Introduction

This submission has been put together by a handful of Albertans through volunteer efforts that has created a "notional" analysis of the available data, creation of prepared boundaries, and predictions. Our group does not have the resources of the Boundary Commission or the Government of Alberta, and it is not our intent to compete with those vast resources, or in fact be 100% accurate in our submission. Rather, we are attempting to demonstrate outcomes and strategies that could (in our opinion should) be followed to create EFFECTIVE representation for Albertans. In order to assuage 'political" interests we masked the 2015 election results on a pol by poll basis (where possible) and show the a virtual election resulted based on that 2015 election on the basis of the boundaries shown in each option.

Summary

Alberta has experienced significant population growth since 2010. According to the latest census, Alberta is the fastest growing province in Canada (more than 11% population growth from 2011 to 2016). Migration from other Canadian provinces, new immigrants and new refugees can easily be identified as contributing to this rapid growth. The call for submissions regarding the review of existing constituency boundaries is very timely.

In Alberta, electoral boundaries for representation in the legislature are not to be primarily driven by population. Rather representation is supposed to be determined by other influences such as national and provincial borders, natural boundaries, municipal boundaries, effective representation and input of Albertans, all the while considering the relative population density throughout the Province of Alberta along with any other factor the Commission may wish to consider.

These considerations provide the opportunity to address the geographic concentration of Albertans along the QEII and HWY 3, increasing rural and large city disparity of needs and common community interests, all in an effort to provide effective representation in the legislature, which does not mean equal representation by population.

Through analysis and extrapolation of the 2011 census data three options for consideration of boundary establishment are offered:

- 1. Maintain Strictly the existing boundaries
- 2. Metro Areas (Large Cities) Equalized Representation
- 3. Municipal Boundaries & Charter Cities

Provided are highlights, method and some pros cons of these options. As this is a volunteer developed submission it is purposely lean on written discussion and is intended to provoke considerations and solutions that the Commission may have not yet developed. A previous online submission was completed and then a pause was made to submitting this document and supporting maps in anticipation of the release of new census data. However, due to the unavailability of recent population numbers at a sufficiently granular level in the recently released data, we reverted to the detailed 2011 population.

The arithmetic to establish the average population of the ED's can become gymnastic when a blending of municipal and federal census data is used to achieve the overall population to be divided among 87 electoral districts. Usually, the large cities claim to have the most current and accurate information. While this may well be the case, using these populations will impact the average, but also the deviation from the average on a percentage basis (+/- 25%, and 4 at up to 50%). The point being, that the ranges of deviation allowed by the commission per electoral division may be different dependent upon the total population selected by the commission. It should also serve to illustrate that the population calculation and the resultant average should not be the final determinant of a boundary. The Commission may wish to seek dispensation from this requirement should the other considerations far outweigh the population equation in establishing EFFECTIVE REPRESENTATION especially in the sparsely populated east, north and southwest areas.

NOTES:

Current population number should be considered for the appropriateness of proposed boundaries in option 2 and 3. At the end of this document, population numbers for each constituency are provided for option 1, 2 and 3.

Provision of the Topological digital files (GIS – shapefiles) can be discussed.

Context

Alberta has changed in population and its demographics - again. The disparity and travel times and communication issues of representing such a vast province are not new. From its formation in 1905 forward, Alberta has created solutions that accommodate the needs of the day. The connectivity of Albertans has however changed immensely in the past decade as a result of improved highway networks, footprint of the internet, and capability of smart phones and social media. Presently, elected officials routinely struggle to identify the representative or proportionate population value and hierarchy of a personal visit, a phone call, a traditional letter, an email or a tweet. Living 150km from the legislature may not mean as much in 2017 as years past. Certainly the EBC must have like struggles given the array of inputs.

Federal Governments over the past 30 years or more have created grants for municipalities that need be accessed through the provinces. This can and has caused competing municipalities grief and frustration when attempting to garner the support of their MLA when boundaries include large urban, small urban, and rural – the lack of common interest is evident.

Populations have densified in the Capital Region, Calgary, the Highway 2 corridor and other cities. Challenges in delivery of services at the municipal level have started discussions ranging from eliminating Summer Villages to granting City Charters, from pooling and redistributing linear tax revenue to performing viability studies on municipalities. This long standing and significant focus on the municipalities, and the Legislative Assemblies impact on them, is likely the rationale behind making electoral boundaries contiguous with Municipal boundaries whenever possible.

Currently the Municipal Government Act contemplates Calgary and Edmonton being granted City Charters in June 2017. This will give them powers beyond the rest of the municipalities. The Charter Cities will be able to make decisions normally reserved for the Legislature. Does that provide the Charter Cities disproportionate representation in the context of EFFECTIVE representation for the "Rest of Alberta"?

The MGA also sets out the need for CFA's or Collaboration Framework Agreements among rural and urban municipalities to be in place very soon. Many Regional Services Commissions are in place throughout the Province to provide services ranging from emergency management to solid waste, airports to water- and all use the municipal boundary to identify the area the commissions operate. Similarly the CFA's identify municipal boundaries, then collaboration.

There are likely many other compelling examples that demonstrate the municipal boundary (including Metis and First Nations boundaries) prominence in identification to the public where

the delivery of services to Albertans and common interests emanate from (such as; ag services board, intermunicipal development plans, recreation associations, seniors foundations, to name a few). Current electoral boundaries in many cases are not an example of prominence of municipal boundaries regarding "common interests".

We feel the boundaries should be clear and remain so that they should change only when it is demonstrably evident that the boundaries NO LONGER provide EFFECTIVE representation. It seems that there has been a presumption by many previous boundary commissions that population change insists that boundaries are no longer EFFECTIVE and must be changed. Perhaps the previous commissions should have measured the then existing boundaries against the mandate below and only if the MUST factors in the first consideration were not met would they then consider the SHOULD regarding population in the second consideration.

For reference; follows is an excerpt from the abebc.ca website regarding the mandate – which does not necessarily mean interpret the regulations soleysolely

"Considerations

The Commission must take the following factors into consideration in making their recommendations to the Legislative Assembly of Alberta:

- the requirement for effective representation as guaranteed by the *Canadian Charter* of *Rights and Freedoms*,
- sparsity and density of population,
- common community interests and community organizations, including those of Indian reserves and Métis settlements,
- wherever possible, the existing community boundaries within the cities of Edmonton and Calgary,
- wherever possible, the existing municipal boundaries,
- the number of municipalities and other local authorities,
- geographical features, including existing road systems,
- the desirability of understandable and clear boundaries, and
- any other factors the Commission considers appropriate.

The population of a proposed electoral constituency should not vary more than 25% from the provincial average, except in a few special cases."

Follows are three options that could be considered frameworks or strategies for further analysis by the commission.

1. Option 1 - Maintain Strictly the existing boundaries

Highlights:

- 1. We analyzed the population numbers and the implications if we do not change existing boundaries
- 2. Current boundaries are shown in Figure 1a and 1b

Pros:

- 1. No effort/resources to change boundaries
- 2. Albertans won't have to experience changed constituencies during election
- 3. Common Interest may germinate within a recurring boundary

Cons:

- 1. No reflection of change in population
- 2. No reflection of change in municipal boundaries
- 3. Many constituencies cross multiple municipalities
- 4. No analysis of effective representation
- 5. No consideration / reflection of common community interest

Option 2 – Metro Areas (Large Cities) Equalized Representation

Highlights:

- 1. Changes in City of Edmonton from existing 20 EDs to proposed 17 (Figure 2a)
- 2. Changes in City of Calgary from existing 25 EDs to proposed 17 (Figure 2b)
- 3. Remaining 7577 electoral districts remain as much as possible
- 4. Metro area needs do not normally change over geographic area of ED's or distances and the "common community interests" are generally congruent with wards and city limits
- 5. City Council members via ward system represent many more Albertans than MLA's and deem that as effective representation at the municipal level. That supports rationale for fewer ED's in Cities
- 6. Community, wards, and natural boundaries are used to create new constituencies
- 7. Changes in St. Albert, City of Airdrie and City of Medicine Hat constituencies to accommodate changes in municipal boundaries due to annexations (Figure 2c)

Cons:

- 1. More effort/resources to change boundaries
- 2. Albertans won't have same constituencies in next election
- 3. Some constituencies may have population in the range of 60-70k but those constituencies are fairly stable and won't experience high influx of people over time they are built
- 4. Cities may not like the idea of fewer constituencies

Pros:

- 1. Reflect municipally boundary changes
- 2. Balanced approach in two metro areas (Edmonton & Calgary)
- 3. Common community interest
- 4. Fairer representation with respect to wards
- 5. Fewer Constituencies reduce 87 by 12 to 75 total

Option 3 - Municipal Boundaries & Charter Cities

Highlights:

- 1. Total number of constituencies remain same (87)
- 2. Changes in City of Edmonton from existing 20 EDs to proposed 18 (Figure 3a)
- 3. Changes in City of Calgary from existing 25 EDs to proposed 19 (Figure 3b)
- 4. Metro area needs do not normally change over geographic area of ED's or distances and the "common community interests" are generally congruent with wards and city limits
- 5. City Council members via ward system represent many more Albertans than MLA's and deem that as effective representation at the municipal level. That supports rationale for fewer ED's in Cities
- 6. Rural constituencies cover large areas including many small town, villages, hamlets
- Cutting down 8 constituencies from Edmonton & Calgary and adding in other parts of AB
- 8. Population of Calgary and Edmonton removed from Rest of Alberta total and average population is calculated as Rest of Alberta divided by 50 remaining ED's to create 87 total. This increases opportunity to consolidate 'common interest" and reduce geographic foot print of vast ED's
- 9. One constituency for Airdrie is proposed
- 10. One constituency for Leduc is proposed
- 11. One constituency for Stony Plain and Spruce Groove (combined) is proposed
- 12. Three constituencies for City of Red Deer instead of two
- 13. Chiefly municipal boundaries are used as a first rule rural so that each municipality belongs to one constituency only where possible and no crossover from Charter Cities to Rest of Alberta
- 14. Attempts to reflect common interests of Highway 2 corridor municipalities by consolidating around corridor.
- 15. At few places, one municipality is divided into more than one constituency to accommodate large number of population using natural boundaries (river, highway)
- 16. Changes in St. Albert, City of Airdrie and City of Medicine Hat constituencies to accommodate changes in municipal boundaries
- 17. Option 3 proposed boundaries in relation to 2010 boundaries are shown in (figure 3c)

Cons:

1. More effort/resources to change boundaries

- 2. Albertans won't have same constituencies in next election
- 3. Some constituencies may have population in the range of 60s-70sk but those constituencies are fairly stable and won't experience high influx of people over time
- 4. Cities may not like the idea of fewer constituencies

Pros:

- 1. Reflect municipal boundary changes
- 2. Balanced approach across AB
- 3. Re- Alignment with municipal boundaries
- 4. Increased representation of Rural Alberta to off-set City Charters
- 5. Common community interest
- 6. Defined representation of growing areas (Airdrie, Stony Plain & Spruce Grove, Leduc)





I can also check Alberta Municipal data and assign 2015/16 population number to cities/towns (it won't be available at lower level such as polling stations).
I think this would be all we need to start reconstructing EDs or to create new ones. I would need you to sit with me and sometime next week so that we can draft changes to meet the deadline of Feb 08. We can move polling stations from one ED to other (if makes sense) by keeping in limits of the minimum maximum population criteria. I can come to wednesday or Friday next week or if you are in I can meet any other day as well.

In the meantime, if there is any other data that you think will be helpful in reshaping EDs, let us know and we'll try to get it.



I called Election AB to get 2015 results shapefile by polling stations and the GIS guy (I guess same we spoke many years ago) told me he didn't have it for a number of reasons: 1. the results were combined for some polling stations; 2. some polling stations divided into A & B & C; 3. many polling stations have mobile and special ballots which can't be represented by polling station shapefile.

kindly cleaned data for me for 1 & 2. We can't do anything for number 3 except keeping them out of the analysis / mapping. I also had to do some cleanup on my side to match GIS file with excel results file and also to combine polling stations where election AB reported combined results. It is interesting the many Polling Station that were combined are not contiguous (ED5- Poll# 54-65 & 57-66), (ED18-Poll#46 & 59, 60 & 70), (ED25- Poll# 67 & 115), ED 27- Poll# 52 & 72), ED 28 - Poll # 56&59), (ED 31 - Poll # 14&16, 23&53), ED38 - Poll# 62 & 63), (Ed 63 - Poll#54 & 63, 72 & 76), (ED 64 - Poll# 3 & 5, Poll# 26 & 27, Poll# 28, 29, 30, Poll # 53 & 87, Poll # 79 & 85), (ED 68 - Poll # 5 & 21), (Ed 77, Poll # 24 & 37, Poll # 62 & 68), (ED 82, Poll # 21 & 39, Poll # 71 & 76). 



The proposed boundaries for Millwoods West/East, Ellerslie and Edmonton-East do not reflect the character of the neighbourhoods. The little arm going south between 17th street and the Henday should NOT be a part of Edmonton East, and is nothing like the rest of the proposed Edmonton-East area. Instead, it would make more logical sense to move the North-South boundary between Millwoods West and East further east to allow Millwoods East to go right to the Anthony Henday.

Likewise, the section of Edmonton Ellerslie that juts into both Millwoods East and West should be reduced instead.

That said, it is a good decision to move the area north of the Whitemud to Edmonton-East.

There should still be an additional constituency (or even two) in south Edmonton, but I believe the constituencies in south Edmonton in general could be at or slightly lower than the current average population in order to accommodate expected high rates of growth over the next 5-10 years.

Given that some of the proposed populations of the rural ridings (e.g. in NE Alberta, Central AB, etc) are still substantially below the average, I don't think this is a problem.



I had the opportunity to review the revised boundary recommendations for Airdrie. At first I was a little surprised of the City split (vs. Highway 2). With more time to review and reflect, I feel it is a reasonable recommendation. I support how your vision improves the boundaries of the old Banff-Cochrane and Chestemere-Rocky View ED's. It will be unique to have 2 MLA's representing Airdrie, but the current numbers (per the Act) support this requirement. A different discussion at another time would be re-evaluate these numeric guidelines prescribed in the Act.

Their may be some confusion for the NW Airdrie residents, but there is no reason this can't be managed with good communication prior to the next election. The decision will also be enabled by the Airdrie-Cochrane Returning Office ensuring a polling place is set-up in NW Airdrie for these electors; and, to include those rural west of Airdrie electors who consider Airdrie the place they receive services and conduct business.

One minor suggestion would be to consider adding Sharp Hill residents (SE Airdrie) into the Airdrie ED47. They are connected by Sharp Hill Way, and can see their city neighbors by looking over their fences. I only bring this up based on the number of concerns I received, in particular for advanced polls. These residents didn't have a convenient location assigned for this purpose. However, this has been managed this way over the last 2 elections, so it should not be a high priority issue.

The Electoral Boundaries Commission should to be highly cognizant of the symbiotic relationship that exists between rural and urban (populations over 10000) Alberta communities. While rural Albertans account for 11% of the population, only 7% of the seats are what could be considered truly rural. The rural over representation is a myth. Urban communities needs either come from or flow through rural Alberta. Conversely, goods and services in rural areas are self provided, come from small towns or urban communities. For example, urban utilities are provided for a connection fee, rural pay for the entire connection. Urban areas have garbage and curbside recycling, we wait for a truck load to take to the landfill or recycle depots. It is clear that many people in urban areas have lost this mutually beneficial connection and understand very little about food production and rural life. The only way that mutual understanding can occur is for rural voices to be clearly heard and proportionally represented. The previous pairing of rural areas with urban areas overshadowed the rural voice, but made constituencies manageable. There are far too many Albertans (birth -70) who have never left their urban surroundings to learn about rural life. Universal programs that may suit an urban setting simply won't work or work in the same form because of the nature of these differences. Leave the rural constituencies as they are and add to support population growth in urban areas.

Seek first to understand. Unify rather than divide.

As a lifelong Albertan, I have never felt more disenfranchised as now. It feels like rural is under attack from urban.

In reviewing the Interim Report of the Electoral Boundaries Commission, there were several key indicators throughout the document that demonstrated the incredibly hard work of the commission in creating these new boundaries; yet, there were also several key indicators that showed where the commission had fallen short in completing their task.

Looking first at the census data and the city demographic blocks for Edmonton and Calgary, the final shapefiles and maps provided as part of this consultation by the commission, and by following the process order set out by the commission, it became increasingly clear that the commission needed to come full circle – and had not yet done so.

Specifically, while the city of Edmonton is admirably balanced (per page 65), and shows for the highest respect toward the commission's mandate; given the way that the rest of the province was divided, this parity in Edmonton is disparate to the norm.

Understanding that the changes follow the population numbers, logical communities, etc. – why does Edmonton not subdivide like Calgary?

Notably, where the population variances in Calgary are higher in established, central communities - areas that will not experience high growth; and, where variances are lower in areas that will experience growth in the next decade - hedging room for new growth; why would Edmonton not be divided similarly? By putting more population into established areas in Edmonton, and leaving growth areas room for their impending change, throughout the course of these boundaries, there will be much better vote parity going forward.

