people active but more likely 50 active volunteers, and no staff. The town and county depend on the efforts of these volunteers to keep the community going and the MLA is often the point of contact for many government agencies and programming initiatives for both provincial and federal programs. The volunteer base is always stretched thin and in danger of collapse. This causes rural municipalities, when looking at sustainability, to see an ongoing crisis as they are usually responding to crisis in this volunteer sector.

In St Paul (a community of 6000) some organizations get larger, still operated by STPs but many organization run on the passions of their small STP volunteers. The economies of scale are not there but that does not stop them from soldiering on. For instance, the St Paul Chamber had 200 businesses but only 8 directors actively involved when I worked there. They did keep going through the efforts of their paid staffer. They try to run active programs and services for their members just like their big city cousins.

Why should this be of interest to the Alberta Electoral Boundary Commission?

Rural Alberta runs on the STP model at every level. Rural Alberta seems always to resist any change by government. When I studied change management for my master's program, a truism was that "people resist change when it threatens their ability to get work done." STPs, like many people, depend on their connections, their network, and their friends to get things done in their milieu. Changing the boundaries of anything will change where they shop, where they access health care, their learning choices and their political connections. It changes how work gets done.

For 15 years I have worked for a nonprofit group, Riverland Recreational Trail Society, that runs the 288 km Iron Horse Trail that goes through 10 municipalities. The Iron Horse Trail is just a dirt trail through the bush. However many issues arise each month. The STP involved is active and diligently sorting out issues with 10 municipalities and occasionally the Alberta Government. We all, municipalities and nonprofits, work hard at keeping our organizations efficient at grooming the STPs we depend upon in each community for support. Changes to the political boundaries are just one more issue every so often. Each municipal election also brings more newbies to the table who need to be worked with so they can understand the complexities of this new environment. We learn to adjust to changing government but this adjustment effects our efficiency at getting things done.

In my career I served a local college, Portage College, as a regional director in the Lac La Biche – St Paul constituency and the Bonnyville – Cold Lake constituency as well as some parts of Vermilion and Vegreville constituencies. As a regional college we had the many problems working in 18 or 20 communities at the same time, but we found ways to use the STPs to make it work, always individualized to fit the community. We did not work on Goodfish First Nation the way we did in Cold Lake, nor did we work in Frog Lake First Nation the way we did in Saddle Lake First Nation. We worked through the local municipality and though the network of STPs in the community.

So when I hear the Mayor of Bonnyville talking about putting in sewers in Bonnyville costing the same as in Edmonton, I understand the infrastructure issues he is espousing but I also understand that it is his STP network that is so much smaller but has to deal with the same issues. The MLAs presenting are trying to talk of the number of stops they have to make to deal with their many communities issues. Partly they are all referring to the issues of scale when comparing themselves to the large communities but they are also talking about the hidden dimension of the issues of their STPs. STP networks operate on personal contact. The rural community depends on these STPs to a much larger extent and this is why they seek to keep it the same; it preserves the ability of the community to get things done.

How should the Commission respond to Rural Alberta's concern's?

As you approach changing electoral boundaries I think you need to keep in mind the needs of the various economic drivers such as shopping, employment, industrial basis and regional organizations such as municipalities, school boards and First Nations as has been well stated. However, the needs of the volunteer base in Rural Alberta, its very lifeblood, need to be considered. For instance, if Lac La Biche has to go together with another area, choose Athabasca over Fort McMurray for location and similarities of economic base as well as the historical connections that the STP folks have that will enable them to work together. Try not to put Cold Lake in with Fort McMurray as was done federally as they are the geographically distant and have few connections within their STP communities. Onion Lake's connections are with Lloydminster; Frog Lake is connected more today with Bonnyville than its historical connection to St Paul, although it is increasingly connected to Lloydminster.

Your task will be difficult, trying to balance the electoral vision of equal voting, although I think if you look

at the historical connections of the people and the changing demographics you should be able to find ways to support the networks of STPs in each community, large and small, who do much of the work in Rural Alberta. Try not to cut these networks apart. Try to enhance them where possible.



Constituency Boundaries Review Submission:

Clear Hills County is a rural municipality located in the Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley electoral district in northern Alberta, Canada. The constituency is one of two in the province that is considered a special district and allowed to have less than the average population due to the lack of population and distance between communities.

As detailed in the Electoral Boundaries Commission Act, the population of a proposed electoral division should vary no more than 25% from the provincial average except for some unique and special cases.

For 2016, this means that, with 87 seats in the Alberta legislature, on average each riding should have approximately 49,000 residents. With the possibility of 25% variance, this means that each riding should be between 61,250 and 36,750 residents. As outlined on the 2017 Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission's website, the majority of existing ridings currently fall within this range, and as such, Albertans should not expect a significant readjustment from the status quo.

Clear Hills County along with Alberta's other rural municipalities and the residents they represent are concerned that the 2016/17 Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission recommendations to alter the boundaries due to population rather than considering the rural geographic sizes and locations will result in fewer rural seats and a reduction in the ability of Alberta's legislature to adequately represent the interests of rural Albertans and rural communities.

In closing, it is the position of Clear Hills County that the current rural electoral boundaries are already at their maximum size and that expanding the boundaries of any of Alberta's larger electoral constituencies will only increase the existing challenges facing those constituents and their elected representatives.

RE: 2017 ELECTORAL BOUNDARIES REVIEW

The M.D. of Wainwright is pleased to provide its submission to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission. We understand that the Commission is reviewing existing constituency boundaries based on population changes in the province over the last 8 years.

In our view, there has not been enough change in Alberta's rural population to warrant modification of the electoral boundaries. We acknowledge that many constituencies have grown or at least remained stable and viable. However, the provincial average for each constituency has remained fairly steady at about 49,000 each based on 87 areas. According to our calculations using the plus or minus 25 percent factor, this brings the minimum population requirement to 36,750 and the maximum to 61,250. In consideration of the current population data available, the majority of existing constituencies fall within these two thresholds with the exception of only a few exceeding the minimum and maximum limits. In our view, this seems completely adequate to meet the requirements set before the commission.

In closing, we encourage the commission to keep the rural boundaries the same as the geographical size of the existing rural constituencies are large enough. Increasing the size any further would, in our opinion, erode grass roots democracy and move the M.L.A.'s further away from being in touch with the people. We encourage the commission to keep the status quo for rural Alberta to preserve our rural voice and representation in the Alberta Legislature.

We appreciate this opportunity to bring forth our concerns to you and your committee. We ask for your kind consideration of our submission when making your final decision in the Electoral Boundaries Review process.

Alberta Electoral Boundary

January 2017.

Previous Alberta Electoral Boundary Commissions have taken special efforts to preserve the power of Alberta's rural voters. When Alberta's population was primarily rural, rural power was legitimate. When urban population growth outpaced rural growth, Electoral Commissions created devices to ignore where the Albertans actually lived, rouses preserving power disproportionally. While the rhetoric was simpler than the deferments and epicycles used to explain the Ptolemaic System of Planetary Orbit, the effect was the same. Obfuscation! My goal here is promote electoral boundaries that treat all Albertans equally. After this discussion, I will debunk one popular reason for deviating from the principle of one person, one vote.

Our neighboring provinces do better; their electoral districts have nearly equal number of electors. They do so because their politics are different. There is no advantage to gerrymandering because voters change party allegiance from time to time. An advantage to one party would become the other party's advantage in some future election. Further, because Alberta voters outside of Edmonton and Calgary always elect Conservative MLA's, wide-sweeping rules favoring one party over another are dressed up as a defense of principle rather than as a crude power grab. Rural Alberta has always held a hammer. They use it. They want it still. As urban Alberta grows, defending this disparity becomes trickier. Now is the time to ignore the sophistry that supports the notion that the space between voters should determine our representation.

In the late 1990's, I presented to the electoral boundary commission. There I heard that the cities could get by with fewer MLAs than rural Alberta because the cities all had the same interests. It was as if cows or crops in rural Alberta were all different and needed special management considerations. One management consideration is the claim that since their districts are so large, effective MLA service requires fewer electors; service area trumped the number of people served. I wonder if the supporters of this theory ever spent time in traffic in Edmonton or Calgary or even in our smaller cities. When I lived in rural Alberta, I spent less time travelling across large electoral divisions than travelling through Calgary or Edmonton. The space between us is no justification for unequal representation in this age of good roads and fast vehicles. And everyone knows it. Distances within an electoral district has no impact on effective service. Voter disparity is nothing more than a device to hold onto power. So too is the two culture theory of rural and urban purity.

My thesis is that setting electoral boundaries is about distributing power and that this distributed power should leave all electors equal. Other considerations are secondary. Our last redistricting created some urban/rural districts. Excellent but expect blowback and deal with it. In my lifetime, rural folk are comfortable shopping in urban centres, going to school in urban centres, and worshipping in urban centres. For generations, rural voters have found work in urban centres while countless urbanites work in rural settings. Sometimes electors cross boundaries and inter-marry.

None of this mixing has been problematic. If our two "cultures" don't always understand or agree with each other, intermingling can only help. Of course, application of egalitarian principles is not easy.

There are reasons why boundaries exist. Boundaries reflect geographic facts, as well as social, economic, and cultural ties. Electoral boundaries reflecting where people live and work are desirable in so far as possible. Friends who live outside of Red Deer have found themselves in different districts with each boundary change. Perhaps it is unavoidable. Your task is challenging, requiring careful study and reflection. Rather than preserving old and dated power structures, focus on doing equality better. Best wishes.

We are writing to share our own particular dissatisfaction with the constituency in which we have been placed. We live about 21 km west and north of Cochrane, but have been placed in the Airdrie constituency. Our address is 270240 Range Road 54.

This means that we are separated from most of our neighbours, who are in the Banff-Cochrane riding. We have no ties whatsoever with Airdrie. We never heard from any of the candidates in the run up to the provincial election, and we have never subsequently heard from our MLA. She cannot possibly represent us, since she has no interest in us whatsoever. We get our mail in Cochrane (which is a 15 minute drive away on the main roads), this is where we do our shopping, meet friends, work out at the local gym, belong to the Rotary Club, etc., etc. In other words, Cochrane and its immediate surroundings is our "neighbourhood". And yet, we are stuck in the Airdrie riding, which is a long drive away on back roads and has no natural connections to us whatsoever.

You seem to have carved out a small deviation westward at the southwest corner of the Airdrie constituency that includes our home. Cannot this be corrected? The number of people that this would remove from the Airdrie riding and place in the Cochrane-Banff riding is surely not large enough to make a difference to your numbers.



Please make absolutely every effort to ensure that constituencies are redrawn so that every vote is equal. As an example, from 2016 data, there are 51,611 voters in my constituency, but only 29,533 voters in WRP Leader Brian Jean's Fort McMurray-Conklin constituency (this is just one example, there are far greater imbalances in many other other constituencies across this province). This means that a voter from Fort McMurray-Conklin has a vote that is 175% the weight of my own. Or, in other words, 4 voters in Fort McMurray-Conklin have the strength of 7 voters in Calgary-Currie. This marginalizes my vote based purely on where I live and is an affront to our democracy.

Some defend the status quo of population inequality amongst constituencies by citing that a large geographical area can make a constituency more difficult to represent. In our digital era, physical distance has never been less of an obstacle than it is now, and one could easily argue for any number of other factors that make representation difficult, such as the % of a constituency's population living in poverty, the number of head offices in a constituency, the number of languages spoken in a constituency, etc. To favour only geography as a reason for strengthening the power of some votes over others is not only disingenuous, it's discrimination.

I had the privilege of attending the hearing in Olds, and found the presentation to be intelligent and reasonable

I could see that the map around our constituency (Olds Didsbury Three Hills) is fine as it is, but the constituencies north and east are underpopulated while those south are overpopulated, and the imbalance will probably continue and increase.

If the Olds-Didsbury constituency is to be altered, I would agree with either of two options: 1. Include Sundre with Olds-Didsbury, and allow Rocky Mountain House to extend east towards Sylvan Lake; OR (possibly more effective) follow Hwy 22 south past Water Valley to Hwy 290 and include everything West of that line with Rocky Mountain House. To increase Olds-Didsbury, add population from Airdrie constituency up to the town of Airdrie and/or East of Olds-Didsbury towards Drumheller. Adding the Water Valley area will increase the population of Rocky Mountain House by up to 1000 people.

While I understand the concern about a given county having to deal with more than one MLA, I can also see the opposite advantage: if you have two people working for you, that is twice as much voice in the legislature. As well, if one of the two proves to be less effective then you still have the other.

I somewhat agree with your goal of keeping communities fairly homogenous for representation most pleasing to the population, and I completely agree that it is not good practice to mix large urbans with rural areas which will have conflicting issues.

Having observed you in action, I am confident that you will make the choices that work most effectively,

given the need to get the numbers right.



The most important aspect has to be per-person representation. The range of +- 25% for representation seems too broad (values between 61,100 and 36,700 not requiring a consideration of revision of boundaries results in almost doubling the value/influence of some voters over other voters). I would support special circumstances justifying values lower than 25% for the sparsely populated Northern regions. However, I believe the stated target ranges for revision of boundaries should be +- 15% (population range of 56,200 to 41,600). That change of range would mean that based on 2015 population numbers 12 rather than 5 Constituencies need to be smaller, and 12 rather than 3 should be larger (special circumstances do justify the Northern constituencies being smaller). I also do not think that any constituency should have a population value that is more than 15% above the average of the census data that is the basis for establishing the boundaries.

I also believe a rule should be added about the shape of constituencies to avoid the type of bizarre boundaries that a political group may push to have created based on demographic data to maximize their chances of winning. Any adjustment of the current shapes should be done in a way that makes the shapes more regular, closer to square shapes.





In a democracy it is important that all citizens are provided with an equal say on the selection of a government that will work for us. In order to do that we need to continually ensure that the value of each vote is the same, within practical limits.

I understand that the legislation requires a review of electoral boundaries at regular intervals. I agree with the timing as it currently stands, more frequent reviews would be an unnecessary expense. Less frequent reviews might skew the voting to deprive certain constituencies of the representation they deserve.

With the premise that all citizen's votes should be treated equally, we have to recognize that there are other practical and logistical limitations that would prevent a strict adherence to the principle. The guideline that all constituencies should be within +/- 25% of the average is a reasonable compromise.

It is also important to understand that the interests of the various constituencies can differ greatly. Urban interests can vary significantly from rural interests. It is therefore important that those differences be considered when changes to boundaries are being decided. From a practical perspective it would not be possible to have strictly urban or rural constituencies but, the goal should be to avoid mixing urban and rural. To do this would be create divisions of interest within a constituency and mute the voice of one or the other of the groups.

Considering the goal of equal weighting for all constituencies I believe that the current divisions meet that target with only a few minor adjustments required.

The estimated population of 4,252,879 (Statistics Canada as of July 1, 2016) spread over 87

constituencies yields a target size of 48,884 people per constituency. Assuming that a variation of 25% higher or lower that the target size gives us a range of between 36,663 and 61,105 citizens per constituency.

With the downturn in the Alberta economy it is unlikely that we will see the sort of growth that Alberta has had in the past couple of decades or so. The 2016 estimates should give us a fairly accurate basis to consider any required changes to boundaries for the next 10 years.

Of the 87 constituencies there are a total of 8 that fall outside of the stated target size.

I recommend that for the smaller mainly rural constituencies that no changes be made based solely on the population. The constituencies of Dunvegan-Central Peace, Fort McMurray-Conklin and Lesser Slave Lake although smaller in population size, all cover vast areas. In order to adjust the population to conform with the target would require increasing the physical size of the area. Reasonable representation would become more difficult if the area is increased in any meaningful way, just to level that population.

The Banff-Cochrane constituency is currently marginally larger than the target by a little less than 3,000 people. Adjusting the population to simply get it within the +/- 25% range would be a short term fix due to significant growth that is ongoing. It would be advisable to move the population closer to the mid point. The physical footprint of the constituency should be reduced to a tighter circle around the towns of Banff and Canmore and move parts of the more rural portions of the constituency into the neighbouring constituencies of Rimbey Rockyview (under by about 20,000) and Livingstone Mcleod (under by about 20,000). Both of these ridings are below the target by approximately 8-10%. This would also meet the goal of keeping similar interests urban, rural, and in this case Parks in each constituency.

In Calgary McCall the constituency is over the target by about 10% or 7,000 people. Redistributing 3,000 to Calgary Mackay-Nose Hill, 2,000 to Calgary Cross and 2,000 to Calgary Greenway would keep all 4 constituencies within the target range. It would also meet the goal of avoiding significant mixing of urban and rural interests.

Calgary Northern Hills is only slightly over the target (200 people) A proactive adjustment of approximately 2,000 people to the Calgary Foothills constituency would keep both within the target and not impact any of the more rural ridings.

Calgary South East is over the target by a significant margin approximately 18,000 people. The constituency is bordered by Calgary-Shaw (under by 11,000), Calgary Hays (under by 14,000), Calgary Fort (under by 10,000) all of which are below the target. By redistributing the 4 ridings together they could all easily be brought into the desired range.

Edmonton Strathcona is over the target range by approximately 5,000 people. The neighbouring constituencies are Edmonton McClung (under by 18,000), Edmonton Rutherford (under by 15,000), Edmonton Whitemud (under by 8,000). Redistributing the 5,000 to the other ridings would easily keep all the constituencies within the target range and would keep the urban and rural nature intact.

Overall I believe that the current distribution of populations within the constituencies is quite workable and that with some minor adjustments referred to above the electorate in Alberta will be reasonably represented in the legislature.

I plan on participating in a public hearing and submitting a written submission but there is an issue that needs to be addressed by the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission immediately in order for it to credibly do its job.

The deadline for written submissions to Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission is February, 8, 2017. StatsCanada is <u>releasing the first population results from the 2016 census</u> on February 8, 2017.

The commission needs to push back the deadline for written submissions a few weeks to Feb. 28, 2017 in order to give Albertans the necessary time to consider and analyze the latest data and integrate it into their submissions.

If the commission does not push back its deadline and does not give Albertans the time to analyze and consider the latest census data this first round of written submissions will be of poor quality, of little use to the commission and ultimately a waste of its time and of the time of Albertans who are going to the effort of participating in this critical process.

Especially given that the 2016 census data will be the data that's used by the commission to draw its boundaries it's a disservice to Albertans to force them to rely on outdated 2011 census data for their written submissions.

I offer the following thoughts. I hope they are useful to the Commission.

1. A the core, representation should be equitable for all in the province. A general target number of constituents per MLA insures perceptions of fairness. But that would not be equal representation.

There should be tolerances for constituencies that are geographically spread out, and the distance from Legislature should also be a consideration. Travel times to and from the Legislature might be considered as a factor. I think representing a rural jurisdictions involves huge travel and time just to meet people. Less access to their MLA can effectively reduces the representation rural residents, when compared to the level of service that a more urban Member of the Assembly might be able to offer.

Similarly, a Member of the Assembly representing a riding adjacent to the Legislature, would be able to provide the highest availability and level of service, so possibly the number of citizens in that riding might be slightly higher, than a riding in Medicine Hat, Grande Prairie, Fort McMurray or even Calgary.

2. I believe that we have too many Elected representatives.

So while addressing the geographic distribution, and travel times from the Legislature, if the number of elected representatives dropped by 20 or so, I believe that would serve our democracy well. Citizens might more quickly understand that the role is one of representation in a representative democracy. Our civil service would be easily adjust service models to compensate and hopefully our day to day interaction with government would be less political.

Generally I think we expect too much from elected officials - as it relates to the transactions and day-to-day interface with government. Elected representatives should be looking at the longer term, and of course providing structured oversight.

I would like to see fewer elected representatives, more focused on the longer term values of our citizens.

3. I believe that constituency boundaries should align, where possible with the natural affiliations of the riding. If boundaries can align to federal constituencies, municipal wards and school boards, it would be helpful.

Each part of a city and communities are be unique. By example, I would not have all constituencies as slices of a pie trying to consider all citizens as being the same. We are different. It is reflected in the communities we live in, the things that we do once we are home, and a common set of needs based upon geography and situation.

People from certain areas may align politically and there may be a desire to blend them to force a broader perspective - I think such a forced union to be unwise. Please try to keep the 'politics' out of boundary work.

I think it is up to municipalities to best plan communities, so I don't that using the boundaries commission for such purposes is a good idea. I believe Municipalities can do a better job in this regard, of 'master planning' to insure diverse and well engaged communities providing advantages for all, but I still believe that is there job.





I spent some time going over the current Electoral division maps and the rules governing them. Here are some observations that stood out and the EBC should consider rectifiying these issues:

- 1. Allowing a 25% variance in Electoral districts. This allowance is very lax in my opinion. I think the maximum allowable variance should be 10%, with no exceptions.
- 2. There have been a lot of debate over the size of urban and rural constuencies in many of the submissions I read. I strongly believe every citizen's vote should be counted equally, and therefore (in the current system), every ED should have the same number of people.
- 3. There is a big divide in the issues a person living in rural vs urban Alberta faces. So rural ED's should be separate from urban.
- 4. An example of #3 is the awkward division of Fort McMurray. The MLA for FortMac-Wood Buffalo represents both an oilsands worker living in Fort McMurray and also a person living in the national park in Peace Point,AB. Certainly these people have different poins of view on the environment.
- 5. Grand Prairie's division is also similarly awkward.
- 6. Lastly, the province of Alberta has a very dynamic population. The population of communities change with the booms and busts in the Oil & Gas sector making reviews like this imperative. A better solution would be to move to a proprtional system of representation in the Legislative assembly.

There is too much variation in population of Alberta electoral districts. This ranges from less than 25,000 people in Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley to more than 50,000 in Spruce Grove-St. Albert and Calgary-Northern Hills. This disparity dilutes democracy in that the voting power of urban residents is unfairly less than rural residents.

In the past the argument was made that rural ridings could not be made larger due to large areas required for travel. With the advent of more electronic means of being engaged in the democratic process (i.e. telephone town halls, etc.) the travel argument has less merit than before. For the update of Alberta Electoral Boundaries, consideration needs to be made to more evenly distribute the number of electors more equally across ridings even if this makes some ridings larger. An elector's vote in Alberta should have the same 'weight' regardless of where it is cast in the province.

Note that there are much larger (in area) federal ridings and their representatives seem to be able to manage the larger geographic area. Larger ridings - to more evenly represent electors - should be considered where needed in Alberta.

The Banff/Cochrane district (including Canmore, Exshaw, and Dead Man's Flats) census is projected at 639000 for 2016. Despite being over the maximum number of constituents, these communities vary greatly in terms of needs, conversations, and location. Banff, Canmore, Exshaw and Dead Man's have vastly different concerns than Cochrane, which was evidenced by the 2015 Federal Election where Cochrane (and Airdrie) results drowned out representation in these other communities. It is time to separate Cochrane which is quickly becoming a suburb of Calgary, from these smaller communities who have specific needs/concerns around protecting the environment, affordable housing, un-livable wages (\$23.40 is the required living wage for a single person in Canmore based on a 2016 study commissioned by the Town of Canmore), and the added pressures on infrastructure, services, and quality of life due to tourism and visitation. The town of Banff is technically supposed to have only 8000 residents as per the lease and incorporation agreement with Parks Canada, but the 2014 census revealed 9386, and it is widely know that at least 10000 residents live in Banff to support the tourist economy which peaked to 3,894,332 million visitors in 2015/16. This annual influx of visitors means the community's concerns should be weighted and represented differently, especially as Banff is projected to support the entire population of Alberta (over 4 million visitors) in terms of usage in 2017.





Thank you very much for the opportunity for input into this process. I am a resident of the St. Albert constituency but am a block away from the Spruce Grove - St. Albert constituency where I grew up. I have had the good fortune of running for nomination of a political party in Spruce Grove St. Albert and therefore have a unique perspective that few have about lack of provincial common interests between the two cities. I have also spent time on St. Albert City Council and I teach in Morinville and can tell you that St. Albert NorthWest would be better aligned with municipalities to the North instead of to the West.

The purpose of my submission is to share with you my belief that the North West corner of St. Albert would be better aligned with Sturgeon County, the Town of Morinville, and the Town of Legal to the North instead of with Spruce Grove.

- St. Albert proper is not large enough for two constituencies and should therefore continue to be split. The current dividing line within St. Albert city boundaries is clear and well established with the three distinct neighbourhoods North of McKenney and West of St. Albert Trail excluded from the St. Albert constituency. I believe this should remain the case, however instead of being aligned with Spruce Grove, I believe there are many reasons North West St. Albert should be aligned with Morinville, Legal, and Sturgeon County instead.
- St. Albert, Morinville, and Legal currently share a school division (Greater St. Albert Catholic Schools) because of the traditional french-Canadian heritage.
- St. Albert, Morinville, Legal, and Sturgeon County also share a trade corridor along Highway 2. The City has partnered with Sturgeon County and Morinville on a variety of transportation issues, many of which

have provincial oversight - a commonality not shared by St. Albert an Spruce Grove. Two examples of this are the partnership and construction of Ray Gibbon Drive, a provincial road intended to provide a bypass around St. Albert Trail. Another example would be the thousands of people from Morinville, Legal, and Sturgeon County that commute through St. Albert and use St. Albert transit and park and ride.

St. Albert, Morinville, and Sturgeon County have also partnered on many intermunicipal issues over the years including our intermunicipal development plan, the development of the commercial corridor at the North end of St. Albert and various recreational facilities.

Another major provincial issue affecting the municipalities is the provision of health services. Sturgeon Hospital serves more of Sturgeon County and Morinville than it does Spruce Grove, and our ambulances are often shared between these three municipalities rather than with Spruce Grove.

Lastly, there are contiguous residential boundaries between the City of St. Albert and Sturgeon County residential areas, whereas there is not with Spruce Grove or Parkland County.

St. Albert, Sturgeon County, Morinville and Legal have much more in common, have a stronger working relationship, and share in a number of provincial issues. Currently, Sturgeon County falls within three (3) electoral divisions, those being:

As detailed in the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act*, it is our understanding that the Commission will generally look to achieve a population of 48,883 per constituency, subject to a 25% variance. Special circumstances may exist for up to 4 electoral divisions, whereby such divisions may have a population that is 50% below the average population of the electoral divisions.

We are confident that as the Commission reviews the boundaries, that population figures will not be the sole determinant of boundaries, and that existing municipal boundaries, community character and geographical/transportation features are also considered, per the *Act*. These items are crucial to ensure accessibility to, and accountability of elected officials; and that diverse and under-represented populations have an efficient path to have their voices heard within the Legislative Assembly.

Within a Sturgeon County context, we are a diverse municipality that spans over 2,300 square kilometers and possesses significant provincial transportation corridors. Many of the issues we face are increasingly complex in nature, in part given our proximity to major urban centres, yet we still retain our traditional "rural" heritage and lifestyles. We are home to approximately 20,000 people, including those who reside at CFB Edmonton; we have significant industrial activity throughout the County, specifically within Alberta's Industrial Heartland; are home to some of the best agricultural land in the Province; and have a large concentration of residents within the Sturgeon Valley (adjacent to Edmonton and St. Albert).

As you determine which boundaries will best serve Sturgeon County residents and Albertans, we encourage you consider the following:

 Achieving a constituency boundary which reflects our community, meaning that community characteristics indicative of 'rural life' need to be balanced within 'rurban' ridings;



Alberta is a rapidly-growing province, and cities are the drivers of that growth, both in terms of population and economic activity.

It is very important to appreciate where growth has happened in Alberta. Urban areas are generators of the majority of economic activity, as well as the concentration of population. Yet, in the past, they have been dramatically under-represented politically.

Given that movement within Alberta, and within Canada generally has been from rural areas TO cities, or between urban areas, if discretion must be given, it ought to be given in the favour of urban constituencies, with the expectation that those ridings will continue to grow in population, particularly by comparison to rural ridings. Calgary's population, for example, is growing about 3% per year and has been for some time. The province as a whole is only increasing by about 1.7%. That suggests that urban growth is substantially driving overall growth. That is to say that if an urban riding has fewer people immediately upon redrawing the boundaries, urban growth should offset that advantage in short order. On the other hand, if a rural riding has fewer people (and thus more political influence), that imbalance is likely to grow substantially before the next boundary review.

The 25% variance rule has traditionally been used to substantially weaken the appropriate political power of cities. I strongly feel that a variance closer to 5% would be the appropriate amount. We have the technology and detailed survey information to make the calls closer than they have been.



Hello:

First and foremost, I am pleased that you are undertaking this exercise and that you are doing it in an open ant transparent way. This demonstrates honesty and integrity.

One of the primary issues facing provinces across Canada, as well as the Federal Government, is the urban/rural divide and it's increasing impacts on various programs, including elections. While strict representation and distribution of funds and services based on population, sounds initially like a fair way to organize elections and programs, it is also intensifies the impacts of the urban/rural divide and does not address the issues.

When it comes to elections boundaries should consider as the primary condition, representation by population. It should also consider the different needs and challenges of municipalities (including size and location) as well as rural areas. They should also consider the practical capabilities of an elected official to represent that geographic area. The current boundaries do not appear to have any logical boundaries. Some are long and thin and appear to stretch out along highways, others combine rural and larger urban areas with distinctly different needs, making it extremely difficult for representatives to balance the diverse needs. Please, no gerrymandering. This has happened historically and damages the integrity of the entire process. In summary, and by priority, the primary considerations for the electoral boundaries should be:

- 1) Representation by population primary but does not have to be completely equal numbers in each boundary area.
- 2) Recognition of the diverse needs of the larger urban and rural areas avoid having portions of larger urban areas mixed in with rural areas
- 3) Boundaries that make sense e.g. geographic divisions that create boundaries and distinctly separate areas.
- 4) Boundaries that will allow elected officials to represent their areas, i.e. avoid configurations that make it difficult for officials to travel to their entire constituency easily.
- 5) Special provisions to allow rural areas with small populations to have a voice. This could be in the form of requiring sub-committees to have representation by the MLAs of these areas.

On a secondary note, several years ago I was in Norway. At that time I was meeting with political representatives of the urban centres. They explained that a large portion of their funding was provided by their Federal Government as that is the level of Government that collected taxes. While this was done at their Federal level, they did not have the second level of Government that we have with provinces so I believe it could work at the provincial level here. The money was distributed in a unique way. Specifically, it was not distributed strictly by service area or population. Instead the funds were distributed as follows:

- Each service area, e.g. Education, Seniors Services, Environmental Services, Transportation, etc. set basic service standards that each area must adhere with.
- Funds were allocated based on a formula that considered both population and geographic area covered. It was a special formula that factored in both the high density population areas (efficiency of scale), as well as the fact that it is often more costly to provide services in areas that have a small population and a large geographic area.
- Funds for all service areas were provided as one sum. They were not provided by numerous different grant programs. It was then left to the elected officials in the geographic area to distribute the money to each program area, based on the needs of that area, as long as the basic service standards were met. In this way, if a geographic area had a decline in student populations, and an increase in seniors residency needs, they could allocate the money accordingly. Likewise, areas that may have decent transportation (roadways) but increased health care needs due to distances to medical care centres, had the ability to reallocate funding accordingly. This placed the decision making of strategic priorities on the political representatives closest to the public, which the is counties, MD, municipal and school trustee levels.

I appreciate this would be a radical change, and it is a logical change because it would greatly reduce the GoA administrative costs and decrease the time from collection of taxes to delivery of services. It gives the areas rural and urban autonomy to allocate funding to where it is needed the most. The elected officials I spoke with said this worked extremely well for them and they could not understand how we managed to operate with the constant changes to different grant programs.

Having lived in Alberta for the past 39 years -- one year in Lethbridge and the other 38 in Camrose -- and having witnessed the work of a number of previous Boundary Commissions, I have come to the conclusion that the large urban centres of Edmonton and Calgary are chronically under-represented in the Alberta Legislature and that the rural areas in the province have been chronically over-represented. To me there appears to be a significant distortion when some rural constituencies have populations one quarter the size of the largest city ones. While I believe that all parts of the province need to be properly represented, I find this huge discrepancy undemocratic; just because I live in rural Alberta, my vote should not count up to 4 times as much as one cast in Edmonton or Calgary. In the past the difference was largely justified by the sparsity of the rural population and the huge distances rural MLAs had to cover to meet with their constituents but I think that argument no longer obtains, given the major improvements in both travel and communication we have experienced in the past few decades. If the majority of our population live in our two major cities then the majority of the seats in the Legislature should be allocated to them. Boundaries need to change to properly fix the representation by population. The Spruce Grove - St. Albert riding has approximately double the population in its riding than Fort McMurray- Conklin. Does the member from Spruce Grove - St. Albert get two votes to the other member's one? No, of course not.