Conclusively, it will also create a better balance between the urban centres.

It will be a disservice to the residents in and around Grimshaw to be moved into the Peace River constituency.

Grimshaw is the major centre for schools, medical and long term care services, Seniors lodge, farm fuel outlets, grocery shopping, and recreation for both the town people and rural families, especially since construction of the MultiPlex complex with school and sport activities combined.

The overall population of the riding seems to be reduced by the shifting of this one town into the neighboring constituency. Taking away the population at this end of the constituency and replacing it with the Beaverlodge/Hythe/Wemblay area is not logical - there is very little commonality between those communities close to Grande Prairie, and our region of Grimshaw and surrounding rural area. It would be more effective to keep the northern boundary of the MD of Peace and leave Grimshaw in the Dunvegan Notley constituency.

Our MLA has a large territory to service already with the Falher/Girouxville segment so adding the new southwest portion will take more travel time, compared to serving Grimshaw area once he/she is already serves in the Berwyn neighborhood. It may be necessary to add another MLA Office in Beaverlodge just to serve the new group that is being added.

The restructuring is decreasing the constituency population by about the equivalent of the Town of Grimshaw - it would be best to leave Grimshaw in the present count in DCPN.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on your interim report.

In its report, the Commission recommended modest changes to the east boundaries of Edmonton-Strathcona, following which the population in the constituency would be 1% below the provincial average.

I would ask the Commission to consider adding another 3.5 blocks to Edmonton-Strathcona, namely the area bounded by 111 Street and 110 Street, and 87 Avenue and Saskatchewan Drive. The abutting blocks to the east and south of these boundaries are entirely within the Edmonton-Strathcona constituency; to the west of this area is the University campus, which is in the Riverview constituency.

The blocks in question formed part of the Garneau neighbourhood until their annexation by the University. They include a mix of housing styles, and the area remains residential in style (rather than institutional).

While the homes and apartments on these blocks are the property of the University, the area remains historically and presently linked to the Garneau neighbourhood, and the residents have a strong relationship to the surrounding community.

If these blocks remain in the Edmonton-Riverview constituency, they will be islanded on the east side of campus, away from the bulk of the Riverview constituency's residents. Their incorporation into Edmonton-Strathcona would better reflect factors such as community boundaries, community interests, having understandable and clear boundaries, and a general preference for contiguously-defined constituencies.

It is possible that these residential blocks entered the Riverview constituency because of their ownership by the University. If so, I would discourage the Commission from treating ownership as a determinative factor, particularly since the University now owns substantial residential real estate within the Garneau neighbourhood, some of which is operated on long-term leases. These apartment blocks remain within the Edmonton-Strathcona constituency, as they should – because the daily life of those residents is linked to the Garneau and Strathcona communities. I respectfully suggest that it makes sense for the rest of the residential community north of 87 Avenue to be included in the Strathcona constituency as well.

- 1. Two municipalities are split in two, actually contrary to the Boundary Commission's guidelines. This creates added work for municipalities as they deal with government. Why not put all of one municipality in one constituency and all the other in the other constituency.
- 2. Distance is a huge issue in the constituency under the present boundaries let alone the proposed new boundaries. It is a three and one half hour drive from one corner of the proposed new constituency to the other so a return trip means a full day's drive not including meeting times.
- 3. Unreasonable work load. There are at present five school boards in the old constituency, eight hospitals and between villages, towns and municipalities another 15 20 groups to meet with. Thank you for the recent notification of the error in the printed Interim Report of the Electoral Boundaries Commission. I would like to provide the Commission with information relating to additional errors in the Interim Report.

In the section "Recommendations for Boundary Changes", on page 54 under "Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul" the following is stated:

Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul would capture the area east of the eastern border of the electoral division of Sherwood

Park, including the entirety of the area around the town of Tofield (currently split between two electoral divisions).

It would follow the path of the Yellowhead Trail, a major highway, between Sherwood Park and the border.

The southwest boundary would be extended further southwest into the Battle River-Wainwright constituency.

It would gain New Sarepta (from Leduc-Beaumont), a community with similar interests to others within the electoral

division, found along Highway 21 south, all as shown on Map 61.

Most of this description is incorrect. The eastern border of the proposed constituency of Sherwood Park borders on Fort-Saskathcewan-St. Paul, but only north of Highway 16. South of Highway 16, and for the majority of its eastern border, it borders on the proposed constituency of Strathcona-Sherwood Park. The area around the town of Tofield would be split between the proposed constituencies of Stettler-Wainwright and Vermilion-Lloydminster. The next sentence, which states that it would follow the path of the Yellowhead Trail "between Sherwood Park and the border" is also not consistent with Map 61. The proposed boundary follows Highway 16 only as far as the point between Mundare and Vegreville where Highway 16 angles to the south. The southwest boundary does not extend further southwest into the Battle River-Wainwright constituency; on the contrary, the southwest boundary would move considerably northward by the proposed expansion of the Vermilion-Lloydminster constituency. Finally, the last sentence describing the gain of New Sarepta is also incorrect. Note that, on page 61, under "Stettler-Wainwright", the following is stated:

The new constituency will add New Sarepta, from Leduc-Beaumont, a community which is similar to

other communities

within the electoral division located along Highway 21 South (e.g., Hay Lakes).

Examination of Maps 61 and 82 clearly show the area in question around New Sarepta is to be included in the proposed Stettler-Wainwright constituency and not in the proposed Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul constituency.

In the interest of accuracy and also to alleviate concerns expressed by residents in the affected areas, I would encourage the Commission to issue a second correction to the Interim Report.

To the Members of the Electoral Boundaries Commission:

I would like to begin by thanking the members of the Commission for their service. The drawing of electoral boundaries is a particularly challenging task, given the number of sometimes conflicting considerations that must be balanced as best as possible. Your assignment was made all the more challenging given the mandate requiring that no additional constituencies could be created. It is my view that this restriction was a fundamental error and is the root cause for many of the issues identified since the release of the Interim Report. However, given the set number of 87 constituencies, and the disproportionate growth of population in urban/suburban centers, some very difficult decisions had to be made.

That said, I must take issue with a number of the recommendations of the Commission, both in general terms affecting the electoral map of the entire province, and the changes proposed for the constituency that I am currently privileged to represent, Vermilion-Lloydminster. As I have served the constituents of Vermilion-Lloydminster as their MLA since 2012, and been involved in provincial politics in Alberta since the mid-1970s, I hope you find my observations helpful.

Province-wide considerations:

1. Over-emphasis of numerical equality of voters between constituencies--The Electoral Boundaries Commission is asked to weigh a number of considerations in proposing boundaries. Numerical equality of population between constituencies (also referred to as "voter parity") is an important consideration, but it cannot be the overriding goal of the Commission to the detriment of other important considerations. Dozens of presenters clearly articulated the challenges of representing large rural constituencies. There is simply no comparison between representing a densely populated urban constituency in Edmonton (where the MLA can attend events and meet with constituents every day, even when the Legislature is in Session) and a rural MLA who must drive several hours just to travel to and from their constituency to the Legislature. Rural MLAs must interact with and advocate on behalf of multiple municipalities, school

boards, agricultural societies, and other citizen's groups. The in-person attendance of the MLA at high school graduations, college convocations, summer fairs, winter carnivals, fall suppers, Canada Day celebrations and Remembrance Day observances is expected as part of the MLA's job. The recommendations of the Commission to "assist in achieving effective representation" (Page 66 of the Interim Report) fall far short of what is required, both for effective representation by the MLA and (more importantly) for equitable access to the MLA for rural constituents. Many rural MLAs (myself included) already staff two constituency offices. More money for more staff and more offices is helpful but nothing replaces face to face contact with the MLA. This contact does not always occur in the office, in many situations a site visit is required by the MLA. As a former veterinarian, I was trained to examine the situation with my own eyes, to ask questions on site, and arrive at a diagnosis thereafter. It is a pattern of service I have continued in my current role, and is appreciated by constituents.

- 2. Setting of boundaries in anticipation of future population growth or lack thereof—While I understand the Commission's desire to anticipate changes in Alberta's population, I am appalled the majority feels this is justification for creating huge rural constituencies with populations significantly over the provincial average. The statement that this variance can be justified because of an older than average population, and therefore lower than average population growth, is repeated several times in the text of the report. Albertans who live in proposed constituencies like Drumheller-Strathmore (+16% over population mean) or Drayton Valley-Rocky Mountain House (+17%) will have their provincial representatives cover huge areas AND represent the highest number of constituents in the province. How is this even remotely fair? These Albertans are being punished for: a) Choosing to live in a sparsely populated area of rural Alberta, b) Reproducing at a lower rate than the provincial average, and c) Being old. Is this really the message that the Commission wants to send people in these (and several other) rural constituencies?
- 3. Failing to honour long-standing "community interests and community organizations" (Section 14 (c) of the Electoral Boundaries Commission Act)—In speaking with Albertans since the Interim Report was released, I hear time and again that the proposed boundaries appear to have been drawn very arbitrarily, with no regard to well-established regional community relationships. There are numerous examples in the proposed boundaries where a major service centre is cut off from a large portion of its "trading area" by arbitrarily drawn boundaries. Examples include the towns of St. Paul, Stettler, Drayton Valley and Tofield. In other instances, smaller communities and rural residents are placed in constituencies where the bulk of the population is located in larger suburban centres that are hundreds of kilometers away and may have nothing in common with those residents. Examples of proposed constituencies where this is the case include Fort Saskatchewan-St.Paul and St. Albert-Redwater. It is anticipated that the Commission will hear a great deal from many Albertans who will be adversely affected by the proposed boundary changes, and it is hoped that the Commission gives careful consideration to these well-founded concerns.

4. Failing to use well-established municipal boundaries-Major shifts in electoral boundaries, as the Interim Report proposes, divides long established communities of voters and creates unnatural and unworkable new constituencies. Under Section 14 (e) of the Electoral Boundaries Commission Act, the Commission is to consider "whenever possible, the existing municipal boundaries". It is noted that there are several instances in the Interim Report where the Commission elected specifically to keep a County or Rural Municipality all in one constituency because of current or future intermunicipal cooperative projects within that County (e.g. County of Flagstaff, Page 61). These types of regional projects are common across the province and will become even more commonplace as a result of recent changes in the Municipal Government Act. Accordingly, I would urge the Commission to reconsider any boundaries that result in the fragmentation of Counties or Rural Municipalities. There is a very practical reason to do this—county boundaries are well established, and do not change every decade. Every rural resident knows exactly which county they reside in. Rural constituencies could be easily and clearly defined using county boundaries. The added benefit for the County would be to have only one MLA to work with rather than two or three or more in order to have their concerns heard at the provincial level.

In terms of specific recommendations regarding individual constituency boundaries, I will confine my comments to the proposed Vermilion-Lloydminster constituency.

- 1. It is duly noted that the population of the current constituency falls some 17% below the provincial average. Some adjustment to the boundary was anticipated; the only certainty was that the constituency would not expand to the east. In my view, the expansion of the constituency to the west, along Highway 16 to include the western half of the County of Minburn, makes sense. (Currently the County of Minburn is divided between the existing constituencies of Fort Saskatchewan-Vegreville and Vermilion-Lloydminster). Additionally, I can understand the rationale behind including most of Beaver County in this constituency, as noted in the text of the Interim Report, Beaver County is currently split into four provincial constituencies. That said, I am baffled by the decision to exclude the Town of Tofield and the associated Division 2 of Beaver County from the proposed constituency. I would recommend that the entirety of Beaver County, including all of the Town of Tofield, be included in the proposed constituency of Vermilion-Lloydminster.
- 2. In the northeastern corner of the proposed constituency, the Interim Report recommends setting Township Road 532 as the northern boundary in the northeastern corner of the constituency, rather than having the boundary follow the Vermilion River County line as it currently does. This proposed change has the Alberta portion of the Onion Lake First Nation, and the communities of Tulliby Lake, Lea Park, Dewberry and Clandonald severed from their long-established trading centres of Vermilion and Lloydminster. The relationship between the Onion Lake First Nation and the City of

Lloydminster is especially important and vital to preserve—these two communities have historically worked together on a wide range of issues including health, education, social services, culture and recreation. The linkage is especially appropriate because both Lloydminster and Onion Lake First Nation straddle the Alberta/Saskatchewan border and therefore both have dealings with the provincial governments in Edmonton and Regina. The other communities (Tulliby Lake, Lea Park, Dewberry and Clandonald) all interact primarily with either Lloydminster or Vermilion, and are all located within the County of Vermilion River, which has its county seat in the Village of Kitscoty. To arbitrarily use Township Road 532 (which is a simple dirt road, not a major highway or recognizable boundary) would shift these communities into a sprawling constituency where half the population is over 200 km away in Fort Saskatchewan, a community that shares no connection with them. I have spoken with hundreds of residents of this part of the constituency and they are adamant that they remain in the Vermilion-Lloydminster constituency.

3. On the far western extent of the proposed constituency, the use of Township Road 532 as a boundary creates similar issues of fragmentation. It is acknowledged that here, this road is a clearly identified boundary, as it starts as Highway 16 in Elk Island Park, and continues as Secondary Highway 631 at Royal Park. That said, the use of Secondary Highway 532 as the boundary cuts off the far northwestern portion of the County of Minburn, portions of both Divisions 4 and 7 of said County. My recommendation to the Commission is that all of the County of Minburn be included in the new constituency of Vermilion-Lloydminster, including those portions of the County north of Township Road 532.

Additionally, the proposed constituency extends further to include Elk Island National Park, using Highway 16 as a boundary. While Highway 16 is certainly a clearly recognized boundary, this cuts off small portions of southernmost Divisions 1 and 2 of Lamont County, with the vast majority of that County lying within the proposed constituency of Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul. Again, in the interests of avoiding fragmentation of existing municipalities, I would recommend that the western portion of the boundary be adjusted such that all of the County of Lamont be included into the proposed Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul constituency.

4. Constituency name—According to Page 33 of the Interim Report, the Commission received one submission calling for shortening the names of constituencies. I believe this is completely unnecessary. Alberta has had a long history of using multiple community names to designate constituencies, this practice provides more clarity not less, and it is not an issue in the day-to-day business of the Legislative Assembly. Specifically, in the case of Vermilion-Lloydminster, the exclusion of any reference to Vegreville runs contrary to the Commission's agreed third principle for naming constituencies, specifically: "Where electoral division boundaries expand to include a new city, town, or First Nations reserve, its name should be modified to include the name of the city, town or First Nations reserve that most clearly reflects its location and

size". Since the boundaries of Vermilion-Lloydminster are proposed to expand to include Vegreville, a major centre with a population 5,708, the constituency name should reflect that. The dropping of a community name from a constituency is a matter that should not be taken lightly—just ask the community's residents. Vegreville is a major centre and would become the western "hub" of the new proposed constituency, which I would respectfully suggest be named, "Vegreville-Vermilion-Lloydminster", to reflect the three major centres located in the constituency.

In conclusion, I would once again like to express my appreciation to the members of the Electoral Boundaries Commission for their work on behalf of Albertans. Redrawing electoral boundaries is never a simple task. My observations and recommendations regarding the proposed new electoral divisions are offered in good faith as a life-long Albertan, someone who has lived in both a major city and a rural area, and has represented Albertans in our Legislature. I wish you well as you consider your final recommendations.

Thank you for your diligence and commitment to the province of Alberta through your appointment on the Electoral Boundaries Committee.

As MLA for Cypress-Medicine Hat I would like to offer my considerable concerns as it relates to diminished rural representation with the proposed boundaries. Firstly, I would like to say that I support the dissenting position presented by Gwen Day in the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Interim Report. I have read over her dissent and I agree that the proposed addition of constituencies in Edmonton and Calgary takes representation away from rural Albertans and places disproportionate political power within urban areas. I understand that you have requested public input and I have asked my constituents and those affected by these changes to do offer their suggestions.

Secondly, it is with sincere conviction that I express the necessity for adequate representation in rural

Alberta. Southern Alberta losing a seat is effectively taking another rural voice out of the legislature. Our rural citizens are already sitting at the margins of representation and I would hate to see their influence limited. Further, as a rural MLA, I know how challenging it can be to represent a constituency as large as mine. Aside from population, it is imperative that the committee takes into account cultural similarities, as well as economic similarities within the electoral boundaries.

For that reason, I would like to suggest and request that Cypress-Medicine Hat stays in its current state. Currently, this constituency is well within the population requirements as dictated by the Interim Report as well as represents communities of likeness. My constituency is home to many agricultural producers and families or "common communities of interest" as indicated in your report.

Finally, I would like to propose that a hearing be scheduled in Medicine Hat as we are at the center of one of the most affected areas of the province. While I appreciate that you are accepting written feedback, this is an issue that is very deeply felt within my constituency and could attract many rural advocates as well.

I am writing to address my concerns with the newly redrawn Electoral Districts in the Grande Prairie area, specifically those of 62 Grande Prairie and 63 Grande Prairie-Smoky.




Figure 1. Overview of proposed Electoral District boundaries around the City of Grande Prairie.

Understandably, the Commission had to redraw the boundaries within certain guidelines. One being to have a population within each Electoral District as close to 46,698 as possible. Another was to maintain a balance between rural and urban populations within each Electoral District, or to minimize blended constituencies altogether. Given these guidelines, it is understandable why the Commision chose to redraw the Electoral Districts for the Grande Prairie region as shown in Figures 1 to 3. The Commission created a city only riding, proposed Electoral District Grande Prairie, with a population as close to the desired average as possible (Table 1). However, with the population of the City of Grande Prairie at 63,166, that puts 16,823 city residents into the large, predominantly rural riding of Grande Prairie-Smoky. The proposed riding will have a population that is approximately 63% rural. As a resident of the city of Grande Prairie, and a resident of the proposed Grande Prairie-Smoky Electoral District, I am opposed to this uneven division of the City of Grande Prairie and to being placed within a riding that does not have an equal blending of rural and urban populations. My interests, as a resident of the City of Grande Prairie, are not the same as those living in the rural areas of this proposed riding. Why would a Grande Prairie-Smoky MLA listen to my urban concerns as a City of Grande Prairie resident when there's another MLA tasked with the job within the proposed Grande Prairie riding? The uneven distribution of the population of the City of Grande Prairie also means that only 64% of the city's residents have a say in provincial government decisions regarding the city.

Table 1. Population within the proposed Electoral Districts

Grande Prairie-Smoky	45,094	-3

I would like to propose another solution. Since creating a city of Grande Prairie only riding will always lead to a third of the population being placed into a rural riding as the result of trying to maintain the average population of 46,698 within each Electoral District, I propose that the City of Grande Prairie be split into two ridings, Grande Prairie-East and Granded Prairie-West. The rural riding of Central Peace-Notley and Grande Prairie-Smoky would then be combined into one riding, Central Peace-Smoky. This solution maintains the current number of electoral districts in the region at three and there's the potential to redraw the boundaries such that each proposed Electoral District has an approximate population of 41,303 for a variation of -12% (total population of proposed electoral districts Grande Prairie, Grande Prairie-Smoky and Central Peace-Notley divided by 3). If the population of the City of

Grande Prairie is equally distributed between the proposed Grande Prairie-East and Grande Prairie-West, then that provides a population of about 31,583 in each Electoral District. The remaining 9,720 people needed to meet the goal population of 41,303 would be residents of nearby communities that often commute to Grande Prairie for work or use facilities within the city and so have a vested interest in city affairs. So although this proposal creates two blended ridings with predominant urban populations, the rural component would mainly consist of suburban dwellers.

I would like to see the boundary between the proposed Grande Prairie-East and Grande Prairie-West be 100 St (Figure 4). This boundary would continue north to Alberta highway 59, thus placing the suburban town of Clairmont in the proposed riding of Grande Prairie-East and the suburban town of Sexsmith in Grande Prairie-West. The riding of Grande Prairie-West should at least extend west to highway 724 and include the town of Wembley. The western boundary can be extended as needed to meet population requirements. Proposed Electoral District Grande Prairie-East would extend to Range Road 31 (or further depending on population requirements) and include the communities of Teepee Creek and Bezanson. The southern boundaries of the proposed Grande Prairie-East and -West electoral districts would then be the Wapiti River. However, it would be sensible to include the town of Grovedale within Grande Prairie-West since its residents often use city services. Another benefit of dividing the city in two is that as the city continues to grow, the area of these proposed ridings can be easily reduced and may eventually become urban only ridings.

The Electoral Districts of Central Peace-Notley and Grande Prairie-Smoky would be combined into one riding, Central Peace-Smoky, and would keep the same outer boundaries with Grande Prairie-West and —East essentially being a doughnut hole within it.

Thank you for taking the time to review my concerns and my proposal to improve the Electoral Districts in my community. I would like to discuss this further at the upcoming open house in Grande Prairie on July 17th.




Figure 2. Proposed Electoral District of Grande Prairie.




Figure 3. Proposed Electoral District of Grande Prairie-Smoky.




Figure 4. Proposed solution for Electoral District boundaries.





The County of Warner Council recently reviewed the interim report done by the Electoral Boundary Commission and has a number of concerns with the new proposals. In the proposals, our County is to be divided in half which we believe will cause confusion amongst our rate payers when it comes time for voting and contacting their MLA an item that is to try to be avoided under section 14(e). Other legislation being reviewed by the Province is forcing collaboration amongst its neighbours. The County of Warner has been partnering in these collaborations for years providing many services jointly or through commissions. The process of splitting our County up has the potential to negatively affect all of the positive work we have done to date.

In reviewing the guidelines that the Commission followed our County has a hard time believing any of the factors to considered were followed. It is now proposed that our MLA will be representing an area that shares very little common ground when it comes to the needs and desires of the communities, increasing the number of municipalities that the MLA will have to work with which is supposed to be a consideration under 14(f). Further the proposed methods of the MLA's to deal with the increased travel and workload are quite frankly ridiculous. In a Province that is already struggling financially the even thought that satellite offices and chauffers' would help the MLA in their duties is questionable. The apparent lack or desire of the commission to consider the concerns of Rural Alberta is quite evident. This leading to a two-class system in the province as it relates to public services Urban and Rural. When looking at equal representation everything needs to be evaluated and not just population as per section 14(b) as well as the allowance of the 25% factor stated in section 15(1).

I would like to thank the Commission for its work as well as the opportunity for written submissions on the Interim Report.

I wish to advise that I have concerns with the proposed electoral boundaries of the new Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul constituency.


Fort Saskatchewan is currently within the constituency of Fort Saskatchewan-Vegreville. This riding is one of the proposed electoral divisions in the central northeast area being consolidated from four ridings down to three.

My primary concern is the vast size of the proposed electoral division. Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul would extend east to the Saskatchewan border, a distance of approximately 240 kilometres. The geographic area for an MLA to cover, remain in contact with constituents, provide face-to-face meeting opportunities and maintain obligations for community and organization events would be extremely challenging. The blended constituency with the City of Fort Saskatchewan (2017 population of 25, 533) combined with a sprawling rural area, extending well beyond just adjoining the city, presents unique issues for an MLA representing disparate communities of interest.

The overall size of the proposed riding within the report is at 51,216 and 10% higher than the average population of electoral divisions. These numbers are drawn from the 2016 census data. Fort Saskatchewan is a rapidly growing city with the most recent census in 2017 showing a 3.9% population increase from 2016 to 25,533 residents. Based on Fort Saskatchewan's historical growth patterns the proposed riding size would continue to increase and exceed in greater percentages than the average population of electoral divisions.

I trust comments and concerns will be given due consideration prior to making any dramatic changes such as this as we value our Provincial representation in our community.

Thank you for the opportunity to influence your final decision on electoral boundaries for the next 8 years.

I propose that the constituency of Calgary-Northern Hills stay intact.

To remain as is:

- -has us very close to the \pm -- 25% allowance of the 46 697 average population per constituency (more so if only Hanson Ranch were removed to join its fellow community of Hidden Valley where they share the same community association).
- -Respects shared community interests
- -Respects existing natural geographical boundaries of Deerfoot Tr on East/South; Beddington to the West/South; Stoney Tr to the North. To split us into 3 separate constituencies does NOT meet existing legislation on boundary requirements.
- -Coordinating and communicating with 3 different MLA's regarding a common need would create an unnecessary obstacle, increasing the challenge to affect necessary change through our elected representatives. It is astounding that a constituency has too many people to remain a single riding but not enough to necessitate a High School within our bounds.

The proposed constituency of Calgary - NorthEast would be comprised of Coventry Hills, Harvest Hills, Livingston as well as Redstone and SkyView Ranch - communities located on the east side of Deerfoot and the other side of the Airport, a full 10 km away. This constituency crosses 2 ward boundaries (everything east of Deerfoot will become ward 5 as of October 2017), and 2 community associations.

The proposed constituency of Calgary - Beddington includes Hidden Valley (but not Hanson Ranch), Country Hills, and the established communities of MacEwan, Sandstone, Beddington and Huntington Hills. This constituency will cross 2 Ward boundaries, and FIVE (5) community associations. The diversity in age of these communities represents many competing priorities for residents.

The proposed constituency of Calgary - North includes Panorama, Hanson Ranch, Carrington with parts of Evanston. This crosses into the territory of at least 3 community associations, and 2 city wards (East of 14th st north of Stoney Trail will be part of Ward 2 as of October 2017). Should the need to divide us prevail, I request that the Northern Hills communities not be grouped with communities to the south of Beddington Trail (there isn't even an accessible direct transportation route to link us; joining established older communities that have access to amenities with younger communities lacking infrastructure and services makes no sense), or to the East of Deerfoot Trail (zero common priorities and needs as well as being miles apart geographically). We have completely unique interests and needs not only regarding schools, but infrastructure and healthcare.

I also request that Calgary – Northern Hills not be split into any more than 2 ridings. Counter proposal:

Clear Hills County Council has taken the time to discuss your recommendations for the Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley constituency. Although we realize the task of formulating electoral boundaries is a difficult one, we are disappointed with the proposed expansion to the south.

We cannot help but feel we are "collateral damage" due to urban expansion issues six to ten hours' drive south of where we live. Alberta is a huge and diverse province with very distinct areas having very little in common with respect to economic and social lifestyles. (Yes, some of us drive 20 minutes to get our mail!)

The initial round of public input identified all the factors that make our districts unique, especially when the remote northern factors are added in. Also not to be forgotten are the challenges our MLA's have in servicing a population that is often several hours driving time distant. There is no need to repeat what has been said.

Having now seen the results of the proposed boundary change we have two new points to raise. First; we have the perception that no one has had any issue with the existing electoral boundary of this constituency and we have become a victim of a problem that exists down south in the major centers. Most urban voters, at best, only have a vague knowledge of our existence.

Ironically, what seems to be working well for us, appears to be headed in the direction of; "if it isn't broken, then let's fix it!"

Secondly; we need to understand the consequences of changing something that doesn't require change. There is no denying that elections in Canada have dismal voter turnout which has always been of major concern.

The recommended expansion to the Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley is a prime example of what discourages people from voting!

Geographically, this is a huge riding, and one cannot expect someone who does not reside here to understand the demographic patterns as dictated by distance, economic structure, real estate values, and even lifestyles. An outsider viewing a map and the population numbers can easily view the area as northern rural and draw the line without knowing the issues above.

Allow us a moment for some specifics. The southern boundary as it exists, though not perfect does delineate two areas of population, separated by a major river with one bridge. For someone not familiar with the area, it helps to know that driving from the proposed northern to the southern populated area can easily take 3 to 4 hours.

The living standards of the intended expansion of the boundary are dramatically different.

Real estate values are double, food prices substantially lower, services readily available as opposed to having to "plan a trip," completely different job market; almost an endless list.

One can say that the northern and southern residents of this newly proposed constituency would have vastly different priorities.

Further, as Grande Prairie residents attempt to move out of the urban environment, they settle into the rural landscape forming a type of suburb, which segregates our lifestyles even further.

These comments serve to background a major reason why voters do not show up at the polls,

The proposed expansion of our constituency would to a large extent leave the northern voters with the perception that their votes won't count. In fact, it's more than perception; it's reality.

No one south of the river could care about the bridge north of them. Nor do they consider anything but Grande Prairie for their commercial trade and understandably so.

In no way intended to be derogatory, however, it is obvious that the proposed expansion of the constituency will assure an MLA that originates, is situated and elected by the heavily populated area surrounding Highway 43 to the border.

Unfortunately one would need to spend some time in the present constituency to truly understand the many reasons why changing the boundary to Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley would be regarded as an erosion of the residents' democratic representation. As elected representatives, we stand firm in our belief that the rights of our citizens should be highly respected.

Peace Wapiti Public School Division #76 provides service to approximately 6,000 students in Kindergarten through Grade 12 in 33 schools, including eight Hutterite schools and an outreach and online school located in Spirit River. High School programs are operated in eight schools – Spirit River Regional Academy, Beaverlodge Regional High School, Eaglesham School, Ridgevalley School, Savanna School, Sexsmith Secondary School, Peace Wapiti Academy and Peace Academy of Virtual Education (PAVE). The Board also provides educational programming at a group home facility serving students in Northern Alberta. While our boundaries separate us from the City of Grande Prairie, we currently have two schools located within the city.

Peace Wapiti Public School Division #76 is currently represented by MLAs in the following ridings: Grande Prairie Smoky, Grande Prairie-Wapiti, and Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley. In its Interim Report, the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission has recommended changes to these three ridings. The Commission's recommendations would result in boundary changes that would mean Peace Wapiti's boundaries would overlap with only 2 ridings, Grande Prairie-Smoky and Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley.

We believe consideration must be given to geographic limitations as well as recognition of the distinct differences between rural and urban areas, not simply boundaries that reflect population. Amalgamation of the constituencies serving our rural division, and others, unequivocally diminishes the voice of rural Albertans.


Peace Wapiti School Division #76 is concerned with proposed changes which will result in less representation for our division.

Thank you for the opportunity to respond to the Commission's proposal for redistribution of provincial electoral boundaries. On behalf of Medicine Hat City Council we would respectfully ask that the Commission revise its recommendations with regard to the districts affecting our municipality.

While we appreciate and understand the consideration for greater voter parity driving the Commission to recommend increasing the size of rural ridings to the benefit of large urban centers, there are other considerations which should be taken into account to ensure effective representation for all Albertans. Effective representation is also driven by considerations such as the geographic size as well as economic and demographic diversity of a riding, which are important factors that need to be considered to ensure the fairness of our electoral system.

Specifically we would like to point out the following:

- The proposed riding of Taber Vulcan is geographically vast and covers diverse interests ranging from farming, ranching and a wide variety of agri-business industries, to oil and gas, unmanned airspace usage, parkland, tourism and US border crossings. This riding spans a very large number of municipalities. How one MLA is expected to serve the interests of so many communities and keep in touch with their concerns is an issue of significant concern.
- The Brooks Cypress riding would in all likelihood mean that a portion of our Medicine
 Hat residents would be represented either by an MLA from Brooks or from a completely
 rural area with no urban connections. The MLA would then come from a totally different
 demographic and economic base than our city does.
- Further, the Commission proposes to increase the number of MLAs from large urban centers at the expense of rural representation. The large urban cities in Alberta already have more than twice as many MLAs as City Councillors within a single municipality. Furthermore these are the only municipalities in Alberta with full time City Councillors.

They already have by far the greatest concentration of resources dedicated to furthering their municipal interests and lobby with the Province for their needs. By comparison a smaller city or rural riding where Councillors have full time occupations in addition to their municipal duties, will never have the resources or network to make their concerns know to an MLA the same way a large city can.

Based on these concerns, it is Medicine Hat City Council's <u>strong recommendation</u> that the Commission leave the current electoral boundaries unchanged in our region.

On behalf of Camrose County Council, I would like to take this opportunity to express several concerns regarding the proposed electoral boundaries, as defined in the recently released Interim Report from the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission (AEBC), that effect Camrose County, and suggest some alternatives, specifically, the consolidation of:

Seven electoral divisions into six in the eastern side of the province. Those current seven electoral divisions are Battle River-Wainwright, Drumheller-Stettler, Strathmore-Brooks, Little Bow, Cardston-Taber-Warner, Cypress-Medicine Hat, and Vermilion-Lloydminster.

In response to the Interim Report, Camrose County would like to reiterate the importance of ensuring that Alberta's democratic institutions effectively represent Albertans from all walks of life and areas of the province. Achieving this representation by balancing population and demographics, community interest and characteristics, existing municipal and natural boundaries, and other relevant criteria is a difficult but necessary task. Over-reliance on absolute voter parity may inhibit the ability of Albertans to be effectively represented.

Camrose County's submission dated January 11, 2017 spoke to several important points that the County would again submit for consideration by the AEBC as they form their final recommendations. Issues:

- Size: Battle River-Wainwright Electoral Division currently covers approximately 250 km east to
 west boundary and 100 km north to south, to increase the size of that constituency would make
 it geographically difficult for one MLA to represent effectively the needs of that diverse a
 population.
- 2. Community Interests: Variations in topography, land-use and major industry are significant within the region. In the west half of the constituency, primary agricultural production is the major economic driver, while in the east although primary agriculture is part of the economy, oil and gas production is the major economic driver.
- 3. Regional Collaboration: Camrose County and residents of Camrose County participate in, and support extensively, the facilities and services located in the City of Camrose, which is currently part of the Wetaskiwin-Camrose constituency.



Possible Alternatives/Solutions:

Camrose County is respectfully requesting that the current electoral boundary be adjusted to reflect a more north south constituency and is encouraged by the AEBC's efforts in the Interim Report to align constituencies with municipal boundaries where possible, even going so far to reflect intermunicipal partnerships that exist in regions of the province. As dividing municipalities, particularly geographically large rural municipalities, into multiple electoral divisions can create unnecessarily complex governance arrangements when municipal and provincial elected officials work collaboratively, again Camrose County recommends that the AEBC continue to use municipal boundaries as a guiding tool for establishing electoral boundaries.