One can argue that the population in rural areas is spread out and if we properly divided up representation, the ridings would be too big. My answer to that is, with a less concentrated population, the member's pressures will be more on travel than the intricate problems of urban representation. All MLA's work hard to represent their constituents, so it shouldn't matter the physical riding size. Running for election is a choice made by citizens. If you know your riding size is really large and you can't manage the job to represent the same number of people as an urban MLA, don't run. With modern technology, they can figure it out or find other ways to ensure they're reaching/communicating with their constituents.

For far too long the urbans have been underrepresented in this province, likely for political gain by certain political parties. It's time to properly divide up our province to ensure my voice is as equitable as possible to someone in the north or south.

We don't need more representatives. We need better representation.

Population figures and population density

I wonder when these figures are from? Everyone knows that people have returned to their origin provinces to wait things out. I think it is dangerous in a time of extreme upheaval to even consider realigning electoral boundaries. People that feel their voice has been removed will react to that. Hence the protests.

Having said that, this is my input. Please note that my comments are directed less at physical boundaries, more at the rule boundaries and examples of what makes it necessary, which would lead to effective representation that should be in place for political parties.

Change management

Change management in an effective representative government is in part about causing the least amount of damage to the least number of people in accomplishing your goals. Our elected officials need to understand the cost and consequences of every choice they make. The people who are in government must implicitly understand the needs of their people. They cannot be willfully blind.

Willful blindness is evident when:

- any leader says that the population the leader represents needs to make better choices. People make choices based on reality not idealism. Examples:
 - o Rural Albertans typically need vehicles that are reliable in extreme weather conditions. The vehicles that meet that criteria are not necessarily the most fuel efficient.
 - o Alberta has a lot of trees and in the winter tends to be buried in snow. In the winter the sun is lower in the sky. Such realities make solar energy a less efficient alternative then what it would be in places closer to the equator. I am not saying don't do it. I am just saying be real about it. I am certainly reviewing whether it would be cost efficient or practical for my home. But I am not cutting down my shelterbelt (trees) to do it. Whether this is reasonable or affordable is going to depend on your personal circumstances.

o Certain basic needs such as natural gas to heat the home are not alternatives. They are not a choice; they are a reality. Any tax or government policy that negatively impacts the affordability of the basic needs of Albertans is unethical and immoral. The theory of change management demands that reasonable and affordable alternatives be presented and available before any such taxation of the existing system is done.

We need representatives that understand this. City folk cannot represent country folk because of the lack of understanding, and vice versa. We need workable solutions, not rhetoric.

- the Premier does not take seriously credit ratings, deficit reduction or business interests. When business does well, everyone does well, and this is what would make the change the Premier seeks possible. Willful blindness to practical matters.
- a government that serves its own activist interests is willfully blind to the interests of Albertans. You know this for sure, when the Premier cannot even look at the camera when she says she will work to get the pipelines going. As with everyone, people deal with what they know. This Premier knows about transgender issues, not about business. In fact, this Premier has expressed activist views that Alberta should not be involved in Oil and Gas at all. Change management dictates that you know where you are at, you know where you need to get, and you work a path to that. If you skip the small steps everyone will suffer.
- research whether or not the math fits the government's claims. One claim they have is that by reducing the small business income tax they will create jobs. Now do the math. Tax is on profit. A 1% decrease in tax equates to \$1 for every \$100 in profit (not revenue, profit). Let's add four zeros. For every \$1,000,000 in profit this is \$10,000. Now I ask you does this equate to a job? Now look at the limits on the small business deduction in the Income Tax Act. And I ask you again, for small businesses out there, presuming their profit is that high does this equate to a job? To say that it does is willful blindness. At best it mitigates some of the increase in minimum wage. I challenge you to go over the government's website and check whether their math matches their claims. Certainly, the math needs to be checked on the population density figures.

Respect

I have said this prior to this government and I am going to repeat myself. A debate in the Legislative Assembly is not about making snide incomprehensible irrelevant comments about previous leadership or anyone else for that matter – watch Notley clips, you will see what I mean. The Legislative Assembly calls for respect.

Experience and associated pay

There are too many MLAs, and far too high of a salary budget for the Legislative Assembly. There is a certain point where less is more. Restructuring should reduce the number of city MLA's, and possibly replace them with lower paid, not severed come an election, non-partisan civil servants. These people would report to the MLA's for North, South, East and West Calgary and Edmonton.

We need people who are competent professionals who are experienced in the right areas. The candidates that are put forward by any party must have a certain content of experienced professionals specializing in finance, accounting, business law, social services, human services, negotiation, etc. People who have the maturity and experience to grasp that even in a bad economy government policy matters. People who know that blaming a bad economy doesn't balance the books. We need political parties that take responsibility for the quality of experience in the people they put forward as candidates. We need voters that demand quality candidates.

Nowhere in this government do you find a conscientious objector. Nor do you find the experience necessary to read a contract before you cancel it (a sign of a fundamental lack of business acumen). Nowhere do you find a person who has Alberta's back. It doesn't matter how much you waste on marketing, it doesn't change the facts. It doesn't matter how many buzzwords like "diversify our economy" you use, it changes nothing for Albertans if your idealistic mind doesn't know how to follow through (experience matters).

There are too many people out there who are unable to see or simply exhibit willful blindness of how they harm others when they pursue their own activities, desires, addictions and wants. There are too many people out there who are unable to identify the consequences of their actions. Inexperienced persons lack understanding that the things they prioritize with an inexperienced mind will be put into better context in an experienced mind.

Our representatives in the Legislative Assembly must have mathematical skills. But more than that the experience to identify what the math means, and shove aside the political spin. Political spin does not produce the intended result of legislation. Experience. Running the province is not an entry level job.

If a political party treats these positions as entry level jobs then the elected official should only receive entry level pay.

Conscientious objector

When you get too many people thinking the same things, you get something called "groupthink." Groupthink does not produce the best result.

How about the leader of the opposition joins Notley's cabinet? There is your conscientious objector. In all honesty Notley would do better in a conscientious objector position then she does as Premier. That is a role that I would trust her in. As leader, she doesn't seem to care what Albertan's need, want, think or feel.

I recognize that the question being posed is how should we realign the electoral districts. I feel that the reason it is being posed is that Notley wishes to create electoral districts that are most likely to support the NDP, and to remove any voices that don't. The Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission, "an independent body" that no doubt answers to the Premier.

So, with all of the above in mind, I believe we need to create rules about who may be selected by a political party as a candidate, and put in place recall legislation for when we make a grievous error. We learned last election that as long as they have a heartbeat they are in. Apparently they don't even have to work out the details of a Bill before it is passed – lack of transparency, lack of research, lack of consultation of affected parties, etc. Everything that we don't need. We need rules in place to force political parties to take steps to understand the consequences of their actions before a Bill is passed and implemented.

Are we receiving effective representation? Not now.

We don't just expect better. We demand it. We require it. We need better than what we have. We need to ensure our future will be secure.

I think it is imperative for all ED's be as equitable in terms of population, as possible (I do recognize how hard this can be but +/- 5,000 people could be a realistic goal. This gives voters equitable representation in the LA, which is in my mind is key to democracy.

In terms of names for the ED's. I am the RO for Calgary North West. This particular name causes much confusion, as many people think this encompasses all of NW Calgary, not the small portion of NW Calgary it really represents. If more localized names/descriptors could be used which better describe the actual area rather than generic direction type descriptors it would assist voters and reduce confusion. For example the current ED of Calgary North West encompasses Lynx Ridge, Tuscany, Scenic Acres, Rocky Ridge and Royal Oak. If the name could be drawn from the community names it would better help people know which area it covers i.e. Royal Tuscany, Tuscany Ridge, Rocky Acres.

When creating ED's I also believe only major roads, preferably those which do not contain residential homes, should be used to divide the areas. It is very confusing for people who reside across the street from one another to be in different ED's from one another. That also makes it hard for community groups who advocate for those residents and they don't know which MLA to go to for assistance. For example in the 2000's the residential community of Scenic Acres was divided along a residential street between two ED's. It was both confusing and challenging for voters to understand.

In rural areas where this is challenging GPS locations could be used to divide ED's rather than roads. Thank you again for your consideration,

I am responding to a printed invitation I received via Canada Post to make a written submission to you concerning your review of Alberta's current 87 electoral constituencies.

Assessment of Existing Boundaries

The extent of underrepresentation of suburban voters vis-à-vis some rural voters is appalling and must be rectified. I live in the suburban riding of Edmonton Millcreek which has a reported population of 56,995 and is permitted one Member of the Legislative Assembly (MLA). In comparison, I understand that the northern Alberta ridings of Dunvegan-Central Peace Notley and Fort McMurray-Conklin, which have populations of 25,192 and 29,533, respectively, also elect one MLA each. This means that my single vote as an Alberta suburban resident is worth only 44 per cent of the vote of a Dunvegan-Central Peace Notley resident and only 52 per cent of a resident of Fort McMurray-Conklin. This extreme disparity is completely unacceptable to me.

Recommendations

- 1. Do not increase the overall number of electoral constituencies as a solution to the problem of under representation of suburban voters. Former Premier Stelmach's addition of ridings in Edmonton and Calgary, instead of redrawing electoral boundaries, was a poor and short sighted solution to the problem of rebalancing out-of-date electoral boundaries. Eighty-seven MLAs are more than enough. In fact, it is my understanding that Alberta has proportionately more MLAs by population than most other Canadian provinces. We don't need any more, and could probably do with fewer MLAs.
- 2. Revoke the existing law that allows a variance of 25 per cent plus or minus the provincial average in the number of residents per riding, and replace it with a law that no riding may have more than 5 per cent plus or minus the provincial average. This would ensure fairness for suburban voters.
- 3. Revoke the existing law which allows Alberta's four biggest rural ridings to have a population 50 per cent below the provincial average. Today's road network and enhanced telephone and electronic communication render this special advantage to these rural ridings unnecessary. Retaining this special advantage would be prejudicial to other rural voters, in addition to urban and suburban voters.

In conclusion, I believe it is essential that Alberta's electoral boundaries are revised to reflect today's population realities and ensure fairness for all Albertans in electing MLAs. The existing electoral boundaries are unfair to suburban Albertans, in particular.

Thank you for your attention and consideration. I applaud your endeavour.

Issues:

- Size: Battle River-Wainwright Electoral Division covers approximately 250 km east to west boundary and 100 km north to south. For one MLA to represent effectively the needs of a population spread over 25000 km² seems unreasonable.
- Community Interests: Variations in topography, land-use and major industry are significant within the region. In the west half of the constituency, primary agricultural production is the major economic driver, while in the east although primary agriculture is part of the economy, oil and gas production is the major economic driver.
- Regional Collaboration: Camrose County and residents of Camrose County participate in, and support
 extensively, the facilities and services located in the City of Camrose, which is currently part of the WetaskiwinCamrose constituency.

Possible Alternatives/Solutions:

Thank you for this opportunity to make this submission regarding your review of provincial constituency boundaries.

I urge you to address the serious disparity of the number of eligible voters between rural and urban constituencies. For example, I am informed that the constituency of Dunvegan – Central Peace – Notley had 16,392 voters while Calgary Southeast had 46,871 voters. As a result, a voter in this rural riding had almost three times the effective representation and political influence as a voter in this urban riding.

This inequity is unacceptable, and can no longer be tolerated for the following reasons.

It violates the *Charter* principle of equality and the concept of a free and democratic society. It is clearly undemocratic.

This inequity has lead to, and will likely continue to lead to violations of the principles of basic human rights. Article 1 of the *Universal Declaration of Human Rights* states "Everyone is born free and equal in dignity and rights". However, the existing disparity between rural and urban ridings clearly denies the right to equal representation and political influence of urban citizens.

Whereas hunger and homelessness tend to be an urban problem, more so than a rural problem, this undemocratic rural political influence has likely a significant factor in the government's failure to ensure adequate social housing, and the cold-hearted cuts to this province's most vulnerable citizens' receiving Assured Income for the Severely Handicapped. This resulted in the violation of Article 25 of the *Universal Declaration of Human Rights* which asserts the right of all persons to adequate food, clothing, housing and medical care.

This disparity between rural and urban voters was probably a significant factor in the Alberta Government's ongoing denial of *Charter Rights* equality to its gay and lesbian citizens. Whereas many members of this minority tend to migrate to larger urban centers to find support and acceptance, the issue of justice for gays and lesbians was rarely a concern in rural areas. Few would doubt that pandering to the homophobic voters in the rural ridings was the reason for the government's continued violation of Section 15 of the Charter by denying gays and lesbians equal protection of Alberta's human rights legislation. Nor would many people doubt that this was a factor in the Alberta Government's refusal to amend their human rights legislation for over 10 years, in contempt for the Vriend ruling by Canada's Supreme Court.

This voter inequity has resulted in Alberta earning the reputation as "red-neck", "backward", and sometimes rightfully referred to as "Alabama North".

In this age of electronic communications, the geographic size of a constituency can not justify this undemocratic inequality.

I therefore urge your commission to redraw Alberta's constituency boundaries so that there is as near as possible, equal number of voters in each.

How Many Seats for Calgarians in the Legislative Assembly of Alberta?

According to the 2016 estimates posted on the Commission's website at http://abebc.ca/about/stats/, the total estimated population of the constituencies within the boundaries of the City of Calgary is 1,317,772. With the Commission's stated provincial average of 48,884 residents per constituency, this suggests that, as of today, the residents within the City of Calgary, in the interest of the requirement for effective representation as guaranteed by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, should be represented by 27 Members of the Legislative Assembly (in an Assembly of 87 Members representing all of Alberta).

As there are presently 25 seats in the Legislature representing Calgary, a fair redistribution reflecting the current population while maintaining the current Legislature membership at 87 (per the Commission's Terms of Reference) requires an additional 2 seats be added to Calgary.

More realistically, however, the Commission should consider population trends in Calgary. Over the past 10 years (such a long-term view necessary in light of the cyclical nature of the local economy), Calgary has seen population growth

averaging 2.94% per annum¹. Extrapolated over the next 8 years until this Commission next sits, this represents growth of over 300,000 residents in Calgary. In just the past several years, despite the recent economic slow-down, Calgary has seen population growth year-over-year of as many as 35,000 people in a single year (April 2014-April 2015).

We see evidence of this when this Commission last sat in 2010 and recommended the establishment of a constituency (Calgary-South East) which at the time had a population of 36,848 and has grown in the 7 years since to over 79,000. The principle of Effective Representation would suggest that efforts to avoid situations where a citizen's voice is diminished by more than 50% in between sittings of this Commission would be desirable. And so, while adding 2 seats to Calgary would effectively redress issues of representation that have come up over the past decade, they do little to set Calgarians up for effective representation in the years until this Commission next sits.

As such, it is respectfully submitted to this Commission that the more fair outcome would be to allocate **3 additional seats to Calgary**, bringing the total to 28 seats out of 87 with an average population of 46,857, or a variance of -4.15% from the average (smaller than the average variance of -4.3 for Edmonton constituencies reflected in the Final Report of this Commission in 2009/10).

A rudimentary look at the estimated population figures on the Commission website suggests that those seats would be at the expense of areas of the province with less population density and slower – or perhaps zero or sub-zero – net population growth.

This author does not purport to be an expert on the needs and character of every community within this beautiful province. As such, there will be no suggestions regarding where specifically to find the 3 seats that must be added to Calgary to ensure fair representation, or of redistribution in the rest of the province, both of which my fellow citizens will no doubt be more than happy to provide. Efforts on my part to suggest new boundaries for constituencies in Grande Prairie or Edmonton would be folly, and a waste of this Commission's valuable time. This submission will instead focus on the City of Calgary, with which the author is much more familiar.

Given the Commission's stated provincial average of 48,884 residents per constituency, the acceptable variance by law of 25% from this figure puts the minimum population of a constituency at 36,663 and the maximum at 61,105.

It is submitted that the following constituencies see boundary changes, as detailed below:

Calgary-Cross (est. population 59,406): Remove the communities of Vista Heights, Sunridge, Horizon, and Pineridge. New estimated population 46,783. The new Calgary-Cross would contain the fully developed and low-growth communities of Rundle, Whitehorn and Temple.

Calgary-East (est. population 56,618): Remove the communities of Red Carpet, Southview, Albert Park/Radisson Heights, Mayland, Meridian, and Franklin. Add the communities of Forest Lawn and Forest Heights. New estimated population 54,703. The new Calgary-East would contain the fully developed and low-growth communities of Forest Lawn, Forest Heights, Marlborough, Marlborough Park, and Penbrooke Meadows.

Calgary-Fish Creek (est. population 40,566): Add the communities of Woodbine and Woodlands, which share a single community association (Woodcreek). New estimated population 55,669. The new Calgary-Fish Creek would contain the fully developed and low-growth communities of Queensland, Deer Run, Deer Ridge, Parkland, Bonavista Downs, Lake Bonavista, Canyon Meadows, Diamond Cove, Woodbine and Woodlands. The southern boundary of the constituency would be the northern bank of the Fish Creek, and the northern boundary would be Anderson Road.

Calgary-Fort (est. population 51,083): Remove the communities of Forest Lawn and Forest Heights. Add the communities of Applewood Park and Red Carpet. New estimated population 45,325. Due to the continued presence of large non-residential/industrial areas within the constituency, Calgary-Fort would remain one of the largest constituencies in Calgary speaking geographically, however the presence of many major roads in the constituency, including but not limited to Blackfoot Trail, Barlow Trail, Glenmore Trail and Stoney Trail, will make travel for the constituents to their MLA's office very manageable.

Calgary-Greenway (est. population 56,474): Remove the communities of Taradale and Applewod Estates, and add the community of Pineridge. New estimated population 40,797. The new Calgary-Greenway would include the fully developed and low-growth communities of Monterey Park, Pineridge, Abbeydale and Applewood, but also the growing community of Coral Springs and allows for future communities to the east

of Stoney Trail, which may very well be a factor when this Commission next sits in approximately 8 years' time.

Calgary-Lougheed (est. population 54,734): Remove the communities of Woodbine and Woodlands, which share a single community association (Woodcreek). New estimated population 39,631. While this number nears the maximum allowable variance below the average population, it should be noted that the western half of the new constituency, sparsely populated at this time, is due for major development to begin soon including the new communities of Providence, with an expected eventual population of 35,000 new residents (http://calgaryherald.com/news/local-news/developer-wants-to-build-in-s-w-calgary-corner-before-ring-road-complete), making this one of the highest potential growth areas in the city of Calgary.

Calgary-Mackay-Nose Hill (est. population 56,625): Remove the community of Evanston, as well as all lands east of Deerfoot Trail and all lands north of Country Hills Blvd. New eastern boundary would be Deerfoot Trail. New estimated population 42,361.

Calgary-McCall (est. population 68,523): Remove the communities of Saddle Ridge, Skyview Ranch and Redstone. New estimated population 38,315, with one of Calgary's 3 new constituencies gaining the communities listed above. The new Calgary-McCall would include the fully developed and low-growth communities of Martindale, Castleridge and Falconridge

Calgary-Northern Hills (est. population 61,377): Remove the communities of Harvest Hills, Country Hills, and Coventry Hills. Add the community of Evanston, as well as all lands between Centre Street and Symons Valley Blvd north of Stoney Trail. New estimated population 44,096. The new Calgary-Northern Hills would include the community of Panorama Hills (Calgary's most populous community, with over 25,000 residents) and the fast-growing Evanston, as well as lands to be developed north of Stoney Trail. By the time this Commission next sits, the riding might once again need to be considered for splitting if populations grow as expected.

Calgary-South East (est. population 79,034): By far, this is estimated to be the most populous constituency in Alberta according the Commission's website. Remove the communities of Cranston, Chaparral, Walden, Legacy and Silverado, which would be constituted as their own, new constituency. The new Calgary-South East would include the developing and growing communities of Auburn Bay, Mahogany, New Brighton and

Copperfield, as well as the lands south of Marquis of Lorne Trail/Stoney Trail which are to the east Deerfoot Trail. The rate of growth in this area has far exceeded the estimates on the Commission's website, as according to the City of Calgary Census of 2016 the population of the new Calgary-South East would be 46,190 (as opposed to the Treasury Board and Finance/Statistics Canada estimates of fewer than 35,000 once the abovementioned communities were split into the new constituency).

New Constituency A: Includes the communities of Southview, Albert Park/Radisson Heights, Mayland, Meridian, Franklin, Vista Heights, Sunridge, Horizon, Harvest Hills, Country Hills and Coventry Hills. Estimated population 44,068. Would also include YYC Calgary International Airport, and lands to be developed between Centre Street and 36th Street NE, north of Stoney Trail. While the constituency would be large in area, particularly from the northern edge to the southern edge, the fact that so many of the communities are adjacent to Deerfoot Trail makes travel for constituents to a centrally-located MLA's office reasonable. Most of the communities within the constituency are low-growth and fully developed, however the potential for growth on the northern edge will bring population in line with or above the provincial average in short order.

New Constituency B: Includes the communities of Taradale, Martindale, Saddle Ridge, Skyview Ranch and Redstone. Estimated population 47,579. With the exception of Taradale, an established and fully developed community, this constituency has the potential for explosive population growth over the next decade.

New Constituency C: Includes the communities of Cranston, Chaparral, Walden, Legacy, and Silverado. Estimated population 44,077. All of these communities are in their relative infancy with high potential for growth, with the possible exception of Cranston which is nearing capacity at 18,013 residents as of the 2016 Calgary Municipal Census.

As submitted, the range of variance in Calgary constituencies would be from a low of -21.6% to a high of +13.9%.

Overall, the variance compares favourably to that in the final report of this Commission in 2010, with 72% of constituencies within 10% variance, and 90% within 15% variance:



Names of Constituencies

In the Final Report to the Speaker of the 2009/2010 Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission, dated June 24th 2010, the recommendation is made on page 25 that "The Legislative Assembly may wish to consider adopting a protocol for the naming of electoral divisions for the guidance of future Commissions". No such protocol appears to have been adopted. Further, the report notes that the Commission at that time "generally favours the use of geographical names which provide an indication of the location of the electoral division", though the Legislative Assembly in fact adopted several names of persons, including former Premier Ralph Klein and former Leader of Her Majesty's Official Opposition Grant Notley, in the final revisions.

- Given the changes that have been made in this submission, it is the
 recommendation of the author that in light of the removal of several
 communities which all included "Hills" in their name and lent reason to the
 naming of the constituency, the provincial constituency of CalgaryNorthern Hills be re-named to "Calgary-Nose Creek", in reference to the
 creek which runs along much of the newly-designed constituency's
 southwest edge.
- For reasons of clarity in naming, it is further recommended that the
 proposed new constituency comprising the northeastern corner of
 Calgary's current city limits, to this point referred to in this submission and
 on the included map as "New Constituency B", be named "Calgary-North
 East".

• If this Commission agrees with the previous Commission that geographical names are preferable, it is further submitted that the constituency which has to this point been referred to as "New Constituency C", on Calgary's southern boundary, be named "Calgary-Pine Creek", in reference to the named creek running through the proposed constituency which was noted on late 19th-century maps of the area, and which has in past lent itself to the naming of, among other things, a cemetery, post office and water plant in the area.



If this Commission considers the naming or re-naming of various constituencies to honour the accomplishments and lives of great Albertans, the author would make the following suggestions:

• The proposed new constituency in north-central Calgary will include YYC Calgary International Airport. This presents an opportunity to recognize an important Calgary-born aviator, Ian Willoughby Bazalgette, who was awarded the Victoria Cross for his heroic selflessness and sacrifice in August of 1944. While a school in Calgary bears his name, this man who gave his life in defence of democracy and freedom would be appropriately remembered with an electoral constituency bearing his name. This would also, as with Calgary-McCall, serve as a means of

remembrance for Calgary's aviation history in the area that includes one of Canada's busiest airports. For this reason, this author recommends that the new constituency, referred to earlier in this submission as "New Constituency A", be named "Calgary-Bazalgette".

• While this Commission is doubtless very much aware of the tragic circumstances surrounding the death of MLA Manmeet Bhullar, the author wishes to note on the record that Member Bhullar was en route to Edmonton to do the work of his constituents, when he pulled over to assist a motorist in distress. While attempting to help, he was struck by another vehicle, and subsequently died of his injuries. While it is always unfortunate to lose a respected Albertan who has served in elected office earlier in their lives, it is worthy of remembrance that MLA Bhullar, a former Minister of the Crown and a sitting MLA, died in office, while in an act of selfless service to his fellow Albertans. For this reason, it is the author's belief that a fitting tribute would be to rename the constituency which he served – Calgary-Greenway, to "Calgary-Bhullar", in honour of this great Albertan and public servant. The present name of Calgary-Greenway was only adopted in 2012, and as such no meaningful history would be lost in this change.




I am happy to be able to contribute to this process, as I believe it is fundamentally important to a healthy democracy. Frankly, I cannot support the current state of affairs.

I worked as an Alberta public servant for over 30 years, two-thirds of that time in rural Alberta, and the remainder in Edmonton. I mention this to make the point that I have lived and worked in both rural and urban settings, and I have seen at close hand the workings of the government, as well as observing it from the outside as an ordinary citizen and voter. It is plain to me that the current system is badly flawed. I believe it can best be described as an entrenched patronage system, with a transfer of wealth and influence to rural ridings in exchange for ongoing political support. How else can anyone explain the fact that Alberta has had so few changes in government? Alberta is unique in Canada in this regard, and yet there is very little public discussion of why this is so.

For me, the signs are clear. Lengthy political dynasties, ending only when the electorate becomes truly fed up with entitlement politics and abuse of power. Low voter turnout, especially in rural ridings, is also evident. In far too many ridings, the only real contest is at the candidate nomination level, to determine who will dish out favors on behalf of the party in power. These are facts, not opinions. The current system underpins pork barrel government, and is inherently inefficient, corrupt and undemocratic. Albertans deserve better.

I don't know what the current numbers of voters per riding are, nor do I know how many actual votes were cast per riding in the last few elections. But I know that the long-term approach has been to deliberately allow rural ridings to have fewer voters by a substantial margin. Clearly, this means that an urban vote is worth less. Then, combined with the fact that many rural ridings are considered 'safe' seats, this leads to exceptionally low voter turnout. You can check the actual numbers, but I recall previous elections where many rural ridings saw only 10-12,000 total votes cast, compared to many city ridings, where over 40,000 votes were cast. This means that, in many cases, an urban vote was worth only 1/4 of a rural vote. It also means that the only truly contested ridings tended to be in urban areas, while rural voters had little reason to turn out. Real democracy is defeated by this.

In every review of electoral boundaries, we hear the argument that the current bias is fair, since rural ridings are so much larger, creating demands on rural MLAs that are not seen in the cities. In this day and age, this is hardly relevant, and is clearly a self-serving argument to maintain the current broken system. If Alberta is to break out of, or even weaken, patronage government, you <u>must</u> do everything in your power to rebalance things. You have an extraordinarily important responsibility to <u>all</u> citizens of Alberta. Very few benefit from the current system. Alberta deserves better.

Re: Electoral Boundaries.

I acknowledge and appreciate that my submissions herein are likely beyond the scope of the Commission's mandate. However, re-aligning the electoral boundaries in our first-past-the-post electoral system is a bit like re-arranging the deck chairs on the Titonic-there is action, but nothing valuable will be achieved.

I don't think that either I, or anyone else, need explain how unrepresentative our current System is. Proutinely, majority governments are formed with 35 to 40% of the popular vote, which is pretty Sad if you believe in trying to "hear as many voices" as possible.

Here are my suggestions for reform:

- 1. Abolish the current 87 provincial electoral ridings.
- 2. Establish 45 new vidings with as nearly as possible equal populations.
- 3. Each political party will be allowed to

run only one condidate in each of the 45 ridings.

- 4. Voters must rank all the condidates on the ballot in their viding. A rank of I must be given to the condidate desired most by the voter, a rank of 2 to the next most desirable condidate, and onwards, with the voter giving higher and higher numbers to less and tess desirable condidates. For example, if 5 candidates run in a riding, voters must rank them one (1) to five (5) to properly vote.
- 5. From each of the 45 vidings the two candidates with the lowest scores (the most ones and twos, far the most part) go to Edmonton to sit as M. L. A.s for that viding.
- 6. This suggestion not only gives each voter the apportunity to support the candidate they want the most, by giving them a one (1), but it also allows each voter to effectively vote against the candidate they want the least by giving that candidate the highest number.
- 7. Majorities in the Legislature would never result under this Eystem, which is

good, because majority governments behave as though they can ignore the 60-65% of the voters who did not vote for them. Majorities quickly become for (not literally) bloated, unverpossive and arrogant because they do not have to consider, nor work with anybody else.

8. Under my proposal we would have minority governments, on coalitions, either of which are much more representative of more voters. In these two types of governments M.L. A.s must be more co-aperative, they must try harder to find concensus, and they have less real apportunity to be partisan and aggressive in their approach to governing.

It this system were effected I believe more voters would come to believe that their views were being better represented in Edmonton, and, over time, voter engagement and voten turnout would increase.

Alberta Municipal and Natural Electoral Boundaries

If changes to Alberta electoral boundaries are to be considered, perhaps the most beneficial ones would be to reduce the dimension of boundaries to more equitably serve all Albertans. Critical issues evolve from too wide a boundary scope. Currently one MP in a constituency with too broad an electoral boundary cannot adequately serve all.

For instance, the electoral boundaries encompassing Flagstaff and Camrose Counties also ironically include such a distant unrelated area as Kneehill County. The County of Red Deer may more closely relate with the needs of Kneehill County according to proximity.

Rule of law in Democracy is replaced by a form of dictatorial rule where some residents are pushed through the proverbial "cracks" by those in office. An example of this incongruity is seen in at least one county that employs a CEO and a CAO. Both appear to use favouritism in addition to apparent conflicts of interest. 

I wish to submit the following points and ask the Commission to please ensure that the rural ridings are not swallowed up by urban ridings:

- Redistribution of rural ridings will make them very large and therefore hard for an MLA to access and represent their ridings leaving constituents in rural Alberta not having the same access as urban voters.
- It will decrease the amount of time the MLA will be in their constituency which would be another way all constituents would lose.
- Although electronic devices can reach a lot of the constituencies, there are many in rural Alberta that do not have a reliable internet service to be able to communicate with their MLA.
- A new formula is needed as with the lesser amount of voters in rural areas compared to urban... representation by population is not effective in rural areas and again the rural voter who looses
- Rural exclusion can happen when the urban centre increases in population.
- Issues relating to rural areas are unique and would be swallowed out and spit out and deemed less important compared to the larger urban population which has it's own set of issues.
- Electoral boundaries for urban centre should not be more than the rural electoral boundaries, ie total 80 (40 to urban 40 to rural). The numbers of rural to urbanshould not be disproportionate. A suggestion is to use boundaries following closely neighboring county lines.

As a rural community, the County of Barrhead No. 11 would like to ensure that effective representation is the goal of the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission. By resolution dated January 17, 2017 of Council, the County of Barrhead No. 11 supports the position of the Alberta Association Municipal Districts & Counties (AAMD&C).

The AAMD&C position, as presented in their January 2017 submission and as discussed at the Pembina Zone meeting, focuses on five main recommendations:

- Balance rural and urban populations to create incentives for elected MLAs to work with and understand all of their constituents.
- Consideration of geographical distances to keep constituencies to a reasonable size.
- 3) Adequate funding for MLAs with geographically large constituencies to equalize efforts required by MLAs to connect and meet with their constituents.
- 4) Avoid fracturing a municipality into multiple electoral districts as fracturing can create unnecessary complexity and confusion.
- 5) Further consideration of unique and special circumstances for deviance from 25% variance may be required to avoid reducing the number of electoral districts in rural areas.

We look forward to reviewing the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission's interim report later this year.

As the Mayor of the Village of Boyle, thank you for the opportunity to provide some input regarding our Constituency of Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater.

Since 1993 we have been part of 4 different provincial electoral districts with dramatically different boundaries stretching from the eastern provincial border to the northern border to the edge of Edmonton. (Athabasca – Lac La Biche, Athabasca - Wabasca, Athabasca - Redwater, Athabasca - Sturgeon-Red water)

I feel dramatic changes interfere with developing a political culture and keeping people connected with the political process. We need an era of boundary stability.

Rural ridings require the allowed deviation from average population. Your mandate is 2 pronged, each vote is "relatively" equal and effective representation. Urban ridings have one municipality and it is a short drive to anywhere in the riding, and one constituency office can easily be visited by any constituent. The 25% allowed deviation should not be avoided, it should be embraced to allow effective representation for rural citizens.