The AEBC's comments regarding "common community interests" do acknowledge that this is indeed a consideration for the determination of electoral boundaries and although, as the AEBC Interim Report states, "most current electoral divisions outside of Edmonton and Calgary do not contain a single common community", it is fair to say that creating even larger geographical ridings from already diverse electoral constituencies only further moves away from the recognition of common community characteristics that do exist. The expansion of electoral boundaries that are already large is, more often than not, at odds with the preservation of "common community interests."

Camrose County appreciates the opportunity to express our concerns and provide alternatives, and looks forward to the Commission's conclusions.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit feedback on the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission's Interim Report ("Interim Report").

Leduc County advises that the proposed boundaries do not accurately consider rural boundaries. The Interim Report has Leduc County being spread amongst seven constituencies, considerably more than it currently sits in. With the mandate of the Commission including respect for municipal boundaries, the County asks that this include consideration of rural municipal boundaries. Leduc County proposes that an electoral boundary be considered at Range Road 243/244. This would separate the higher urban populations of the City of Leduc and Town of Beaumont allowing the County to maintain two constituencies. This also recognizes the high growth rates of Leduc, Beaumont and the East Vistas area. The constituencies could be referred to as Leduc-Leduc County and Leduc-Beaumont as shown on the attached map.

The Interim report lacks consideration for Leduc County's position in the Edmonton Metropolitan Regional Structure with parts of the County being grouped with communities such as Camrose, Stettler and Wainwright. Keeping Leduc County in the Edmonton Metropolitan Regional constituencies allows for continued regional collaboration as opposed to the proposal where parts of the County are grouped with communities which are outside of that structure.


Leduc County requests that the new "Edmonton-South" riding as well as the "Edmonton-Southwest" riding accurately reflect the annexation boundaries that we are working toward reaching agreement on with the City of Edmonton. The maps displayed in the Interim Report regarding this area are not consistent with any notices of intent or amendments issued by the City of Edmonton. Our formal request is that Highway 19 be the southern boundary for both of these constituencies.

Members of the Commission,

The Board of Trustees of Aspen View Public Schools Division #78 is pleased to provide its feedback on the Interim Report of the 2016/17 Electoral Boundaries Commission. We were pleased to participate in the Public Hearing held in Slave Lake on February 23, 2017, and we appreciate the opportunity to provide further input in response to the Interim Report.

With the great appreciation for the hard work of the Commission, we nevertheless respectfully disagree with its recommendations and some of the reasoning provided. In particular, we disagree with the recommendation to add three ridings in the Edmonton and Calgary areas, achieved by consolidating ridings in rural Alberta.

We maintain the position we put forth in our February presentation; that there are increasingly diverse realities between rural and urban school jurisdictions in Alberta, impacting educational program offerings, student transportation, facility operations and maintenance, and other areas. Aspen View Public Schools has taken a lead role in addressing these issues, advocating for a thorough review of the current education funding model towards a system that is more equitable for all students, regardless of where they live in Alberta. The necessary changes must be made at the provincial level, and therefore we believe it is very important that changes to electoral boundaries and the distribution of legislative seats do not further marginalize the unique issues and needs of rural Alberta.

We have concern with statements made in the Commission's majority position, specific to 'Rural Concerns':

"As for the core concern that a reduction in the number of constituencies located in rural areas of the province will reduce the rural 'voice' in the legislature, with the result that rural concerns will command less attention and fewer resources than they have in the past, that is the inevitable result of the application of the principle of representation by population in a time of major population shift."

- Interim Report, Page 27

We respectfully submit that even if one were to accept the premise that the continued marginalization of rural concerns is an 'inevitable result', it is nevertheless an undesirable consequence indicative of an over-application of the principle of representation by population, and an under-application of other factors supported by both the *Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms* and case law.

On this point, we concur with the minority position put forth by Commissioner Day; that the Commission's recommendations prioritized voter parity without adequately considering other factors allowed under the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act*.

"Because of this focus on voter parity, the Commission is proposing to add a new riding in both Calgary and Edmonton. I do not believe that this was necessary given the discretion allowed for variances and additional considerations besides population in the Act. Nor do I believe it was beneficial to ensuring effective representation for all Albertans."

Commissioner Day, Interim Report, page 70.

"As new ridings are added to the cities, electoral divisions must be taken from the 'Rest of Alberta'. This results in ongoing erosion of ridings in rural Alberta and is not sustainable if all Albertans are to be effectively represented."

- Commissioner Day, Interim Report, page 70.

Specific to Aspen View Public Schools in particular, we also disagree with the proposed reconfiguration of constituencies in our area. Currently, Aspen View Public Schools lies predominantly within the Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater constituency, with smaller areas near the northwest and southeast boundaries falling within the Lesser Slave Lake & Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills constituencies, respectively. Under the recommended boundary changes, the small area within Lesser Slave Lake would remain, but the rest of Aspen View would be essentially divided between the Fort McMurray-Lac La Biche and St. Albert-Redwater constituencies. We find this recommendation to be counter to our position as stated in February; that any realignment of provincial constituency boundaries should strive for consistency with existing municipal and school jurisdiction boundaries, to facilitate more efficient and consistent communication with our provincial representatives.

In summary, while we appreciate the challenging task placed before the Commission and the hard work it has done, we believe the Interim Report misses the mark, particularly in regard to rural Alberta. We would encourage the Commission, in preparation of its Final Report, to reevaluate the allocation of additional seats to the Edmonton and Calgary areas, and instead make better use of the population variances allowed under the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act*, in order to maintain effective representation for rural Alberta.

We again thank the Commission for the opportunity to provide input, and wish you well in this challenging and important undertaking.



This will advise that it was the consensus of the County of Two Hills Council, at their meeting of June 13, 2017 to forward a letter to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission to reconsider the proposed boundaries.

Namely the consolidation of four electoral divisions into three in the central northeast area of the province. These four electoral divisions are Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills. Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater, Fort Saskatchewan-Vegreville, and Bonnyville-Cold Lake.

The consolidation of these ridings, will impact the ability of rural Albertans to be effectively represented in Alberta's legislature.


The County Council would like to emphasize the importance of maintaining an adequate and equitable representation for Alberta's rural residents and communities.

I wish to make a specific recommendation to adjust West Yellowhead's proposed boundaries, and would like to point out what I believe is an inappropriate inference used to determine the size of some rural constituencies.

The population of West Yellowhead will leap from -32% to +10% of the provincial mean following the Commission's recommendation; that of Grande Prairie-Smoky will be -3%. Both constituencies are rural, resource based, and share similar demographics.

With the addition of the majority of Yellowhead County plus the Town of Whitecourt and a portion of Woodlands County, the demographic center of gravity of West Yellowhead will shift from Hinton to Edson. This leaves the Town of Grande Cache and sliver of the MD of Greenview surrounding it, even more of an outlier in the revised constituency. As well, Grande Cache's economic orientation leans more towards Grande Prairie than it does towards the rest of West Yellowhead. Grande Cache is the supply and administration center for the uninhabited Willmore Wilderness Park.

I recommend you remove the Town of Grande Cache, the small portion of the MD of Greenview and Willmore Wilderness Park from West Yellowhead and add it to Grande Prairie-Smoky. This will push the populations of both constituencies closer to the provincial mean and promote better integrity of existing municipal boundaries.

Finally, I wish to make a general comment about one of the inferences the majority used, I believe inappropriately, in much of rural Alberta. The Commission has justified artificially high populations in many rural, resource based constituencies, notably West Yellowhead, Drumheller-Strathmore, Drayton

Valley-Rocky Mountain House, Bonnyville-Cold Lake and Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul on the grounds that, "this relatively large variance can be justified by the expected continued decline in the population growth rates in this area as compared to the provincial average." [Interim Report, p. 62 re: West Yellowhead]

I note that "the Commission agrees that, while not expressly listed in the Act, it would be proper to consider a number of other factors in the design of electoral division boundaries including, projected growth rates..." [ibid. p.15] While the enabling legislation allows you some latitude to speculate on future population growth, I believe the scope of your speculation is properly confined to those jurisdictions – principally urban, whose demographics and planning authorities support your conclusions.

Forecasting population decline in rural communities – especially communities whose economies are heavily dependent on oil and gas and/or coal at a time when their economies and consequently their populations are experiencing the cumulative negative impacts of depressed global markets exacerbated by anti-carbon policies enacted by our present government – is not only inappropriate, but likely contraindicated. The Commission's final recommendations, when ratified will alter Alberta's political landscape for a decade; polls strongly suggest our present government with its hostile attitude to carbon resources use and development is unlikely to survive beyond its present term of office. I urge the Commission to exercise an abundance of caution when forecasting rural population declines in our present, atypical political environment.

The issue of electoral Boundaries is a contentious and emotional issue, but in our democratic society I believe that the overriding criterion must be the concept that all citizens have equal representation within our Legislative Assembly. The urbanization of Alberta is a trend that is well established and I cannot foresee it ever reversing.

Based on these precepts, my support is for a very tight tolerance (+-3%) in the variations of populations between ridings, regardless of the logistical problems some MLAs will be left to cope with. Perhaps such problems can be mitigated by, for example, allocating additional resources such as funding for satellite offices in geographically large ridings.

A further concern of mine is that attention be paid to ensuring that ridings, to the greatest degree possible consistent with the overriding constraint of equalized populations, be made socio-culturally consistent so that each riding's MLA can more easily find consensus that represent thatthe most significant issues of concern to his/her constituents, regardless of their political affiliation. An example that springs to mind is the issue of school access in newly constructed subdivisions (which at present I suspect are mostly in ridings that are currently "under-represented"), or the converse issue of school closures in areas where the current numbers of school-age children are low (which problem can occur in both rural and inner-city ridings, with the complicating factor that the school-age populations of inner-city ridings may in fact increase in the future due to urban redevelopment.) I present this only as a example that I am acquainted with from both sides.

In general, I am supportive of the "Interim Report of the 2016/17 Electoral Boundaries Commission", recognizing that there are undoubtedly some issues of "fine tuning" that need to be done to address the

socio-cultural type of concern I mentioned above.

My personal bias is, if any ridings are to be below average in population, then they should be ridings that are likely to show a continuing trend of population increase between now and the next Electoral Boundaries review.

Finally, I disagree with any submissions that suggest that Electoral Boundaries Review is or should be a partisan political process. My understanding of the current process is that it is designed to as objective as possible. The criteria are well defined. Let them be adhered to.

RE: Interim Report of the 2016/17 Electoral Boundaries Commission

Since the tabling of the Interim Report of the 2016/17 Electoral Boundaries Commission to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta on May 23, 2017, the County of Wetaskiwin has been made aware of significant questions and concerns from the over eleven thousand citizens that we represent and have been asked to comment regarding the aforementioned report and initial conclusions made by the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission.

Overall, the County of Wetaskiwin is greatly disappointed and concerned with the initial conclusions that have been made by the Commission for several reasons. First, in regard to specifically the County of Wetaskiwin, the municipality under the conclusions of the Interim Report would be a part of five different constituencies being Devon-Parkland, Drayton Valley-Rocky Mountain House, Lacombe-Ponoka, Stettler-Wainwright, and Wetaskiwin-Camrose, which is an additional constituency from the current situation where the County of Wetaskiwin is located in four constituencies. In all of these proposed constituencies aside from the constituency of Wetaskiwin-Camrose, the County of Wetaskiwin makes up a very small and insignificant portion of the constituencies, making up approximately less than ten percent of the total land area of each constituency. Combined with the fact that the constituencies of Devon-Parkland, Drayton Valley-Rocky Mountain House, Lacombe-Ponoka, and Stettler-Wainwright cover land areas that stretch over hundreds of kilometres, this will undoubtedly leave the County of Wetaskiwin and the citizens who call the area home to be represented by their Member of the Legislative Assembly (MLA) in a severely ineffective manner as the MLA will have to cover an unreasonable amount of distance to interact with the citizens and representatives of the County of Wetaskiwin, a County that is proposed to be an insignificant part of the overall constituency.

Secondly, the County of Wetaskiwin strongly questions the majority opinion of the Commission to base the proposed electoral boundaries based solely on achieving an equalized population amongst all constituencies. In the case of the County of Wetaskiwin and many rural municipalities being ineffectively represented if the proposed constituencies were established, the Commission in our

opinion has made a glaring error in not taking other factors into consideration as mandated by the Electoral Boundaries Commission Act such as sparsity of population, common community interests, trading areas, and geographic size. The County is also highly concerned that the Commission believes, as stated on page twenty-six of the Interim Report, "that the time has come to stop treating differences between rural and urban Albertans as a main driver in setting the boundaries of electoral divisions." This statement by the Commission strongly implies that the Commission has the opinion that rural Albertans do not matter to the same extent as an Albertan who lives in the Calgary and Edmonton areas, an opinion that appears to be confirmed as being true as the Commission believes this is an "inevitable result" as stated on page twenty-seven. Clearly, the Commission does not realize that rural Alberta, including the County of Wetaskiwin, does indeed matter to the overall strength of the entire province as a whole. With the two main economic industries of agriculture and resource extraction being located almost exclusively within rural Alberta, rural Alberta should be recognized for being home to the main economic drivers of this province with effective representation through their MLA. Instead, the Commission appears to be labelling rural Albertans as second-class citizens just because they do not live in an urban metropolis that has led to unmanageable urban sprawl, which has led to a significant negative impact on the agricultural and other industries that have made Alberta the prosperous province that it is today. The Commission needs to realize that rural Alberta does indeed matter and that effective representation should be a right based on more factors than just how many citizens call an area home.

Thirdly, the County of Wetaskiwin has concerns as to the constant change in electoral boundaries in Alberta. The County recognizes that the Commission as mandated under of *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* must review the existing electoral boundaries established, but are not legally required to change said boundaries. In the past two reviews, the County of Wetaskiwin have gone from being within three constituencies to four constituencies currently, with the proposal being that the County will be split amongst five constituencies. These constant changes from review to review have left citizens in the County of Wetaskiwin and possibly elsewhere in Alberta to be confused as to who their elected representative is and what constituency they are a part of. The County does note that citizens can easily access this information from Elections Alberta, but the ongoing changes to what constituency a person resides in and who their MLA is can and undoubtedly has led to dissatisfaction in the democratic electoral process throughout Alberta as can be extrapolated through increased voter apathy and lower voter turnout. Stability in electoral boundaries would allow for people to remain interested, informed, and connected to the issues within the constituency and how their MLA is dealing with said issues and concerns, therefore leading to a higher voter interest and turnout and an overall healthier democracy.

In summation, the County of Wetaskiwin is immensely concerned with the position that the Commission has taken in regard to basing the proposed new electoral boundaries for the Province of Alberta almost exclusively on population. Without taking additional factors such as, population sparsity, geographic size, trading areas, common community interest linkages, the uniqueness and importance of rural Alberta to the overall strength of Alberta as a whole, and the continued increase in splitting up the County of Wetaskiwin into five constituencies from three as was the case only two reviews or less than a decade ago, the Commission will ultimately fall far from their goal of providing effective representation for all Albertans, particularly rural Albertans, as set out as the single most important goal of the Commission in the Interim Report. The County of Wetaskiwin would strongly recommend that the splitting of our municipality be held at the current four constituencies or preferably reduced to the County of Wetaskiwin being contained completely within three or less constituencies in order to effectively represent the citizens of the County of Wetaskiwin to an even greater rate than what is proposed in the Interim Report.

If there are any questions or concerns regarding the position of the County of Wetaskiwin, please advise. The County of Wetaskiwin hopes that the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission under your leadership does take both our concerns and the concerns of all affected Albertans seriously and look forward to a resolution that can be accepted by all parties.

It makes absolutely no sense to group any portion of the existing northern hills area with areas on the east side of Deerfoot Trail. Deerfoot Trail is a major geographic boundary. Further, there is a substantial industrial area between the residential areas east of Métis Trail and west of Deerfoot Trail. There is nothing in common between the two residential areas. Further, there is a substantial natural area and a rail line running immediately west of Deerfoot Trail, further increasing the gap between the communities. It is far more logical to use Deerfoot Trail as a dividing line.

Coventry Hills and other communities between Harvest Hills Boulevard/Centre Street and Deerfoot Trail have far more in common with communities west of Centre Street than they do with communities east of Métis Trail. A similar concern applies for the Skyview area. It is my opinion that this would place unnecessary burdens on the elected representatives for the districts as proprosed, including possibly needing to maintain two constituency offices when such should not be required in an urban setting simply due to the significant geographic separation.

While a reasonable case exists for subdividing the Northern Hills area due to rising population, it should be done with some reasonable consideration for the real geographic boundaries (Nose Creek/Deerfoot Trail, Beddington Trail/Symons Valley Road/West Nose Creek, Stoney Trail). Indeed, it seems likely that a division along Stoney Trail would make more sense, combining Evanston, Carrington, and Livingston rather than splitting the northern hills area along Harvest Hills Boulevard.

Regardless, the proposed Calgary-North district is completely unreasonable and ignores a real and significant natural boundary (Nose Creek) which combines with Deerfoot Trail and an intervening non-residential area. Even the City of Calgary now uses Deerfoot Trail for the ward boundaries for the area as

of the upcoming municipal election! Thus the proposed district boundary is now at odds with internal ward divisions in the city.

To Whom it May Concern:

Thank you for the many hours your committee has laboured on behalf of Albertans. Please allow me to comment on the proposed constituency Taber - Vulcan. This constituency is geographically too large and diverse to be effectively represented by one Member of the Legislature. This enormous land mass disadvantages rural communities and those who represent them. Travel time and expense would be significantly greater than nearly all other ridings in Alberta. There is no guarantee of monies supplied to cover these expenses either now or in the future. In a time, when our Province is focusing on energy conservation and efficiency should someone need to drive hours outside their community to meet with their MLA? Or an MLA be forced to fly from one community to the next to touch base with his/her constituents?

I agree that Taber - Vulcan is agriculturally based, however the diversity of agriculture is great. The intensity of farming operations and density of population increases as one moves east to west therefore the challenges each area faces vary significantly. In the southeast corner wherein there are great rolling hills, light soils, arid climate, and vast tracts of native prairie, suitable (agriculturally speaking) only for light grazing of domestic animals. The north west portion of the proposed riding is better suited for intensive agriculture. It hosts extensive irrigation systems facilitating intensive cropping and livestock operations.

I would prefer Cypress-Medicine Hat Constituency current boundaries remain intact. A blended constituency is ideal in this area. If the population is too low to meet targets then please consider moving a greater portion of the City of Medicine Hat into the riding rather than rural lands. If the City were divided using an easily identified landmark residents would have clarity on where their riding starts and ends and who represents them. A natural dividing line in Medicine Hat is the South Saskatchewan River as the City is fairly equally divided in terms of both population and development on either side of the banks I agree with others who spoke about Medicine Hat and area during the consultation process. Urban and rural values and culture are consistent as the City is the economic and social hub for southeastern Alberta.

The west side of the proposed Taber - Vulcan riding has significant north - south travel corridors, setting it apart, once again, from its eastern counterpart. The west boundary, Highway 4, is a vital thoroughfare with the only USA Port of Entry in Alberta open 24 hours a day and 7 days a week. Also Highway 36, a north - south roadway linking to Highway 4 at its south most point and Lac La Biche at its north most point is a profoundly important trade/transport corridor for the Province. It seems logical to group these elements within a constituency as population would allow perhaps drawing the boundary line closer to or within Lethbridge.

With the electoral boundaries commission releasing their Interim Report, and major changes on the horizon, Cypress Medicine Hat MLA Drew Barnes is increasingly concerned about the lack of rural and Medicine Hat representation in the new constituency reallocation. This is immediately evidenced by 3 rural seats eliminated province-wide. In the new re-draw, only one constituency bares the Medicine Hat name.

In a letter that he recently wrote to Justice Bielby, who was appointed to preside over the Boundaries Commission, he stated "it is with sincere conviction that (he expresses) the necessity for adequate representation in

rural Alberta. Southern Alberta losing a seat is effectively taking another rural voice out of the legislature.

Our rural citizens are already sitting at the margins of representation and (he) would hate to see their influence limited."

Barnes notes that Cypress-Medicine Hat and Medicine Hat should be kept as they are as they fit within the current evaluation guidelines proposed by the committee this term. Based on an assessment category coined "common communities of interest" Barnes has noted that Cypress-Medicine Hat already fits into this category with its focus on agriculture, proportionate population density

and rural nature. If the boundaries were to change as indicated in the report, the constituency would be obsolete. The Medicine Hat riding would gain Ross Glen, while Southridge and Desert Blume would go to the newly formed constituency of Brooks-Cypress along with Redcliff and Ralston. The communities of Bow Island, Foremost, Etzikom, Elkwater all the way up to Dunmore

will go to Taber-Vulcan.

The Boundaries Commission is asking for public input. Input will be accepted online at www.abebc.ca. MLA Barnes has requested that "a hearing be scheduled in Medicine Hat as (Cypress-Medicine hat is) at the center of one of the most affected areas of the province." While he acknowledges that the committee is accepting written feedback, he feels that the best way to have adequate representation of his constituents would be to hold a hearing locally.

The Council of the Village of Foremost is very concerned about the proposed changes to the Alberta Electoral Boundary Review for 2016/2017.

These proposed changes would eliminate Cypress-Medicine Hat as a constituency and create two new ones in its place, Brooks-Cypress which would include Southridge, Desert Blume and Redcliff, Taber-Vulcan would expand to include Veinerville and Dunmore, and lastly Ross Glen would move into Medicine Hat.

Under the proposed changes, the Cypress Hills would cease to be a part of Brooks-Cypress and would be added to a new and much larger riding-Taber-Vulcan. In addition, the County of Forty Mile and the Southern portions of Cypress-County would be added to the Little Bow area of Taber-Vulcan as well (making Taber-Vulcan one of the largest constituencies in the province). Thus covering a vast area with a northern end 20 minutes from Calgary and a southern end that stretches all the way to the border.





- The establishment of the 20th electoral district ensures that representation levels for all Edmontonians remain manageable and fall within the average population as established by the Commission.
- 2. The establishment of the electoral districts in the south reflects the City's future annexation lands and City boundaries.
- 3. Some of the proposed district names may be confusing to the public due to their similarity to each other e.g. Edmonton-Mill Woods West and Edmonton-Mill Woods East.
- The current and new City Council look forward to working closing with MLAs and delivering services to our shared populations.

My City Council colleagues have unanimously directed that I speak on their behalf at the Commission's public hearing.

In light of the fast-paced growth in the Province and City of Edmonton, we support a review of Alberta Electoral boundaries earlier than the proposed review in eight years, to reflect changes in population and otherwise.

Writing on behalf of Starland County, I would like to express our concern and disappointment with the AEBC's recommendations in their Interim Report. The current proposal would take our electoral division from being 24% below average to 16% above average which generally speaking means as an outcome of this process our residents will see the greatest reduction in the weight of their vote of nearly every constituency in Alberta. The report goes to great lengths to discuss how Alberta is no longer rural and that "rural voice" is not a consideration. Additionally it chose to create no more S.15 Ridings while noting that ridings such as ours have good roads which make them different to the two ridings which have been granted special status. We strongly disagree that the presence of good roads will make it easier to effectively represent both Castor and Strathmore.

Starland strongly agrees with the minority report that imbalance repeatedly referred to by the report between a district in Calgary and Lesser Slave or Peace River could be resolved by re-organizing the ridings of Edmonton and Calgary to more evenly distribute the population. The current recommendations will only further the dominance of Calgary and Edmonton in the Legislature at the expense of rural areas like Starland. Additionally the votes in our riding will be further diluted in comparison to any Calgary or Edmonton riding. The report justifies this dilution with the assumption that our population will shrink to the average by the time the next Boundary Commission is convened. We think that if the Commission think our area is struggling they would respond with more effective representation not less.

According to Wikipedia (and my own personal knowledge) Mill Woods is a residential area in the City of Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. Located in southeast Edmonton, Mill Woods is bounded by Whitemud Drive (Highway 14) to the north, 91 Street to the west, 34 Street to the east, and Anthony Henday Drive (Highway 216) to the south.[5] Mill Woods is adjacent to three other residential areas including The Meadows to the east across 34 Street, and Southeast Edmonton and Ellerslie to the south and southwest respectively across Anthony Henday Drive.

Given the geographical community boundaries, it would make more sense to have the divide along 34 Street with the east border being the Anthony Henday. Having the section east of 17 Street to the Henday does not align with the demographics of Edmonton-East as it is an older, established population with different needs. This configuration also follows similar boundaries of the municipal Ward 12. North and south boundaries would naturally be Whitemud to the north and Anthony Henday to the south. The demographics of the newer developments in the area is more similar to the existing population of Edmonton Millcreek with a diverse ethnicity including Latino, Indigenous, Pilipino and other south Asian groups.

My recommendation is to rename it "Edmonton Meadows" to recognize the established Community Leagues that operate in the area (The Meadows and Fulton Meadows). In order to offset the increased population to the proposed Mill Woods-West constituency (taken from the area between 50 St & 34 St), the dividing line between it and Edmonton-Ellerslie could be 23 Ave which is another major traffic artery (natural split). As this does divide up the neighbourhoods of Mill Woods, it could then be called Mill Woods-North (to differentiate it from the federal Edmonton-Mill Woods riding). By providing Edmonton-Ellerslie this additional population between 23 Ave & the Henday compensates for the area shaved off from its eastern boundary for Edmonton-Meadows.

Re: Redistribution of Provincial Electoral Boundaries - Southeast Alberta

Thank you for the opportunity to respond to the Commission's proposal for redistribution of provincial electoral boundaries. On behalf of Palliser Economic Partnership Ltd, we respectfully ask that the Commission revise its recommendations regarding the new electoral districts proposed for Southeast Alberta.

Palliser Economic Partnership is (PEP) was incorporated as a not-for-profit corporation in 2001. Its shareholders consist of twenty urban and rural municipalities and a post-secondary institution located in Southeast Alberta (see attached map). PEP is a member driven organization, with board members that include elected officials and business representatives from the region. More information regarding PEP can be sourced at www.palliseralberta.com.

Rural Alberta faces a wide range of challenges among them sparse population, limited growth opportunities, reduced provincial government spending in health and education, and physical infrastructure necessary to induce and attract business development. To that we now add rural constituencies becoming a convenience for those other than the voters who reside there.

The Commission's report to Honourable Robert Wanner makes reference to Madam Justice McLachlin (now Chief Justice of Canada) that

"It emerges therefore that deviations from absolute voter parity may be justified on the grounds of practical impossibility or the provision of more effective representation. Justice McLachlin went on state that "The problems of representing vast, sparsely populated territories, for example, may dictate somewhat lower voter populations in these districts; to insist on voter parity might deprive citizens with distinct interests of an effective voice in the legislative process as well as of effective assistance from their representatives in their "ombudsman" role.

While the Commission references the Chief Justice and the Supreme Court decision regarding latitudes it has to create and configure electoral districts the Commission has virtually ignored this advice when it established the new electoral districts in Southeast Alberta.

In the proposed **Taber – Vulcan** constituency it's a mere 300 km distance between Vulcan and Walsh and in the proposed **Strathmore – Drumheller** constituency its 335 km from Altario to Strathmore. These distances are greater than the distance between Edmonton and Calgary. To address the issue of distance in geographic size the "interim report" suggests that additional staff may be provided to the MLA, that Alberta highways are top notch which they are but you do not address winter and winter driving road conditions in rural Alberta which can in some years be more than six months of the year. Your additional suggestion that Internet / Broadband will also address issue of contact and communication with MLAs is also quite disconcerting.


The Canadian Radio and Telecommunication Commission recently announced that the new minimum standard for Canada is 50 Mbps for downloads and 10 Mbps for uploads. This standard does not exist in virtually all of rural Alberta which is already disadvantaged by having the poorest levels of broadband connectivity in the province. There is also little evidence to support your contention that rural broadband connectivity will improve in the next several years. The private sector has not rushed into rural Alberta to provide improved / enhanced broadband service nor is it going to do so. There is also no evidence that the Government of Alberta plans to alter the policy and the operations of the Alberta SuperNet to effect significant broadband improvements for rural Alberta.

The other point we wish to raise is the while it is not acceptable for the Commission to create blended constituencies in Edmonton or Calgary due to the fact that the voters there would have nothing in common with their rural neighbours yet it is acceptable to create a blended constituency in Southeast Alberta. The proposed **Brooks – Cypress** electoral district will include an urban portion of the City of Medicine Hat. These Medicine Hat voters will now be part of a rural constituency with voters in the farming – ranching community of Gem a mere 170 kilometers distant from one another. Again, does such a large geographic electoral district of this size really make common sense.

While we appreciate the work of the Commission we do not support the new electoral districts proposed for Southeast Alberta. As the geographic size of rural ridings' increase it does not assist the rural voter to be in contact with his / her MLA or vice versa. Nor does driving excessive distance on good roads in bad weather or reliance on less than adequate broadband service serve as sufficient responses to this issue for rural Albertans.

The Commission needs to re-evaluate the proposed constituencies and take other criteria into account to ensure effective representation for Albertans residing in Southeast Alberta. The Commission has the authority to implement, if necessary, the up to 25% deviation rule to maintain the existing electoral districts in Southeast Alberta and we encourage you to do so.

My name is Jason Watt. I am a resident of the neighbourhood of McLeod, which is proposed to be moved from Edmonton Manning to Edmonton Decore. I don't believe this change is the most logical. I will present my reasons here, as well as an alternate solution.

Proposed by the Committee:

To move the Edmonton Manning boundary from 66 Street, east on 153 Ave to 58 Street (a road that doesn't even exist across half the proposed division), south to 144 Ave (a major E-W thoroughfare) and then West back to 66 Street.

Committee solution outcomes:

Divides McLeod Community League, which comprises neighbourhoods of Miller, Casselman, Hollick-Kenyon, Matt Berry, and McLeod.

Leaves residents on either side of 58 Street, a quiet residential street, in two different ridings.

Adds approx. 2226 (2016 Edmonton Municipal Census) to Edmonton Decore, bringing total population to 49,862, but including no neighbourhoods with significant growth potential.

Jason Watt proposed solution:

Move the Edmonton Manning boundary south to 144 Ave, then cut East to 50 Street, then south to Fort Road/Manning Fwy, then southwest to 66 Street.

Jason Watt proposed solution outcomes:

Leaves all Community Leagues (Steele Heights, Kilkenny, Londonderry, McLeod, and Belvedere) intact. Moves a larger population (3,901 from York and 5,169 from Belvedere) into Edmonton Decore, giving a total of 56,706. Larger than the desired population, but includes no neighbourhoods that are likely to undergo significant population growth.

Uses busy roads (based on Committee's goal of using geographic boundaries) 144 Ave, 50 Street, and Fort Road/Manning Freeway, rather than quiet residential streets.

Removes Steele Heights/York from Edmonton Manning, reducing its population count to 50,133, which is still larger than the desired target population. It includes areas that are likely to experience significant growth over the next decade, and have likely already experienced growth that has not been counted. Likely, by the next provincial election, Edmonton Manning and Edmonton Decore would have similar population counts.

Removes Belvedere from Edmonton Beverly-Clareview, giving it boundaries that also make more sense, given existing roads. It moves the boundary from 66 Street/137 Ave to Fort Road, which is a more obvious geographic division. Leaves Edmonton Beverly-Clareview with a population of 41,347. 

Re: Proposed boundary for Innisfail-Sylvan Lake

As a long time resident of the Benalto area I would like to suggest the following changes to the proposed boundaries for the Innisfail-Sylvan Lake proposed Electoral Division (May 2017) referencing the following map:

On the northwest corner of the proposed Innisfail-Sylvan Lake Electoral Division (ED) I believe the natural western boundary for this ED is between RR 40 and highway 766 extending from the Red Deer River north to Highway 12 and from there due east to intersect with the Blindman river - then following the natural barrier of the Blindman River south and east to the boundary proposed in the Commission Report. This approximate natural boundary is shown by the green lines in the following sketch. For clarity I refer to it as the <u>766 Re-alignment</u>.



I suggest this addition for the following reasons:

The towns of Eckville, Benalto, Evarts, Spruceview/Dickson, Innisfail, and Sylvan Lake are historically linked both economically and culturally.

Natural Barriers and Connections

Initially this linkage followed the soil zones and the type of farming possible based on those soil types. The gray wooded soil zone typically starts a couple of miles west of Highway 766 extending from north to south in a line roughly through the hamlet of Hespero on RR 40 and running west into the eastern slopes of the Rocky Mountains.

North of Sylvan Lake proper the gray wooded soil zone extends northwards from an east to west line roughly following Highway 20 from Gilby to its intersection with the Blindman River west of the town of Bentley. This line runs along the south edge of the Medicine Lodge Hills, delineating another natural barrier between the area I propose should be added to the Innisfail – Sylvan Lake ED and adjacent EDs.

Economic and Trading Connections

The Alberta Wheat Pool (AWP) had large grain elevators at both Benalto and Eckville until 1982 and 2001 respectively. United Grain Growers Ltd. built a new grain elevator at Kuusamo, just east of Benalto in 1984 subsequent to rail service to Benalto being discontinued.

In contrast, in the gray wooded zone west of Highway 766 the AWP had only a small elevator at Leslieville and a very short lived elevator at Rocky Mountain House which closed in the late 1960s. This reflected the limited grain production potential of this higher elevation gray wooded soil zone.

The grain economy reflected by these elevators also established the principle trading patterns of the area in a block delineated by Eckville, Spruceview, Innisfail, and Sylvan Lake. This is a pattern which continues to this day.

The very recent amalgamation of the Eckville Cooperative Association (Alberta's first retail cooperative association) with the nearby Innisfail and Red Deer Cooperative Associations confirms this pattern. This amalgamated Cooperative will be opening a new retail store and fuel station in the Town of Sylvan Lake in the next couple of years which builds on an earlier initiative by the Eckville Cooperative Association to open a retail store and gas bar in the Town of Sylvan Lake.