In closing let me add that if our boundaries were to change, we have a great deal of commonality with our neighbours in Lac La Biche. We have very similar economies, a shared major employer in Alpac pulp mill, and Portage College which has been a huge benefit to our area.

I am confident that your decision will be the right one. Thank you.

Submission to Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission

The population of a constituency is one of the determinants of the size and shape of that constituency. Though rural population is gradually becoming a smaller percentage of the total population, we believe rural Alberta needs more representatives in the Legislature, not less. Geographically, rural constituencies cover much territory. The driving time between the north and south borders of the Lac La Biche – St. Paul - Two Hills Constituency is three hours. Significant when put in perspective with some urban constituencies in which only a 30 minute walk is required to go from one boundary to the next.

Rural residents want to have personal contact with their MLA. This means visits to the constituency office to seek assistance in resolving issues often because the constituent has no other place to turn to: in cities there are provincial, municipal or community service providers. There also is an expectation in the many communities within the constituency that the MLA will personally be at community events, celebrations, parades, school graduations, 4H Show Days and more. Constituents generally want to speak directly to the MLA, to share, to discuss views and issues.

Within the Lac La Biche – St. Paul – Two Hills Constituency there are numerous local governments: three Counties, four School Authorities, two Metis Settlements, and five First Nations. These authorities communicate regularly with the MLA, often seeking in person meetings. We believe the demands placed on an MLA representing our constituency already are at maximum and would be intensified should the constituency be increased in size.

If there is a concern for equal population in each Alberta constituency, then we suggest that the following inequality be first addressed: that the average expenditure by the provincial government per person in rural Alberta is less than that spent in urban Alberta. Raise expenditures especially on infrastructure in rural Alberta. In northeast Alberta we are in dire need of infrastructure upgrades.

Our recommendation is that the current boundaries of the Lac La Biche – St. Paul – Two Hills Constituency remain unchanged.







Your recent publication stated that you wanted "input from Albertans", and that one of the factors that you would consider would be "effective representation". My comments with respect to your notification and the task which you have been directed to consider are as follows:

- 1. The existing boundaries of the present 87 electoral constituencies should be ENLARGED to include both population increases and decreases.
- 2. Consideration should be given to reducing the present number of 87 electoral boundaries. Alberta has far too many MLAs at present time. Their expense, both direct (salary, pension benefits, travel allowances is exorbitant few MLAs are worth such benefits), and indirect (staffing, constituency offices, etc.). Service to the public is no longer a determining factor in individuals deciding to seek election. Benefits weigh far more heavily. Remember, at one time and for many years the goal of individuals was to serve the public. Since the 1970s the remuneration has been a major factor in one's decision to become a MLA. Decisions concerning remuneration are ALWAYS MADE BY THE MLAS NEVER THE PUBLIC.
- 3. If you must increase representation not only reduce the number of electoral constituencies but increase representation in each constituency. For example: 50 electoral constituencies 2 members each for 100 in total. That, however would be excessive is some of the lower population rural areas. To determine a 2nd member the population in the riding must exceed a designated level. a 20% increase in population could result in an additional 17 member of the Legislature! God forbid!!

What a Golden opportunity the Commission has been handed. This is a chance to redress the out of control growth in provincial ridings over the last three decades or more. Alberta is one of the most over represented provinces in the country. With a population of 4.2 Million and 87 ridings currently that results in each elected MLA representing 48,600 individuals. By comparison the neighbour province to the west has a population of 4.7 Million and 85 MLAs which means each of their ridings represents 55,400. Both of the provinces are reasonably comparable in size and "sprawling" nature of some of their ridings. But the "Gold" standard for the Commission to work towards is Ontario. This is the largest province in Canada both in terms of geography and population. They have a population of 13.9 Million represented by 121 MLAs or 115,500 individuals for each riding. The target for the Commission should be an initial reduction of 30 ridings for the next election and a further 12 prior to the following election.

The cost savings associated with the recommendation are difficult to quantify. A rough estimate would likely be in the range of \$750,000 and \$1,000,000 annually per MLA when salary, support staff, office and travel expenses as well as the constituency office are counted.

Why should the Commission seriously consider this recommendation? First more than 50% of Alberta's population reside in the cities of Calgary and Edmonton. Those two cities alone each elect approximately 15 councillors / mayors to run their jurisdictions and have strong "lobbying" power with the provincial government. That said however all municipalities report to and are the responsibility of the Alberta government. Provincial ridings covering those two cities alone could be dramatically reduced without any serious dilution in representation. Lastly there will be an argument advanced that every citizen needs to be represented and as the population grows the ridings need to be increased. That argument is no longer valid and hasn't been for some time. The traditional methods for communicating with constituency members have been changed permanently by social media. In fact it could be argued that MLAs using social media are far more efficient at reaching their constituents individually or collectively than ever before. And conversely the constituent have now far quicker access to their MLA.

I strongly recommend a significant reduction in provincial ridings.

The Alberta Electoral boundaries need to be adjusted (every election) to ensure a more equal representation of each voter. A quick review of the electoral map and the statistics available at http://officialresults.elections.ab.ca/orresultspge.cfm?EventId=31 for the May 2015 election indicates several 10,000's of voters in the least populated ridings (Fort McMurray-Conklin and Dunvegan-Central Peace Notley) effectively got three votes compared to each voter in the most populated ridings (Calgary-South East and Spruce Grove-St. Albert). This is patently undemocratic and needs to be adjusted to ensure an equitable distribution of ridings and voters. A rural voter should not have more influence on policy compared to the urban voter. The average number of voters per riding should be on the order of 32,000. There is no reason the ridings boundaries can not be adjusted to provide a more equal distribution of voters per riding. I recognize this may cause political upheaval between elections but our ability to preserver the democratic process relies on voter equality not the preservation of political affiliations from one election to the next.

Dear Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commissioners,

My name is Kevin Allen and I am the Returning Officer for Calgary Buffalo (Provincially) as well as Calgary Centre (Federally). According to your websites statistics page, the Calgary Buffalo 2016 population estimate is 52,963, which is a 34% jump from the 2011 census count.

I can attest that Calgary Buffalo is seeing massive population increases currently as high-density condo and rental apartment buildings get completed in inner city areas like the Beltline, Downtown and the East Village. As part of my Elections Canada work, I have to make population projections in Calgary Centre in order to predict where future pressure points and polling sites will be. Did you know that the East Village is welcoming 12,000 new residents in the next few years? Or that the Beltline, one of Calgary's fastest growing communities over the past 10 years, is on track to be the largest neighbourhood by population in Calgary (it is currently 2nd largest)?

In the next two years, we will see even more increases in population density here as there are many additional hi-rise residential towers nearing completion.

Here is a concrete example: let us look at the Calgary Buffalo polling subdivision (PSD) with the most names on the list of electors – 035 Colours. During the 2012 Provincial Election there were 662 names listed; during the 2015 Provincial Election there were 1587 – and that does not include electors who were not enumerated but who also live in that PSD.

[By legislation, PSDs are limited to 450 electors, so in practice we end up splitting the large ones when

conducting the election.]

Consequently, when you are determining new boundaries for the Calgary Buffalo Electoral Division (ED) in order to reduce its population, I hope that you will err on the side of fewer electors to allow for the growth that will almost certainly be present in 2019.

I have three proposed ideas for shrinking Calgary Buffalo roughly 10% (using the current polling division breakdown for the ED – there are 72 PSDs). Historical note: Calgary Buffalo was created in 1971 and has always contained the Downtown core and Beltline.

Option one.

Revert back to the ED's previous 17th avenue SW southern border, and eliminate PSDs: 1,2,3,4,5,6,7, and parts of 8 and 15 - making 4th Street SW the new western edge, south of 17th avenue. This has the benefit of making the ED simply three communities: Downtown, Beltline and Mission (losing Lower Mount Royal and Cliff Bungalow). This has a disadvantage for the community association of Cliff Bungalow Mission, whose two founding communities associations merged in 1990.

Option two.

Break up downtown by losing the West End which is quite high density and likely to get higher. Eliminate PSDs 51, 52, 53, 60, 61, 62, 63 & 64 – making 8th Street the new western boundary north of the CP Rail Tracks.

Option three.

Break up downtown by losing the East End, which is becoming high density with lots of new residential tower developments near the Bow River. Eliminate PSDs 55, 56, 57, 58 70, 71 & 72 – making 5th Street the new eastern boundary north of the CP Rail Tracks. This might work well if attaching these PSDs to the East Village, but would somewhat arbitrarily break up the Downtown Eau Claire community into an East and West side.

Recommendation:

I see all three of these options as possible, but likely the larger challenge of redistribution in Calgary Buffalo's neighbouring EDs - and Calgary as a whole - would greatly inform your process. For ease of election administration, my preference is Option one.

As noted in the Public Interest Alberta's submission to your Commission "Alberta has dramatic and troubling departures from representation by population, leaving many Albertans significantly over-represented or under-represented. These problems are clearly illustrated by the numbers of eligible voters in constituencies in the 2015 provincial election: Edmonton-Whitemud had approximately 37,000 eligible voters, while Spruce Grove-St. Albert and Calgary-South East both had approximately 46,000. In contrast, Lesser Slave Lake had roughly 20,000 eligible voters, Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley had approximately 16,000, and Fort McMurray- Conklin had just over 15,000.

This means that in 2015, voters in Fort McMurray-Conklin had three times the "voting power" of voters in Calgary-South East. One Alberta MLA speaks for three times the number of voters represented by another Alberta MLA. This is not consistent with political equality."

This certainly indicates that there is a significant issue to be addressed in terms of equal representation and what a wonderful opportunity for your Commission to do so. Democracy at it's best is equal representation!

As a result, I strongly support the recommendations and the rationale of Public Interest Alberta which are:

- 1. Reduce the current 25% variance in the constituency population size to 5%.
- 2. The Electoral Boundaries Commission should call for increased support to MLAs to assist them in effectively representing their constituents and addressing their varying needs

When considering redistricting, please ensure the following principles are followed:

- 1) representation by population;
- 2) ridings should, wherever population numbers allow, be either urban or rural, but not a mix of both.

To achieve fair rep-by-pop (1), the commission should aim to set a standard population size for each riding within plus/minus no more than 10%. This should be done while keeping in mind the practical ability of a rural MLA to represent a large district. To achieve this, the commission should create more ridings in densely-populated areas rather than increasing the size of any of the large, sparsely-populated rural ridings.

In order to achieve (2), it is crucial that large densely-populated areas (i.e. urban) and sparsely-populated areas (i.e. rural) are not included in the same riding. The often-divergent considerations of rural and urban populations dilutes the legitimate voting power of rural or urban voters during an election. For urban areas with populations larger than the normal riding size, there should be at least one fully urban riding, with additional fully urban ridings for each interval of the normal riding population.

Subject: St. Albert Electoral Boundaries

The board of directors of the St. Albert Progressive Conservative Association has reviewed the criteria specified in the Electoral boundaries Act, the population data provided by the Commission, and the current electoral boundaries

The official Alberta Municipal Affairs population count indicates that as of April 7, 2014 the total population of the City of St. Albert amounted to 63,255 people. As the expected benchmark for each redistricted constituency is 48 883 people, St Albert obviously does not have the population base to support two constituencies by and of itself.

Historically, the result of this has been to have one constituency which is solely composed of a portion of the City of St Albert, (constituency of St Albert) and one constituency that consists of the remaining portions of St Albert, some surrounding rural areas, and the City of Spruce Grove (constituency of Spruce Grove-St Albert).

We believe that it is important to keep one St Albert constituency as a purely urban riding. This will allow one MLA to focus on issues relating to St Albert in specific, and issues relating to all of Alberta's medium sized cities in general. The interim population count indicates the current St. Albert Electoral Division contains 48,430 people. This falls extremely close to the expected benchmark for the newly redistricted divisions. As such, we would recommend that no changes be enacted to the current St Albert Electoral Division.

In regards to what areas to combine with the remaining portions of St Albert to fill out the second constituency, there are several nearby population areas that have a much closer connection to St Albert than Spruce Grove.

Specifically:

- The communities of Morinville, Legal and Cardiff,
- The new subdivisions being developed to the south of Big Lake (the Edmonton subdivisions of Hawk's Ridge, Starling, and Trumpeter).
- In general, the west portion of Sturgeon County including the numerous acreage subdivisions which lie on the southern boundary with the City of Edmonton.

The transit patterns for these areas generally run through St Albert, many of the residents of these outlying areas use St Albert businesses, schools, sports and recreation facilities. The nearest major health care facility is the Sturgeon Community Hospital which is located in St Albert. The local St Albert newspaper devotes print space to news from Morinville and Sturgeon County. The St Albert Chamber of Commerce is actually named the St Albert and District Chamber of Commerce because it services and advocates for business throughout the surrounding area. All these connections show the organic and naturally occurring relationship between St Albert and the communities immediately surrounding the city, and lend credence that they should be served by the same MLA.

Recommendations:

The boundaries of the St. Albert Electoral Division continue to be wholly contained within the municipal boundaries of the City of St. Albert, and thus remain unchanged from the current St Albert electoral division.

The Spruce Grove-St Albert Electoral Division be changed to a St Albert-Morinville-Sturgeon County Electoral Division with the following boundaries:

- Southern limit is the Anthony Henday Drive and the western portion of the Yellowhead Trail,
- West border to be Rge Rd 261 (same as the Edmonton city limits) then merging with the western boundary of Sturgeon County
- The northern boundary of Sturgeon County
- Eastward extant to be a line mid-way through Sturgeon County that is appropriate to bring this new Electoral Division to an acceptable baseline population.

Good day:

I appreciate the Commission's work this year. Allow me to make four key points:

- 1. The principle of one person one vote needs to generate a redrawing of ridings. The transportation and other communication technologies of today mean there are no difficulties in representing a large riding. In the past, alleged difficulties have furnished an excuse for gerrymandering. Anything other than one person one vote would continue to discriminate against new Canadians who predominantly reside in urban areas, as well as others who reside in the cities in our urban and urbanizing province.
- 2. Attendance at polling stations should be mandatory, enforced by civil penalties such as fines for not attending. Note: I do not say *voting* should be mandatory. Looking at the experience of Australia and some dozen other jurisdictions, mandatory attendance reduces the need for fund raising and therefore reduces the dangers of donations driving policy and representation. There are many other benefits to mandatory attendance.
- 3. Mixed-memember proportional voting should be brought in; the first past the post-system has over rewarded its beneficiaries and has choked down representation of too many views and too many practical options for policy and administration. In Alberta's case, the first-past-the-post system has lead to a corsening of political cultural over my adult lifetime. For example, since the 1990's incumbants feel safe to jeer at other ideas and treat people who are not their partisans as enemies to be disrespected, even in public. We need more of a sense that democracy is where political opponents face and address the same issues and where getting on the bandwagon of partisan dogmatism is a pretty ineffective way to

have influence on public life, let alone a career in public life.

4. The change to the voting system should be done by the House. For the Legislature has the constitutional power to change how its members are chosen. Also, referenda are not an ethically or practically acceptable option, I think. They are lightening rods for other discontents (viz., Brexit) or are ways for the gov't to jury rig failure and claim popular will (viz., the BC govt.'s insistence on 2/3 majority support for change, while it deployed various forms of neglect or opposition).

My suggestions above are premised on, amongst other things, there being (a) a basic reflection of a party's percentage of the vote in a general provincial election in the percentage of MLAs it has, (b) no single transferable ballot, and (c) ridings. In contrast to ridings, the Israeli system of all members representing all voters in the entire jurisdication has problems and, I believe, would not fit Alberta. In any event, the Israeli system is an anomaly amongst systems of proporational representation.

As for by-elections, it might be practical to have a run off election between the two leading candidates in case there is no recipient of the majority of votes. Another option might be a single transferable ballot for by-elections only.

A submission to the Electoral Boundaries Commission by the Green Party of Alberta

The submission was prepared by Janet Keeping, Leader of the Green Party of Alberta, and sent to the Commission on February 6, 2017

1.0 The Green Party of Alberta

The Green Party of Alberta (GPA) is a political party registered under the laws of Alberta. The GPA is independent of other political parties but adheres to the six principles of the global Green movement which are: Participatory democracy, Respect for diversity, Social justice, Sustainability, Ecological wisdom and Non-violence.

Democratic renewal is a priority for the Green Party of Alberta. Alberta's future can be a healthy one – socially, economically and environmentally. But this outcome is much more likely with a revitalized political culture, one in which citizens feel it is worthwhile to be engaged, for example, to vote. And being treated fairly by our electoral and other political systems is a prerequisite to engagement for most people.

2.0 One person – one vote

The GPA is deeply committed to the one person – one vote principle which we see as the foundation of any democratic electoral system because it respects the equal rights of citizens and treats them fairly.

We recognize that the Supreme Court of Canada has ruled that in our country the overriding consideration is "effectiveness of representation" not "absolute parity", the latter being the Court's characterization of the American standard. But really the two standards are not very different: it's hard to see how representative government functions fairly if some voters have significantly more power than others.

So we encourage members of the Electoral Boundaries Commission to adhere as rigorously as possible to the one person – one vote principle and we note in passing that the

provisions of the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act*² allowing for up to 25% +/- deviations from the average number of voters per electoral division (except in up to 4 cases where certain specified conditions are met) do not require the Commission to create such deviations, of course, but only permit them.

We recognize that MLAs representing comparatively large ridings face greater practical difficulties than other MLAs. In the past these greater difficulties may have warranted the creation of ridings with significantly fewer voters than the average. However, with communication even over vast distances so much easier now, we would argue that to the maximum extent possible those greater hurdles should be addressed in ways other than violating the one person – one vote principle. For example, MLAs with significantly larger ridings could be given more funding than others for constituency outreach than those with smaller ridings.³

3.0 The historical tension between Alberta's urban and rural voters

We are well aware that in the past rural ridings often had significantly fewer voters than urban ones in Alberta and we appreciate too that progress has been made in reducing this discrepancy. But we quote the words of the Alberta Court of Appeal in 1995 when it said "the historic imbalance in the level of representation between agrarian and non-agrarian populations in Alberta ... cannot be permitted to continue if Alberta wishes to call itself a democracy" and insist there should be no back-sliding in our province's progress in moving away from such blatant unfairness.

Having said that, we want also to note our concern about the urban/rural divide in the province. Alberta is a highly urbanized province, more so than any other province except B.C. Many Albertans, especially in the cities, are well-educated and well-travelled. Many have been to Istanbul but never to Grande Prairie or Medicine Hat, not to mention the smaller settlements in between those centres and Edmonton or Calgary. Many urban Albertans are quite unaware of the exigencies of rural life, for example, the demands of farming or ranching and even look with disdain upon those occupations. They know about environmental issues in the South American rainforest but not in their own backyards, for example, the rapid disappearance of prairie flora and fauna.

That there is such a divide is one of the reasons the province is in an environmental mess. It is critical that the divide be bridged but in our view this is best accomplished through public education to increase awareness that urban and rural Albertans, far from being from different planets as seems sometimes to be the case, are in fact highly interdependent. Many urban Albertans seem unaware that their well-being depends upon the health of the surrounding rural areas – for food production and watershed protection, just to give two examples – and this dependency can only increase in the future. But violating the fairness that must lie at the core of our voting system is not an acceptable way to deal with urban obliviousness.

4.0 Defining "shared or common interests"

One of the primary principles and probably the defining value driving Green politics is sustainability. We would then encourage Commission members to think about this: that overtime electoral division boundaries should be moved so as to be as consistent as possible with the eco-systems in which we are all embedded and which make all life possible. Ecosystem boundaries can be defined in a variety of ways, for example, according to air shed, food shed or watershed. The last – watershed – is likely to be the most salient in Alberta where water quality and quantity and extreme water supply issues, such as drought and flood, are so critical.

How might this kind of thinking have import for electoral boundaries? Well, conventional wisdom might see Calgary, for example, as having a lot more in common with a city such as Red Deer which is located in the Calgary-Edmonton corridor. But given the magnitude of the damage caused by the 2013 flood in the Bow River valley and the virtual certainty that significant flooding will occur again, Calgarians' interests are probably at least as tied to those of people in towns such as upstream Banff and Canmore and downstream Medicine Hat.

We encourage the Commission to take such ecological factors into consideration when redrawing boundaries so as to make representation in the Legislature more effective. We note that the literature on boundary delineations often points to the use of geographic features such as rivers. But it isn't rivers, such as the Bow, which should constitute electoral boundary divisions but instead the corresponding watersheds which by definition include both sides of those rivers. Albertans are not divided by their rivers; quite the opposite, they are for better or worse united by them.

Sections 14 (c), (g) and (h) of the <u>Electoral Boundaries Commission Act</u> may suffice as bases for using, for example, watersheds as a factor in boundary delineations but amendment of the legislation to explicitly provide for the use of ecosystem boundaries might be required.

5.0 Conclusion – Future moves to some form of Proportional Representation

While not certain, it is likely that Canadian jurisdictions are going to be moving to some form of Proportional Representation (PR) in the near to medium future. The GPA is strongly in favour of such a change: as with the need for roughly equal numbers of voters per riding, a move to some form of PR is also demanded by 1) respect for the principle of one person - one vote, 2) the need for representation to be effective and at rock bottom 3) fundamental fairness. Indeed we see the move to PR as the next step – after over-coming historical inequities such as the prohibition on women and Aboriginal people voting and the less egregious but still unacceptable favouritism shown rural voters in Alberta – in realizing greater fairness in our voting system.

We appreciate that it is not the mandate of the Commission to advise the provincial government on adoption of a new voting system but we encourage Commission members to keep in mind that the recommendations they make may well have implications for how easy or difficult it is to implement electoral change when that time comes.

Suggestions below are designed to bring some sense of consistency to the riding of Calgary Currie along the lines of geography, community boundaries, and housing (community) style.

North and West Boundaries: It seems reasonable to maintain both the western-most and northern-most boundaries of Calgary Currie. This would mean that Sarcee Trail in the West and the Bow River to the North would remain as "natural boundaries" for the riding.

Eastern Boundary: This ought to be extended south along 14th Street SW all the way to 33rd Ave SW as well as south down Crowchild Trail SW all the way to Glenmore Trail. Both these roadways are "natural boundaries". Moreover, the extension of 14th Street SW maintains the division the City of Calgary currently uses to distinguish between "downtown" and the rest of the city proper.

Southern Boundary: The southern boundary of Calgary Currie extended (east - west) along 33rd Ave SW and then along Glenmore Trail in the south. This, again, would follow both "natural boundaries" within the city as well as ensuring that complete communities are integrated into Currie (such as MRU and those who attend the university or work there and live in the surrounding communities). Further rationale would be that with this change residents on both sides of Richmond Road would be represented by the same MLA, rather than divided as it is today, where parts of the riding are bounded by Richmond Road while others are not.

Dear Madam Justice Bielby and Commission Members,

I live in the West Yellowhead constituency which presently consists of most of Yellowhead County, Jasper National and Willmore Wilderness Parks and a small area in the southernmost portion of Greenview County including the Town of Grande Cache. Your population estimate of 36,901 is 24% below the estimated provincial average.

I propose our revised constituency be named *Yellowhead* or alternatively, *Jasper – Yellowhead* and include within its boundaries all of Yellowhead County and Jasper National Park. Alternatively, the extreme south-eastern corner of Yellowhead County presently attached to the Drayton Valley – Devon constituency could logically remain with Drayton Valley, which is the trading center for its very few, if any permanent residents.

The major West Yellowhead boundary adjustments I propose would:

- ➤ Delete Grande Cache and the small area of Greenview County surrounding it from Yellowhead – thereby losing 2797 (2015) eligible voters to Grande Prairie – Wapiti, or its successor constituency to the north;
- ➤ Delete Willmore Wilderness Park which contains, to the best of my knowledge, no permanent residents and whose administrative center is Grande Cache;
- ✓ Add all that portion of Yellowhead County presently in the Whitecourt Ste. Anne constituency and circumscribed in general terms by the south boundary of Township 51, the Pembina River to the east, and an irregular line roughly halfway between Highways 16 and 43 to the north. This would add approximately 4470 (2015) eligible voters to Yellowhead.

These changes would **increase** the new Yellowhead constituency's number of registered voters, bringing it more into line with the provincial average.

Dear Madam Justice Bielby and Commission Members,

I wish to revise my earlier proposal for the electoral redistribution of West Yellowhead constituency, taking into account the 2016 census data. Our updated population of 31,551 is 32% below the provincial average. Dropping Grande Cache, which is more aligned with Grand Prairie, and bringing the remainder of Yellowhead County within our boundaries (see attached Figure 1) as I proposed in my earlier submission will raise it to only -27%. I retain my earlier recommendations to delete Grande Cache/Greenview County and rename our constituency *Yellowhead*. Since we must significantly increase *Yellowhead*'s population and size, but cannot extend west, north or south I recommend one of the following three expansion scenarios:

- Add to Yellowhead all that portion of the western half of the present Drayton Valley – Devon constituency lying west of the North Saskatchewan River including the Town of Drayton Valley, or
- 2) Delete from Stony Plain and Whitecourt-Ste. Anne, and add to *Yellowhead* that portion of Parkland County lying west of Highways 43 and 770, or
- Add to Yellowhead that portion of Woodlands County west of Range 10, including the Town of Whitecourt.

As evidenced in the attached summary (Figure 1: Alternatives for Adjusting West Yellowhead ...), each of these adjustments will increase the new *Yellowhead* constituency's population to within 5% of the provincial average. The demographics for each of the three options are similar, municipal integrity is respected where possible, and distinct geographical features taken into account. Your final choice will depend more on population pressures and redistribution priorities in other constituencies adjoining the three affected by these changes, which likely favors Option 2, but all are acceptable to me.

Thank you once again for the opportunity to participate in this process, and I look forward to presenting my proposal in more detail on February 23 in Edson.

Dear Commissioners,

I attended the first public hearing in Edmonton, on January 16, 2017. As there were very few contributors that morning, the chair generously opened the floor to anyone who would like to add their comments or suggestions. I chose to add a few words, but would like to expand on my thoughts from that day.

I live in the Edmonton South West constituency, which has a projected number in excess of 66,000 voters, pending the actual census results. This number is really unworkable and like the neighbouring Edmonton Ellerslie constituency it needs to be adjusted, to take into account the ongoing massive population growth in these areas. I was asked to draw a line on the laminated map (posted on the wall) suggesting how the two ridings could be made into three......and somewhat foolishly I agreed! On reflection, please ignore what I drew, as the obvious split in the Edmonton South West riding should most probably occur on the western side using the North Saskatchewan river, as a natural boundary, with all that area and that which is north to the Whitemud Drive included in possibly either Edmonton McClung or Edmonton Meadowlark.

It is quite apparent that some major shifts will need to occur with boundaries, to accommodate the growth on the south side of Edmonton, especially if the number of ridings is to be kept at the current 87. (I understand that a similar population growth is happening in the Calgary metropolitan area too.)

The urban and rural divides will still remain, but it is grossly unfair to have certain urban ridings, in particular, with such a high number of voters that is far above the current number of close to 49,000 as an average.

A few suggestions :-

- 1) That the commission should reduce the current 25% above or below average population to 5%, as it is in our neighbouring Saskatchewan, or to an absolute maximum of 10%.
- 2) Really the whole map needs to be redrawn in Alberta, as there are such huge discrepancies in the voters' numbers in different ridings! Why for example should Fort McMurray-Conklin have one quarter of the number compared to Edmonton South West? There are a couple of remote constituencies that have been granted special treatment in the past, which needs to be revisited, given our changed circumstances.
- 3) It is bogus to claim that distance is an issue in some of the rural ridings, as current technology makes it convenient and possible to maintain contact by letter, phone, mail, email, Skype etc.
- 4) Your task is to level the playing field and it will require some hard decisions to be made, to make the constituencies fairer, without giving an apparent political advantage to certain areas.

Edmonton-South West EBC Submission

The Electoral Boundaries Commission has an opportunity to draw electoral boundaries that will ensure more effective representation and equality of the voting power in Alberta. There has been massive urban growth in Alberta (more than 20% in the last eight years). Edmonton itself has grown from 817, 867 in 2009 (near the time of the last commission) to 950, 421 in 2015. Specifically, the riding of Edmonton-South West has experienced much of this growth in Edmonton, and therefore should be redrawn to reflect this.

There are a few things to consider:

Population

- Edmonton-South West is the second largest riding in Alberta, in terms of actual voters (41, 230).
 According to the 2016 census released by the Alberta Electoral Boundary Commission,
 Edmonton-South West is expected to be at 36 per cent above average. Alberta allows a variance of 25 per cent plus or minus the provincial average.
- The overpopulation of Edmonton-South West means a vote in this constituency is worth considerably less than a vote in many rural ridings with few voters (i.e., Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley has 16, 392 voters and Lesser Slave Lake has 19, 062 voters). Yet, Edmonton-South West is more than double the size of these ridings, in terms of actual voters. This means that a vote in Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley and Lesser Slave Lake is worth more than double a vote in Edmonton-South West.
- 5/10 of Edmonton's fastest growing neighbourhoods are in Edmonton-South West.

Demographics

• The neighbourhood of Twin Brooks is more established, and has an older population. However, most of the neighbourhoods (i.e., Cavanagh, Richford, Windermere) in Edmonton-South West are still being developed, and have many young families. The needs and interests of Twin Brooks is different than the rest of the neighbourhoods of Edmonton-South West. This makes effective representation difficult.

Natural Geographic Boundaries

- The Anthony Henday acts as a continuous natural boundary between Edmonton-South West and Edmonton-McClung, and Edmonton-Whitemud. However, this logical natural boundary is not followed between Edmonton-South West and Edmonton-Rutherford. In this instance, the Anthony Henday boundary is compromised in the inclusion of Twin Brooks in the Edmonton-South West electoral district.
- The North Saskatchewan River is a natural geographic boundary. It is effectively used between the riding of Edmonton-McClung and Edmonton-Whitemud. It is also used as a boundary between polls in Edmonton-South West (poll 76, and poll 65, 70, and 75). Therefore, this could be a logical boundary when re-drawing the electoral boundaries of Edmonton-South West.

In a democracy it is important that all citizens are provided with an equal say on the selection of a government that will work for us. In order to do that we need to continually ensure that the value of each vote is the same, within practical limits.

I understand that the legislation requires a review of electoral boundaries at regular intervals. I agree with the timing as it currently stands, more frequent reviews would be an unnecessary expense. Less frequent reviews might skew the voting to deprive certain constituencies of the representation they deserve.

With the premise that all citizen's votes should be treated equally, we have to recognize that there are other practical and logistical limitations that would prevent a strict adherence to the principle. The guideline that all constituencies should be within +/- 25% of the average is a reasonable compromise.

It is also important to understand that the interests of the various constituencies can differ greatly. Urban interests can vary significantly from rural interests. It is therefore important that those differences be considered when changes to boundaries are being decided. From a practical perspective it would not be possible to have strictly urban or rural constituencies but, the goal should be to avoid mixing urban and rural. To do this would be create divisions of interest within a constituency and mute the voice of one or the other of the groups.

Considering the goal of equal weighting for all constituencies I believe that the current divisions meet that target with only a few minor adjustments required.

The estimated population of 4,252,879 (Statistics Canada as of July 1, 2016) spread over 87

constituencies yields a target size of 48,884 people per constituency. Assuming that a variation of 25% higher or lower that the target size gives us a range of between 36,663 and 61,105 citizens per constituency.

With the downturn in the Alberta economy it is unlikely that we will see the sort of growth that Alberta has had in the past couple of decades or so. The 2016 estimates should give us a fairly accurate basis to consider any required changes to boundaries for the next 10 years.

Of the 87 constituencies there are a total of 8 that fall outside of the stated target size.

I recommend that for the smaller mainly rural constituencies that no changes be made based solely on the population. The constituencies of Dunvegan-Central Peace, Fort McMurray-Conklin and Lesser Slave Lake although smaller in population size, all cover vast areas. In order to adjust the population to conform with the target would require increasing the physical size of the area. Reasonable representation would become more difficult if the area is increased in any meaningful way, just to level that population.

The Banff-Cochrane constituency is currently larger than the target marginally. Adjusting the population to simply get it within the +/- 25% range would be a short term fix. Due to significant growth that is ongoing it would be advisable to move the population closer to the mid point. The physical footprint of the constituency should be reduced to a tighter circle around the towns of Banff and Canmore and move parts of the more rural portions of the constituency into the neighbouring constituencies of Rimbey Rockyview and Livingstone Mcleod. Both of these ridings are below the target by approximately 8-10%. This would also meet the goal of keeping similar interests urban, rural, and in this case Parks in each riding.

In Calgary McCall the constituency is over the target by about 10% or 7,000 people. Redistributing 3,000 to Calgary Mackay-Nose Hill, 2,000 to Calgary Cross and 2,000 to Calgary Greenway would keep all 4 constituencies within the target range. It would also meet the goal of avoiding significant mixing of urban and rural interests.

Calgary Northern Hills is only slightly over the target (200 people) A proactive adjustment of approximately 2,000 people to the Calgary Foothills constituency would keep both within the target and not impact any of the more rural ridings.

Calgary South East is over the target by a significant margin approximately 18,000 people. The constituency is bordered by Calgary-Shaw (under by 11,000), Calgary Hays (under by 14,000), Calgary Fort (under by 10,000) all of which are below the target. By redistributing the 4 ridings together they could all easily be brought into the desired range.

Edmonton Strathcona is over the target range by approximately 5,000 people. The neighbouring constituencies are Edmonton Mcclung (under by 18,000), Edmonton Rutherford (under by 15,000), Edmonton Whitemud (under by 8,000). Redistributing the 5,000 to the other ridings would easily keep all the constituencies within the target range and would keep the urban and rural nature intact.

Overall I believe that the current distribution of populations within the constituencies is quite workable and that with some minor adjustments referred to above the electorate in Alberta will be reasonably represented in the legislature.

- 1. Alberta should have fewer MLAs, for example, about 60 MLAs with 75,000 people per constituency. Southern Alberta would be as well represented with 3 MLAs as the current 5 MLAs. The change would result in one(1) MLA for southeastern Alberta and two(2) MLAs for southwestern Alberta.
- The workload would increase for an MLA's office. This increase would mainly be for support staff.
 MLAs would require a larger budget to higher additional staff, who mainly handle the requests/inquiries of constituents.
- 3. The main issues which face Alberta are beyond the old and stale argument of rural versus urban and that rural Albertans will not be represented in the Alberta Government. Municipal Governments are better designed to address the important issues of the different areas.
- 4. The compensation paid to MLAs supports that they represent a larger number of people. The argument of more travel in rural Alberta in our age of modern technology is outdated and not very valid. MLA earnings are comparable to MPs, and their electoral districts have about 110,000 people. MPs are also in a House which sits considerably longer annually than our Legislature.
- 5. MLAs are not in an employee-employer relationship to justify the design of the current compensation system. They are independent contractors. They should be properly paid, but the taxpayers are not contributing additionally to the cost of any benefits. The MLAs design their own benefit package and contribute accordingly. For example, the severance package is the first to go. Independent contractors are paid when they are elected, but they are not paid anything if their contract is terminated [lose an election].

6. A commission of Albertans[citizens & MLAs] should be appointed to participate in design of the independent contractor system. The first task is to write the job description of a MLA. For example, MLAs should not receive additional compensation for serving on committees of the Legislature. It is part of the job. The chair may receive a nominal honorarium.

I am truly proud and honoured to represent the constituents of Calgary-Currie. My recommendation to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission for consideration of changes made to the constituency of Calgary-Currie are highlighted in the following points:

- 1.) **North and West Boundaries:** Keep the existing boundaries at Sarcee trail on the west, and the Bow River on the west, as these are natural boundaries that have been longstanding.
- 2.) Eastern boundary: 14th street SW from the Bow River up to 33rd Avenue SW. I recommend that Calgary-Currie incorporates the community of South Calgary. {see attached map}

The communities of Richmond Knob Hill and South Calgary form part of the Marda Loop South Calgary Community. I note that 14th street is the same downtown western boundary that the City of Calgary uses in their definition of downtown, versus inner city. It is important that 14th street SW remains a natural constituency border, because it separates downtown from inner city, where the downtown is a business district and the neighbourhoods west of 14th street are residential inner city.

In addition, the existing boundaries at 33rd avenue and 20th street cause daily confusion for the constituents in and outside of the riding at my constituency office and during the election period as to which electoral boundary they live in.

3.) South West boundary: 33 Avenue SW, Crowchild and Glenmore trail SW. I recommend that the communities of Lincoln Park, Rutland Park and Glamorgan be included in Calgary Currie. Currently, the riding crosses over 33rd avenue into Currie Barracks. The 33rd avenue/Richmond Road cross over should continue up to Sarcee trail and Glenmore trail. Glenmore trail is a natural and significant roadway border to the west and the South.

Lincoln Park - Historically associated with the Currie Barracks as it is directly south of the barracks.

Rutland Park - Currie Barracks residents currently use Rutland Park's community association as their own. It would make sense to bring Rutland Park into Calgary-Currie. Small sections of Rutland Park currently form part of Calgary-Currie. It makes no sense to split up neighbourhoods.

Glamorgan – Many of the residents in Glamorgan attend schools and churches located across 33rd Avenue in Killarney and Glenbrook and Glendale, and vice versa. Glamorgan is very similar in age and socio-economic statistics to Glenbrook and Glendale.

During the election period, and in day to day constituency enquiries, there is a moderate amount of confusion by constituents as to which riding they live in. Glenmore trail and Crowchild trail will provide strong boundary indicators to alleviate this problem.

These recommendations will allow for between 7,000 and 10,000 new constituents to Calgary-Currie, within the margin set out by the commission.



southern bias. In this context, the County is opposed to the loss of any ridings in Northern Alberta. The numbers already indicate that three of our northerly ridings are at risk given the lack of population. While the legislation allows for some special consideration for up to 4 ridings to be created with special circumstances, the temptation to perhaps merge ridings together in the north to allow for even more seats in the south might be somewhat enticing. However, such a move would be detrimental to the residents in Northern Alberta and should be resisted.

The panel may have heard the issue before but it is worth repeating; electoral boundaries are more than just population. It must also consider the geography of the Province, the quality and adequacy of the transportation network, weather conditions, accessibility to the MLA in a timely manner and communication linkages. To this end, rural Alberta is at a severe disadvantage compared to its urban neighbours. This is particularly true about Northern Alberta where weather plays a major role in the ability to service a riding, where airline transportation is virtually non- existent and the roads are in horrible shape after years of pounding by the resource industry. The access to basic services such as medical care, postsecondary education and education is compromised by the continued centralization of services into the large urban areas such as Edmonton and Calgary. The elimination of Regional Health Authorities is a prime example of the centralization model. Additional loss of political representation would continue to erode our ability to move ahead.

There may be some opportunities to alter constituency boundaries but the gains or losses within each constituency will not for the most part be large enough to bring those into compliance. Meanwhile, some constituencies will continue to get larger and harder to serve while others will become smaller and likely easier to serve. Most urbans certainly fall into the latter category. The point to our submission on this issue is that Northern Alberta cannot afford to lose any more seats or political representation. We respectfully request that the Commission carefully consider these points when making a final recommendation.

Specifically with respect to the two Grande Prairie ridings, the County would like to make the point that the current boundaries work well for the region and the County including our smaller urban municipalities. Having two MLA's working on our behalf on the issues affecting the area is important. We cannot emphasis this point enough. The current boundaries allow our MLA's to work on mutual issues affecting both the rural and urban areas. Their combined work on the Mountain Pine Beetle is an example of an issue that transcends riding boundaries affects rural and urban municipalities alike. Other issues include, regional health care, transportation and highway improvements, municipal sustainability funding, policing, resource issues affecting agriculture, forestry and oil and gas to name only a few. Generally the current alignment of the boundaries is supported by the County. Splitting the City on an east-west axis along 100th Avenue creating a north side and south side ensures a fairly even population distribution between the two ridings now and into the future. The issues the region faces are intertwined. They are not urban or rural issues. They are regional issues. Because you cannot create a riding

contains the entire City based on the current population, it is therefore acknowledged that the part of the City must be part of a rural riding. Should this occur, the remaining rural/urban MLA would also be required to attend requests for meetings in the City in addition to all the other demands on their time. City based organizations and other regional bodies will want both MLA's to attend meetings and represent interests in Edmonton.

This situation creates a huge imbalance in the workload that the Commission needs to consider. A single MLA in Grande Prairie with one municipality to deal with and a second MLA that must deal with 8 municipalities including the City and travel extensively to do it would effectively put eight times the workload on to one MLA. The current boundaries provide more balance to this workload splitting the municipal workload in particular with six municipalities for GP Wapiti and five for GP Smoky. This situation can be expanded to other organizations such as Chambers of Commerce, School Boards, Seniors Housing organizations, First Nations and so on. As the area continues to grow, both ridings have shared and will continue to share in the growth. The obligations to deal with the growth should be shared equally between two MLA's.

In summary, there are two main elements to our presentation. Firstly, in the Provincial context, the County urges the Commission not to eliminate any northern Alberta ridings. Secondly, the County generally supports the current boundaries of Grande Prairie Wapiti and Grande Prairie Smoky insofar as it affects the County of Grande Prairie. Major change would not be supported.

The Electoral Boundary Review of 2003 clearly dictated that universal equal representation by population was not feasible. The commission at that time decided that effective representation should be the goal. The review weighed rural population scarcity and distance between communities against population density in urban areas. These principles should apply to the current review.

The County trusts that the Commission will give a full and complete consideration of our comments. Thank you for allowing us to make this submission.



Dear Justice Myra Bielby,

The Special Areas is a unique form of rural local government which serves a large geographical area in east-central Alberta, including three urban areas within the boundaries: the Town of Hanna, Town of Oyen and Village of Consort. While most maps show Special Areas 2, 3 & 4 as separate municipalities, they are administered as a single entity by the Special Areas Board. The Special Areas Advisory Council, of which I act as Chairman, is comprised of 13 representatives elected under the provisions of the *Local Authorities Election Act*. The mandate of the Advisory Council is to give advice to the Special Areas Board and the Minister of Municipal Affairs on the administration and operation of Special Areas. This area falls into the Drumheller – Stettler constituency.

One of the most critical responsibilities of the Electoral Boundaries Commission is to ensure all Albertans are provided effective representation by their elected representatives in the Legislative Assembly. As noted by this Commission, effective representation does not mean absolute voter parity. Additional factors must be considered by the Commission when making recommendations, including ensuring a manageable geographic size for electoral divisions in sparsely populated, rural or northern regions.

The Special Areas, and the larger eastern-central region we are located within, is a rural-remote area of Alberta. Rural-remote regions are distinct from rural areas in the overall larger geographic size of the region, the distance between population centers, the size of the population centers themselves, and the overall level of access to services available. The area of east-central Alberta which the Special Areas resides within is sparsely populated, covers a large geographic area, and is significantly removed from a primary service area – specifically the QEII corridor (Edmonton-Red



Deer-Calgary). Additional characteristics of a rural-remote region include declining and aging populations, declining industrial activity and assessment base, increasing scarcity of access to basic technological infrastructure and service level, and physical isolation from larger service areas.

There are many commonalities which can be found throughout this specific rural-remote region of Alberta, frequently centering on common economic interests, community identity, specific agricultural conditions and industrial development. Common economic interests include agricultural, oil & gas development, and coal-fired power generation. Similar environmental conditions have led to the development of agricultural operations which mitigate the historically low precipitation rates and marginal land quality common to this area. Large areas of native grasslands exist throughout the area; not necessarily by choice, but by necessity due to prevailing conditions. Lack of access to irrigation is a critical differentiation of this rural-remote region when compared to the region south of Red Deer River. The communities throughout this region are generally small (under 1000 population), geographically far removed from one another, and subject to declining populations, assessment and increasing age. These factors all combine to paint a picture of a rural-remote region which has limited resources: economic, demographic, and cultural.

As the Special Areas Advisory Council represents all three Special Areas, and as all three Special Areas are administered by a single body – the Special Areas Board, we strongly recommend the boundaries of the Drumheller-Stettler do not change in any way which would not recognize our municipal boundaries. In short we operate as one unit and would strongly recommend to you that the Special Areas stay as one unit with one MLA.

The Special Areas Advisory Council recognizes the Electoral Boundaries Commission is required to make some adjustments to the current composition of the electoral divisions in Alberta to ensure effective representation for all Albertans. Furthermore, we also recognize the Electoral Boundaries Commission is not able to create new electoral divisions to alleviate any challenges when balancing the changes in population which have occurred since 2010. However, we recommend the current boundaries of the Drumheller-Stettler electoral division do not increase in size as this electoral division meets at three of the criteria for a Special Electoral division as outlined in Section 15 (2) of the *Electoral Boundaries Act*. The area of the Drumheller-Stettler electoral division is 33,017 km², greater than 20,000 km². The distance from the Legislative Assembly in Edmonton to the nearest constituency office in Drumheller-Stettler electoral division is 202 km, greater than 150 km. Finally, the Drumheller-Stettler



electoral division has a portion of its boundary coterminous with a boundary of the Province of Alberta (Province of Saskatchewan on eastern boundary).

An additional consideration is the Drumheller-Stettler electoral division is already one of the largest in the Province of Alberta, and to remain within a 10% deviation to the provincial population average, it would have to become either unreasonably large or incorporate a large urban area with distinctly divergent and competing needs. Either of these two options would threaten the ability of the elected representative to provide effective representation for the residents of Drumheller-Stettler. Our question to the Electoral Boundaries Commission is: how much bigger can this electoral division be and still ensure effective representation?

The population density issue seems to be typical of electoral divisions along the eastern side of this province where the population deviation from the proposed average are all in the negative. The sparse population in this rural-remote region has implications when it comes to effective representation. The elected representative for Drumheller-Stettler is faced with the issue of time and distance – specifically the amount of time it takes to effectively cover the distance of this electoral division. It would take approximately five hours to travel from one end of the electoral division to the opposite. The average distance between more heavily populated areas (Villages/Hamlets) is 110 km. It requires a considerable commitment of time, funds and other resources by the elected representative to get out to community events vital to good governance and effective representation. This is a critical difference from the electoral divisions that have much more concentrated populations, even if their total electoral divisions are also geographically large. **Drumheller-Stettler is the largest electoral division in the settled part of the province.**

To increase the size of the current electoral division would make it impossible for the elected representative to effectively represent the increasingly large region with disparate communities included within the division's boundaries. Economic and community ties would not exist in a meaningful way as there would be a disruption in the historical pattern in the electoral division. Stable electoral boundaries were recognized by the Supreme Court of Canada as an important contributing element for achieving effective representation. An even larger electoral division for Drumheller-Stettler would reduce the similarity of economic relationships and interests within its boundaries. Different patterns of trade, commuting areas and service areas, and health-care regions would create a disparate and competing interests for a single elected representative.



In the opinion of the Special Areas Advisory Council, any increase in size to the existing Drumheller-Stettler electoral division would significantly threaten the ability for an elected representative to effectively represent the interests of its constituents. No increase in funding or further additional offices or staff would enable a single MLA to effectively represent the Drumheller-Stettler electoral division if its size was increased or composition significantly changed.

On behalf of the Special Areas Advisory Council, I thank you for the opportunity to provide input and context for our rural-remote area of Alberta. The Advisory Council looks forward to reviewing your draft recommendations and would welcome any further opportunity to provide any information which would assist this Commission in its preparation of final recommendations.

My primary concern regarding electoral boundaries in Alberta is that we presently have unfair representation in many ridings due to large differences in population between ridings. I believe the most important job of the Electoral Boundaries Commission is to improve our democracy by adjusting our riding boundaries in order to minimize the differences in population. These differences should not exceed 10% and should be adjusted on a regular basis to ensure that riding population differences never exceed 10% as population changes occur.

I do not believe it is necessary for riding boundaries to always follow existing municipal boundaries. The need for fairness in riding population size is most important.

I believe the total number of ridings in the province is sufficient and must not be increased in order to improve rural representation. If all riding populations are to be within 10% then rural Alberta will have to lose ridings and urban Alberta will gain. It is not logical nor is it fair to maintain the present number of rural ridings as rural populations decline and urban populations quickly rise.

There is the argument that the number of rural ridings must be maintained in order to have effective representation, due to the large areas involved. I do not agree with this argument as communication has improved significantly in recent years with the use of mobile phones, email and the internet. As well, roads and air connections are much better than those in the past. For rural MLAs today communication is much easier than it was in the past. Smaller riding areas are not necessary.

I believe we will have a better democracy if we adjust our riding sizes to count each person's vote as equally as possible.

Thanks for the invitation to submit our observations to your commission. Our essential statement to you is quite simple. We think there is no reason to make any changes to the boundaries of Lethbridge East. We note that the projected median population for Alberta constituencies is approximately 49,000. We also note section 14 A) of the Electoral Boundaries Commission Act declares "the requirement of effective representation as guaranteed by the Can. Charter of Rights and Freedoms."

OUR CONCLUSIONS - POPULATION

Your commission projects our constituency population will be almost 45,000 in the 2016 census figures. Our own sense of this, after consulting with the city mayor and others is that city grow will push our 2016 census figures probably higher than the figure of 44, 927 mentioned at the Lethbridge hearing on Jan. 25, 2017. We suspect the Lethbridge East figures will be even closer to the median of 49,000 and projected city growth over the next few years will likely move the figure upwards even more. So on the basis of population, our constituency would seem to be very close to the ideal suggested by your commission

OUR CONCLUSION - RE THE SPECIFIC PRESENT BOUNDARIES

We would also suggest that the specific boundaries, mostly following 13th St. in dividing the city on a north-south basis makes sense from a cultural perspective. This is a reasonable boundary, familiar to most and as easily explained and communicated as any other one could propose. The boundaries are also appropriate in including the urban developments on the north and south, while leaving farming areas to neighboring rural constituencies where they are better represented. So we would recommend that the present boundary does not need any minor adjustments or tweaking.

IN CONCLUSION

We understand that your commission will face some complex issues in the course of your decisions. However, this constituency of Lethbridge East, we suggest, already meets the criteria you seek, and does not need changes of any kind.

As someone who lives in the Spruce Grove-St. Albert electoral district, I am very disappointed with our current electoral district boundaries. So much so, that our family has even considered moving simply because we feel that our electoral district doesn't have a voice.

Our family lives in North Ridge in the far North-West quadrant of St. Albert. During a provincial election, our city is forced to be divided; typically with several strong, local candidates in the St. Albert riding but in the Spruce Grove-St. Albert riding, we are often left with inexperienced candidates, "newbies" or worse, no candidate at all.

Even more frustrating is that every candidate in this riding is always a resident of Spruce Grove (never St. Albert).

I appreciate that Spruce Grove deserves a voice in the legislature; truly they do. However, Spruce Grove and St. Albert are very different communities and typically, we have very unique priorities.

At a municipal and provincial level, the City of St. Albert is more likely to be more strongly influenced and have a stronger effect on the nearby communities of Sturgeon County (i.e. Morinville, Bon Accord, Gibbons etc..) than we have with Spruce Grove. Just read our local newspapers (The St. Albert Gazette, The Morinville News etc..) You'll see a strong influence between our communities. Spruce Grove on the other hand appears to have a stronger relationship/influence between themselves and Stony Plain. Much stronger than they've ever had with St. Albert.

I would like to see the electoral boundaries change so that the Alberta communities who have the strongest influence on one another and as such, similar priorities, are within the same electoral boundaries. Even if our next set of candidates are once again, not St. Albert residents, it would at least be beneficial if the candidate was from a community within Sturgeon County.

I would really like to see candidates who have a stronger connection and understanding of our two cities (St. Albert/Spruce Grove) but, with the current electoral boundaries, as they are; this just isn't happening.

Frankly, it's unfair to both our cities and I feel that new boundaries need to be considered. I realize that in the past, St. Albert and Sturgeon County have not always been allies but, I believe that this relationship is rapidly changing for the better. The impact of similar priorities and a need for strong relationships between St. Albert with Sturgeon County and Spruce Grove with Stony Plain is essential and the current electoral boundaries do not reflect this at all.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide input into the 2017 Electoral Boundary Review. I submit this letter on behalf of St. Albert City Council.

Currently, the City of St. Albert is represented by two provincial constituencies:

Constituency	2011 Census Population Counts	2016 Population Estimates
St. Albert	44,420	48,430
Spruce Grove-St. Albert	51,795	59,453

Based on the 2016 population estimates, both St. Albert constituencies are within the Electoral Boundaries Commission Act's 25% variance of the 48,884 average population estimate. However, in the event that the constituency boundary of Spruce Grove-St. Albert be redrawn for any reason, we request that the Commission consider extending the boundary north to include the Town of Morinville instead of including the City of Spruce Grove or extending farther west. We believe this to be the ideal course of action for the following reasons:

• The City of St. Albert and the Town of Morinville are likely to continue to grow in population, as is the City of Spruce Grove. Redrawing the boundary to exclude the City of Spruce Grove and include the Town of Morinville would set the population of the constituency at approximately 41,851. This is within the 25% variance, however provides room for population growth.

 The proposed changes to the constituency boundary would more accurately reflect the current sub-region and its municipal planning partners.

 The City of St. Albert has signed a Memorandum of Agreement with Sturgeon County, which includes a commitment to undertake joint growth planning between the two

municipalities and have undertaken a formal process to do so.

 The proposed changes to the constituency boundary more accurately reflect the planned future growth and municipal boundaries in this sub-region for better provincial-municipal alignment.



Written Submission to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission

This submission regards the practise of attaching names of notable Albertans to certain constituencies.

To date, the individuals chosen are predominantly past serving provincial politicians. This is not a common practise among provinces as only one other, Quebec, does the same. The standard federally and of all other provinces is that constituencies are named using only geographic references.

The potential pitfalls of the current practise are several, a key one of which is illustrated by the Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley constituency. Although the recognition was intended for a former MLA, it now serves as an unspoken advantage in an election to one political party, given that the MLA's daughter is now the premier of our province. By virtue of name association alone, an unintended consequence is that some voters may be influenced, subliminally or more overtly, to cast their ballots for the party that the Premier represents and to the detriment of other candidates.

While this may, at face value, seem of little potential consequence in terms of numbers of votes cast, it cannot be disregarded. For no reason more so than an election outcome in the constituency affected. It is not uncommon for elections to be decided in this constituency by close margins, the most recent two being a little more than 500 votes or less. A change in a small number of ballots cast would have yielded an individual of a different political party being elected.

Beyond this immediate concern other principles lie at risk. The fact that politicians have been chosen for naming constituencies opens possible inferences of political favoritism or dissent. Any choice of personage is subjective and open to question.

Brevity and conciseness should be the hallmarks of any constituency name. Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley is a model for what a name should not be. It is much too lengthy with too many hyphens and is neither brief nor precise. People at all levels of government and residents of this area commonly express dissatisfaction and angst over the name.

For the initial concerns and reasons, it would be prudent to discontinue naming or adding the names of individuals to constituency names. A policy of using purely geographical names is both unambiguous and prevents unforeseen situations involving personal names and election outcomes.

For the secondary reasons, constituency names should reflect as few words as possible; one or at most two descriptive words. Dunvegan or Central Peace would serve as a naming model. At the least, the naming tie to our Premier should be dropped.

I suggest allowing a certain percentage discrepancy (10%? 20%? fewer) in the number of people per MLA in rural Alberta and in those in the cities.

More importantly, I encourage the AEBC to support keeping voters with common interests and needs together. Don't divide up a city and tack on large rural areas to make one riding. Keep the city together (assuming it has the population to justify it), so their MLA can accurately represent them—similarly, keep the rural area together so that those voters can have their say without being overwhelmed by an urban population.



The gov't of AB is currently looking at possible changes to the electoral boundaries. First and foremost, DO NOT increase the number of seats. One thing we DO NOT need is more politicians!

Thank you so much for taking time to read this submission.

My name is Charlene Preston and I am a resident of Sundre in the Rimbey- Rocky Mountain House – Sundre constituency. Frist thank you for your willingness to serve on this commission it is a thankless job but a very important one. You help shape the future of our legislature and democracy and it will be impossible to make everyone happy.

The population of Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House- Sundre as of last year according to the Speakers office was 44,000 which is within the current standards. As you may know Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House- Sundre currently has 12 municipalities and 72 municipally elected officials as well as 4 school boards with 28 trustees 3 significant hospitals, 27 Schools including 11 high schools, multiple agricultural societies and community groups. (While this is a lot, it is by no means the largest in terms of communities) One thing I think is very important and often over looked but is important for the commission to remember is the effective representation requirement. In the rural areas we need to do whatever is possible to ensure we have effective representation. If rural ridings increase size dramatically or the number of stake holders increases significantly we run the risk of creating an even more dramatic divide in representation between rural and urban representation. I do not believe that this will be of a net benefit to Albertans should it happen. As you are well aware the population is one driving factor to consider, so is effective representation. As I mentioned above growing the size both is size or stakeholders would create more challenges for effective representation.

Rimbey- Rocky Mountain House- Sundre is unique to many other constituencies due to the 2 First Nations Reserves that fall within our boundaries. There are 2 schools that service the reserves both K-12

and there are 7 elected officials. Another very unique situation that needs to be taken into consideration is the tourism destination of the west country. In both the winter and the summer months the west country is a popular destination for hiking and camping and quadding/snowmobiling and horseback riding. This is very taxing on the services in the area, especially first responders, medical and policing and on our 3 hospitals.

With respect to the rural/urban divide I am sure you have heard at other public hearings that the current population (and while I accept we are waiting for more data) is made up of very close to 50 percent in Calgary and Edmonton. 28.9 percent in Calgary and 21.07 percent in Edmonton they also hold 50 percent of the ridings. The rest of the Province including the smaller cities also have 50 percent of the population as well as just shy of 50 percent of the ridings in Alberta. The city limits of both Calgary and Edmonton should and need to continue to be respected and kept whole. These population numbers represent that and it would be a disservice to rural voters if the long standing tradition of keeping the two major cities intact was changed.

A possible solution to increasing population to the Rimbey –Rocky Mountain House- Sundre Constituency is as follows- by taking small portions of surrounding ridings. For example- Cremona, Water Valley Eagle Hill (from Olds- Didsbury-Three Hills), Little Red Deer, Dickson, Spruceview, Gleniffer, Markerville and Garrington West (from Innisfail-Sylvan Lake) and Fallen Timber (from Banff Cochrane). All of these areas have similar demographics to Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre.

I know that it has been put forward to the Commission to have Sundre included in Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills. Should this change be an option in the eyes of the committee then it should be Olds joining Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House- Sundre. Rocky Mountain House, Clearwater Country and Sundre NEED to stay together. They all have very good working relationships with each other, they all have similar issues to deal with- tourism, river issues, manufacturing and industrial (West Fraser has a location near Sundre and one near Rocky and it would be detrimental to breaking them up).

At the end of the day keeping rural, rural and urban is important. We need to ensure representation is not just equal but effective and always keep in mind municipal boundaries as well as what communities naturally fit together.

In actual fact, the variations are worse. The population of

Fort McMurray-Conklin (29,533)is 40% of the constituency average (48,860)! A clear violation of the current act. That makes it 37% of Calgary-South East. Which means a vote in Fort McMurray-Conklin is worth more than twice as much as a vote in Calgary-South East. Not fair.

Some serious tweaking needs to take place: first of all with the margins. If Saskatchewan can work with a 5% variance, why can't Alberta?

Secondly, we need proportional representation so that we can put a stop to the unfair majorities that rule our promise. I realize this is not part of your mandate, but I think you should recognize it as a problem.

Flagstaff Intermunicipal Partnership (FIP) is a regional committee established by the Village of Alliance, Town of Daysland, Flagstaff County, Village of Forestburg, Town of Hardisty, Village of Heisler, Town of Killam, Village of Lougheed and the Town of Sedgewick. Our region, which is currently based in the Battle River-Wainwright constituency, has a population base of approximately 8,350.

Our municipalities are currently undertaking a Regional Governance Project in which we are exploring the possibilities of forming a single-tier municipal government to replace the nine (9) existing municipalities. FIP has the following concerns we wish the Commission to take under consideration:

- Splitting our region into more than one provincial constituency could result in competition within ourselves. Our group of municipalities is working hard to ensure our viability. As small municipalities, we are continually competing for funding for capital projects as well as for special projects. We are concerned that if our region is split into more than one provincial constituency we could encounter even more competition between ourselves. We are also concerned that if regional projects are being undertaken, having to deal with two provincial legislative members could cause delays or even conflict in getting our projects approved. We are requesting that the Commission not split the Flagstaff area into more than one constituency.
- Loss of representation for rural Alberta as a whole within the legislative assembly
 would greatly impede our ability to remain sustainable and viable. We recognize
 the out-migration that is happening in all rural areas and we are very concerned
 that the realignment of constituency boundaries could result in even less
 representation for rural communities within the legislative assembly. We are

therefore requesting that the Commission carefully consider the ramifications of moving seats from rural Alberta to the major cities within the Province.

Dear Commission Members,

The point of my suggestion is simple: that although Alberta has largely succeeded in creating individual electoral districts that are sensible and fair -- which is to say, we have been able to avoid gerrymandering -- there remains one problem, and that is that rural Alberta is still over-represented in the overall map.

Generally speaking, riding boundaries ought to be drawn to ensure that each district has approximately the same population. I do support the existence of a very small number of ridings that have special population size exemptions as long as there are good reasons for it (I believe there are currently two or three such ridings). Beyond this, however, urban and rural ridings should be drawn in such a way that the populations are about equal when compared. Currently, this is not the case: there are rural ridings, which do not fall under a special status, which have populations smaller than the 'target', and there are urban ridings with populations well above the target.

This is unfair. I am not arguing that rural Alberta should have less of a voice, nor trying to pit urban vs rural. Rather, it is a matter of equality and fairness. I want *every* Albertan to have an *equal* voice. Generally speaking, people should not have more or less of a political impact based on where they live. Whether you live in downtown Calgary, suburban Edmonton, or ten minutes outside Elk Point, your political voice, expressed through voting, should be equal. And when some regions are over-represented compared to others, people are not being treated equally, nor fairly.

Therefore, I urge you to correct this unfair situation.

Thank you for considering my submission. I do not envy you the difficult work you have ahead, but I am most grateful for your service and look forward to seeing you discharge your duty in a fair, impartial, rational, and compassionate manner. I feel lucky to live in a place where these values are at the centre of the electoral boundary-drawing process.

The Law

The *Boundary Commission Act* directs the commission to divide the province in 87 electoral divisions, with a deviation of plus or minus 25% of the provincial average.

The Act states:

13 The Commission shall divide Alberta into 87 proposed electoral divisions.

RSA 2000 cE-3 s13;2009 c19 s4

- 14(1) In determining the area to be included in and in fixing the boundaries of the proposed electoral divisions, the Commission, subject to section to section 15, may take into consideration any factors it considers appropriate, but shall take into consideration
 - (a) the requirement for effective representation as guaranteed by the *Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms*,
 - (b) scarcity and density of population,



- (c) common community interests and community organizations, including those of Indian Reserves and Metis Settlements,
- (d) wherever possible, the existing community boundaries within the City of Edmonton and Calgary,
- (e) wherever possible, the existing municipal boundaries,
- (f) the number of municipalities and local authorities,
- (g) geographical features, including existing road systems, and,
- (h) the desirability of understandable and clear boundaries.

1990 cE-4.01 s16;1993 c2 s12;1995 c10 s12

- 15(1) The population of a proposed electoral division must not be more than 25% above nor more than 25% below the average population of all the proposed electoral divisions.
- 15(2) Notwithstanding subsection (1), in the case of no more than 4 of the proposed electoral divisions, if the Commission is of the opinion that at least 3 of the following criteria exist in a proposed electoral division, the proposed electoral division may have a population that is as much as 50% below average population of all the proposed electoral divisions:
 - (a) the area of the proposed electoral division is 20,000 square kilometres or the total surveyed area of the proposed electoral division exceeds 15,000 square kilometres;
 - (b) the distance from the Legislative Assembly Building in Edmonton to the nearest boundary of the proposed electoral division exceeds 15,000 square kilometres;
 - (c) there is no town in the proposed electoral division that has a population exceeding 8,000 people;
 - (d) the area of the proposed electoral division contains an Indian Reserve or a Metis Settlement;
 - (e) the proposed electoral division has a portion of its boundary coterminous with a boundary of the Province of Alberta.

The Supreme Court Decision

We are also guided by the Supreme Court of Canada decision in the Reference Re Prov. Electoral Boundaries (Sask.)ⁱ. Justice McLaughlin writing for the majority stated,

'The purpose of the right to vote enshrined in s.3 of the Charter is not equality of voting power per se but the right to "effective representation". The right to vote therefore compromises many factors, of which equity is but one. The section does not guarantee equality of voting power.