It should be noted that the Board of Directors of the Eckville Cooperative Association examined the option of amalgamation with the thriving Rocky Mountain House Cooperative Association and rejected that option for various reasons including the lack of membership support for that option due to established trading patterns. A similar analysis by the Board of Directors and membership of the Eckville and District Credit Union led to their rejection of an amalgamation with the Rocky Mountain House Credit Union earlier last year.

The non-farm employment in the Eckville/Benalto area is primarily focused on the service sector in the Towns of Eckville, Sylvan Lake, the rural industrial subdivision at Kuusamo on Highway 11 just east of Benalto, and some services available in Benalto. Many non-farm residents of the area also commute to jobs in the City of Red Deer.

Cultural and Social Connections

Culturally this area east of highway 766 has used Eckville, Benalto, and Sylvan Lake for recreational and health facilities with most seniors from the area needing supportive care being housed in Eckville, Sylvan Lake and Innisfail. Public Libraries in Eckville and Sylvan Lake draw most of their patrons from people resident east of Highway 766. The Town of Sylvan Lake's new multi-purpose arena will continue to be the focus of much of this area's recreational services and it includes the closest available public swimming pool as well as ice and other playing surfaces.

Benalto's housing stock is increasing and children from this community are bussed to Sylvan Lake for K to 12. Many commute to Red Deer College for further education. The community is also working to reopen the recently closed Benalto Elementary School.

This same reasoning would suggest that the north boundary of the Innisfail Sylvan Lake proposed ED be moved north from the intersection of RGE RD 10 and TWP RD 394 to an east to west line roughly following Highway 20 from Gilby to

the intersection with the Blindman River west of the town of Bentley to intersect with a line extending north from the highway 766 Re-alignment.

<u>Drayton Valley – Rocky Mountain House</u>

This is not to suggest that Drayton Valley Rocky Mountain House is not a worthy constituency but its history, agroecology and trading patterns make it much less compatible with the common history shared between the proposed Innisfail – Sylvan Lake ED and with the proposed *766 Re-alignment* area I have outlined. Drayton Valley/Rocky has a long tradition of forestry, trapping, oil exploration, coal mining, and tourism which are largely absent from the proposed *766 Re-alignment* presented here.

I would conclude by saying that adding this small <u>766 Re-alignment</u> to the Innisfail Sylvan Lake ED would enable legislative representation which can focus on representing common interests whereas the present suggested ED makes the area I have delineated into a small anomaly within a large Drayton Valley Rocky Mountain House ED largely devoted to very different economic pursuits.

Lastly, <u>if and only if</u> it is necessary to reduce the population of the Innisfail-Sylvan Lake proposed ED I would suggest, for much the same reasons adumbrated above, that the southern boundary be made a simple straight line, extending east to west, along TWP RD 350 between the folds of the Red Deer River. This would exclude the Town of Bowden whose trading and cultural area can be seen to be split between Innisfail and Olds. This is also an area where the climate shifts from the wetter Parkland agro-ecology typical from Highway 54 north, to a more dry-land agro-ecology.

Canmore Town Council unanimously passed the following motion on July 4, 2017: "that the Town provide feedback to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission suggesting that the entirety of Improvement District #5 be included within the Banff Stoney electoral district."

The Town of Canmore has a long history of working with Kananaskis Country on matters of common interest such as seniors housing and the tourism economy. Since we often look to the Province for support, we believe that it would be most beneficial to have one MLA representing all of our communities. We are concerned that the proposed Electoral Districts of Highwood and Livingstone-Macleod - which would both contain a part of ID#5 - have little in common with our communities and shared recreational tourism economy. There is a concern that there might be little motivation at the MLA level to show the same cooperation that has benefitted our communities over the years.

I am concerned about the recommended changes that impact the constituencies of Banff-Cochrane and Airdrie.

In the current electoral divisions, our residence (located just north of the hamlet of Bottrel) is located in the Airdrie riding while our address, and centre where we do most of our shopping is, Cochrane. I was able to live with this electoral placement because I work in Airdrie. With the proposed changes, I would now be located in the electoral division of Banff-Stoney.

In the report it is noted that Cochrane has been moved to Airdrie-Cochrane to give "the residents of Cochrane a voice undiluted by the concerns of Alberta's mountain park communities." The proposed positioning of Bottrel, located in Rocky View County and a community connected to Cochrane and Cremona, is located in the electoral division of Banff-Stoney. This creates the same issue for Bottrel - the concerns of Alberta's mountain park communities are not tied to the needs of my rural community. I would argue that this will be a similar sentiment for the Town of Sundre that has been slapped (yes, this is an intentional word choice) in with Banff-Stoney. Sundre, located in the County of Mountain View, would be more connected to the interests and needs of Olds or Rocky Mountain House. In comparison, I would compare my response to be equal to a Calgarian who has been told that they will be represented by an MLA in Edmonton - that would not be acceptable.

The commission has emphasized representation by population to the disservice of Albertans residing in rural areas of the province. Equal representation for all is a laudable goal, however, an MLA's ability to serve the residents of the constituency should carry equal weight to that of its population. Residents expect their representatives to attend numerous events in person where they can meet with them in 'in the flesh'. That will make for a very tall order for any MLA serving the vast new rural ridings proposed in the Commission's Interim Report. In fact the name riding came about because in the days before motorized transportation, riding boundaries were selected on the distance you could travel on horseback in one day. Even traveling today by car across the new ridings will be an onerous task. These huge footprints must be reduced.

Another concern is the demographic makeup of the constituencies. In the case of the proposed St. Albert - Redwater riding, the new MLA will be asked to represent a population with very different concerns. About a third of the population will reside in the very urban setting of St. Albert with very urban concerns while two thirds of the riding will be more focused on agricultural issues and the challenges faced by small municipalities with stagnant or declining populations. I would suggest they are two birds with very different feathers.

My recommendation is that the 87 riding cap be removed from the Commission's mandate to allow for three additional ridings. That would go a long way toward addressing these two issues.

P.S. The Commission might want to consider the voting age populations, including projections over the next 10 years. It may just find that rep by 'voting' pop will be a little closer given the high number of below voting age residents in the urban areas.



My opinion is that they aren't so different from any other sparse rural area and should therefore be required to fall within the same population threshold as elsewhere. In this modern era we can do away with extreme deviation from the population mean, and stick closer to equal voting strength.

Q2 is Fort Mac - Lac La Biche. I think the Commission has adequately addressed the question of its population oddity due to the temporary displacement. The next census will show any adjustment required in future.

- Q3 the new divide of the 2 Fort McMurray ridings makes more sense than the prior one.
- Q4 the blended riding for Medicine Hat makes sense.
- Q5 proposed Drumheller Strathmore makes sense. Going with a higher population now to offset its decline makes sense and is forward-thinking.
- Q6 I strongly agree that Airdrie and Cochrane share similar makeup and concern and pairing them is a good idea

Other key points:

Rural ridings: I disagree with the points put forward in the minority report. Giving small or rural ridings more MLAs when the population does not justify it is undemocratic and must not happen. If required, provide rural MLAs with extra budget to have more staff and/or constituency offices.

Renaming ridings: I think all ridings should be renamed to be as descriptive of the area as possible. Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Commission's Interim Report. The MD of Bighorn will restrict its comments to the proposed Banff-Stoney Constituency boundary.

Bighorn is pleased that the entire municipality is in one constituency and not fragmented. Our geographic size of 2,700 sq. km. and central location on the eastern slopes has been recognized by the Commission. Bighorn's economy is based on very significant industrial resource extraction. Contributing \$4 Billion to the Alberta Goss Domestic Product of \$313 Billion, Bighorn is one of Alberta's essential economic engines.

The Bow River watershed is a unifying ecological influence from Lake Louise through to the ranchlands area of the MD to Cochrane, which includes the Ghost, Spray, and Kananaskis Rivers. Bighorn is adjacent to Banff National Park (BNP), Bow Valley Wildlands Park and Don Getty Wildlands Park, and Kananaskis Park; all being highly protected areas. The Bow Corridor is visited by hundreds of thousands of tourists every year to visit and recreate in these parks and communities. The TransCanada Highway and Highway 40 are key transportation routes for tourists to access these wonderful areas. Considering the high degree of protected areas within the BNP, MD of Bighorn and Kananaskis, Bighorn is very surprised that ID 5 – Kananaskis Country has been removed from the new constituency boundary. We strongly suggest the ID 5 be included in the boundary as it environmentally economically and historically connected to the Bow Valley and the noted protected areas.

Bighorn strongly supports the Commission's recommendation to include the Stoney First Nation reserve within the constituency. The Stoney Nation is recognized as a founding culture in this

area and are valued neighbours with Bighorn. Economic diversification will be a strong element in their future, especially tourism.

Bighorn questions the Commission's recommendation to include the Tsuut'ina First Nation reserve within the proposed electoral boundary. As with the Stoney's, the Tsuut'ina Nation is a founding culture in Alberta. The Tsuut'ina reserve is adjacent to the City of Calgary and it would appear this adjacency has created a beneficial relationship with the metropolitan economy within and surrounding Calgary. Specific example of shared economic interests between the Tsuut'ina and the City of Calgary would be the S.W. Calgary Ring Road and the Springbank Reservoir project. Should the Tsuut'ina Nation express a desire to be better connected to the municipalities within the Calgary Capital Region, Bighorn would support their wish.

Lastly, the exclusion of Cochrane from the proposed boundary is not shared by Bighorn. The Commission has referenced Cochrane residents want closer alignment with Airdrie as it concerns will be "undiluted by the concerns of Alberta's mountain park communities". Both Banff and Lake Louise are within National Parks and as such have very different operating principles and issues than municipalities outside of the park. However, Bighorn and the ranchlands area of our municipality have strong economic and historic connections dating back to the 1800's. The removal of Cochrane will frustrate that relationship.

Thank you again for the opportunity to comment on the Commission's Interim Report and specifically the proposed Banff-Stoney Constituency boundary. I hope you will consider Bighorn's comments and recommendations as you prepare your final report.

Dear Sirs:

I am writing to submit my response to the proposed electoral boundaries as outlined in the Interim Report of the 2016-17 Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission. My comments pertain to the proposed constituency of Calgary North (19).

The existing riding of Calgary Northern Hills, which I live in, encompasses Panorama Hills, Coventry Hills, Country Hills and Harvest Hills Neighborhoods. Hence the name Northern Hills. This is a well-designed riding as it encompasses the above-mentioned neighborhoods, who all belong to the Northern Hills Community Association. In addition, they all utilize facilities such as the Vivo Recreational Centre and Notre Dame High School. The riding tends to tie together neighborhoods that have common community bonds (See Illustration 1).

In the report, the Commission proposes to draw the eastern boundary at Harvest Hills Blvd/Centre Street, Country Hills Blvd to the south, Beddington Trail/Symons Valley Road to the Southwest and Evanspark Road to the West, and the Northern Boundary at the Calgary City Limits. The population of this proposed constituency is approximately 39,085, a 16 percent variance below the provincial average to allow for future growth of neighborhoods north of Stoney Trail (See Illustration 2).

I feel that these new boundary proposals would divide the communities of Panorama Hills and Coventry Hills and hinder their representation at the Provincial Level. What I am proposing in my submission is the following boundaries for Calgary North to reflect on the needs of Panorama Hills and Coventry Hills (See Illustration 3). I would humbly like to suggest the following boundaries:

- To move the western border of Calgary North from Evanspark Boulevard to 14th Street NW, and the northwest border from 14th Street NW down Stoney Trail to the intersection of Symons Valley Road/Beddington Trail NW. I feel that the community of Evanston would be better served in the Calgary Foothills Riding and keep Evanston and Symons Valley together in one riding. This proposal would also keep Foothills within five percent variance of the provincial population average.
- 2. To move the eastern border of Calgary North to Deerfoot Trail, from the City Limits down to Country Hills Boulevard. Deerfoot Trail is a natural boundary as Coventry Hills fits naturally with Panorama Hills while east of Deerfoot Trail would naturally lend to the Calgary Northeast Riding.
- 3. To establish the southern border along Country Hills Boulevard to Beddington Trail NW. Ideally Harvest Hills and Country Hills should be included in Calgary North, it is recognized that changing demographics and city growth would require changes and these two neighborhoods would be best served in Calgary Beddington.
- 4. **Beddington Trail from Country Hills Boulevard to Stoney Trail would be the Southwest Border**. Beddington Trail makes a natural boundary between Country Hills and Beddington.
- 5. **Stoney Trail from Beddington Boulevard to 14th St NW would the northwest border**. Stoney Trail makes a natural boundary between the neighborhoods of Evanston and Panorama Hills

Conclusion: By using natural boundaries such as Deerfoot Trail for the Eastern Border, Country Hills Boulevard for the Southern Border, Beddington Trail for the Southwest Border and Stoney Trail for the Northwest Border up to 14th Street NW would create a more representative constituency and allow for future growth in neighborhoods north of Stoney Trail in the future. It would also tend to keep core community neighborhoods together that would provide for more effective representation.

Illustration 1: Current Constituency of Calgary Northern Hills (2015 Boundaries)






Illustration 2: Proposed Calgary North Riding as Proposed by the Electoral Boundaries Commission (2017)

On behalf of the St. Albert and District Chamber of Commerce's 985 business members and their 19,000 employees, I would like to thank the Electoral Boundaries Commissions for the opportunity to voice our opinions and concerns regarding the review and proposed changes to the constituency boundaries for the Province of Alberta.

Historically the Commission's challenge in boundary realignment process has been based on representation by population. After reviewing the results of this traditional method, we have identified crucial and compelling elements are missing from the decision-making process and believe now is the time to adjust how constituency boundaries are determined and defined.

St. Albert is an urban community with a population nearing 66,000 people that is currently divided into two recommended constituencies – St. Albert and St. Albert-Redwater.

The proposed St. Albert-Redwater constituency is vast in size (covering close to 6,500 square kilometres) and we have concerns that the geographical size alone can greatly impeded an MLA's ability to properly represent their constituents. The needs of the 17,844 St. Albert residents included in this proposed constituency vary greatly from the 27,542 residents who live in the rural areas. St. Albert urbanites, statistically, are most likely commuters to Edmonton with little in common with the agricultural based communities of Bon Accord, Gibbons, Redwater, Smoky Lake, Waskateneau, and Vilna. How can an MLA effectively balance the potentially disparate interests of two very different kinds of constituents?

In addition to the balance of interests and representation, the MLA of this proposed riding would still face the challenge of building working relationships with seven different municipalities, their political officials, and community leaders. Compared to an urban MLA who may enjoy a close relationship with a single municipality, school board, and community; a rural MLA's ability to provide the same degree of access to constituents (even with satellite offices) is questionable. It is also unfair to expect a rural MLA to attend the same percentage of public functions in all the communities.

Representation by population, at first, appears logical, but the potential negative impact on rural ridings could be substantive. Adjusting boundaries solely based on population shifts without consideration for true democratic representation no longer meets the needs of constituents in our growing province.

We propose that the Electoral Boundary Commission consider a constituency blend of representation by population and geography. Perhaps rural ridings could contain less population than urban ridings, thereby making the rural ridings more manageable in geographical terms for the MLA. We contend an MLA can effectively represent a given (higher) population in a condensed urban geography as the needs and interests of the community are similar.

We urge the Commission to re-examine the St. Albert-Redwater constituency borders and ask that more consideration and emphasis be made on keeping communities of like interest intact. We believe that such changes in the process will also ensure the ability of the elected MLA to effectively represent their constituents and ensure a strengthened democratic process for Alberta.

I am writing to you and the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission members concerning the proposed interim boundaries for the constituencies in Alberta. I am very pleased with amount of work put in by the members of this commission. Attached are a written description of my personal proposals for the constituencies in the City of Edmonton, along with a map.

I believe that the Alberta constituencies should be based mainly on population and am pleased that the members of the commission agree. When the interim report became available, I examined the ridings located in the City of Edmonton. Overall, I was pleased with them. However, I disliked the fact that many ridings crossed the Yellowhead Trial, as that roadway is more of a dividing line in the city, rather than a connector. I started out by rearranging the population in Edmonton – West Henday, to remove the neighbourhoods of Wellington, Athlone and Calder, as they have no connection with the rest of the constituency. My brother, who lives in Wellington, brought up that fact that there is little economic or geographical connection between him and Lewis Estates. I ended up moving the population throughout almost all of the ridings to accommodate these changes and minimize the crossing of the Yellowhead Trail and North Saskatchewan River. I hope that the members of this commission review the changes that I have submitted and hopefully it will influence the ridings that are presented in the Final Report.



EDMONTON - CALDER

This riding would encompass an area in north western Edmonton. The boundary of this riding would be 113A Street (Castle Downs Road) from the Yellowhead Trail to 167th Avenue, where it would turn to run westward to the Boundary with St. Albert. The boundary would then follow the City of Edmonton's boundary until it reached 137th Avenue where it would go eastward until 149th Street and then south to the Yellowhead Trail, before turning east again until 113A Street. The population of this riding would be around 49 822, which would be a positive variance of seven percent. This variance is acceptable as there is very little room for residential growth in this riding.