Relative parity of voting power is a prime condition of effective representation. Deviations from absolute voter parity, however, may be justified on the grounds of practical impossibility or the provision of more effective representation. Factors like geography, community history, community interests, and minority representation may need to be taken into account to ensure that our legislative assemblies effectively represent the diversity of our social mosaic. Beyond this, dilution of one citizen's vote as compared with another's should not be countenanced."

The Supreme Court has affirmed that there are a number of factors that the province can ensure effective representation. The principles outlined by Justice McLaughlin have been reflected in the *Boundary Commission Act*.

Rural Versus Urban

The Constitution, the Supreme Court and the Electoral Commission Act all try to strike a balance between competing interests in creating as fair electoral boundaries as possible. One of the areas of tension is between urban and rural electoral divisions. I am drawn to a quote from Laurie Blakeman the former MLA from Edmonton Centre,

'I think when I read some of the submissions that came from constituency associations ... there's an expectation that they could, you know, phone and get an immediate meeting with their MLA and chat with them face to face and things like that. Yeah, my folks would like to do that, too, but they don't get the same kind of opportunity to do that because I'm dealing with more people, and it's not possible for me to organize my representation of people in that same way. If my people had the chance to do it the way some of the rural people were talking, I'm sure they'd take it. They'd say, 'Absolutely I want to be able to operate that same way and have that same kind of relationship with my MLA,' but that's not what's available to me as an urban representative."



Expectations from rural residents will have to adjust to the reality that their percentage of population is waning. While the law allows for some variance between electoral districts they have to be reasonable, justifiable and create effective representation.

Population Growth

The population of Alberta has increased by 566,351 people since the last Commission report.

Alberta population in the first quarter of 2010 is 3,702,578ⁱⁱ.

Alberta population on October 1, 2016 is 4,268,929iii.

Section 13 of the Act has not changed and the Commission will have divide the province into 87 electoral districts.

The law allows for a maximum variation of plus 25% the maximum riding is 61,335.

The law also allows for a maximum variation of minus 25% below the minimum 36,801.

While the law provides for up to a 25% deviation the lower the deviation the more confidence Albertans will have in the process.

The City of Calgary should maintain the number of seats it has within Legislature as it is reflective of its portion of the population.

The City of Edmonton should maintain the number of seats it has within Legislature as it is reflective of its portion of the population.

The City of Lethbridge should maintain the number of seats it has within Legislature as it is reflective of its portion of the population.

The City of Red Deer should maintain the number of seats it has within Legislature as it is reflective of its portion of the population.



Within the 2016 boundaries of the cities of Calgary, Edmonton, Lethbridge, and Red Deer there will need to be a redrawing of the maps to be more reflective of the changes in population within the cities. The Commission should respect section 14(1) (d) and respect community boundaries in Edmonton and Calgary. Keeping neighborhoods within one electoral division should apply to Lethbridge, Red Deer, and all cities in Alberta.

When the boundaries are being redrawn I would urge the Commission to keep communities together.

I would note that we do not know what effect the fire in Wood Buffalo had on the population of the region. If there is a decrease in population that may need to be reflected in divisions.

The maximum size of a riding is 25% above the average is 61,335 depending on the population statistics used. There are two cities that will need to have their boundaries redrawn.

Airdrie^{xvi} - 61,842

Medicine Hat - 63,018

Each city is above 25% threshold and yet contains a single MLA. While it is not ideal there may need to be four hybrid city and rural constituencies. There should be one city MLA and one rural city hybrid. The Commission should examine Grande Prairie to see how it can be done effectively.

The boundaries of surrounding constituencies will have to be adjusted.

Special Seats

Dunvegan-Central and Lesser Slave Lake are two seats that meet the criteria under section 15(2) of the Act. Under section 15(2) of the Act the smallest a rural constituency can be is 24,534 under the 2010 population statistics in 2010 Dunvegan-Central Peace has a population of 24,584 it's boundaries may need to be adjusted depending on the population of the region.

Contiguous Seats

The Commission should electoral divisions contiguous. It is unfathomable to the writer of this submission that Alberta has an electoral division that is not contiguous. Westaskawin Camrose is not a contiguous seat and there is no justification and it undermines the credibility of the Electoral Boundary Commission. On it's face it appears that there is gerrymandering and that cannot be countenanced. This Commission ensure all electoral divisions contiguous.



Conclusion

The Commission needs to increase the size of each riding to 49,068.

The Commission should minimize the size of the variation.

The cities of Calgary, Edmonton, Lethbridge, and Red Deer should maintain their seat count and redraw the maps within city boundaries.

The Cities of Airdrie and Medicine Hat will need to split in a manner similar to Grande Prairie.

The Commission should look at the examining the populations of Wood Buffalo and Dunvegan-Central Peace.

INTRODUCTION

The Alberta Association of Municipal District and Counties (AAMDC) is a provincial association that represents Alberta's rural municipalities which include 64 municipal districts and five incorporated specialized municipalities. Together, AAMDC members cover 85% of Alberta's land mass and 18% of Alberta's population. Through proactive leadership, strategic partnerships and effective advocacy, the AAMDC works to build strong, vibrant, and resilient communities.

As a voice for Alberta's rural communities, the AAMDC believes it is positioned to provide a unique and necessary perspective to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission (ABEBC) during the 2016/17 review of Alberta's electoral boundaries. The AAMDC's submission below outlines the AAMDC's recommendations and considerations for the ABEBC.

As a necessary step to improve Alberta's democratic process, this process is designed to ensure that a number of different factors including population, community interest, existing municipal and natural boundaries, and effective representation are used in determining Alberta's electoral boundaries. The use of these different factors is essential to ensuring that Alberta's democratic process is both fair and equitable for all Albertans.

DEMOGRAPHICS IN ALBERTA

In the past decade, Alberta has seen considerable population growth which has only recently been slowed by the downturn in Alberta's economy. Much of this growth has been to Alberta's largest urban centres but Alberta's rural and small communities have also seen a net-increase in population – a trend unique in Alberta in comparison to the rest of Canada.

Alberta's rural municipalities recognize these shifting demographics and the potential outcome of the ABEBC's review which may see a greater portion of Alberta's constituencies being made found in urban communities; however, the AAMDC and its members want to emphasize the importance of maintaining adequate and equitable representation for Alberta's rural residents and communities.

EFFECTIVE REPRESENTATION

As outlined in the Section 3 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms and the 1991 Supreme Court of Canada's Decision Reference Re Provincial Electoral Boundaries (Sask), the purpose of the right to vote is not pure equality of voting power but the right to 'effective representation.' Therefore, factors in addition to populations such as geography, community history, community interests, and community identity may need to be taken into account to ensure that Alberta's legislative assembly effectively represents the diversity of Albertans.

In the 2010, the Alberta Electoral Boundary Commission's report outlined the following principles of effective representation:

- 1. Relative parity of voting power.
- 2. The tradition in Canada of "effective representation," not absolute parity as in the U.S.
- Recognition that the process of achieving effective representation may involve altering the political power of some votes – but not unduly and not without reason.

4. The balancing of these interests which involves an examination of the social history, geography and demography of communities.

The AAMDC supports these principles for consideration in the 2016/2017 Alberta's Electoral Boundaries Commission's review.

As detailed in the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act*, the population of a proposed electoral division should vary no more than 25% from the provincial average with the exception of a number of unique and special cases. For 2016, this means that, with 87 seats in the Alberta legislature, on average each riding should have approximately 49,000 residents. With the possibility of 25% variance, this means that each riding should be between 61,250 and 36,750 residents. As outlined on the 2017 Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission's website, the vast majority of existing ridings currently fall within this range and as such, Albertans should not expect a significant readjustment from the status quo.

EFFECTIVE RURAL REPRESENTATION

Alberta's rural municipalities and the residents they represent are concerned that the 2016/17 ABEBC recommendations will result in fewer rural seats and by extension, a reduction in the ability of Alberta's legislature to effectively represent the interests of rural Albertans and rural communities. Unlike previous electoral boundary commissions that were tasked with the allocation of additional seats to the legislature, the current Commission has not been afforded that ability and, unfortunately, the reallocation of electoral boundaries is a zero-sum-game whereby any additional seats added to Alberta's urban communities is a direct loss to Alberta's rural communities.

The following recommendations are provided by the AAMDC for consideration by the 2016/17 ABEBC.

Balance "Rurban" Ridings

Electoral boundaries are intended, to a certain degree, to reflect community differences and in the past, this has been achieved by maintaining a separation between urban and rural communities in electoral boundaries. This was done to reflect the differences in economies and community characteristics, and to ensure that those unique features of "rural life" were represented in the Alberta legislature. In the past in Alberta, and also in other jurisdictions across Canada and elsewhere, electoral boundary re-adjustments have included 'rurban' ridings which combine both rural and urban residents. In some instances, particularly around metropolitan areas, this can make the task of effectively representing all residents challenging for elected officials, particularly when the populations of the rural and urban portions of the constituency are not even.

The AAMDC recommends that where 'rurban' ridings are used that the commission attempt to balance the rural and urban populations as closely as possible. This will ensure that the elected MLAs have an incentive to work with both rural and urban constituents and understand their issues and concerns.

Consideration of Geographical Distances

Given the distribution of Albertans across Alberta's landscape and the attempt to balance relative parity of voter powers, urban ridings tend to be significantly smaller than Alberta's rural constituencies in terms of geographic space. With this comes numerous challenges for elected Members of Alberta's Legislature (MLA) as they may have to travel considerable distances to attend community events and listen to constituent concerns.

The reverse is also true for constituents to connect directly with an MLA's constituency office which, in some instances, can be hundreds of kilometers away. Anecdotally, some rural residents have noted that it takes four hours to drive one-way to their MLA's office and then a four-hour return trip home. This means that a full workday must be used to visit an MLA's office whereas their urban counterparts may need to drive less than ten minutes. The AAMDC and rural residents generally recognize that this is an element of rural life but would emphasize the need to consider relative equity in the effort required to meet with the MLAs. Keeping constituencies to a reasonable size will also ensure that intangible social and cultural values can also be represented by an MLA who understands them.

It is the AAMDC's position that the current electoral boundaries are at their maximum size and that expanding the boundaries of Alberta's largest electoral constituencies will only exacerbate the existing challenges facing those constituents and their elected representatives.

Though advances in technology may ease the burden of distance across large constituencies, it is also important to remember that many rural and remote communities do not have access to high-speed broadband internet which can inhibit the use of streaming or video/audio conferencing services which MLA's may use to connect with their constituents. In addition to improving high-speed internet in rural and remote communities, the Government of Alberta should seek to ensure the Alberta Legislature is properly equipped with the technology to connect MLAs with those constituents who have the access to high-speed internet.

Adequately Funding MLAs in Geographically Large Constituencies

As noted above, geographically large electoral constituencies pose unique challenges to both residents and MLAs that are not found in smaller urban constituencies. To assist in mitigating these barriers, the AAMDC recommends that adequate funding be provided to MLAs in geographically larger constituencies to account for increased travel costs, additional offices, and additional staff. The aim of this funding should be to equalize the efforts required by MLAs to connect and meet with constituents.

Avoid Fracturing Municipalities into Multiple Electoral Districts

Unlike most provinces in Canada, municipalities govern Alberta's entire landmass with the exception of national and provincial parks. This expansive system of governance reflects the communities Albertans live in and can make for logical boundaries for Alberta's provincial electoral boundaries – especially outside of Alberta's large cities and towns.

As the ABEBC reviews Alberta's current electoral boundaries, the Commission should consider municipal boundaries and seek to align electoral boundaries where it is appropriate to do so. Dividing municipalities, particularly geographically large rural municipalities, into multiple electoral divisions can create unnecessarily complex governance arrangements when municipal

and provincial elected officials work collaboratively on issues affecting the constituents they jointly represent.

Consider Unique and Special Circumstances for Deviance from the 25% Variance

As noted above, the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* requires the population of a proposed electoral division to not vary by more than 25% from the provincial average with the exception of unique or special cases. In the 2010 boundary adjustment, special and unique circumstances were used to justify the creation of two electoral districts in Dunvegan-Central Peace and Lesser Slave Lake. The 2010 ABEBC noted the scarcity of population as justification for the deviance from the 25% threshold.

As the 2016/17 ABEBC has not been tasked with allocating additional seats and may seek to redistribute existing seats into Alberta's highest growth urban areas, the number of electoral districts in Alberta's rural areas may be reduced - creating even larger electoral districts. To minimize the geographic distances that rural electoral districts cover – and their associated challenges – the ABEBC may need to increase the number of districts that qualify as unique and special and therefore, outside the 25% variance.

CONCLUSION

The AAMDC appreciates the opportunity to provide comment to the 2016/17 Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission and the important questions it has been tasked with. To conclude the points above, the AAMDC would like to reiterate that much of what the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission must address is a question of means and ends in that, the core outcome and end goal for the Alberta Legislative Assembly is the ability to effectively represent Albertans from all walks of life. The process or means through with the representation is achieved by balancing population and demographics, community interest and characteristics, existing municipal and natural boundaries, and other relevant criteria. Over reliance on absolute voter parity may not achieve the desired outcome and may inhibit the ability of Albertans to be effectively represented – effectively weakening Alberta's democratic institutions.

The AAMDC is pleased to work with the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission on this important task and will continue to provide comment where appropriate.

Edmonton Ellerslie Prov. Ndp

Ellerslie provincial constituency is experiencing a major gain in population. Most of this gain is coming in the Walker Lakes subdivision. This area is rapidly expanding to the East. As well the Summerside area is expanding rapidly to the South. Both of these areas are located south of the Henday, between 91 st and 50st. The part of Ellerslie that is North of the Henday has a fairly stable population, if anything it is going down slightly.

We are proposing that our polls 1-10 which are located in the Ekota and the Menisa neighbourhoods, be moved to Millwoods constituency. This move will be an easy one for the constituents as they will be joining neighbourhoods that are very similar to their own neighbourhood. We realize that this is only a stop gap move in terms of dealing with Ellerslie's over population.

We would also like to comment on the City of Edmonton's suggestion that Ellerslie constituency south of the Henday and Windemere area be combined to form a new constituency. Our opposition to this suggestion is based on several factors; The first is that there would be a substantial gap between the two areas. The second and probably the most important reason why this merger should not take place is that the natural movement flow is an north – south flow and not an east –west flow. This north-south flow is facilitated by 91 st.,66st, 50 st, 34 st, and 17 st. A person travelling from Ellerslie district to Windemere has two possibilities for a route, Ellerslie road and the Henday.

On a broad note we ask the commission to seriously examine the disparities between rural and urban constituencies. The 25% variance that is allowed now is too great. A 5% variance would go a long way towards reducing the disparity between rural and urban constituencies.



Subjects of this Submission

This submission addresses two topics:

- 1. The electoral district of Calgary-Varsity
- 2. The equity of representation within the province as a whole.

Calgary Varsity Electoral District

The Alberta provincial electoral district, or riding, of Calgary-Varsity was created in 1993 and since then has elected Progressive Conservative, Liberal and New Democratic Party representatives to the legislature.

In 2011 Calgary-Varsity had a population of 40,875, close to the provincial riding average population at that time of 41,900. Calgary-Varsity's population is now 48,107 which is still close to the new provincial average of 48,884, based on the 2016 estimates. In other words, the population of Calgary-Varsity has grown at roughly the same rate as the province as a whole. From 2011 to 2016 the province grew by 17% and the riding of Calgary-Varsity grew by 18%.

The seven ridings that border Calgary-Varsity are all currently within +-10% of the provincial average with the exception of Calgary-Mackay-Nose-Hill which is 16% above the average. Any adjustment of Calgary-Mackay-Nose-Hill would presumably take place on its northern and/or eastern edge not on its Southern edge that borders Calgary-Varsity as that area is the uninhabited Nose Hill park.

The existing boundaries of the Calgary-Varsity electoral district are very clear and easily understood.

The NorthEastern boundary of the riding is John Laurie Boulevard NW, a major divided road with limited access. A large portion of this NE boundary has Nose Hill Park on the other side of John Laurie Boulevard, an area where no one lives.

Much of the Western boundary of the riding is Sarcee Trail, another major divided road. It isn't possible to cross by car from the community East of Sarcee Trail to the community on the West of Sarcee Trail without traveling a long way around by either Crowchild Trail or John Laurie Boulevard. Sarcee Trail represents a logical boundary. The rest of the Western boundary is SilverSprings Gate NW and then a line running south through the Silver Springs Golf Course and green space to the Bow River.

A large portion of the South boundary of the riding is the Bow River, another major barrier to travel and hence a logical and well understood boundary. The rest of Southern boundary is 16th Avenue North.

The Eastern boundary is largely 19th St NW, with a jog one block east to 18th street NW for a few blocks. While this jog isn't intuitive as a boundary, this little anomaly follows the border of the community of Banff Trail.

All of the boundaries of the riding are also community boundaries. Starting in the NW and going clockwise, the communities that make up Calgary-Varsity are: Dalhousie, Brentwood, Charleswood, Banff Trail, University of Calgary, University Heights, Montgomery, and finally the namesake of the riding, Varsity.

A newly created community within the riding is the University District, formerly known as the West Campus of the University of Calgary. This area is located around the Alberta Children's Hospital. It encompasses the area West of the main University of Calgary campus and West of the community of University Heights, South of 32nd Ave NW, East of Shaganappi Trail and North of 16th Ave NW. This new 200 acre community will see the addition of approximately 11,222 residents over the next 15 years with the first new occupants in 2018. This population number comes from the Land Use & Outline Plan Report, submitted by the West Campus Development Trust, to the City of Calgary first in the fall of 2013 and in it final form on July 8, 2014.

If there is a need to add some more population to the riding, we suggest the addition of the community of Point McKay. This would extend the riding slightly east of the community of Montgomery, still having the Bow River as the southern boundary. Additionally Point McKay is demographically similar to the majority of Calgary-Varsity. Many residents of Point McKay share the same local employment opportunities, and community concerns as by Banff Trail, Montgomery, and University Heights..

Our overall recommendation is to leave the boundaries of the riding of Calgary-Varsity unchanged. The boundaries are all community boundaries and are, with one very minor exception, clear boundaries. Furthermore with anticipated population growth in the University District to be modest (approximately 20% over 15 years), and the relatively slow growth in

Alberta the last 3 years, the population of Calgary-Varsity is unlikely to change significantly before the next review of the Electoral Boundaries.

Equity of Representation

We believe there is a need for better voter parity in Alberta. The goal should be for each vote to have the same weight. Over the past few decades Alberta has made progress in achieving better voter parity, however more is needed.

Currently ridings are allowed to have a population with up to 25% more than the target (average riding population) or up to 25% less. The math on this plus or minus 25% means that there can be 125% ridings and 75% ridings giving those in the 75% riding the equivalent of 1 and $\frac{2}{3}$ votes (125/75 = 1.667) compared to those in a 125% riding. In actuality there in one riding, Dunvegan-Central Peace Notley, with a 2016 population of 25,192 where each vote is currently worth 1.94 times the average of 49,000 of riding. This is far from equal representation.

The current legislation allows up to four sparsely populated riding to have up to 50% less population than the average but the use of this allowance is not required. This extreme is allowed but by not using it better voter parity is achieved. This exception was created decades ago to help deal with vast distances that would result in the sparsely populated ridings. Modern, essentially free, electronic communication means that constituents and their representative can easily be in contact with each other regardless of the geographic size of the riding.

While for most ridings the legislation allows a variance of up to plus or minus 25% but the commission is free to craft the ridings within a far more equal population distribution. Since the population of all ridings grow or shrink at different rates over time, it is best that at the time of redistribution that all the ridings be near the average. We suggest that the target be for ridings to be created within a much narrower range of plus or minus 10% from the average. Currently 45 of the existing ridings already fall within this +-10% goal. Twelve more ridings are within +-15%. See the attached spreadsheet of current ridings and their projected 2016 populations, sorted by percentage above or below the average.

One common argument against adjusting the sparsely populated rural seats to better represent the population of Alberta is access to resources. Member Services assigns funding to constituency offices in three categories: fixed, variable, and matrix score. While the fixed portions would remain unchanged the variable amounts would increase the funding to the riding as more electors, and population were added. The Matrix score is a fudge factor that is applied to account for other factors such as population density, size of constituency, etc. The Matrix model can also be used to supply extra funding to the constituency if required. There is no loss of resources to the communities if the some of the sparsely populated ridings were increased in geographic size to include more population.

The five seats with the lowest population (furthest below the provincial average) are: Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley, Fort McMurray Conklin, Lesser Slave Lake, Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills, and West Yellowhead. Each of the above have a greater than 25% variance.

The five seats with the highest population (furthest above the provincial average) are: Spruce Grove-Sturgeon-St.Albert, Calgary-Northern Hills, Calgary South East, Highwood, Edmonton-Whitemud. Each of the above have a greater than 15% variance.

It doesn't require a change in legislation to achieve better voter parity. It simply requires the existing law be applied to achieve ridings with similar sized populations.



Dear Commissioners,

My name is David Cournoyer, I am a voter living in the Edmonton-Highlands-Norwood constituency. I have followed the electoral boundary redistribution process for a number of years and am very interested in the process. I have included below my recommendations to your Commission for the redistribution currently taking place:

Population in each district

The previous Commission did a good job keeping the population of most electoral districts within ten percent of the provincial average population per electoral district. But some districts have become outliers as populations grow or decline, which creates a system of unequal representation in the Legislative Assembly.

According to Statistics Canada 2016 Census data made available on Feb. 8, 2017, there has been tremendous growth in Alberta's urban areas, including the Edmonton region, Calgary region and the Red Deer corridor which spans the length between the province's two largest cities. Communities like Airdrie and Cochrane have seen significant growth of more than 40 percent since the last census. Because of this, it would be appropriate to redistribute new districts into these regions of the province.

The census data also shows a decline in population in areas west of the Red Deer corridor and in east central Alberta. It would be appropriate to redistribute the boundaries of these districts to reflect this population decline.

I recommend that the commission attempt to keep districts within ten percent, but ideally within five percent, above or below the provincial average population per electoral district.

Special districts

I would prefer that no district fall below twenty-five percent of the average, as increased funding should be allocated to MLAs in geographically larger rural ridings for additional offices, staff and travel costs. But political necessity will likely lead to the existence of one or two of these special exceptions.

I recommend that if special districts are required, that be created only in extreme circumstances and be kept to a minimum number.

Naming districts

In the past there has been little or no guidelines for the Commission to name electoral districts. Some districts are named after geographical locations and some after prominent figures from Alberta's political history.

I recommend that the Commission or the Legislative Assembly create a protocol for naming of electoral divisions for the guidance of future commissions and legislatures.

Noncontiguous districts

There is currently one district that is noncontiguous, meaning that a portion of the district is completely surrounded by another district. A portion of the Samson Indian Reserve #13 located in the Wetaskiwin-

Camrose district is currently completely surrounded by the Drayton Valley-Devon and Lacombe-Ponoka districts.

I recommend that all districts be contiguous.

On this topic, it appears that the communities of Maskwacis are divided between two districts - Drayton Valley-Devon and Wetaskiwin-Camrose. This appears to be an anomaly as all other First Nations communities in Alberta which are adjacent to each other are kept in the same district. If the commission is seeking draw district boundaries around communities of interest, it would make sense for Maskwacis to be included in the one district.

Rural/urban perspectives

As the provincial population increases in urban communities and decreases in many rural communities, it seems inevitable that outlying districts may be fewer and larger in the future. As stated by the previous commission which existed in 2009/2010, this raises a question about how large a division can be before it involves so many non-common interests that it is impractical for the disparate issues of the electors to be represented, and for the MLA to represent them.

As was recommended by the previous commission, I agree that the Legislative Assembly needs to seriously consider how the urban/rural perspectives will be addressed in the future.

I appreciate the opportunity to have my voice heard. My submission to the Commission has three parts:

- Part 1: General comments on the weighting of all constituencies
- Part 2: General comments on the total number of constituencies
- Part 3: Specific comments on my (current) constituency of Edmonton-Ellerslie

1. General Comments on Constituency Weight

I would urge the commission to adopt a reasonable variance cap that applies to <u>all</u> <u>constituencies equally</u>. I suggest 3% - 5% is appropriate. Any further variance distorts the relative voting weight of each constituency. Currently, as you know, there are many rural constituencies that have far below the average weighting.

Typically, the argument is that large, sparsely populated, rural ridings are deserving of special variances. I would like to offer the following points in defense of the 3%-5% proposal:

- a) Current technological advancements provide for ease of communication across large rural constituencies. Tools like Skype and email have replaced physical travel and mail.
- b) Rural constituencies may be supplemented with funds for additional resources, such as:
 - i. multiple MLA offices in one constituency;
 - communications tools (such as Skype) installed in public locations such as libraries in multiple towns across a large rural constituency so that residents can access their MLA.

While I realize it is beyond your mandate to include such additional funding as mandatory in the report, I respectfully suggest there is no problem with the Ç

Commission making such a recommendation to the Legislative Assembly to ease the transition to larger constituencies.

- c) Precedents exist for large, sparsely populated constituencies to be effectively served by one elected legislative representative. Examples in Alberta include Federal rural ridings such as Yellowhead, and examples in other provinces include the provincial ridings of Athabasca and Cumberland in Saskatchewan, and the federal riding of Yukon.
- d) Concerns of interest that are unique to rural ridings are heavily represented effectively through various other channels, such as Agriculture special interest groups, rural municipalities associations, and oil and gas groups.
- e) Distorting the weight of constituencies may negatively affect party politics in the province as it effectively gives some areas of the province more clout than others.
- f) Finally, it goes against the fundamental principal of democracy one person, one vote.

2. Number of Constituencies

The number of constituencies in this province, at 87, is too high. I suggest you look at a number in the range of 71-77. Our number of MLAs per capita is higher than BC, ON, and QC.

3. Edmonton-Ellerslie

My constituency of Edmonton-Ellerslie is currently effectively split between an older section of the city (the section North of the Anthony Henday Drive) and a much newer, including brand new, area of the City (everything South of the Anthony Henday Drive).

I live in Ekota (poll 2). Our neighbourhood is 45 years old, which is typical of most of the homes in the North section of the constituency. The types of challenges that we face in the older communities include:

- aging in place
- university tuition
- aging infrastructure
- declining enrollment in schools

By contrast, many of the new communities in the south section of the constituency do not face some of the age-related problems. The demographic is younger, the schools are much fuller, and the overall concerns are different.

The community of interest that would be more appropriate for the northern communities in the current configuration is that of Edmonton-Mill Woods.

In the next configuration of this section of Edmonton, I propose to the Commission that everything North of the Anthony Henday and west of 50th Street (roughly by

3.11

neighbourhood age) be included in the same constituency as the rest of Mill Woods (the area of Edmonton, not necessarily the current constituency with the same name). For example, you may want to use 23rd avenue as the northern boundary/Anthony Henday as a Southern Boundary and create a "Mill Woods South" constituency.

In addition to keeping older neighbourhoods like Ekota in the same community of interest as other, older neighbourhoods, this configuration would allow the communities in the newer, southern part of the constituency to be grouped geographically with other communities that share the same concerns. Most of the growth is happening in the areas south of the Anthony Henday, so it would be appropriate to have that area as one constituency to allow for future population growth.

Conclusion

I want to thank the Commission for extending the deadline for initial submissions. I also thank each of you for considering my submission and I look forward to the interim report.

I live in Morinville and work in St. Albert, and see problems with two of the existing electoral divisions.

Having worked and lived in Westlock previously, I can say from personal experience the wants and needs of Westlock- and Barrhead-area residents are much different than those of Morinville-area residents. As part of the Capital Region Board, the interest of Morinville and Sturgeon County are much more closely aligned with St. Albert than with the two rural hubs to the north. This difference in culture and needs is in part reflected in the vote breakdown during the last provincial election, which saw Morinville residents vote predominantly in favour of one political party while Westlock and Barrhead residents voted predominantly in favour of another.

The second problem is with the St. Albert-Spruce Grove riding. I have less direct personal experience with that riding, but have heard from many of my coworkers and others in St. Albert that the interests of St. Albert and Spruce Grove don't always align. Spruce Grove obviously has closer ties to Stony Plain and Parkland County than with St. Albert.

The obvious solution to this is, in my mind, to align the existing Spruce Grove-St. Albert riding to the north and east to encompass Morinville and more of Sturgeon County, while grouping Spruce Grove into a riding with Stony Plain and more of Parkland County.

I understand that the commission has requirements to meet in terms of riding sizes, but I believe residents of all the areas I've referred to in this submission would benefit from the kind of realignment I've suggested.

We would like to urge the Commission to carefully consider the proposed boundaries in North Calgary as they determine the new electoral map. As proposed, there are communities such as Evanston who would be better served if more attention was paid to natural divisions created by roads, geography, neighbourhood boundaries, and especially the interests of each community. For example, Evanston is one of Calgary's newest and fastest-growing communities, which results in different concerns and priorities than commonly found in older communities such as Huntington Hills, which is close to fifty years older. 

- 1. Proportional Representation for all voters one voter, one vote
- 2. No 'special adjustments' for rural voters.

If 85%-90% of voters are urban .. then 85%-90% of the MLA's should be urban based and urban focused.

Rural residents do rely on larger communities and metro areas for many of their services and are generally at ease with travelling larger distances to access those services. Lets limit the number of metro residents who are asked to travel large distances to access minor surgical procedures and services in smaller communities.

3. Reduce the number of MLA's.

BC has 85 MLA's representing 4.6M people across .945 M Km 2.

SK has 57 MLA's representing 1.13 M people across .652 M Km 2. MN has 57 MLA's representing 1.3 M people across .648 M Km 2.

Alberta has 87 MLA's representing 4.1 people across .662 M Km2. Current technologies allow easier communication and access between MLA's and their constituents.

The number of Alberta electoral constituencies and Alberta MLA's should be reduced from 87 to between 57 and 71 MLA's to mirror the efficiencies achieved by their counterparts in BC (basis larger population and larger land size).







Thank you very much for the opportunity to submit written input into your deliberations on updating Alberta's electoral boundaries. I thank you on behalf of Calgary City Council and all Calgarians for your hard work and public service.


My office and I have considered this issue and have reviewed the latest demographic data. We have been awaiting the release of Statistic Canada's 2016 Census before drafting this letter and coming to a conclusion. However, a preliminary review of the Statistics Canada data released today, along with Calgary's yearly municipal census, strongly points to the fact that Calgary is extremely underrepresented in the Alberta Legislature. This requires, at minimum, two or three additional electoral districts within the city limits and one more electoral district in the Greater Calgary Metropolitan & Bow Valley Regions.

To maintain the current 87 electoral districts in Alberta, it is clear that at least three rural electoral districts can be amalgamated with their neighbours, evenly distributing populations. If those districts were transferred from rural ridings to the Calgary Region, rural and urban will come into a more equitable balance of population per representative.

Please note that Calgary City Council has not yet considered this matter, so has no official position. However, my office is currently working on a much more detailed proposal, incorporating Statistics Canada's 2016 Census data. This will be submitted by the February 17, 2017 deadline and will be shared with my colleagues on City Council.

Again, thank you for the opportunity to provide input into your deliberations.

Dear Chair and Commission Members,

Once again thank you very much for the opportunity to present a written submission to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission (the "Commission") to contribute to your deliberations on updating Alberta's electoral boundaries. Thank you also for giving me the opportunity to revise my proposal after the release of the 2016 Federal Census numbers. My initial position that Calgary is extremely underrepresented is even further validated by the official Census numbers in relation to the estimates I used in my initial submission. The facts clearly show that Calgary must receive two new provincial electoral districts within the city limits.

Key Facts

In my analysis of the provincial 2016 population figures I would like to highlight some facts:

- Alberta has seven electoral districts that have seen remarkable population growth. These
 electoral districts are underrepresented according to the act as they are well above the 25 per
 cent allowed over the average population of 46,697 people. There are three such electoral
 districts in Calgary, two in Edmonton, as well as Airdrie and Spruce Grove-St. Albert.
- 2. The electoral districts underrepresented in Calgary are Calgary-South East at 96 per cent above the average (92,148), Calgary-McCall at 37 per cent above the average (64,613), and Calgary-Northern Hills at 28 per cent above the average (59,961). As taken as a whole, Calgary's electoral districts are on average 5 percent above the provincial average.

- 3. Alberta has 52 electoral districts or 60 per cent of all its electoral subdivisions with less than the average population of 46,697 people.
- 4. Of the four exceptions allowed by the act for large rural electoral districts, two electoral districts have populations even lower than 50 per cent of the average population per riding. Fort McMurray-Conklin at 64 per cent under the average (17,129) and Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley at 51 percent below the average (23,094). It is also notable that two electoral districts are close to 50 percent below of the average; they are Lesser Slave Lake at 41 per cent below the average (27,663) and West Yellowhead at 33 per cent below the average (31,551).

Proposal

I am proposing that the Commission create two additional electoral districts within the municipal boundaries of Calgary to absorb the population growth of Calgary-South East, Calgary-McCall and Calgary-Northern Hills and design the new electoral districts to accommodate Calgary's future anticipated population growth. You can easily achieve this if you undertake the following:

- 1. Divide Calgary-South East into two electoral districts as City of Calgary Administration projects that this area of the city will continue to experience significant future growth. Dividing the electoral district, with a total population of 92,148, in half will create two electoral districts with populations of 46,074 each. The two resulting electoral districts will be essentially equal to the provincial average and bigger than the 45 smallest Alberta electoral districts. Even with this change, significant growth in Calgary's south east is expected to continue over the next decade and these two electoral districts will soon be above the provincial average and among the 20 most populous according to the projections.
- 2. Insert an additional electoral district into North Calgary by evenly redistributing the population of the four biggest electoral districts among five electoral districts. Calgary- McCall with a total population of 64,613 is 33 per cent above the average, Calgary-Northern Hills, with a total population of 59,961 is presently 28 per cent above the average. The other two electoral districts, Calgary-Foothills and Calgary-Mackay-Nose Hill are well above of the average population of 46,697. Distributing the actual population of these four electoral districts into five will result in electoral districts with an average population of approximately 46,163, essentially equal to the provincial average. Once again, according to City projections, these electoral districts will continue to experience rapid population growth, which will eventually bring them back into the group of the most populated electoral districts of the province and well above of the provincial average.

The mandate of the Commission is to avoid increasing the total number of electoral districts beyond the current 87. As Calgary's growth requires two more electoral districts, this proposal includes three options to merge several electoral districts with populations well below the provincial average together in order to accommodate the creation of two additional Calgary electoral districts. I propose for your consideration the following:

 Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills has a variance of 22 per cent under the provincial average population and can be divided into three parts and its population centres merged and evenly redistributed between Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater (which has a variance of 19 per cent below the average), Bonnyville-Cold Lake (which has a variance of 19 per cent below the average), and with Vermillion-Lloydminster (which is 18 per cent under the average). Depending on the exact boundary lines, the resulting three constituencies will have a population average of approximately 50,000 or just 7 per cent above the average.

- 2. Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre has a variance of 13 per cent below provincial average can be divided into three parts and its population centres merged and redistributed between West Yellowhead, which is 33 per cent below the provincial average (as one of the four exceptions allowed by the act), Whitecourt-Ste. Anne (with a variance of 16 per cent under the provincial average), and Drayton Valley-Devon (which is 10 per cent below the provincial average). Depending on the exact boundary lines, the resulting three constituencies will have an average population of approximately of 51,000, just 11 per cent above the provincial population average.
- 3. Drumheller-Stettler has a variance of 22 per cent below the average population and can be divided and its population centres merged between Strathmore-Brooks (which has just 2 per cent above the average), Battle River-Wainwright (which is just in the verge of the 17 per cent below the average), and Lacombe-Ponoka (which has a difference of 4 per cent below average as well). Depending on the exact boundary lines, the resulting three constituencies will have an average population of approximately 56,000 citizens; 20 per cent above the average. Though not ideal, these rural areas have a history of low growth and within a decade will be of similar size as their urban neighbours.

To ensure fair representation, Calgary is in need of two more additional electoral districts, the data clearly shows this. At the same time, at least three electoral districts can be divided up and their population centres merged in with neighbouring electoral districts. I believe this would provide a more equitable redistribution of representative per population and create boundaries that can endure population growth until review by the Commission a decade from now.

On behalf of the citizens of Calgary, I appreciate the opportunity to provide input into the Commission's important work to ensure Calgarians are fairly represented in the legislature.

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To whom it may concern:

My name is Jarrad Marthaller, President of the Spruce Grove-St. Albert New Democratic Constituency Association. On behalf of the association, we respectfully submit the following feedback for the Commission's consideration when making electoral boundary recommendations to the Legislative Assembly.

The constituency of Spruce Grove- St. Albert includes two major and distinct urban cities, the Alexander First nation, and rural land within the Sturgeon and Parkland counties. It is a large, diverse constituency that continues to experience significant growth in population, a trend that is very likely to continue. Specifically, both St. Albert and Spruce Grove are projecting to add significant population to the constituency in the coming years.

The current population of the constituency is very close to the 25% variance of the quotient (122% as estimated by the Boundaries Commission) and, with growth expected to continue, some parts of the Constituency should be transferred to neighbouring constituencies which have less population. This would ensure the riding remains within the allowable variance.

We urge the Commission to consider these factors when conduction their work in redistribution, and we would ask for particular emphasis on respecting municipal boundaries, keeping communities of interest intact, and ensuring the ability of the elected member to effectively represent constituents.

Redistribution: - Redrawing the electoral map for greater fairness

The purpose of redistribution is to redraw the riding boundaries so as to give all voters an equal say. Your task is to readjust the constituency boundaries so as to put the same number of voters in each.

Variance

The present Alberta guidelines state that: "The population of a proposed electoral constituency should not vary more than 25% from the provincial average, except in a few special cases."

The allowable **variance of 25%** is so large, it is undemocratic, and **unacceptable**. Based on 47,000, you could have a range from 35,000 to 59,000 to start with – the maximum is almost double the minimum. In ten years, an urban riding on the rim of Edmonton or Calgary that started with 59,000 can easily have grown to 80,000. So you will have the situation of an urban constituency, having almost three times the population of Lesser Slave Lake (30,094).

Four of ten provinces allow a variance of ten percent. Saskatchewan and New Brunswick allow only a 5% variance. How can we allow 25% and even more in "a few special cases". Alberta should seek to reduce variance to 5% or 10%.

Should Rural Constituencies Have Fewer Voters?

The number of voters in a rural constituency should be the same as the number of voters in an urban constituency. Both deserve the same degree of representation.

I do not accept that rural constituencies should have fewer voters because the distances are larger. The population density is decreasing in rural areas, and the remaining population is concentrated in the towns. When one farmer farms thousands of acres, there are few truly rural voters. Rural constituencies will have to get bigger.

In today's world, we no longer need to meet face to face thanks to the internet, email, and Skype. Young people are used to conferencing via internet devices. Everyone has a cell phone. MLAs can just as easily contact voters in Edmonton as in Fort Vermillion. Distance is no longer an issue. The size of the riding does not matter. Each MLA should be representing the same number of voters. The smaller cities, like Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie, and Vegreville have the same box stores and curved sub-divisions as Edmonton.

Why are the 25,192 voters of Dunvegan-Central Peace and the 30,094 of Lesser Slave Lake twice or three times as worthy as the 66,489 voters of Edmonton-South West and the 79,034 of Calgary-South-East?

Anticipate Future Population Changes

We should also try to anticipate future population changes. We know that the outer rims of Edmonton and Calgary are scheduled for continued development, and the new homes are going to result in a large population growth. Unless these constituencies start with fewer voters than the provincial average, in ten years they will be grossly under represented.

In the same way, by looking at recent trends, we can predict which areas will continue to decline in population. For example: Battle River-Wainwright declined from 37,675 to 36,905, and Livingstone-Macleod was unchanged 42,705 to 42,794. In these regions, we should start with extra voters, so that in ten years there won't be such a large disparity.

Suggested Boundary Changes

I have developed my suggestions for boundary changes using a ten per cent variance from 46,749:42,000-52,000 voters.

- (1) Fort McMurray-Conklin has 29,533 voters and Fort McMurray-Wood Buffalo has 59,576 {totalling 89,109}. Move the boundary in the city of Fort McMurray so that each riding has 45,000 voters.
- (2) Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater, Bonnyville-Cold Lake, Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills, Lesser Slave Lake, and Vermilion-Lloydminster are all below the provincial average. I suggest rearranging these five ridings into four, and using the extra riding to accommodate the new growth areas around Edmonton. Bonnyville-Cold Lake (39,696), Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills (38,260), and Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater (38,051) {total 116,007.} I suggest that 12,000 from the Athabasca section be reassigned to Lesser Slave Lake (30,094), and 8,000 from the Two Hills area be reassigned to Vermilion-Lloydminster (40,544). The remainder can be reassembled into two constituencies Lac La Biche-Bonnyville-Cold Lake and Sturgeon-Redwater-St. Paul.

Results: Lesser Slave Lake- Athabasca (42,000)

Two-Hills-Vermilion-Lloydminster (48,000)

Lac La Biche-Bonnyville-Cold Lake (48,000)

Sturgeon-Redwater-St. Paul (48,000).

(3) Edmonton-South West (66,489) and Edmonton-Ellerslie (59,091) have a total of 125,580 voters. I propose that these new fast growing areas, and 10,000 voters from the Spruce Grove section of Spruce Grove-St. Albert (59,453), be reassembled into three new constituencies of about 45,000. In ten years, these three constituencies will be at the maximum allowable variance.

Our Goals

The citizens of Alberta do not want more M.L.A.s; we are already over presented compared to other provinces, but everyone should be <u>equally represented</u>. Every group of **46,749** voters should have one MLA. We desire fairness and equality, regardless of where we live.

The allowable variance of 25% is too large; please aim for 5 or 10%.

I wish you the best in your efforts in redrawing the electoral boundaries so as to give all Albertans an equal say.

"The Matrix Myth"

Submission to Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission February 8, 2017

A common theme running through recent *Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commissions* hearings and Reports has been the tension between arguments for more *equal* representation and those arguably concerned more with *effective* represention --- between those who maintain that the Province's electoral districts should contain relatively equal numbers of citizens and those who maintain that factors other than numbers of voters should be taken into account.

Without fail, each and every previous Commission has been sympathetic to arguments for equal representation. Also without fail, however, each and every one of those Commissions has also decided that its' primary responsibility is to consider "the requirement for effective representation as guaranteed by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms".

As a result, each and every previous *Commission* has maintained the *status quo*, which has meant that electoral divisions in rural Alberta are geographically smaller and more numerous than their populations warrant, and contain fewer voters than do their urban counterparts.

The "Matrix": Background

Previous Electoral Boundaries Commissions have justified this by accepting and agreeing with arguments (generally made by rural Albertans and their representatives) that it is more difficult to represent rural electoral divisions than urban ones.

The 1995/1996 Electoral Boundaries Commission even developed a "matrix" involving several variables that it thought affected "effective representation." Applying this formula to Alberta's electoral divisions created a "score" for each one, with the notion being that the higher the score the more difficult it was to effectively represent an area. In 1995/96 these scores ranged from -18 for the least difficult areas to represent to +18 for the most difficult areas to represent.

The variables considered in 1995/96 included:

- Geographic area,
- Population,
- Population density,
- Number of households,
- Elected/Appointed Bodies, Indian Reserves and Metis Settlements, and
- Distance from the Legislature.

The 1995/1996 Commission used this "matrix" to help it determine the boundaries (and hence the area as well as the population) of the electoral divisions it proposed, adjusting these so that no division would fall too far outside a range of permissible deviations, and therefore be potentially too difficult (or too easy?) to represent effectively.

The 2002/2003 Commission decided to build on and refine this matrix. It removed the population variable and replaced it with a Rural/Urban Ratio because it felt that population was a standard requirement anyway. It also replaced the "number of households" variable with one indicating the

"Dependent Population Proportion" to indicate the proportion of a given population more likely to be dependent on provincial programs,

The variables considered in 2002/2003, then, included:

- Area, and it was presumed that it would be more difficult to effectively represent larger areas;
- Population Density, and it was argued that it would be more difficult to represent lowerdensity areas;
- "Dependant" Population Proportion, where higher numbers of children 14 years of age and under and seniors 65 years of age and older would result in a higher score as they were seen to be more dependant on government programs and believed to be more difficult to represent;
- Elected/Appointed Bodies, where higher numbers of municipalities, health regions, school divisions, Indian Reserves, and Metis Settlements would result in higher scores and be deemed to be more difficult to effectively represent;
- Distance from the Legislature, where the argument was that the further an area was from the Legislature the more difficult it would be to effectively represent it.

As was the case with the 1995/1996 Electoral Boundaries Commission Report, applying this formula to the electoral divisions recommended by the 2002/2003 Commission resulted in scores ranging from -18 to +17.

And, as was also the case with the 1995/1996 Commission, the 2002/2003 Commission considered these "matrix scores" as it adjusted the sizes, boundaries, and populations of Alberta's electoral divisions, maintaining that this was being done according to "scientific" principles --- ie the matrix.

Curiously, neither the Interim nor the Final Report of the 2009/2010 Electoral Boundaries Commission contains even a single reference to this "matrix". However, both Reports go on at considerable length about the need to ensure 'effective representation' at some cost to the principle of 'equality of voting power.' That Commission also relied directly upon the provisions of the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* of 2000, which in many ways enshrined the spirit of the matrix formulae into legislation, and in particular provided for a +/- 25% variance in the populations of constituencies from the provincial average.

The "Matrix": Questions

The problem with all of this is simply this: the matrix approach introduced in 1995/1996, applied in altered form in 2002/2003, and simply presupposed in 2009/2010 contains underlying assumptions that heavily favor over-representation of rural electors at the expense of those in urban centres.

For example, it is NOT clear that a larger geographic area or lower population densities are more difficult to represent than might be a densely-populated area containing a widely diverse electorate having

multiple and varied interests, concerns, and even languages. An elected official does not represent geography but rather people, and it is the nature of these people rather than of the geography that impacts how difficult it may or may not be to represent them. Certainly, it cannot be difficult to represent empty spaces, but this measure suggests that it somehow is.

It is also NOT clear that children under 14 years of age or seniors over 65 years of age are more difficult to represent than are working-age Albertans with families in school, or facing daycare shortages, or receiving AISH or other form of provincial assistance, or facing challenges meeting rent payments on fixed incomes, or becoming unemployed or being under-employed, or experiencing the myriad of other social problems more common to their age group. In fact, quite the opposite may be closer to the truth, and if asked most MLAs would likely admit that the bulk of their work involves working-age Albertans.

It is also NOT clear that an urban area contains fewer elected or appointed bodies, once one considers the numbers of community leagues, schools, voluntary and not-for-profit, faith or religious-based, cultural, business, and interest-based organizations that concentrate there --- including bodies concerned with the welfare of First Nations persons --- and which urban elected representatives must be in relationship with.

It has even been proposed that the number of river crossings in an area can impede effective representation, making one wonder if the MLA who raised that issue had to ford such crossings without the benefit of roads or bridges!

The "matrix" itself, I would argue, is pseudo-science, and it is doubtful that it effectively outlines how difficult it might be to represent a particular constituency.

No previous Commission has looked at scholarly and accredited research from elsewhere on this issue, much less reviewed it or taken it into account. Similarly, no other Commission (or Member Services Committee) has sufficiently reviewed other factors which could be taken into account here, such as the relative incidence of low-incomes in an area; the relative numbers of single-parent households, or persons with high school or less levels of education, or the relative numbers of households where English is not the primary language spoken at home, or the relative number of in-migrants or newcomers to an area, or others too numerous to mention, in determining how potentially "difficult" it might be to represent an area.

It would NOT be a stretch to argue that any one of these could impact the "difficulty to represent" factor as much as if not more than any of the factors included in the "matrix" formula.

Instead, for many years these Commissions have accepted at face value the self-serving arguments raised by rural representatives that their work is more difficult than is the work of others. Since 1995/1996 these arguments have become accepted as "science" even though there is no real basis for this, and they are in fact little more than folk-lore.

Secondly, even if it was true that some areas may be more difficult to represent than others (and it has been argued, unsuccessfully, that inner-city urban areas may be the most difficult to represent) that in no way justifies maintaining a system whereby the votes from those areas count more than do the voters from elsewhere.

This is fundamentally un- and even anti-democratic.

In fact, if inner-city urban areas might be the most challenging to represent, an argument could be made that those areas should be represented in smaller and more numerous electoral divisions, just as rural areas are at present. Interestingly, **NO** report from this Commission has ever included that even as a suggestion, leaving the over-abundance of rural divisions unchallenged.

For **both** of these reasons, this Commission is strongly urged to abandon the "matrix" as a determinant of the size and boundaries of Alberta's electoral divisions, and move instead towards a model where representation by population is the guiding rule.

Other Issues With the "Matrix":

Another problem that arises from "matrix-mania" is that these matrix scores have also been used by the Members' Services Committee to help determine the monetary resources different MLAs receive (ie: their Members' Services Allowances or MSAs), with more resources going to electoral division deemed more difficult to represent and fewer resources being directed towards divisions deemed easier to represent. (See Appendix I attached below)

This compounds the issue, for now we have a situation where relatively numerous and under-populated divisions are receiving considerably more financial assistance (recently up to almost \$25,000 more) than any of their urban counterparts.

In short, rural Alberta constituencies are rewarded twice --- first by the Electoral Boundaries Commission when they are made smaller in area and population than otherwise warranted, and secondly by the Members' Services Committee when they receive more funds than otherwise warranted.

Although the Members' Services Committee has heard many times that additional resources may be required to help meet the needs of urban constituents, it has followed the lead of previous Electoral Boundary Commissions here in paying only lip-service to those arguments while continuing to provide extra support to rural areas. (Recently, at long last, the Member Services Committee moved to counter some of this imbalance by providing a basic "matrix adjustment" to the MSAs of areas which had previously received none.)

It is also not at all clear that these additional funds in any way address the issue of how "difficult" it may be to represent a particular area, much less how existing MLAs actually do so.

To illustrate this point, consider the operations of 6 adjoining constituencies from south-east Alberta:

If "matrix scores" were indicative of how difficult it was to represent a constituency, one would expect those areas with higher scores would require more offices and/or personnel to be represented effectively. As these examples show, however, there is no clear indication of this, and areas with lower scores --- and more in terms of the "matrix adjustment" they receive --- may have more offices and/or constituency assistants than those with the highest scores, regardless of the fact that their respective MLAs may belong to the same Caucus.

Although this concern arises directly from the work of the Member Services Committee, that Committee in turn has referred to the work of these Commissions for applying the matrix in this area, and so it is critical that this Commission open debate on the topic of the matrix itself, so that the Members' Services Committee is encouraged to do so as well.

Albertans will be better served, on the whole, when the fundamental democratic principle of representation-by-population is closely adhered to, and when financial benefits are not disproportionately allocated according to a "matrix" that has little if any sound, scientific merit.



Re: Edmonton Riverview Constituency

On behalf of Edmonton Riverview Alberta Liberal Party Constituency Association, I would like to provide you our submission that our riding of Edmonton Riverview:

- 1. **Be kept mostly the same.** By keeping *similar* boundaries and populations as it has been since it was established for the 1993 election and won by three different parties in the past decade;
- Drop certain areas on the western edge, namely certain areas on the west of the riding to reduce slightly the size of the riding and to better reflect the similar sociodemographic elements and age of housing stock of the remainder of the riding;
- 3. Add certain areas on the southwest of the riding that have similar socio-demographic elements and age of housing stock to the remainder of the riding.

Equality and fairness for voters and their ridings

We endorse the recommendation of others that the Commission strive to achieve greater equality in population between ridings, as much as possible, to ensure that each vote is relatively equal in terms of representation. If geographically large ridings need extra financial support, technology or flexibility to permit better election campaigning and representation in the legislature, that should be favoured over diluting the value of votes in any particular part of the province.

As rural populations appear to be generally overrepresented by ridings and MLAs compared to urban ones, we would expect that your recommendations would mean rural ridings would grow

in population and urban ones, not just in the two largest cities, would shrink by comparison so that all come much closer to the provincial average. Some other provinces have nearly all ridings under 10% from their provincial average and many US electoral districts are under 5% from their relevant averages. We hope that your recommendations can achieve similar goals to advance voter equality and fairness. Accordingly, we recommend options for *reducing* the population of our riding.

City of Edmonton considerations

We understand that the City of Edmonton proposed a submission that showed many City ridings are less populous than Edmonton's average. This might imply that certain more populous ridings should shrink in population and many others should grow. Accordingly, we recommend options for *increasing* the population of our riding.

The City of Edmonton proposed submission reports that our riding increased in population from 40,000 in 2011 to 45,517 in 2016.

To **increase** the population of the riding and keep the similar socio-demographic population along the river valley, we propose the addition of the following Edmonton neighbourhoods, in order of similarity and proximity to our current riding boundaries:

Adding

(from east to west, along the current southern boundary)

- 1) Rio Terrace
- 2) Patricia Heights
- 3) Quesnell Heights

These three neighbourhoods were part of Edmonton Riverview in prior elections. They are now part of the current federal riding Edmonton Centre, along with our provincial riding's western neighbourhoods of Laurier Heights, Parkview and Crestwood etc.

We recommend adding those small areas of Garneau and McKernan west of 109 street. We believe 109 street forms a natural and distinct boundary for the eastern edge of the riding. The riding already includes other areas immediately surrounding the University.

If further changes are necessary

If you see fit to add even more population to the riding, in keeping with its current sociodemographics and housing stock, we recommend the following three areas along the Whitemud freeway and along the river valley:

Adding

- 4) Brookside
- 5) Brander Gardens
- 6) Ramsay Heights

We note that these three areas would come from Edmonton Whitemud, a riding that you may seek to reduce in size.

If you need to add more population, the next neighbourhoods along the river valley and its ravines could be added north of the current boundary (and also part of the current federal riding of Edmonton Centre)

- 7) Glenora
- 8) Grovenor

Removing areas less similar

Whether or not you add all those neighbourhoods above, we recommend you remove areas that have less in common with the socio-demographics of the riding population and age of housing and state of renovation. These areas below have greater commonality with the areas in the riding to the west of ours and include more rental and multi-unit housing. Their removal would allow 149 Street to provide a more distinctive boundary for the riding, especially north of 87th Avenue.

Removing

(in the rough order of distance and priority on the west edge of the riding)

- 1) Elmwood (farthest from the core of the riding, the river)
- 2) Meadowlark Park (to add to Edmonton Meadowlark Riding to match its name)
- 3) West Jasper place
- 4) Sherwood
- 5) Jasper Park
- 6) **Lynwood** (could be kept if necessary as it is closest to Laurier Heights in the riding and the areas we propose you add south of the Whitemud freeway)

These recommendations come from the cumulative decades of experience of our association's members living in this riding and months of door knocking and campaigning in this riding in many elections over the decades. Much of the housing stock was built in the 1950s and 1960s and has been undergoing considerable renovation in the recent decade or so. Much of the riding population works as professionals and office workers either downtown, at the Universities or in nearby hospitals, including the University of Alberta hospital in the riding.

Other reasons for these recommendations to keep the riding largely intact with some changes include:

- 1) Cohesive geographic boundaries along major roads and ravines
- 2) High voter turnout throughout the proposed riding communities
- 3) The riding has been competitive, with three different parties winning this riding in the past three elections.

We thank you for your time and consideration of this submission and your work on behalf of Albertans.

PC Caucus – Electoral Boundaries Commission Written Submission

We would first like to thank the Electoral Boundaries Commission for their work on this issue. Their efforts will ensure that Albertans are well represented by their elected officials. It is in that spirit of guaranteeing that Albertans feel that their voices and concerns are being heard that we present our recommendations on updating electoral boundaries.

Our first recommendation is that the Boundaries Commission do as much as it can to ensure that rural Albertans are still adequately represented in provincial government. While it is true that too much disparity in riding population presents a problem for democratic representation, there are realities of representing rural ridings that shouldn't be ignored. Rural ridings generally have more local government bodies to coordinate with, as well as varied and widely dispersed civil groups. Although improved technology can help rural constituents connect with their MLA in large rural ridings, there is no substitute for a face-to-face meeting between constituents and their MLA. Having a very large constituency also makes it very difficult to schedule an MLA to attend events, and reduces engagement. We therefore recommend that the boundaries commission do what it can to not reduce the number of rural constituencies, or increase the size of these constituencies, and that the population variance guideline not be reduced from 25%.

Secondly, we recommend that the Electoral Boundaries Commission commit to having updated constituencies that consider the cohesion of the population within that constituency. Wherever possible, constituencies should be aligned along existing community boundaries, geographic boundaries, and practical delineators such as rivers, large parks, highways and major roadways. Further we propose that the Electoral Boundaries Commission should do its best to avoid bundling large rural areas into urban and suburban areas of major cities to form constituencies. We believe that by respecting natural and practical boundaries in the formation of constituencies there will be less chance of constituencies being shaped solely for political considerations, and more respect given to the communities that Albertans themselves have built.

Our final recommendation is a request to the Electoral Boundaries Commission, asking that they help us honour the memory of a former colleague and Alberta legislator. We would ask that the Electoral Boundaries Commission consider renaming Calgary-Greenway as Calgary-Bhullar in memory of the former MLA, the late Manmeet Singh Bhullar. Manmeet was a man of the highest calibre, an exemplary public servant, and a very dear friend. Dedicated to serving Albertans even in his final moments, it is only fitting that the constituency he spent years serving should now serve as a memorial to all of the good that Manmeet accomplished.

As the Progressive Conservative caucus, we hope that our recommendations will assist the Electoral Boundaries Commission in their work. We know that they will work tirelessly to ensure the link between an MLA and their constituents will remain strong, and that their decisions will be well informed by the best interests of Albertans. We once again thank the Commission for their commitment to public service.

Submission to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission February 8, 2017



Introduction

The City of Grande Prairie is pleased to have the opportunity to provide a submission to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission.

We appreciate the importance of ensuring effective distribution of population and representation. As a growing urban centre, we recognize the need to consider how potential electoral boundary changes might ensure the most equitable representation for the Albertans we represent.

Much has changed in our community since the last review in 2010 when the boundaries remained generally status quo locally (there were minor changes to the border with Grande Prairie-Smoky and Grande Prairie-Wapiti in the City of Grande Prairie, remaining the same in the rural areas).

In 2014, our community celebrated its 100th anniversary since incorporation and has a population of 63,166 as of 2016 Federal Census figures released on Feb. 8. In the 2011 Federal enumeration, the City had 55,032 residents.

In this most recent federal census, the City was the seventh fastest-growing Census Agglomeration Area in Canada with 13.1% growth, well above the national average of 5% and the provincial average of 11.8%.

Grande Prairie continues to be an economic hub in Northwestern Alberta with a market of over 280,000 people that takes in Northeastern B.C., Northwestern Alberta, and the southern Northwest Territories. The community has continued to grow, even during the 2009 downturn and the most recent decelerated economy.

Activity in the energy sector has increased significantly in the past few months, giving rise to a further increase in our population count.

The city is part of two ridings – Grande Prairie-Wapiti and Grande Prairie-Smoky – both constituencies formed in 1993.

The Grande Prairie-Smoky Riding includes the portion of the city north of 100 Ave. (downtown) as well as the hamlet of Clairmont and towns of Sexsmith, Valleyview and Fox Creek. The constituency's population is 57,580.

Grande Prairie-Wapiti includes the portion of Grande Prairie south of 100 Ave. and takes in the towns of Wembley and Beaverlodge to the west. Its population is 56,975.

Position

We believe that Grande Prairie should be served by a fully urban MLA and potentially two within 10 years, hence our position approved at City Council on Monday, Feb. 6.

The City of Grande Prairie requests a minimum of one fully urban MLA for Grande Prairie as well as a second riding that would include the remainder of Grande Prairie and the urban/rural areas within a 25-kilometre radius of the City.

We note that the Commission had originally proposed one urban MLA for Grande Prairie in 2010.

While Grande Prairie promotes a regional approach to service delivery, land use and, potentially, municipal governance, it's vital the community itself is represented by urban MLAs. This will become even more important as the city continues to grow and larger urban issues arise.

The large geographic area the current constituencies comprise means that the existing MLAs have to interact with a significant number of stakeholder groups from a variety of communities.

Under today's boundary structure, there is no guarantee that either MLA serving the community will reside within the community and may, in fact, live some distance away. With Fox Creek being part of the Grande Prairie-Smoky riding for example, it is possible one of our MLAs lives two hours away from the majority of his constituents who reside within the City limits.

Our Grande Prairie-Wapiti riding has not had a representative living within the city since 2008, while Grande Prairie-Smoky has not had an MLA actually reside in the city since the constituency was formed in 1993.

Living outside the city presents challenges in that the MLA may not fully experience urban issues in the same way as the majority of their constituents. Similarly, someone located within Grande Prairie would not be as attuned to life and the issues in Valleyview or Fox Creek.

Rationale

Even by the lowest population projections, Grande Prairie would have 81,967 residents by 2027. This forecast is based on the Canadian annualized growth rate of 1.50 per cent between 1921 and 2011.

Based on Grande Prairie's growth rate of 4.53 per cent between 1921 and 2015 (the last municipal census), the city would have a population of about 116,000 a decade from now.

Of Alberta's five mid-sized cities with a population of over 60,000 only Grande Prairie and Airdrie (58,690) are without at least one fully urban constituency. Lethbridge (94,804), Medicine Hat (63,018), Red Deer (100,807) and St. Albert (63,255) all have at least one fully urban MLA.

We recognize the average population for each constituency should be about 49,000 people. Based on projected growth within the City and in the County of Grande Prairie, boundaries could be adjusted to the maps of both existing constituencies to permit two urban MLAs for Grande Prairie.

Having at least one constituency fully contained within city limits means the MLA can focus on being a voice for our busy, growing community, which is among the youngest in Canada with an average age of 30.3.

Our Chamber of Commerce is the second largest in the province. We have three school boards and active groups such as the Urban Developers Institute and community organizations, including four Rotary chapters.

Under the current structure, both MLAs must advocate for multiple communities and work with numerous agencies, school boards and stakeholders within these communities and the broader region, which often have competing interests, making it extremely challenging.

Our submission could allow the Commission to return to a proposal in the 2010 interim report of placing Fox Creek within the Whitecourt-St. Anne constituency where it is more geographically aligned.

Conclusion

Grande Prairie has reached the size and regional standing to have a minimum of one fully urban MLA. We also propose a second riding to include the City of Grande Prairie as well as the urban/rural areas within a 25-kilometre radius of the City.

Electoral Boundaries Commission Submission Edmonton-Calder

The Edmonton-Calder electoral district has undergone significant changes in past Electoral Boundaries Commission reviews. These changes have resulted in the electoral district having irregular shaped boundaries, a large geographic size and high population (compared to other constituencies in the Edmonton metropolitan area). Recommendations are based on the criteria specified by the Electoral Boundaries Commission and will help ensure effective representation for the constituents of Edmonton-Calder.

To ensure effective representation for the constituents of Edmonton-Calder, it is recommended that the current electoral boundaries be modified to reduce the number of constituents (based on current and future population projections), increase the demographic homogeneity of neighborhoods within the constituency, and make the boundaries clearer and more easily understood.

Based on the 2016 Census Estimate, the Edmonton-Calder electoral district is projected to have 53,918 constituents, which is approximately 10% greater than the projected electoral quotient of 48,884. The population of the Edmonton-Calder electoral district has grown more rapidly than the Edmonton metropolitan




Figure 1: Change in population from 2014 to 2016 in the Edmonton-Calder electoral district (2016 City of Edmonton Municipal Census).

area average of 13.9%. From 2011 to 2016 the electoral district population increased approximately 20% with the population of certain neighbourhoods increasing more rapidly over the past two years (Figure 1). The population increase has been primarily driven by rezoning and residential construction permits approved by the City of Edmonton.

This rapid increase in population is expected to continue as three previously undeveloped areas within the current Edmonton-Calder electoral district boundaries have been rezoned for residential construction by the City of Edmonton. These areas are the Edmonton Municipal Airport (Blatchford), subdivisions west of 142 Street (e.g. Starling and Trumpeter) and subdivisions in the north portion of the electoral district. The subdivisions in the north and west of the electoral district are currently under construction with homes ready for possession while initial occupancy is expected in 2018 for Blatchford.

Given the expected population growth in these areas, the number of constituents in the Edmonton-Calder electoral district will vary more than 25% from the

provincial average prior to the next Electoral Boundary Commission review if existing boundaries are not modified. It is recommended the Edmonton-Calder electoral district boundaries are modified to primarily include mature neighbourhoods to limit excessive population increases from approved residential development projects. Limiting future population increases is especially important as the population of Edmonton-Calder is already estimated as greater than the mean constituency size.




Figure 3: Language spoken by neighbourhoods within the Edmonton-Calder electoral district (2016 City of Edmonton Municipal Census).