EDMONTON - CASTLE DOWNS

Edmonton – Castle Downs would be a riding on the northern edge of the city. The boundary would be 82nd Street from 153rd Avenue to the northern boundary of the city of Edmonton, where it would turn west and follow the boundary as it turns south until 167th Street where it would head eastward. It would run east to 113A Street (Castle Downs Road) before heading south until 153 Ave, where it would turn east until 82nd Street. The population variance would be negative five percent, for a population of around 44 420. This would leave room for growth in the future neighbourhood of Goodridge Corners that is located in the riding.

EDMONTON - CITY CENTER

This riding would contain the downtown core in the city of Edmonton. The southern boundary of this riding would follow the North Saskatchewan River from Groat Road to 82nd Street, where a turn north would occur until it reached 111th Avenue where it would turn west. It would continue going west to 109th Street where it would turn south until 104th Ave, where a west turn would occur, followed by a turn south along 116th Street and another turn west along 102nd Ave. The final turn would be south along Groat Road, where it would follow until the North Saskatchewan River. The total population of this riding would be about 46 329, which leads to a variance of only negative one percent.

EDMONTON - CLAREVIEW

Edmonton – Clareview would be a riding in the north eastern side of Edmonton. The southern boundary of this riding would be the Yellowhead Trail from 66th Street to the City of Edmonton Boundary, where it would turn north and follow the boundary until the North Saskatchewan River, where it would turn west and follow the river until 144th Ave, where it would turn west. A turn north along Victoria Trail, which would be followed by a westward turn along 153rd Avenue, where the northern boundary of the riding would be. A south turn along 59th Street, the diving line between the Neighbourhoods of McLeod and Casselman, would be next and it would be followed up by a turn west along 144th Street and a turn south along 66th Street, where the boundary would continue until the Yellowhead Trail. The population of this riding would be 48 897, which would result in a five percent population deviation from the Provincial Average. This is acceptable as there is minimal room for Residential growth in this riding.

EDMONTON - DECORE

Edmonton – Decore would contain an area in north Edmonton, just north of the Yellowhead Trail. The riding would have its western Boundary on 113A Street (Castle Downs Road) stretching from 153 Avenue to the Yellowhead Trial. Yellowhead Trail would form the southern boundary from 113A Street to 66th Street, where the boundary would turn north and follow 66th Street until it reached 144th Avenue, were it would turn west. The boundary then would turn north once again on 59th Street, which is dividing line between the neighbourhoods of McLeod and Casselman, before turning eastward and following 153rd Avenue until it reaches Castle Downs Road. The area in this riding would have a population close to 46 087, which would be a variance of negative one percent.

EDMONTON - EAST

This constituency would consist of much of the eastern side of Edmonton south of the North Saskatchewan River. The northern boundary of this riding would be the North Saskatchewan River, from the boundary at 39th Street to Connors Road at the Low Level Bridge. The Boundary would continue south east down Connors road to the traffic circle at Bonnie Doon, were it would turn south and follow 83rd Street all the way until Argyll Road (63rd Ave), were it would turn west, before turning south on Gateway Boulevard. It would follow Gateway Boulevard until it reached Whitemud Drive, were it would turn east and continue as far as 34th Street before turning south and then turning east on 38th Avenue. This would be followed by another turn south on 17th Street, were the boundary would continue until it reached 23rd Avenue. The future realignment of 23rd Avenue, which would realign 23rd Avenue to move north to 34th Avenue to cross the Anthony Henday, would be the boundary. The entire eastern side of the riding would have the Edmonton city limits as its boundary. The riding would have a population of around 49 773, which would be a positive variance of seven percent. The riding would have a boundary of the future alignment of 23rd Avenue to ensure the future neighbourhood of Aster would not be inside the constituency, so not raise the population higher than it already would be in the future.

EDMONTON - ELLERSLIE

This riding would encompass the south eastern corner of the city of Edmonton. The western boundary of the constituency would be Gateway Boulevard from the Anthony Henday to the city's southern boundary, the riding would then follow the city of Edmonton's boundary from Gateway Boulevard to 34th Ave on the Anthony Henday. The areas east of Gateway Boulevard being annexed by the city would be included in this riding. The boundary would then follow the future alignment of 23rd Avenue, until it reaches 34th Street, where it would head south until it reaches the Anthony Henday, were it would continue along until Gateway Boulevard. The variation of this riding is negative eight percent, or 43 160, to allow for future growth in many areas throughout this riding.

EDMONTON - GLENORA

Edmonton – Glenora would be a riding just west of the downtown core. 149th Street, from the Yellowhead Trail to the MacKinnon Ravine, would be the western boundary. MacKinnon Ravine, along with the North Saskatchewan River, would be the southern boundary. The boundary would then turn

north along Groat Road, east along 102nd Street, north again along 116th Street, east again along 104th Street and finally turn north along 109th Street until it reaches the Yellowhead. The Yellowhead Trail forms the entire northern boundary from 109th Street until 149th Street. The population in this constituency would be about 43 809 and have a variance of negative six percent. This leaves room for future population growth in the Blatchford Neighbourhood, where the City Center Airport used to be.

EDMONTON - HERITAGE VALLEY

The constituency of Edmonton – Heritage Valley would be located in the southern end of Edmonton. The eastern boundary of the riding is Gateway Boulevard and the northern boundary is 23rd Avenue. The western boundary consists of Whitemud Creek from 23rd Ave to Ellerslie Road and 141st street from Ellerslie Road to 41st Avenue. This also includes the minor realignment of 141st Street to Heritage Valley Trail, to minimize impact in the future as this road will be changed. The southern boundary of this riding is 41st Avenue. The population in this riding is close to 42 229 and the population variance is negative ten percent. This ensures that future growth in this riding can be accommodated.

EDMONTON - HIGHLANDS - BEVERLY

This riding would consist of the areas east of downtown and directly south of the Yellowhead Trail. The entire northern boundary of this constituency would be the Yellowhead Trail and the majority of the southern boundary would be the North Saskatchewan River, stretching from the Yellowhead Trail to 82nd Street. The rest of the boundary would be composed of 82nd Street until 111/112th Avenue, were it would turn west until it reaches 109th Street, were it would turn north once again. The population variance in this riding is positive two percent, which is close to the provincial average. The population itself is near 47 735.

EDMONTON - MANNING

Edmonton – Manning would be located in the extreme north eastern corner of Edmonton. Edmonton's boundary would provide the boundary from Range Road 232 in the east to 82nd Street in the west. The boundary would also follow 82nd Street to 153rd Avenue before turning east and following 153rd Avenue until Victoria Trail. Here it would turn south and then quickly east again along 144th Avenue, before following the North Saskatchewan River to Edmonton's boundary. This area altogether would have a population of about 42 284, or a variance of negative nine percent. This allows room for future population growth in these developing areas.

EDMONTON - MCCLUNG

The riding of Edmonton – McClung would encompass an area in western Edmonton. The Patricia Ravine would form part of the boundary from Whitemud Drive to the North Saskatchewan River. The North Saskatchewan River would then be the boundary until the Anthony Henday, were it would turn north along the Anthony Henday and then turn west along 62nd Avenue and north once again along Winterburn Road. The entire northern boundary would consist of Whitemud Drive. The population in this riding would be close to 44 936, which would be a variance of negative six percent.

EDMONTON - MEADOWLARK

This constituency would be located in western Edmonton, close to the downtown areas. The Patricia Ravine and the North Saskatchewan River from that Ravine to the MacKinnon Ravine, would form a portion of the boundary to this constituency. The MacKinnon Ravine would form the next section of the boundary, followed by 149th Street to 111th Avenue, were the boundary would move to 111th Avenue and continue along Mayfield Road, before the last section of boundary, 170th Street, stretching all the way to Patricia Ravine. The name for this constituency would be Edmonton – Meadowlark, as the Meadowlark shopping center would be at the center of the riding and the name would have a better fit here compared to the areas to the west. The population variance would be positive four percent, as there is little growth occurring in this riding. The population would be about 48 436.

EDMONTON -- MILL WOODS EAST

Edmonton – Mill Woods East would be a riding in the eastern section of Mill Woods. The eastern boundary would be formed by 50th Street, from Whitemud Drive to Mill Woods Road. The boundary would continue east along Mill Woods Road and 16A Avenue, before turning north along 34th Street, east along 23rd Avenue and north again along 17th Street. Once it arrived at 38th Ave it would turn west, followed by a northward turn along 34th Street and finally a westward turn along Whitemud Drive. The population for this area would be 48 268 and have a variance of positive three percent.

EDMONTON -- MILL WOODS WEST

Edmonton – Mill Woods West would be a riding in the western section of Mill Woods. The northern boundary would be Whitemud Drive, the eastern boundary would be Gateway Boulevard and the southern boundary would be the Anthony Henday Drive. 34th Street would form the first section of the boundary next, followed by 16A Avenue and Mill Woods Road, before finally using 50th Street until it reaches Whitemud Drive. The only adjustment to this riding, compared to the interim report, would be the introduction of the neighbourhood of Crawford Plains to help lower the population in Edmonton – Ellerslie. The population of this area altogether would be 51 418, resulting in a variance of positive ten percent. This is acceptable as there is no residential growth occurring in this riding.

EDMONTON - RUTHERFORD

This riding encompasses an area in southern Edmonton. The riding would have a western boundary of Whitemud Creek, from the North Saskatchewan River to 23rd Avenue. 23rd Avenue would be the southern boundary and the eastern boundary would consist of Gateway Boulevard. The northern boundary would have a couple sections. From Gateway Boulevard to 122nd Street, 63rd/61st Avenue would be the boundary. At 122nd Street the boundary would turn north and then it would turn west once it reaches the North Saskatchewan River. This riding would have a population of about 49 637 and a population variance of positive six percent.

EDMONTON - SOUTH WEST

This constituency consists of the southwest corner of the City of Edmonton. The boundary mainly follows Edmonton's boundary. At 62nd Avenue, the boundary would follow Edmonton's boundary along Winterburn Road and continue until it would reach 141st Street in the south. (The riding would also include the area annexed by the City of Edmonton west of Highway 2). At 141st Street the boundary would follow the road along its realignment and continue north and continue along Whitemud Creek as well, before turning west on 23rd Avenue and south again along Rabbit Hill Road. The boundary would then follow the Anthony Henday until 62nd Avenue, where it would turn west. The population variance for this area would be negative eight percent, to allow for future growth in the region. It would have a population close to 43 069.

EDMONTON – STRATHCONA


Edmonton – Strathcona would be a riding directly south of the Downtown Core and the North Saskatchewan River. From Connors Road to 122nd Street, the North Saskatchewan River would be the northern boundary. This would be followed south by 122nd Street and then west along 61st Avenue, which turns into 63rd Avenue (Argyll Road), before turning north on 83rd Street. 83rd Street turns into Connors Road via the traffic circle and the boundary would then continue until it reaches the river. The population would be around 50 772 and the population variance would be positive nine percent. This variation is allowable, due to the slow residential growth in the area.

EDMONTON - WEST

Edmonton – West is located in the extreme west of Edmonton. The southern boundary of this constituency would be Whitemud Drive. The eastern boundary would follow 231st Street and the northern boundary would follow the edge of Big Lake and 137th Avenue until 149th Street. 149th Street would be the boundary until 111th Avenue, which turns into Mayfield Road, and the last section would be 170th Street. This riding would have a population of about 44 462, and a population variance of negative five percent. This allows for future growth in the region in the years ahead.

EDMONTON – WHITEMUD

The riding of Edmonton – Whitemud would be exactly same as recommended in the interim report. The population would be 46 833 and have no population variation.

I am writing to express deep concern regarding the Interim Report boundary recommendation of the new provincial St. Albert-Redwater constituency. There seems no logic to the proposed boundaries, which would place nearly 18,000 St. Albert residents in a new constituency that extends some 187 kilometres. This vast region would extend east to Redwater, Waskatenau, Smoky Lake, Vilna and includes the smaller communities within Thorhild and Smoky Lake Counties.

As a former MLA for the St. Albert constituency from 1979 – 86, I know the challenges of serving the needs of a large diversified constituency. At that time, St. Albert constituency borders extended north into the Municipal District of Westlock, east to Gibbons and west to Callihou and the Alexander Aboriginal First Nation. We had a diverse population of rural and urban but the boundaries were primarily based on the trading patterns of this growing region.

The recent Electoral Boundaries report does a great job of population distribution in each constituency. However, the proposal for the St. Albert-Redwater Electoral Division does not take into consideration distance and diversity. The natural trading areas and the linkages the residents have within the boundaries was certainly not considered for the proposed St. Albert-Redwater constituency.

I submit that the boundaries in this new electoral division do not make sense for both the electorate and for the MLA. In my experience, the rural counties and smaller communities rely much more on their members of the Legislature to make linkages to various provincial government departments. Having access to your MLA is important for both the individual citizen and for the local governments. This consideration should also be included in determining what is fair for electoral boundaries.

I respectfully ask The Electoral Boundaries Commission to reconsider the boundaries for the St. Albert-Redwater Electoral Division. One proposal submitted by the St. Albert Progressive Conservative Constituency Association provides a logical solution that would keep the population count within the guidelines but at the same time respect the natural linkages that voters would expect for their electoral division.

The proposed boundary changes to north central Calgary do not consider the lived experiences of constituents. Specifically, the proposed changes separate the similar communities of Panorama Hills, Country Hills, Harvest Hills and Coventry Hills. These 4 communities form the largest community association in the city, and asking for them to be represented by 3 different MLAs is ineffective. This will result in triplication of efforts and resources by constituency staff and the MLAs themselves. Further, the City of Calgary recently changed its ward boundaries to bring north central communities back together. 
It is with great concern that it has been proposed to move the town of High River from Highwood into Livingstone-Macleod Riding.

Dear Justice Bielby,

On behalf of Councils for the Town of Drayton Valley and Brazeau County, we wish to express our concerns regarding recommendations made in the Interim Report on the *Proposed Electoral Division Areas, Boundaries, and Names for Alberta* for the Drayton Valley-Devon riding.

It is understandable that electoral boundaries will need to be adjusted as population centres grow. The proposal to restructure the Drayton Valley-Devon riding to become "Drayton Valley-Rocky Mountain House" riding, however, does not fully contemplate the benefits of community groupings with potential for symbiotic relationships. Benefits of the Town of Drayton Valley and Brazeau County being linked with the Town of Devon, Parkland County, Village of Warburg, Village of Breton, Town of Thorsby, and Town of Calmar include increased access to potential trade partners and business interests as well as recognition of well-used transportation corridors. The current constituency facilitates linkages between municipalities within this primary East-West transportation corridor, and our Councils believe this enhances the opportunities for a supportive and effective partnership between municipalities like Drayton Valley, Brazeau County, Parkland County, the Town of Devon, and others. These commonalities of interest allow for partnerships, cohesion, and collaborative work toward regional goals that can result in economic growth and prosperity to our area. One such partnership that holds great promise for our region is the Alberta Hemp Alliance, a municipal-industry alliance whose purpose is to enhance industrial opportunities and which includes all of the above-mentioned municipalities.

Another significant argument that we would like to present for your consideration is the long history between the Town of Drayton Valley and Brazeau County. As the Town and County

share an extensive past consisting of partnerships and economic interests that ensure a high quality of life for residents in both municipalities, it would benefit the region to keep these municipalities in the same riding as much of our joint advocacy includes our provincial elected representative. This work is done much more effectively when the MLA represents municipalities with similar goals and interests.

Accordingly, we respectfully submit that the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission revise its Report with the inclusion of common economic interests that are considered a factor in assessing potential ridings. We would propose that the boundary is realigned such that the southern boundary of Devon-Parkland does not run south along RR22 but rather continues easterly to HWY 2. Pigeon Lake, including the villages around the lake, would then be included in the Rocky Mountain House riding. In this scenario, all of Brazeau County would be included in Devon-Parkland as would the Town of Drayton Valley. To maintain balance, parts of Wetaskiwin County would be added to Rocky Mountain House riding.

We are proud of the work we have done within Drayton Valley and Brazeau County to promote and foster quality of life and economic development. We feel that the commission's proposal for a boundary change of this magnitude would be counterproductive and would serve to inhibit the forward momentum and future successes of projects and initiatives between our municipalities. As the communities within our constituency grow and prosper, so does the province as a whole.

Many thanks to you and the other Commission members for your time and attention to this important matter.

Submission to Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission - July 2017

A. Introduction

The primary problem with Alberta's existing electoral boundaries is a lack of adherence to the principle of representation by population. The Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission (the Commission) appointed in 2016 was tasked with recommending new boundaries for the province's 87 constituencies.

Public Interest Alberta's Democracy Task Force (the Task Force) made a written submission and an oral presentation to the Commission and is pleased to see the Commission's Interim Report follow the overall direction of making Albertans' votes count equally regardless of where they live in the province.

B. Review of recommendations in our previous submission

We made two main recommendations in our initial written submission to the Commission:

1. Limit the variance in constituency population to 5%.

While legislation allows the Commission to vary the population size of constituencies to 25% above or below the average constituency population, the Task Force recommended the variance be kept to a maximum of 5%. The Commission also has the power to create up to four "special exceptions" constituencies with population variances as high as 50% above or below the average constituency population. We recommended against the Commission using that power.