Smoothing the awkward geographic boundaries of the Edmonton-Calder electoral district (Figure 2) will allow for more effective representation as boundaries will be clearer (incorporating the natural boundaries of City of Edmonton neighbourhood designations) and population demographics/characteristics to be more homogenous. This recommendation would allow certain constituent populations to be incorporated into neighbouring electoral district better aligned with current demographics. For example, when the neighbourhoods in Edmonton-Calder are analyzed, Rual West Big Lake and Kinokamau Plains Area (on the west

side of the electoral district), stand out as demographic outliers. As seen in the graphs below, the neighborhoods of Rural West Big Lake and Kinokamau Plains have lower levels of bilingualism and a higher percentage of household that only speak English (Figure 3).

Updating the boundaries of the Edmonton-Calder electoral district will allow for demographic homogeneity, clearer boundaries and effective representation. A more detailed submission will be provided to the Electoral Boundaries Commission during the next round of public consultations.



A Written Submission to the Alberta Electoral Boundary Commission

Introduction

Greetings. It is my pleasure to produce a written submission for this first round of public consultations that the Alberta Electoral Boundary Commission is facilitating. And while I know you're somewhat obligated to read what I submit I hope that this is a real, helpful contribution to the discourse and to your decision making process.

Progress Alberta is a non-profit communications and advocacy group that launched in January of 2016. The organization focuses on social justice, climate and energy and progressive political issues.

The executive director of Progress Alberta is Duncan Kinney, a communications and non-profit professional who is based in Edmonton, Alberta.

Progress Alberta has thousands of supporters all across Alberta that help keep us afloat. We also have an email newsletter that reaches tens of thousands of Albertans.

The importance of the work of the Boundaries Commission cannot be overstated.

More than any other single act, the recommendations of the commission will affect the opportunity for everyday Albertans to have their voice heard when it comes to the next election. Small changes in boundaries can have large effects on electoral results. Progress Alberta and its supporters have significant interest in the work of the commission. Fundamentally, there are two questions before the commission: the urban/rural split of seats, and the specific boundaries of each constituency.

Urban/Rural Divide Context

The question of how best to balance urban and rural representation continues to be a struggle. It is a widely held belief that the current rural representation in Alberta is too great, and at the expense of the residents of the major cities, who enjoy something less than representation by population.

However, the gold standard for electoral distribution in Canada is not representation by population but rather "effective representation."

Significantly, two court references – one appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada from Saskatchewan, and one from the Alberta Court of Appeal – lay out the extent which representation by population can take a back seat to other considerations, and have been broadly used to support the smaller size of rural constituencies. Under *Reference re Prov. Electoral Boundaries (Sask.)*, [1991] 2 S.C.R. 158, the Supreme Court justices, by 6-3 decision affirmed a province's right to set out considerations other than population:

The purpose of the right to vote enshrined in s. 3 of the Charter is not equality of voting power per se but the right to "effective representation". The right to vote therefore comprises many factors, of which equity is but one. The section does not guarantee equality of voting power ...

Relative parity of voting power is a prime condition of effective representation. Deviations from absolute voter parity, however, may be justified on the grounds of practical impossibility or the provision of more effective representation. Factors like geography, community history, community interests and minority representation may need to be taken into account to ensure that our legislative assemblies effectively represent the diversity of our social mosaic. Beyond this, dilution of one citizen's vote as compared with another's should not be countenanced.

So while the court affirmed the principle of effective representation, it set the limit to the dilution of one citizen's vote at that which is required to reach effective representation. In its decision on Reference re: Electoral Divisions Statutes Amendment Act, 1993 (Alta.), the Alberta Court of Appeal gives further guidance and boundaries:

- 43. It is one thing to say that the effective representation of a specific community requires an electoral division of a below-average population. That approach invites specific reasons, and specific facts. The constitution of Canada is sufficiently flexible to permit disparity to serve geographical and demographic reality.
- 44. It is quite another to say that any electoral division, for no specific reason, may be smaller than average. In [Reference Re: Electoral Boundaries Commission Act, Alberta, 1992 1 W.W.R. 481 (Alta. C.A.)], we affirmed the first, not the second. We affirm again that there is no permissible variation if there is no justification. And the onus to establish justification lies with those who suggest the variation....

According to the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* the following criteria are to be used by the commission to help them in their duties

Relevant considerations

In determining the area to be included in and in fixing the boundaries of the proposed electoral divisions, the Commission, subject to section 15, may take into consideration any factors it

considers appropriate, but shall take into consideration (emphasis added)

- (a) the requirement for effective representation as guaranteed by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms,
- (b) scarcity and density of population,
- (c) common community interests and community organizations, including those of Indian reserves and Metis settlements,
- (d) wherever possible, the existing community boundaries within the cities of Edmonton and Calgary,
- (e) wherever possible, the existing municipal boundaries,
- (f) the number of municipalities and other local authorities,

- (g) geographical features, including existing road systems, and
- (h) the desirability of understandable and clear boundaries.

The commission "may take into consideration any factors it considers appropriate," a key point. Past commissions have attempted to quantify the "geographical and demographic" realities that would require a deviation from the mean constituency size. In the case of the last Boundary Commission, the primary factors which guided the Commission's recommendations included:

- Population
- Scarcity of population
- Community Interests
- Community Boundaries
- Municipal boundaries
- Geographical features
- Understandable and clear boundaries
- Distance and area
- Inner city urban issues
- Other urban issues

For further details on those criteria head to page 6-8 from the final report from 2009/2010 Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission. These decision criteria were vast improvement over the criteria used by past commissions.

In 2002/2003 the following criteria were used to help them make their decisions.

- Area
- Population density
- Rural/urban ratio
- Dependent population proportion
- Number of elected bodies
- Distance to legislature

An Unfair Advantage to Rural Alberta

The majority of the 2002/2003 decision criteria favoured either the status quo (which was tilted towards rural Alberta) or rural Alberta and this was reflected in their work. I think it's a credit to the 2009/2010 commission's good work early on identifying a more diverse set of decision criteria that the end result ended up being far fairer than the work of past commissions.

The other factor that favours rural Alberta is the use of special circumstances. Under the Act up to four constituencies may be created that fall outside of the -25% to +25% population range. These constituencies can vary as much as 50% from the mean constituency population.

While we acknowledge that the use of special circumstances is nigh unavoidable in a place as large as Alberta the commission must also acknowledge that at its core the existence of ridings that use special circumstances in order to justify a smaller population inherently privileges rural Alberta.

2016 census data shows both Calgary and Edmonton require an additional seat each

The status quo seat distribution simply isn't tenable. If the commission retains the status quo seat distribution the average Calgary electoral district would be 6.1% larger in population than the average electoral district. The average Edmonton electoral district would be 5.1% above the average and the average electoral district in the rest of Alberta would be 6.3% below the average.

Due to this imbalance both Calgary and Edmonton require an additional seat each in a redrawn electoral map of Alberta. As you can see in the above table by adding an additional seat to both Calgary and Edmonton the urban/rural divide issue is addressed.

Adding language/cultural diversity as a decision criteria

Past commission reports have acknowledged this as a potentially important criteria for effective representation by MLAs in urban areas however nothing has been done to address it.

Mother tongue data is available from StatsCan and it is highly instructive. Based on 2011 census data more than 22% of Albertans have a mother tongue that is not English. Of the 700,000 Albertans who's mother language is not English 550,000 of them live in either Calgary or Edmonton. And this is 2011 data, based on immigration trends these numbers will only be going up.

Adding language diversity as decision criteria means the commission will be better able to produce an interim report where urban areas are more effectively represented.

Variance from the Electoral Mean

Currently the Act allows a 25 per cent variance from the electoral mean using the most recently available StatsCan census data. According to newly released 2016 census data the average electoral district's population is 46,967.

The possible largest allowable variance between two technically permissible ridings would be 23,248 people. That is simply too high and it means Albertans in ridings with large population (typically urban Albertans) will not receive effective representation. Five of Canada's ten provinces use a 10% or 5% variance when drawing up their electoral boundaries and all five provinces provide effective representation to their residents.

Regardless of our recommendations the map will need a lot of work. There are four rural ridings that fall below the 25 per cent variance limit of 35,293

And there are seven urban ridings that have risen above the 25 per cent variance of 58,641 - Calgary-South East quite dramatically so.

In the interests of effective representation Progress Alberta is proposing that the commission self-impose a 10 per cent variance limit on itself for 83 of 87 ridings for its interim report.

This is not an impossible task. The last commission had 72 of 87 riding fall within a 10 per cent variance.

Our submitted map uses a self-imposed 10 per cent variance limit.

Advances in communication technology make rural ridings easier to serve

The Supreme Court decision that justifies the 25% variance makes claims that are not necessarily true in 2017.

"The material before us suggests that **not only are rural ridings harder to serve** because of difficulty in transport and communications... Thus the goal of effective representation may justify somewhat lower voter populations in rural areas."

While transportation remains a barrier to serving large ridings communication technology has advanced incredibly since 2010. Alberta is the most internet connected province in the country thanks in large part to the SuperNet, a government supported fibre optic network that spans 13,000 kms and reaches 429 communities in Alberta.

What's good enough to provide an entrepreneur in rural southern Alberta with a level playing field in the world of international business is surely good enough for rural MLAs to effectively communicate with their constituents.

We also should not discount the work of the Final Mile Rural Connectivity Initative. This is a joint effort between Service Alberta and Alberta Agriculture to connect unserved Alberta households to high speed internet. When the program was first announced in January 2012, approximately 94 percent of Albertans had access to high-speed Internet services. In order to reach their goal of 98 percent coverage, Service Alberta and Agriculture and Rural Development sunk \$5.1 million into the Final Mile Rural Connectivity Initiative to extend coverage to rural and remote Albertan households.

I would recommend contacting Service Alberta to inquire about the current level of internet coverage in Alberta.

Availability of satellite internet

For areas that can't be reached by fibre optic cable Xplornet launched a 25 MPBS high-speed wireless internet product for rural Alberta in 2015. Service Alberta has also supported Xplornet's offerings of high speed wireless internet to rural Albertans.

This increased level of service makes it easier for rural Albertans to both connect with their representatives as well as to access government services, which have increasingly moved online as well.

Government services are increasingly available and more easily accessible to rural Albertans

There are now 225 registry agents all over Alberta from High Prairie to Medicine Hat. Albertans use these services to get registration, information and licensing services.

There are also numerous examples of government services that have moved online since 2010. For instance Alberta Supports has an online tool that allows you to find family and social support services - https://myalbertasupports.humanservices.alberta.ca/CitizenPortal/application.do The The

Alberta Learning Information Service has an online tool that allows you to see if your post-secondary credits will transfer to or from an institution -

https://myalbertasupports.humanservices.alberta.ca/CitizenPortal/application.do

The Alberta Energy Regulator has a robust online tool portal that allows you to access everything from an abandoned well map to regulatory proceedings to public notices of application. http://portal.aer.ca/portal/site/srp

And those are just three examples. These are services that Albertans could have potentially had to have gone to their MLA for in the past that are now easily available online. There is less of a reason to have a 25% variance and to privilege rural ridings over urban ridings than ever before.

Suggested Electoral Map Changes

Grande Prairie – This is one of the faster growing jurisdictions in Alberta. The current set up where the city of Grande Prairie is split in half and the outlying rural areas are used to fill out the population numbers means the city's urban residents are not effectively represented. Give the city of Grande Prairie one truly urban seat and have the other seat be a mix of urban and rural constituencies. Look to the ridings of Medicine Hat and Cypress-Medicine Hat as an example.

Fort McMurray – There is a massive population imbalance between the two Fort McMurray seats. Fort McMurray-Wood Buffalo has seen massive population growth and was already much larger than Fort McMurray-Conklin to begin with. This must be addressed. Much like in Grande Prairie there is a strong argument to be made to have one truly urban seat and the other seat a mix of urban and rural constituencies. Look to the ridings of Medicine Hat and Cypress-Medicine Hat as an example.

Calgary – There are currently 25 seats in Calgary. Based newly available census information the average Calgary riding would, on average hav 6.1 per cent more people than the average electoral district in the rest of Alberta (not including Edmonton). This is far too high for effective representation for Alberta's largest city.

For effective representation reasons the city of Calgary requires another seat.

This new riding would most likely be on the eastern edge of Calgary as Calgary-Greenway, Calgary McCall and Calgary-South East are all bursting at the seams.

Edmonton – There are currently 19 seats in Edmonton. Based on newly available 2016 census data the average Edmonton electoral district would, on average have 5.1 per cent more than the average Alberta electoral district (not including Calgary). This is again, much too high to ensure effective representation for Alberta's second largest city.

The city of Edmonton requires another seat for effective representation reasons.

The two southern Edmonton ridings of Edmonton-Ellerslie and Edmonton-South West are bursting at the seams. One riding should be added to the Edmonton area and it should most likely be added in southern Edmonton.

During this iteration of the Alberta Electoral Boundary Commission no new seats are to be added. If we want to add new seats in areas of high population growth that means combining ridings that have low populations and low or negative growth. Here are some suggestions to aid the commission in adding urban seats while drafting their interim report.

Turn Drumheller-Stettler, Strathmore-Brooks, Battle River-Wainwright and Lacombe-Ponoka from four ridings into three ridings

Split Drumheller-Stettler in half. The riding is 23% below the average electoral district population.

Merge part of Drumheller-Stettler with Battle River-Wainwright.

Based on how you split Drumheller-Stettler some of Lacombe-Ponoka should probably be split off to fill out the riding. Then combine what's left of Drumheller-Stettler with Strathmore-Brooks.

Turn Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills, Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater and Bonnyville-Cold Lake from four ridings into three ridings

Take the Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills riding, a massive rural super riding and break off the northern part and add it to the Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater, a riding which has a variance 19% below the average.

Take a portion of Lac-La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills and add it to the Bonnyville-Cold Lake riding with a variance that is also 19% below average. And finally, take the southern portion of Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills riding and it to the Vermillion-Lloydminster riding, an area that is 17% under the average.

Turn Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre, West Yellowhead, Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills, Innisfail-Sylvan Lake and Drayton Valley-Devon from five ridings into four ridings In this case Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre would be the riding getting broken into its component parts. West Yellowhead is 32 per cent below th variance.

Add Rocky Mountain House to the West Yellowhead Riding. Rocky Mountain House shares a common landscape and proximity to the mountains with the West Yellowhead riding.

Take Sundre and add it Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills.


Take what's left of the north-central portion of Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre and distribute it amongst Innisfail-Sylvan Lake and Drayton Valley-Devon.

Submitted Map Notes

- 83 of the 87 ridings fall within the 10 per cent variance
- Urban areas were kept together to properly represent urban voters. For example, Grande
 Prairie and Medicine Hat areas are given one primarily urban seat with the rest allocated to a
 doughnut style riding.
- First Nations reserves were grouped together wherever possible to enhance representation.
 This observes the spirit of the recommendations of the Erasmus-Dusseault Royal
 Commission.
- In nearly every case, ridings were drawn based on connecting highways to facilitate transportation.
- 28 ridings were allocated to the Edmonton Census Metropolitan Area (including 20 allocated to the Edmonton city limits/census subdivision)
- 30 ridings should be allocated to the Calgary Census Metropolitan Area (including 26.5 allocated to the Calgary city limits/census subdivision).
- NOTE: one of the suggested ridings on the map takes approximately 0.75 of the Calgary CMA allocation, while 0.1 quotient's worth of unallocated area just south of the Calgary CMA is available to add to one of the Calgary CMA seats

Conclusion

- Keep the decision criteria matrix from the 2009/2010 Electoral Boundary Commission with one addition - language diversity
- Advances in internet connectivity and availability of government services online make rural ridings easier to serve
- Self impose a population variance of 10 per cent from the average riding for 83 of 87 ridings
- Add one contiguous urban seat to both Fort McMurray and Grande Prairie. Make the second seat
 in both of those cities a mix of urban and rural constituencies. Look to Medicine Hat as a
 successful example
- To ensure effective representation add one more seat to Calgary
- To ensure effective representation add one seat to Edmonton
- Merge and combine two under populated rural ridings in order to accomplish this

More than any other single act, the recommendations of the commission will affect the opportunity for everyday Albertans to have their voice heard when it comes to the next election. Small changes in boundaries can have large effects on electoral results. Progress Alberta and its supporters have significant interest in the work of the commission. Fundamentally, there are two questions before the commission: the urban/rural split of seats, and the specific boundaries of each constituency.

Urban/Rural Divide Context

The question of how best to balance urban and rural representation continues to be a struggle. It is a widely held belief that the current rural representation in Alberta is too great, and at the expense of the residents of the major cities, who enjoy something less than representation by population.

However, the gold standard for electoral distribution in Canada is not representation by population but rather "effective representation."

Significantly, two court references – one appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada from Saskatchewan, and one from the Alberta Court of Appeal – lay out the extent which representation by population can take a back seat to other considerations, and have been broadly used to support the smaller size of rural constituencies. Under *Reference re Prov. Electoral Boundaries (Sask.)*, [1991] 2 S.C.R. 158, the Supreme Court justices, by 6-3 decision affirmed a province's right to set out considerations other than population:

The purpose of the right to vote enshrined in s. 3 of the Charter is not equality of voting power per se but the right to "effective representation". The right to vote therefore comprises many factors, of which equity is but one. The section does not guarantee equality of voting power ...

Relative parity of voting power is a prime condition of effective representation. Deviations from absolute voter parity, however, may be justified on the grounds of practical impossibility or the provision of more effective representation. Factors like geography, community history, community interests and minority representation may need to be taken into account to ensure that our legislative assemblies effectively represent the diversity of our social mosaic. Beyond this, dilution of one citizen's vote as compared with another's should not be countenanced.

So while the court affirmed the principle of effective representation, it set the limit to the dilution of one citizen's vote at that which is required to reach effective representation. In its decision on Reference re: Electoral Divisions Statutes Amendment Act, 1993 (Alta.), the Alberta Court of Appeal gives further guidance and boundaries:

- 43. It is one thing to say that the effective representation of a specific community requires an electoral division of a below-average population. That approach invites specific reasons, and specific facts. The constitution of Canada is sufficiently flexible to permit disparity to serve geographical and demographic reality.
- 44. It is quite another to say that any electoral division, for no specific reason, may be smaller than average. In [Reference Re: Electoral Boundaries Commission Act, Alberta, 1992 1 W.W.R. 481 (Alta. C.A.)], we affirmed the first, not the second. We affirm again that there is no permissible variation if there is no justification. And the onus to establish justification lies with those who suggest the variation....

According to the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* the following criteria are to be used by the commission to help them in their duties

Relevant considerations

In determining the area to be included in and in fixing the boundaries of the proposed electoral divisions, the Commission, subject to section 15, may take into consideration any factors it

considers appropriate, but shall take into consideration (emphasis added)

- (a) the requirement for effective representation as guaranteed by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms,
- (b) scarcity and density of population,
- (c) common community interests and community organizations, including those of Indian reserves and Metis settlements,
- (d) wherever possible, the existing community boundaries within the cities of Edmonton and Calgary,
- (e) wherever possible, the existing municipal boundaries,
- (f) the number of municipalities and other local authorities,

- (g) geographical features, including existing road systems, and
- (h) the desirability of understandable and clear boundaries.

The commission "may take into consideration any factors it considers appropriate," a key point. Past commissions have attempted to quantify the "geographical and demographic" realities that would require a deviation from the mean constituency size. In the case of the last Boundary Commission, the primary factors which guided the Commission's recommendations included:

- Population
- Scarcity of population
- Community Interests
- Community Boundaries
- Municipal boundaries
- Geographical features
- Understandable and clear boundaries
- Distance and area
- Inner city urban issues
- Other urban issues

For further details on those criteria head to page 6-8 from the final report from 2009/2010 Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission. These decision criteria were vast improvement over the criteria used by past commissions.

In 2002/2003 the following criteria were used to help them make their decisions.

- Area
- Population density
- Rural/urban ratio
- Dependent population proportion
- Number of elected bodies
- Distance to legislature

An Unfair Advantage to Rural Alberta

The majority of the 2002/2003 decision criteria favoured either the status quo (which was tilted towards rural Alberta) or rural Alberta and this was reflected in their work. I think it's a credit to the 2009/2010 commission's good work early on identifying a more diverse set of decision criteria that the end result ended up being far fairer than the work of past commissions.

The other factor that favours rural Alberta is the use of special circumstances. Under the Act up to four constituencies may be created that fall outside of the -25% to +25% population range. These constituencies can vary as much as 50% from the mean constituency population.

While we acknowledge that the use of special circumstances is nigh unavoidable in a place as large as Alberta the commission must also acknowledge that at its core the existence of ridings that use special circumstances in order to justify a smaller population inherently privileges rural Alberta.

Adding language/cultural diversity as a decision criteria

Past commission reports have acknowledged this as a potentially important criteria for effective representation by MLAs in urban areas however nothing has been done to address it.

Mother tongue data is available from StatsCan and it is highly instructive. Based on 2011 census data more than 22% of Albertans have a mother tongue that is not English. Of the 700,000 Albertans who's mother language is not English 550,000 of them live in either Calgary or Edmonton. And this is 2011 data, based on immigration trends these numbers will only be going up.

Adding language diversity as decision criteria means the commission will be better able to produce an interim report where urban areas are more effectively represented.

"Common community interests" is poorly defined and can lead to electoral boundaries that unnecessarily divide Albertans

The relevant legislation references "common community interests" that must be taken into consideration by the commission when doing its work. But "common community interests" is a vague and ill-defined term and can be used to justify decisions that mean Albertans will get ineffective representation

To be blunt, "common community interests" can be used as a blunt instrument in order not to mix rich people with poor people or white people with people of colour in the same electoral district.

While there are some clear cases of "common community interests" (for instance with the high density of First Nation and Metis settlements in the Lesser Slave Lake constituency) I would encourage the commission to not over use this criteria.

Variance from the Electoral Mean

Currently the Act allows a 25 per cent variance from the electoral mean using the most recently available StatsCan census data. While we don't have the latest census data at the time of this submission we will be crunching the numbers and figuring it out by the Feb. 17th revision deadline.

However, the 25 per cent variance is too high and it inhibits effective representation. Five of Canada's ten provinces use a 10% or 5% variance when drawing up their electoral boundaries.

In the interests of effective representation Progress Alberta is proposing that the commission self-impose a 10 per cent variance limit on itself for 83 of 87 ridings for its interim report.

This is not an impossible task. The last commission had 72 of 87 riding fall within 10 per cent.

We plan on producing a map that follows this self-imposed 10 per cent limit by the Feb. 17 revision deadline based on the 2016 census data and we hope that that Electoral Boundary Commission follows our lead.

The commission is estimating the average riding population to be 48,884 people. With a 10% variance that would mean a riding could have anywhere from between 53,772 people on the high end to 43,996 people on the low end.

We also reserve the right to inch the variance up a few percent based on the results of the 2016 census.

Advances in communication technology make rural ridings easier to serve

The Supreme Court decision that justifies the 25% variance makes claims that are not necessarily true in 2017.

"The material before us suggests that **not only are rural ridings harder to serve** because of difficulty in transport and communications... Thus the goal of effective representation may justify somewhat lower voter populations in rural areas."

While transportation remains a barrier to serving large ridings communication technology has advanced incredibly since 2010. Alberta is the most internet connected province in the country thanks in large part to the SuperNet, a government supported fibre optic network that spans 13,000 kms and reaches 429 communities in Alberta.

What's good enough to provide an entrepreneur in rural southern Alberta with a level playing field in the world of international business is surely good enough for rural MLAs to effectively communicate with their constituents.

We also should not discount the work of the Final Mile Rural Connectivity Initative. This is a joint effort between Service Alberta and Alberta Agriculture to connect unserved Alberta households to high speed internet. When the program was first announced in January 2012, approximately 94 percent of Albertans had access to high-speed Internet services. In order to reach their goal of 98 percent coverage, Service Alberta and Agriculture and Rural Development sunk \$5.1 million into the Final Mile Rural Connectivity Initiative to extend coverage to rural and remote Albertan households.

I would recommend contacting Service Alberta to inquire about the current level of internet coverage in Alberta.

Availability of satellite internet

For areas that can't be reached by fibre optic cable Xplornet launched a 25 MPBS high-speed wireless internet product for rural Alberta in 2015. Service Alberta has also supported Xplornet's offerings of high speed wireless internet to rural Albertans.

This increased level of service makes it easier for rural Albertans to both connect with their representatives as well as to access government services, which have increasingly moved online as well.

Government services are increasingly available and more easily accessible to rural Albertans

There are now 225 registry agents all over Alberta from High Prairie to Medicine Hat. Albertans use these services to get registration, information and licensing services.

There are also numerous examples of government services that have moved online since 2010. For instance Alberta Supports has an online tool that allows you to find family and social support services - https://myalbertasupports.humanservices.alberta.ca/CitizenPortal/application.do The The

Alberta Learning Information Service has an online tool that allows you to see if your post-secondary credits will transfer to or from an institution -

https://myalbertasupports.humanservices.alberta.ca/CitizenPortal/application.do

The Alberta Energy Regulator has a robust online tool portal that allows you to access everything from an abandoned well map to regulatory proceedings to public notices of application. http://portal.aer.ca/portal/site/srp

And those are just three examples. These are services that Albertans could have potentially had to have gone to their MLA for in the past that are now easily available online. There is less of a reason to have a 25% variance and to privilege rural ridings over urban ridings than ever before.

Suggested Electoral Map Changes

Grande Prairie – This is one of the faster growing jurisdictions in Alberta. The current set up where the city of Grande Prairie is split in half and the outlying rural areas are used to fill out the population numbers means the city's urban residents are not effectively represented. Give the city of Grande Prairie one truly urban seat and have the other seat be a mix of urban and rural constituencies. Look to the ridings of Medicine Hat and Cypress-Medicine Hat as an example.

Fort McMurray – There is a massive population imbalance between the two Fort McMurray seats. Fort McMurray-Wood Buffalo has seen massive population growth and was already much larger than Fort McMurray-Conklin to begin with. This must be addressed. Much like in Grande Prairie there is a strong argument to be made to have one truly urban seat and the other seat a mix of urban and rural constituencies. Look to the ridings of Medicine Hat and Cypress-Medicine Hat as an example.

Calgary – There are currently 25 seats in Calgary. Based on the commissions population estimates the average Calgary riding would, on average be 7.8 per cent above the electoral mean. This is far too high for effective representation for Alberta's largest city. In order to bring that number down to a more reasonable level one more seat should be added to Calgary. This new riding would most likely be in northeast Calgary and would pull from Calgary-Greenway, Calgary McCall and Calgary-Mackay-Nose Hill. Massive population growth in Calgary-South East must also be addressed.

Edmonton – There are currently 19 seats in Edmonton. Based on the commissions population estimates the average Edmonton riding would, on average be 4.8 per cent above the electoral mean. This is again, much too high to ensure effective representation for Alberta's second largest city. The two southern Edmonton ridings of Edmonton-Ellerslie and Edmonton-South West are bursting at the seams. One riding should be added to the Edmonton area and it should be added in southern Edmonton.

During this iteration of the Alberta Electoral Boundary Commission no new seats are to be added. If we want to add new seats in areas of high population growth that means combining ridings that have low populations and low or negative growth. Here are some suggestions to aid the commission in adding urban seats while drafting their interim report.

Turn Drumheller-Stettler, Strathmore-Brooks, Battle River-Wainwright and Lacombe-Ponoka from four ridings into three ridings

Split Drumheller-Stettler in half. The riding is 23% below the average electoral district population. Merge part of Drumheller-Stettler with Battle River-Wainwright another riding right on the edge of the 25 per cent variance. Based on how you split Drumheller-Stettler some of Lacombe-Ponoka should probably be split off to fill out the riding. Then combine what's left of Drumheller-Stettler with Strathmore-Brooks.

Turn Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills, Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater and Bonnyville-Cold Lake from four ridings into three ridings

Take the Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills riding, which is massive and has a variance of 22% and break off the northern part and add it to the Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater, a riding which has a variance 22% below the average. Take a portion of Lac-La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills and add it to the Bonnyville-Cold Lake riding with a variance of 19% below average. And finally, take the southern portion of Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills riding and it to the Vermillion-Lloydminster riding, an area that is 17% under the average.

Turn Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre, West Yellowhead, Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills, Innisfail-Sylvan Lake and Drayton Valley-Devon from five ridings into four ridings

In this case Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre would be the riding getting broken into its component parts. West Yellowhead is right on the edge of the 25 per cent variance. Add Rocky Mountain House to the West Yellowhead Riding. Rocky Mountain House shares a common landscape and proximity to the mountains with the West Yellowhead riding.


Take Sundre and add it Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills.

Take what's left of the north-central portion of Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre and distribute it amongst Innisfail-Sylvan Lake and Drayton Valley-Devon.

Conclusion

- Keep the decision criteria matrix from the 2009/2010 Electoral Boundary Commission with one addition - language diversity
- Keep in mind that "common community interests" is poorly defined and can lead to poor decisions
- Self impose a population variance of 10 per cent from the average riding for 83 of 87 ridings
- Advances in internet connectivity and availability of government services online make rural ridings easier to serve
- Add one contiguous urban seat to both Fort McMurray and Grande Prairie. Make the second seat
 in both of those cities a mix of urban and rural constituencies. Look to Medicine Hat as a
 successful example

- To ensure effective representation add one more seat to Calgary
- To ensure effective representation add one seat to Edmonton
- Merge and combine several under populated rural ridings in order to accomplish this
- We are submitting the last electoral map but will be submitting a revised version based on census data by Feb. 17, 2017.

The assertion that rural Alberta is 'over-represented' is simply false as their representation represents geographically vast areas, as well as diverse resources and populations.

<u>Introduction</u>: Thank you for the opportunity to present my views to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission. This is a valuable exercise for any Albertan that is interested in participating in the governance of the province. I have four main issues to discuss.

1. Transactions between MLAs and constituents

Many discussions, and certainly the presentations to these panels, focus on the problems that MLAs have in contacting or meeting with constituents. The panel has heard comments such as "....one heck of a car trip" ...takes hours to drive across" ".....how much area do you expect this guy to cover." Obviously presenters have shone the light on the work of MLAs and provincial representatives and the time required for them to travel and meet constituents to get their messages out. Most of the presenters holding this view were involved in the partisan political process.

I want the panel to use an additional and different viewpoint. Attention needs to be focused on the constituent as a part of this interaction, and the constituent's needs when access to the MLA is required.

There are several important aspects in this interaction, but communication is at the centre of this relationship. Several technological formats ease the handicap of distance for the MLA. These communication methods range from the telephone, video-conferences, television, and the internet. In addition there is the distribution of print materials, advertising mediums and the direct mail alternatives. In addition to, or instead of, the face-to-face meeting, there is a great range of possible communication formats for the MLA to choose.

But "good" communication is a two way street, so the communication from the constituent to the MLA is also paramount in this discussion. In simple terms, the above technological mediums are also available to the interested constituent; therefore there is not a huge impediment for the constituent, or the MLA, with regard to a preferred method for communicating with each other. This is particularly true at election time when constituent's

mailboxes and air waves are overflowing with information from prospective MLAs to constituents.

But there is a specific communication issue for the constituent, and this manifests itself particularly after the election. It would appear that responses to the constituent's concerns are often given a low priority and are characterized by features such as: continuing busy signals, long waits for responses, no returned calls, non-answers from administrative staff, rushed or curt responses, partisan comments and calls referring you to other personnel or agencies. Are the MLAs too busy to attend to the needs of constituents?

It would appear that distance, area and media formats are not really the issue that is hampering 'good' communication; it is the dimension of time. What is most needed is time for the MLA to receive and respond to the constituent's concerns in a quick and efficient manner. And the main variable that directly affects the MLA's available time is the number of citizens in a particular constituency. This assumes that other variables are somewhat similar in nature for all MLAs, and that they have equitable workloads. Let's make the 'listening and responding' part of their workload equitable, by having equitable numbers of constituents for each MLA.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Individual MLAs should not have more time, or less time, than other MLAs for tending to constituent's concerns; but equal time to communicate effectively with constituents. They need an similar number of constituents among all electoral divisions, so the workload is equitable amongst all 87 MLAs and the service is effective for all 4 million plus Albertans. Access to an MLA will then be equitable for all Alberta constituents.

2. Variances (Plus/minus 25% and -50%)

The variances from the provincial average are probably the most difficult consideration that characterizes these hearings. Listening to the presenters will verify this observation. It appears that the variance of 25% has become a target - rather than a limit. Depending upon a presenter's bias it seems probable that citizens want their constituency to have a smaller population in order that their MLA have more time to devote to their concerns.

I implore the panel to keep 'zero variance' as an ideal target, as this is within the legislation. What is crucial to remember is that the variances were established as a limit. There is an implication that the ideal constituency size is close to the provincial average. Let's keep that as a goal. Granted, exact equal numbers may be difficult to achieve, but if you concentrate on the centre of the target, rather than the edges, one is most likely to hit the

bull's eye. I would like to use an axiom from the game of curling, which states "If you keep your eye on the broom, you are likely to hit it!" An allowable variance is no reason to lose sight of the target and overall goal of "effective representation."

Because "effective representation" is an abstract construct, I would like to illustrate how a variance can further deteriorate understanding of this concept by using several analogies that are rather concrete and vivid.

Imagine you enter a convenience store, near an electoral boundary, and want to buy a loaf of bread which was priced at one dollar. You submit your dollar and the clerk says that your dollar is only worth 75 cents (because of a constituency variance). Embarrassed, you dig into your pocket and find an extra 25 cents and claim your loaf of bread. You notice that another person is about to buy a loaf of bread. This second person also tenders a dollar, and the clerk says that his dollar is worth \$1.25 (because of a different constituency variance). Imagine how the first person feels when his extra 25 cents is handed over as change to the second person (all because of the variances).

Athletes would be puzzled if they entered a one kilometer race and were told that, based on the constituency they live in, they have to begin the race further back, one mile from the finish line. (I use this example because the ratio of kilometer to mile is almost exactly the ratio of a constituency with a 25% under-representation compared to a constituency with a 25% over-representation.)

It is patently unfair for our MLAs to legislate that the panel apply a variance of 25% plus/minus for constituencies; unless - the same legislators would also insist that all their votes in caucus be prorated according to the votes received in the last election. Would the MLAs also agree to prorate their voting at the assembly according to the number of people they represent at the constituency level? How likely is that to happen? Because a prorated vote by MLAs is unlikely to happen; the only alternative left for the panel is to determine the borders of electoral divisions in an equitable fashion so that there is no need for prorated voting by MLAs – end of problem.

There is a positive way for the panel to use the variances by modestly (+/- 5%) taking into account the potential increases or decreases of the constituency population, and attempt to be close to the target numbers on the day the election takes place. Being right at the moment is easy; being right in the distant future is more difficult and requires prophetic talent.

<u>Recommendation:</u> The present 25% plus/minus variance is a feature that compounds the difficulty of reaching 'equitable representation.' It stretches the fairness index and promotes further deterioration of democracy; and should be reduced. Only after a provincial average is determined and temporary boundaries have been "penciled in," should modest variances (5% plus/minus) be applied to anticipated increases and decreases in population numbers.

3. Engaging the young voter

My grave concern is that the process of setting electoral boundaries will affect the young voter's and the soon-to-be voter's participation rate. This group has many cynical views about the political world that adults have constructed. This is most evident when they use excuses for abstaining from voting by saying "my vote doesn't count for much," or an expression of defeat when they say "my vote does not count."

Using the figures from low voter turnouts at previous provincial elections as a guide, I expect that the 'young' voter's turnout are probably continuing. What are the reasons for this abstinence? What leads them to dropout from voting, arrange for vote swapping, or spoil their ballots?

It would be ludicrous to suggest that boundary divisions are the cause of teenage malaise; but it is not unreasonable to suggest that equitable boundary divisions may help to encourage the young voter by demonstrating that there is no built-in unfairness. Explaining the present inequities in electoral divisions to a teenager would be similar to trying to explain that his Slurpee is going to cost him 50 cents more, or less, than his friend's Slurpee; simply because they live in different constituencies.

<u>Recommendation:</u> The panel should keep the young voter's needs in mind when setting equitable electoral divisions in order to demonstrate the basis of "effective representation" as a vital part of the democratic process.

4. "Effective" Representation

During the presentations to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission panel, and also in the accompanying materials, many terms have been used to describe the features of the task at hand, namely dividing the province into electoral divisions for 'effective' representation. Some presenters have used "fair" and "reasonable" to describe the final outcome. The term "equal" has come up, although it has been countered that to make the

divisions equal is impractical at best and impossible at worst. I prefer to use the word "equitable", because it takes the hard edge off the word "equal" and suggests there was some accommodation.

The legislation introduces the section on 'Relevant Considerations' by citing the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. Then the legislation goes on to list several other considerations about the redistribution rules which may appear to be of equal weighting to the Charter reference. Some of these points appear to be countering the Charter, almost to the point that the proverbial "notwithstanding clause" floats into mind. The panel should review this section of the legislation to reinforce the tenet that the Charter criterion is the primary consideration and all other features are secondary in nature. Indeed, some accommodations appear to be actual hindrances or obstacles, perhaps making it impossible for the panel to achieve their objective of equitable electoral divisions which could meet the test of "effective representation." It would be prudent to have this protocol well developed and prioritized before application to specific boundary issues.

The exercise of adjusting electoral divisions has to endure two significant difficulties; namely, out-of-date statistics prior to the final report, and obsolete numbers once the report is published. This is the nature of the beast; and constituents need to accept numbers which were published in the commission materials e.g. provincial average of 48,884. Further population updates will clarify the overall population distribution picture and the trends therein. These statistics will be crucial because Alberta had substantial growth since the last redistribution and this growth was in the larger urban centres, and not in the rural areas. This recent trend further exacerbates the urban/rural split.

The second handicap for the final report of the panel is the lapsed time between submitting the final report and the call of the next election which could be between 2 and 3 years.

Although some of these issues are not within the panel's purview, they may be at the root of many dilemmas. The panel should outline these issues in their final report in order to establish an agenda for the next redistribution. In my opinion there are too many electoral divisions. It appears to me that the number of people that a city alderman or a federal MP represents should be similar to that of a provincial representative. The work is similar in nature although that the jurisdiction is different. Provincial representatives are just as capable to represent a similar size of constituency as a city alderman or a federal MP. On the flip-side, I don't want cities to double the number of aldermen or the federal government doubling the number of constituencies because they want to mirror the provincial sizes of electoral

divisions. Would we really notice if we had fewer MLAs? Probably not, but we certainly would notice if we have too many MLAs!

<u>Recommendation:</u> Extensive electoral reforms need to be undertaken to address the perceived democratic deficit with regard to electoral boundaries. The objective would be to increase the participation of Albertans and maintain or reduce the number of MLAs in the electoral process. More consultation and input from Albertans should be undertaken before legislation and guidelines are adopted for the establishment of equitable electoral boundaries

Postlude:

After writing this submission, I feel cautiously optimistic about your task at hand. I wish patience and understanding in your deliberations; and above all, wisdom in making your decisions. I await your report.

Official Submission by the PCAA to the Electoral Boundaries Commission 2017

On behalf of the Progressive Conservative Association of Alberta, I submit this recommendation for revised electoral boundaries.

Commonalities

Our first request is to account for commonalities in constituencies as much as possible. Constituencies in which populations are split apart in the roadways they use, schools they attend, and healthcare facilities they access limits the ability of the MLA to adequately gauge the need the constituency.

In general, however, this serves as an example of how the Electoral Boundaries Commission may seek to find commonalities among populations where possible, and that boundary lines be drawn along natural boundaries, including bodies of water, highways and other major arteries, and include shared schools and healthcare facilities. For example, Edmonton-Riverview, Edmonton-Southwest, Calgary-Fort and Chestermere-Rockyview, have disparate commonalities -- they cross natural boundaries like rivers and major roadways, while contorting around other communities with whom they share similar concerns or may have strong relationships with. Edmonton-Riverview, as we've noted here, spans communities that, while they inhabit the same city, may never interact with one another, in addition to spanning the North Saskatchewan River. The constituencies should follow a logical design and nomenclature that does not separate neighbours and is clear to its residents.

Ease of Participation and Access

Another piece of feedback we have received from PC members is that some of the existing rural constituencies are challenging to travel around, and thereby organize volunteers or convene with their elected representative.

In some northern and southern constituencies such as Peace River and Drumheller-Stettler, this distance is unavoidable, and to a certain degree, expected. In some areas, however, this is proving to be an onerous distance. A return trip of four to five hours to attend a meeting or town hall (which itself may be two hours) is untenable for many, and costly in terms of fuel resources. This lack of access can lead to Albertans being disconnected from the political process.

Some argument has been made to this Commission that the advent of new technology, particularly video conferencing, may be an acceptable substitute for direct access to elected officials. We cannot disagree with this sentiment more. Not only is reliable high-speed internet access still a major concern in many parts of this province, but it is not an acceptable substitute for interaction with either your elected representative or other citizens in your area. Many MLAs, across party lines, may attest to the impact that face-to-face meetings have had on their work.

While a number of rural MLAs accommodate distance by having multiple offices, constituency associations, volunteers and residents do not have the same resources. To encourage participation at the local level, we must address some of the barriers that prevent involvement.

Rural-Urban Constituencies

Our final recommendation to the Commission is with respect to the blending of rural and urban constituencies.

It has been customary in the recent past to preserve a stringent divide between urban and rural representation. This is a noble effort, and respects the autonomy of some communities, however it does not perhaps serve the interests of these communities in the long term. For instance, a rural community that is politically separated from its urban centre, yet relies on that urban centre as a major resource may find itself with no representation in a community that it nonetheless belongs to.

The practice of separating rural and urban constituencies has also resulted in entire constituencies being subsumed in another constituency. We believe that citizens and their concerns might be better represented if there was a stronger mix of urban-rural constituencies. For example, Red Deer North and Red Deer South are completely enveloped by the larger, rural constituency of Innisfail-Sylvan Lake. We believe that the people of Red Deer and the surrounding communities might be better served if they were three mixed ridings, since they share economic concerns. Shared commonalities may factor into how this mix is decided.

Conclusion

Thank you for your attention to this matter. The Progressive Conservative Association of Alberta respectfully submits to the Electoral Boundaries Commission this recommendation.

Good afternoon

We appreciate the opportunity to contribute to the discussion about Alberta provincial electoral boundaries. We have examined population data for each Alberta riding on your website comparing 2011 and estimates for 2016. As well, we have examined the 2015 provincial election results before making our comments.

The 25% variance either way is much too generous. Examining both 2011 and 2016 figures it is very obvious that the votes of some people are dramatically worth more than others For example, the vote of eligible voters in Dunvegan-Central-Peace-Notley (population 25,192) is worth three times more than the vote of eligible voters in Calgary-South East (population 79,034) using 2016 population estimates and assuming the percentage of eligible voters in each riding is roughly equal. This is clearly unacceptable and puts voters in the latter riding at a clear disadvantage.

We understand the variance in Saskatchewan is 5% either way, and other jurisdictions allow a variance of 10%. Using either of these solutions will clearly make the value of each vote more equal. Our personal preference would be 5%. If boundaries are to be adjusted every five years for example, at the end of the five years the variance for some ridings will likely be greater than the 5% as the 2011/2016 figures for Calgary-South East clearly indicate. As the population increases overall, and the trend to greater urbanization continues it may be deemed necessary to increase the number of ridings at some time in the future.

Traditionally rural or perhaps mixed rural/urban ridings have been disadvantaged, probably more the former, because population numbers have become lower over time. The practice has been to permit rural ridings to exist with fewer numbers than urban ridings as MLAs face difficulties reaching out to constituents. With available technologies this issue can more easily be overcome. In any event, the concept of ensuring one person, one vote with reasonable variance due to shifting populations, the representation in the Alberta Legislature becomes more democratic as the worth of each vote becomes more equal.

Examining the 2016 estimates indicates several instances of glaring inequality. However, in an overall sense using the 46,749 persons per riding average, it would appear that while adjustments are warranted in a number of cases the changes to be made may not be terribly dramatic in many cases using a 5% variance, and less so with a 10% variance. To assist MLAs in more sparsely populated ridings more resources could be allocated to allow them to be better able to connect with constituents. As all ridings become more equal in population perhaps resources can be reallocated to better serve this purpose.

It is clear that change is necessary. The 25% variance has to go as it is outdated and does not take into account the dramatic population changes we have experienced recently. Our personal view is that a 5% variance will best equalize the worth of each Alberta voter. As well, advances in technology will ameliorate the problem of MLAs being able to connect with constituents over long distances. Reallocation of certain resources may reduce the costs of this extra support. At some point perhaps the number of ridings may have to be increased due to population increase and continued migration to urban areas. The goal should be to better honour the concept of one person, one vote.





Hello,

It is an important aspect of democracy that all citizens' votes are treated equally. Under our current distribution of electoral districts, this is not the case. Allowing 25 percent variance in the population of districts means that some citizens are able to elect a representative with far fewer votes than others. The Electoral Boundary Commission should do away with the 25% variance and allow for no more than five percent variance in the population of electoral districts.

The argument has been put forward that physically large districts should be allowed a smaller population due to the difficulty of reaching all the constituents. This is true, if representatives were able to receive feedback only directly and in-person. With the technology available today, constituents have access to a variety of methods of providing feedback that don't require them to travel any distance (phone, email, twitter, facebook).

Albertans living in urban areas should not have less representation than those in rural areas, and nor should they have more. A more equal distribution of the population is a more equal distribution of democracy.

Some measure of aesthetics should also be applied to electoral districts. Looking at electoral districts, particularly in urban areas, it is difficult to tell where or why a district ends. Neighbourhoods that share schools, and community associations are, at times, split in half for no discernible reason. Where possible, neighbourhoods should be kept in the same electoral district. Electoral districts that look oddly shaped breed distrust: why were they shaped in such a way. Edmonton-Calder narrows and expands, trading blocks with neighbouring electoral districts; Calgary-MacKay-Nose Hill nearly surrounds Calgary-Northern Hills entirely. They look like they are gaming the system, whether or not this is true.

I appreciate your work and look forward to your report strengthening our democracy.

I own a small acreage in a country residential bedroom community commonly referred to as the Sturgeon Valley. Sturgeon Valley is not incorporated and is simply an residential area within the County of Sturgeon. There are approx. 1000 country residences and a population of 3000-4000 persons in Sturgeon Valley. The area is immediately North East of the city limits of St. Albert and North of the city limits of Edmonton. 

Why is "effective representation" for rural Albertans critical to the well being of all Albertans?

We have three types of industries that create GDP in Alberta:

- 1. Primary industries that drive the service industries. These industries include Oil & Gas, Mining, Forestry, Agriculture, Manufacturing and Tourism.
- 2. Service industries that are driven by the primary industries. These include Retail, Finance, Commerce, Transportation, Construction and Utilities.
- 3. Industries that are funded by provincial tax dollars. These include Health Care and Education.

If good stewardship is not exercised within the primary industries, the service industries will all suffer. If the primary industries and service industries suffer, there will be insufficent tax dollars to fund industries such as Health Care and Education. Therefore the management of resources within the primary industries affects ALL Albertans.

Dear Justice Bielby:

Thank you for the opportunity to speak before you at the St. Paul public hearing on January 23rd, 2017. On behalf of Lac La Biche County Council, I would like to clarify our position on two matters from my presentation, which are the equality that must exist between rural and urban constituencies, and the desired changes to the constituency that Lac La Biche County is currently in.

We believe that rural Alberta needs more political representation. Any changes that are made to the existing boundaries should create more rural constituencies, not less. Current provincial legislation allows for a +/-25% variance in population for a constituency when compared against the provincial average. We believe this variance should be used to its maximum potential when considering rural constituency boundaries.

Currently, the strictly urban ridings, such as those representing Airdrie, Calgary, Edmonton, Red Deer, Lethbridge, Sherwood Park, and a portion of St. Albert, have an estimated population of 2,689,163 and 52 seats. The remaining rural and semi rural constituencies have an estimated population of 1,563,716 and 35 seats. This equates to an average urban riding size of 51,715, which is 5.8% larger than the provincial average, and a rural riding size of 44,679, which is 9.4% smaller than the provincial average.

We propose that urban constituencies give up 4 seats so that there are 48 seats representing strictly urban constituencies, and 39 representing the rural and semi-rural areas. At the same population size estimates, this would result in an average urban riding size of 56,024, or 14.6% larger than the provincial average, and a rural riding size of 40,095, 21.9% smaller than the provincial average. This change would still allow the urban ridings and rural ridings to fall within the allowable population range. Though these population variances are larger, they are in place to account for other relevant considerations.

One consideration is the physical size of each constituency. Rural constituencies cover more geographical space, and the Member of the Legislative Assembly may be harder to meet or contact as a result. This is not as large of an issue in urban constituencies.

The other important consideration is the number of separate communities within a single rural constituency. By communities, we do not mean an ethnic group or a neighbourhood. By communities, we mean groups of people with shared economic, social and political interests in a given area. Although they may be smaller in population, a single rural constituency often contains many communities, each with separate schools, hospitals, and municipal political bodies. Residents in a rural area could be spread across several towns, each with its own infrastructure priorities, hospitals, and social organizations. It is difficult for a single Member of the Legislative Assembly to accurately represent all of these communities on a provincial scale.

Residents in an urban area could be within several square kilometers in a residential neighbourhood, all using the same roads, using the same grocery stores, and accessing the same schools. Although there are more people, they share similar community interests, and may in fact share similar community interests to the next group of 40,000 people several kilometers over.

We do not deny that multiple seats are needed or warranted in a city, and we acknowledge that population should, to a point, dictate representation in the legislature. However, we believe that one MLA can more effectively represent a given population in a condensed urban area. One MLA is less effective in representing the diverse interests of rural communities in a large area.

Present legislation allows for these population variances between ridings, which should continue to be respected to ensure sufficient representation for rural Albertan communities.

The other area of my presentation we would like to highlight are the changes we would like to see to the constituencies affecting Lac La Biche County. From 1989 to 1993, the provincial constituency that covered the majority of what is currently Lac La Biche County was known as Athabasca-Lac La Biche. As the name suggests, it also included the historical and present day Athabasca County.

We support redrawing the constituencies around Lac La Biche County to mirror the boundaries of the historical Athabasca-Lac La Biche constituency. This would include all of Lac La Biche County and Athabasca County. It also includes Janvier, Conklin, Calling Lake and Wabasca, the Kikino Metis Settlement and the Buffalo Lake Metis Settlement. These boundaries would better capture a shared political, social and economic identity than the current constituency does. The trading routes of this region are tied together through highways and other infrastructure.

We believe this constituency would meet the +/-25% population requirements. However, this constituency would also be eligible under section 2 of the *Electoral Boundary Commission Act* for a population that is as much 50% below the provincial average, as it would meet at least three of the criteria due to its geographical size, maximum populations of the towns, and the fact that it would contain Métis Settlements and Indian Reserves.

We do not support increasing the size or population of the existing Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills Constituency to include any of the above mentioned areas, as it would simply become too large. If redrawing the boundaries according to what we have proposed is not possible, we believe it would be best that the boundaries remain as is.

We appreciate the effort made by Commission to hear the opinions and perspectives of Albertans prior to making any decisions on this matter. We look forward to reading the interim report the Commission will be releasing.

Dear Madam Justice Bielby and Commission Members,

I live in the West Yellowhead constituency which presently consists of most of Yellowhead County, Jasper National and Willmore Wilderness Parks and a small area in the southernmost portion of Greenview County including the Town of Grande Cache. Your population estimate of 36,901 is 24% below the estimated provincial average.

I propose our revised constituency be named *Yellowhead* or alternatively, *Jasper – Yellowhead* and include within its boundaries all of Yellowhead County and Jasper National Park. Alternatively, the extreme south-eastern corner of Yellowhead County presently attached to the Drayton Valley – Devon constituency could logically remain with Drayton Valley, which is the trading center for its very few, if any permanent residents.

The major West Yellowhead boundary adjustments I propose would:

- ➤ Delete Grande Cache and the small area of Greenview County surrounding it from Yellowhead – thereby losing 2797 (2015) eligible voters to Grande Prairie – Wapiti, or its successor constituency to the north;
- ➤ Delete Willmore Wilderness Park which contains, to the best of my knowledge, no permanent residents and whose administrative center is Grande Cache;
- ✓ Add all that portion of Yellowhead County presently in the Whitecourt Ste. Anne constituency and circumscribed in general terms by the south boundary of Township 51, the Pembina River to the east, and an irregular line roughly halfway between Highways 16 and 43 to the north. This would add approximately 4470 (2015) eligible voters to Yellowhead.

These changes would **increase** the new Yellowhead constituency's number of registered voters, bringing it more into line with the provincial average.

Once the updated census numbers are available, my proposal may be further refined. Thank you for the opportunity to provide input to this process.



I believe that each constituency should have the same number of voters for the following reasons:

- 1.A fundamental principle of democracy is that each vote should equally affect the outcome of an election. The present electoral map, gerrymandered by the previous government significantly favors rural voters.
- 2. The argument that rural constituencies should be less populous to ensure "effective representation" is specious. An extremely small number of voters, rural or urban, take advantage of opportunities to meet their MLA's face to face. Communication using universally available technology is largely unaffected by sparsity or distance. Rural MLA's representing the same number of electors as urban MLA's should, however, have access to larger travel allowances and other supports to ensure equitable opportunities to communicate with constituents.
- 3. The longstanding trend of urbanization that shows no signs of abating ensures that over time the population of urban constituencies will grow at a much faster rate than that of rural constituencies. Since electoral boundaries are redrawn only once every ten years, it is important that all constituencies begin each new cycle with the same number of voters.

In addition to redrawing boundaries to achieve equity, I hope the review committee will recommend rule changes that will prevent future governments from manipulating the process for political advantage.

Thank you for the work you are doing reviewing existing boundaries and names for the 87 electoral constituencies for all of us in Alberta.

I write to you today on behalf of the Council of the Town of Sundre. It has come to our attention that Reeve Beattie of Mountain View County has made a presentation to you recommending Sundre be removed from our current riding of Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre, and added to the Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills riding.

Reeve Beattie made this recommendation without consultation with our Council and we have since had the opportunity to talk with him about his reasons for that recommendation.

Sundre Town Council does not agree there should be a change in electoral boundaries that would see Sundre removed from the current riding boundaries.

In fact, we strongly request the Commission keep the Sundre area in the current riding boundaries for the following reasons.

The current Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House- Sundre boundaries align more closely with "west country" Provincial issues than "QE 2" issues in the Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills riding. Issues of flood mitigation and threats of wildfire are more aligned with current boundaries and municipalities within those boundaries. Oil and gas industry issues are different in the "west country" than they are for the Highway 2 corridor. Forestry issues for municipalities and industry in the "west country" are much different than for those within the Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills riding. Agriculture is different in the "west country" than it is in the Highway 2 corridor. Tourism issues of access to the west country, education, management of recreational use in the west country, and environmental concerns are much different than the tourism issues faced on the Highway 2 corridor. Environmental issues, such as protection of source water in the headwaters of the Red Deer River Basin, are "west country" issues that our municipalities are familiar with. Highway 2 corridor municipalities have other environmental issues that concern their residents. Highway 27 through Sundre is a high load corridor in Alberta that has different transportation issues to attend to than the QE2.

For these reasons, and more, Sundre Town Council wants you to be sure you do not take Sundre out of the current electoral boundary of Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House- Sundre. The changes that have aligned us with other "west country" municipalities, are very good changes. As we continue to grow, it is vitally important to have MLA representation that can speak to "west country" issues, as well as Highway 2 corridor issues. The two current

ridings of Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre and Olds-Didsbury represent our rural region very well. To ask the Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills MLA to take on all of the "west country" issues listed above, and more that have not been listed, would be asking that MLA to take on a portfolio so vast that it would be a step backward. Two MLAs, dealing with all the legitimate provincial issues of resident concern, is best served with current electoral boundaries.

Please do not make changes in our electoral boundaries that will negatively affect the two MLA ridings that are representing us so well in the vast diversity of our rural region. Sundre Town Council supports enhancing the great rural balanced representation of the current Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre, and Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills ridings. We do not support going backwards to "the way we were" when Sundre was part of the Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills riding. We believe the current two MLA ridings provide an exceptional voice in the Legislature for all the varying issues of concern in our Mountain View County region.



Rocky Mountain House & District Chamber of Commerce respectfully requests the opportunity to comment on the provincial electoral boundaries. We appreciate and understand the importance of the various considerations the Commission needs to address with the electoral boundaries review process.

As its name would indicate, the existing boundaries of the *Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre* riding are extremely large, making it one of the larger constituencies in Alberta in terms of geographic area.

For one MLA to cover the entire *Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre* constituency is already challenging. Our MLA currently spends numerous hours on the road to attend many events and meetings in order to best represent all constituents and address areas of concern for the region. MLAs need to have the capacity to connect with their local constituents, at the local level.

If the Commission should consider amending or expanding the *Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre* electoral district, rural representation may be weakened or degraded completely. Combining more metropolitan areas with rural areas makes effectively representing all constituents an almost impossible task for elected officials. Maintaining a balance in the urban-rural split will help ensure that downgrading of rural Alberta citizen's perspectives and interests doesn't occur.

Rocky Chamber of Commerce has a very strong regional partnership with Clearwater County and Town of Rocky Mountain House. We advocate together for many community issues and projects. Although towns and villages are considered "urban", the towns and village within our existing electoral district have more in common with our rural municipality.

Our region's economy and Chamber members business, tends to flow mostly east-west, and follows the major transportation corridors including Highways 53, 12, 11 and 54.

Upholding the regional affiliation of the *Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre* electoral district is extremely important. - Should electoral boundaries for Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre be amended, the Chamber encourages the Commission to ensure a balance in the number of urban and rural residents within the district. If expanding boundaries for Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre, we suggest extending boundaries eastward to maintain Central Alberta relationships, using Highways 54, 12, 11 and 27.
- If amendments to the Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre electoral boundaries are required, that Clearwater County's municipal boundaries are not fractured and that Clearwater County, the Town of Rocky Mountain House and Village of Caroline remain within a single constituency.


When Alberta became a Province in 1905, Electoral Boundaries were set up. At that time the rural population of the Province was predominately larger than the urban areas. Therefore the rural Electoral Ridings were in the majority. However, beginning in the 1930,s the rural population began a shift to urban areas. Thus decreasing the populations in the rural ridings. As people moved into urban areas these ridings increased greatly in population

Over about a century now there have only been cosmetic changes to rectify the over populations in the urban ridings and maintain the under populations in the rural ridings. Equal representation has not been equal for the residents in the urban ridings. There is an underlying reason for this. Past parties in power have counted on there being more rural ridings than urban ridings. These parties power base has been in the rural areas and needed these ridings to win an election. So they had no incentive but to make cosmetic changes to the Electoral Boundaries in Alberta.

So what do we do about this. The answer is to reduce the number of rural ridings and increase the number of urban ridings to produce as best as possible equal numbers in all ridings. I suggest we hub the riding boundaries out from the urban areas much more than is now in place. This will make ridings in a lot of cases consist of a greater mix of urban/rural constituents. However there are perhaps a couple of very large rural ridings now that perhaps should just be left alone.

I would like to see the above changes while not creating a large abundance of new ridings. As the creation of an abundance of new MLA's from new ridings is going to be costly money wise to the Province.

As Alberta's second-largest city, Edmonton welcomes people from across Canada and around the world. City of Edmonton censuses and Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission estimates confirm that Edmonton's population has increased by over 125,000 over the last eight years. The recent release of federal census numbers confirm that Edmonton continues to grow and is a magnet for in-migration. Projections predict continued population growth over the next decade.

The City of Edmonton hereby requests that the Commission redraw provincial electoral division boundaries to provide for 20 electoral districts within city limits. In advance of the Commission creating an interim report, Edmonton City Council has provided the following directions to the Mayor:

- 1. That Edmonton's current 19 electoral districts remain fully within city boundaries
- That the Commission add a new electoral district in south Edmonton that includes the proposed annexation lands (map attached) currently part of the Leduc-Beaumont electoral district
- That Edmonton's new 20th electoral district results in each district having representative populations consistent with the Commission's recommended median population of 48,884.

In the 2009-10 Provincial Boundary review, although the City of Edmonton requested two additional electoral districts, we received only one. The population at that time warranted the establishment of 20 electoral districts and, in light of continued population growth, this letter continues that ask.



As the third largest city in Alberta, Red Deer has two electoral divisions that represent the citizens of our community. We understand that in accordance with legislation, the population of electoral divisions must fall within a variance of 25% from the average constituency population (48,800). Red Deer's comparative population data is shown below:

As can be seen, both divisions fall within the allowable variance.

The primary purpose of electoral representation is to ensure that the interests and voice of a community and its citizens are clearly articulated to Government. As a large regional urban centre, our interests and challenges are often distinct from that of the surrounding rural municipalities and we strongly believe that our citizens and our community are best served when the electoral ridings remain within the boundaries of our city.

Our recommendation is that the electoral boundaries for Red Deer remain unchanged at this time. If there is a need to redistribute population, that could be done within the two current electoral ridings. Otherwise, it is the perspective of The City that the interests of our citizens are best served by the current boundaries.

SUBMISSION TO THE ELECTORAL BOUNDARIES COMMISSION

The Seniors' Action and Liaison Team (SALT) was founded more than twenty years ago, by a group of individuals with a shared interest in promoting a civil society. We welcome this opportunity to comment on one of the essential elements of a civil society – the setting of electoral boundaries. Our comments will focus on two aspects of the issue: the MLA as community representative; and the MLA as individual advocate. If any of our suggestions are outside the Commission's mandate but are considered to have merit, we request that they be recommended to the Legislature for further discussion.

The MLA as Community Representative

We believe the primary function of any elected representative is to represent a constituency of people, subject only to considerations of the public interest and, nowadays, the dictates of partisan politics. This function cannot be delegated; only an elected representative may sit and speak in the Legislature. Considerations of equity require that each representative speak for the same number of people – in other words, the variance across constituencies should be as small as possible (ideally zero), with geographic area a secondary consideration. If this is the only consideration, the only requirement is that everyone have convenient access to a ballot box. Also, the work of our elected representatives would be less onerous if their constituencies consisted of people with a shared sense of community.

The MLA as Individual Advocate

In contrast to the previous section, this function can be delegated and is highly dependent on the geographic size of the constituency. It is also the more visible of the two functions, which perhaps explains why the relative sizes of urban and rural constituencies is a frequent topic of debate. We acknowledge the inherent difficulty of providing effective and efficient service to a large geographic area, but note that it is a problem that can be alleviated by allocation of sufficient resources. As well, we do not intend to minimise the different problems involved in serving increasingly diverse urban populations, or those where the incumbent is a member of the Cabinet and has significant additional duties. There are valid arguments to be made, that additional resources should be provided in all these cases.

The past century witnessed enormous changes in how (and how quickly) we travel, and several revolutions in communications technology. Despite this, we suspect that the character of the urban/rural debate has not changed significantly. Perhaps it is time for a careful examination of the extent to which electronic communication can replace face-to-face communication in the work of our elected representatives.

A final comment: we are disappointed that the Commission's public hearings did not attract more participation. Perhaps one of your recommendations to the Legislature could be a request that future Commissions be given the resources to be more proactive, by seeking input from community leagues and similar organizations, for example.

RE: ELECTORAL BOUNDARIES SUBMISSION

Northern Sunrise County Council has discussed the review that is being undertaken by the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission over the next six to eight months and would like to provide the following information as the County's submission.

We recognize that the function of the Commission is to review the existing electoral boundaries and to make recommendations as to the area, boundaries, and names of the electoral constituencies within the Province of Alberta.

The 2010 Alberta Electoral Boundary Commission's report outlined the principles of effective representation including: relative parity of voting power, the tradition in Canada of "effective representation", not absolute parity as in the United States, recognition that the process of achieving effective representation may involve altering the political power of some votes, but not unduly and not without reason, and the balancing of these interests which involves an examination of social history, geography, and demography of communities.

Northern Sunrise County continues to support these principles in the current Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission review.

We would like to ensure that the current boundaries of the Peace River region remain as it currently is at this time, as we are approximately only 15% less than the predicted average population of 48,884. Upon reviewing the estimated 2016 population, the Peace River riding will be at 41,492; our riding will fall below the average population; however, our riding is one of the largest geographic ones in the Province and serve mostly rural and small urban locations. As it is now, our current MLA has established two offices in an effort to afford easier access to all of her constituents within the riding.

The County is also very adamant that the rural communities and the residents we serve and have a concern that there is a possibility of reducing the number of rural seats and by extension, a reduction in the ability of Alberta's legislature to effectively represent the interests of rural Albertans and rural communities. Decreasing the number of rural ridings in an effort to increase the number of seats in a higher populated area will take away the voice of the rural communities. This is an unfair advantage to the people who live in our riding.