2. Recommend the Legislative Assembly strengthen supports to MLAs to assist them in effectively representing their constituents and addressing their varying needs.

Recognizing there are myriad challenges for MLAs to effectively represent their constituents and that adopting boundaries that follow the principle of representation by population will shift some of those challenges, the Legislative Assembly should assess the resources given to all MLAs in their constituencies. Those challenges range in nature and include large geographical constituencies, high poverty rates, diverse language populations, and much more. The increased costs to ensure sufficient resources are in place would be a necessary investment in strengthening democracy and a necessary complement to the move to more political equality and representation by population.

C. Evaluating the Commission's Interim Report

The Task Force commends the Commission on the immense amount of work that went into producing its Interim Report. Its task of redrawing the boundaries of 87 constituencies and taking into consideration a wide variety of factors, some of them competing with others, is a difficult one. The consultation process was exemplary, and the Interim Report shows that the Commission members listened closely to the wide array of viewpoints they received in both written submissions and oral presentations.

The Task Force continues to believe that the full implementation of the two recommendations in our previous submission would greatly strengthen the democratic nature of Alberta's electoral system, and we therefore use them as our main criteria to judge the contents of the Commission's Interim Report.

Overall, the Interim Report takes the right approach to the principle of representation by population, recognizing it as "a fundamental underpinning of any democracy" (p. 26). The current system of electoral boundaries is one of unfairness by design. Previous constituency boundaries were drawn in such a way that guaranteed political inequality would be the norm; votes in some areas would be worth much more than in others. Clearly, the Commission has recognized that this approach cannot continue and is recommending a much more democratic direction.

The Commission also rightly rejected approaching its task as a balancing act between urban and rural interests. The Interim Report says, "the time has come to stop treating differences between rural and urban Albertans as a main driver in setting the boundaries of electoral divisions" and that the Commission "arrived at its recommendations for every area of the province without labelling those areas either rural or urban" (p. 26). In avoiding the rural versus urban dichotomy, the Commission was able to focus more squarely on strengthening democracy.

The Interim Report recognizes that effective representation for Albertans of urban areas "can be addressed by measures falling short of creating electoral divisions with significantly smaller populations than average" (p. 26). It offers alternatives for large geographical constituencies, including increasing the presence of satellite offices and adding more staff. It also recognizes input it received that all constituencies have their own particular demands that can vary widely and can include things like high poverty rates and diverse cultural and linguistic groups (p. 17).

The Commission's suggestion to the Legislative Assembly that "addressing the specific costs of additional staff and the operation of satellite offices for remote constituencies would certainly help voters in geographically large electoral divisions feel they can more readily access the services of their MLAs" is a welcome alternative to large disparities in voting power between constituencies (p. 27).

The result of the Commission's consideration of the above factors is a proposal with 53 of Alberta's 87 constituencies falling within our recommended population variance of 5% (compared to 37 of 87 in the previous Commission's final report). While the progress made is both substantial and welcome, 34 of 87 constituencies remain with a population variance of greater than 5%, including 16 with a variance greater than 10% and 2 with a variance greater than 30%. These large variances violate the principle of political equality by which every vote should be counted as equally as possible.

To illustrate the unfairness of large variances, it is instructive to compare the two constituencies at the extremes of the problem. The Interim Report proposes that Drayton Valley-Rocky Mountain House have a population of 54,609, while Lesser Slave Lake would have a population of 27,818. A single vote in Drayton Valley-Rocky Mountain House would therefore be worth nearly half the weight of a single vote in Lesser Slave Lake.

Population variances of greater than 5% should be reduced to within that margin. While some slightly larger variances are probably necessary to account for particularly problematic and compelling local circumstances, these large variances are unnecessary, undemocratic, and must be avoided.

D. Conclusion

The overarching principles espoused in the Commission's Interim Report rightly emphasize the importance of representation by population. The Interim Report recommends a direction that would strengthen democracy in Alberta by reducing the overall disparity in population between constituencies, and is an enormous improvement over the work of previous boundary commissions. We commend the members of the Commission for their impressive work so far.

However, the Commission should go further in its final report to recommend the populations of all constituencies fall within a variance of 5% above or below the average constituency population. Doing so will help to ensure votes are counted as equally as possible in the elections to come and will be a logical extension of the principled work done by the Commission in its Interim Report.

We wish to thank the members of the Commission for their important contribution made in their efforts so far and to encourage them to make these necessary further steps in their final report.

After reviewing the interim report, we have concerns with the draft boundaries for the three ridings of St Albert, St Albert-Redwater, and Barrhead-Morinville-Westlock. Specifically, we feel the current boundaries create the following:

- -One riding that is a suburban Edmonton community (St Albert),
- -One riding that is a primarily a suburban Edmonton community with a minority rural component (St Albert-Redwater),
- -One riding that is primarily rural with a minority of suburban Edmonton (Barrhead-Morinville-Westlock).

We feel that the boundaries can be re-aligned within themselves to create three constituencies that are more homogeneous. Namely, they could be redrafted to create two constituencies of suburban Edmonton communities, and one constituency being uniformly rural.

Therefore, the St. Albert Progressive Conservative Association recommends the following:

- -Keep the contemporary St. Albert constituency boundaries intact (the city of St. Albert minus the neighborhoods of Deer Ridge, Lacombe Park, and North Ridge). This riding will have a population of approximately 46,463 which is <1% below the desired benchmark.
- -The St Albert neighborhoods of Deer Ridge, Lacombe Park, and North Ridge, previously part of Spruce-Grove-St Albert, to be grouped with the town of Morinville and the section of Sturgeon County immediately north of Edmonton and South of Highway 570. This area is primarily composed of high density acreages with residents that work, shop, and participate in liesure activities in St Albert and North

Edmonton. This new riding will have a population of approximately 46,892, which is <1% below the desired benchmark. This riding can be known as St. Albert - Morinville.

-The remaining rural portions of the draft St. Albert – Redwater constituency to be grouped in the draft riding of Barrhead – Morinville – Westlock. This riding will have a population of approximately 44,609 which is 4% below the desired benchmark. This riding can be known as Barrhead – Westlock – Redwater.

The rational for these recommendations are as follows:

- The communities grouped together in this proposal will likely have more similar interests, ie. the rural communities and small towns of Barrhead Westlock Redwater will be grouped together, as will the suburban voters of St Albert, Morinville, and southern Sturgeon County. This would allow the common interests of these citizens to be more effectively represented.
- A natural and historical transportation corridor flows from Edmonton through St Albert to Morinville. As such, the residents of the Morinville area use St Albert businesses, schools, sports, and recreation facilities. Furthermore, the closest hospital in the area is located in St. Albert, which serves many residents in the surrounding area.
- The local St Albert newspaper devotes print space to news from Morinville and Sturgeon County.
- -The St Albert Chamber of Commerce is actually named the St Albert and District Chamber of Commerce because it services and advocates for business throughout the surrounding area.
- -The St. Albert Catholic School Board includes schools in the town of Morinville, thereby, allowing a common interest to be represented by a single MLA.
- -The communities that are grouped together have common historical ties, and have a common Francophone heritage
- -Keeping the St. Albert constituency in its current form will allow the current constituency associations from all political parties to be kept intact, allowing for minimal disruption in the relationships that have formed over the last years of activity. It will also minimize voter confusions as to what constituency they live in.

All these connections show the organic and naturally occurring relationship between St Albert and the communities immediately surrounding the city, and lend credence that they should be served by the same MLA.

Presentation to the Electoral Boundaries Commission July 19, 2017 Presented by Colleen Powell

This presentation concerns the proposed constituency of Fort McMurray - La La Biche, states why this proposal should be reconsidered, and suggests a partial solution to the problem.

This constituency is much like a barbell with a large population at one end and a somewhat smaller population at the other end with very little in between. The main urban centre of Fort McMurray is 350km north of the southwestern edge of the constituency and roughly 300 km from the other major centres of Athabasca and Lac la Biche. There is no community of significant population north of the boundaries of Athabasca County and Lac La Biche and only one major road between them. There is a secondary road at the extreme eastern edge of the constituency.

North of the counties of Athabasca and Lac La Biche are several small and often indigenous communities. These are all small communities, under 500 people for the most part. Although there has been forestry and oil and gas activity in the area, it has not meant an increase in settled population. The area is part of the great boreal forest and thus very little farming except at the borders of the counties.

The two counties of Athabasca and Lac La Biche have a diverse economy whose main employers are Athabasca University, Portage College, and Alberta Pacific Forest Industries. There is also a significant presence of health care, K-12 education, other government departments, a robust oil servicing industry as well as retail and commercial small business. Farming in Athabasca County accounts for around 20%

of the reported employment and is a significant part of the Lac La Biche economy and way of life.

The Athabasca region county is just outside the Capital Region and any service not available in the area is accessed in St. Albert or Edmonton. There is no connection to Fort McMurray. Lac La Biche is further from the Capital Region but again St. Albert and Edmonton draws people from here for goods and services not available in Lac La Biche.

The southern half of the city of Fort McMurray suffered most from the fire and has seen its population drop by about 9,000 people. Many of these people are waiting until they can return and rebuild, thus the population number cannot be taken as accurate. In fact the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo (RMWB) has just completed a population projection that shows a significant increase over the figure used by the Commission. (See the Appendix)

Objections to the Proposed Constituency of Fort McMurray - Lac La Biche
Article 14 of the Electoral Boundaries Act lists the factors that the Commission shall take into
consideration.

This proposed constituency ignores several of these factors:

14 (a) the requirement for effective representation as guaranteed by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

The fire in Fort McMurray will mean that the MLAs of that area must make the rebuilding a priority. This will entail not only working with the municipality but ensuring that provincial services are available for those who need it. This by necessity will become the major focus of both provincial representatives leaving the southern areas of Athabasca and Lac La Biche without effective representation.

14(b) sparsity and density of population

The urban area of Fort McMurray is a densely populated urban centre surrounded by a very sparse population. 300 kilometres to the south are the two counties of Athabasca and Lac La Biche; each town having about 3000 people and the Village of Boyle with a population of around 900. The rest of the population in the two areas is rural farming or county residential. This is a medium density population. There are no centres large enough to be villages between the edges of the counties and the urban centre of Fort McMurray. The sparsity means that there is nothing that really connects the two areas.

14(c) common community interests and community organizations, including those of Indian reserves and Metis settlements.

There are no common community interests between the Northern part of the constituency and the southern other than a shared economic base in parts of the area. There are no community organizations that connect these two areas.

The Athabasca County area is just outside the Capital Region and this is where people, business and government orient when they need products, medical services, entertainment or other services not available in the local area.

There are two groups that do connect with Fort McMurray – oil servicing businesses and people who choose to live in this area but work in Fort McMurray. Although this number is not small, it does not form the basis of a connectivity with the northern area.

The main economic drivers in the Athabasca area are: Alberta Pacific Forest Industries, employing roughly 450 people, Athabasca University, employing about 450 people, and agriculture which accounts for about 20% of the rural populations' occupation. I am not that familiar with the Lac La Biche area, but Portage College, major government agencies and agriculture play a large role in their economy. None of these have major connections with the northern area of this proposed constituency.

In fact, other than people living in the south and working in the north there is no connection between the two areas. The oil servicing industry in the Athabasca area works throughout the oil sands area, not just the Fort McMurray area.

There is a significant indigenous population in the Lac La Biche area and in Wood Buffalo but the Metis colonies of Kikino and Buffalo Lake have been allocated to the proposed St. Albert Redwater constituency. It is difficult to try and bring indigenous groups together into one constituency and in both

these cases, unsuccessful.

14(g) geographical features, including road systems

Although the Athabasca and Lac La Biche areas are within the boreal forest, farming is still a major occupation which it is not further north. There is one major road and one secondary road connecting the two areas. This does not constitute a road system. It is simply the only way other than flying to get from anywhere in Alberta to Fort McMurray. It does not connect the communities, it simply runs through them. The Athabasca River does connect the two areas but only in the concern both areas have in maintaining and improving the health of the river.

This proposed constituency ignores four critical factors that the Commission needs to address when redrawing electoral boundaries and thus it must be changed.

This presentation does not attempt to redraw the entire constituency but proposes a solution for the northern part – Wood Buffalo.

Proposal for Two Wood Buffalo Constituencies

I propose creating two constituencies within the boundary of Wood Buffalo.

The impact of the fire, the worst natural disaster in Alberta history, cannot be underestimated and the need for dedicated services will be necessary for a long time. The MLAs are part of this service and can help with the rebuilding by working with the municipality, government agencies and NPOs, but this must be a significant focus of their constituency work. This is best done within the boundaries of Wood Buffalo

Population

The southern half of Fort McMurray suffered the greatest loss, losing roughly 9,000. However this calculation was done prior to any concerted rebuilding in the city. To assume that over a ten year period this population would not increase in highly unlikely. The Commission's calculation of the population of Fort McMurray Conklin at 17, 129 based on figures from the Office of Statistics and Information, Alberta Treasury Board and Finance. However, the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo (RMWB) has done their statistical count and their figure for the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo is between 75,600 and 77.600.

The figure the Commission is using for the total area is 64,165 which is quite different from the newer Fort McMurray projection. I am not disputing the Commission's figures but suggest that the RMWB figures are more recent and should not be discounted.

If the RMWB figures are accurate, then two constituencies can be formed within the current boundaries of the municipality. This would be in accord with Article 14(e) wherever possible, existing municipal boundaries.

If the Commission's numbers reflect the current population, two constituencies can still be formed as special constituencies. Only two special constituencies have been proposed leaving room for two more. The Commission could work with RMWB for the best configuration and perhaps only one constituency needs to be designated a special constituency.

Population 64,165 Constituency 32,082 Constituency 32,083

There is no community in Alberta that needs special designation more than this area which must rebuild and rehouse many people. Under Article 15(2) of the Act I believe the following apply to Wood Buffalo.

- 15.2(a) the area of the proposed electoral division exceeds 20,000 square kilometres or the total surveyed area...exceeds 15,000 square kilometres.
- 15.s(b) the distance from the Legislature Building in Edmonton to the nearest boundary of the proposed

electoral division by the most direct highway route is more that 150 kilometres.

- 15.2(d) the area of the proposed electoral division contains an Indian reserve or a Metis settlement.
- 15.2(e) the proposed electoral division has a portion of its boundary coterminous with a boundary of the Province of Alberta

The proposed constituency of Fort McMurray - Conklin will not meet the needs of neither the urban area of Fort McMurray nor the southern areas encompassing the counties of Athabasca and Lac La Biche. The proposal did not consider the needs of Fort McMurray as it rebuilds in that it will need the concentrated focus of the MLAs, leaving the southern area underrepresented. There are no common interests and no connectivity.

The best solution is to create two constituencies within the boundaries of the Regional Municipality of Woo

Other Concerns

St. Albert Redwater

This is a brief note on the changes to the southern area of the current Athabasca Sturgeon Redwater

This constituency attempts to knit together a growing urban area with county residential, farming and small town communities just north of St. Albert and with a rural area distant and not connected in anyway to St. Albert. Smoky Lake does not fit into this configuration and is likely to be under represented. In addition the Metis colonies of Kikino and Buffalo Lake are included in this proposal which makes little sense. The people in these settlements orient to Lac La Biche and Boyle, not Redwater, nor St. Albert.

There is concern that city issues will overwhelm rural concerns and many would prefer that St. Albert be removed from this constituency. It appears that the northern area of St. Albert is growing rapidly especially near the COSTCO site and increase the size of the constituency beyond what is needed.

Retain Athabasca - Sturgeon - Redwater

Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater has been together for some time and connections between the areas have been built. It falls within the population guidelines and the Aspen School Division includes Smoky Lake and Thorhild providing more connectivity. There is no real reason to change these boundaries, but understanding the difficulty the Commission has in creating new constituencies, changing the borders slightly would be accepted by most. For example, taking St. Albert out of the new proposal and adding Athabasca County back in with perhaps more of rural Sturgeon County could be acceptable.

Council Accepts New Regional Population Model

(Fort McMurray, AB – May 10, 2017) – Updated population projections for the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo were accepted by Council at its public meeting on Tuesday night.

It is estimated that approximately 75,600 to 77,600 permanent residents are living in the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo, including 72,000 to 74,000 residents in the urban service area of Fort McMurray.

Using a best practice model developed by Nichols Applied Management, the projections were updated by the Oil Sands Community Alliance in collaboration with the Wood Buffalo Steering Group (WBSG),

comprised of representatives from Council, industry and municipal administration.

"The economic downturn, the slowdown of capital-intensive growth in the oil sands and population changes due to the impact of the wildfire necessitated the development of new projections," said Jamie Doyle, Director of Planning and Development. "This update will be used to inform and support long-term planning in the region, including any recommendations and planning developed by the WBSG."

"The population projections show a different future for our community than envisioned a few years ago. However, this information is essential if we are to properly plan and provide the programs, infrastructure and other services to maintain the quality of life for residents in the RMWB," said Karim Zariffa, Executive Director, OSCA.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide further feedback to the Alberta Boundary Commission. I will comment on the Interim Report, and on my ability to share my views on this important subject. I like the Interim Report. A solid effort has been made to move Alberta closer to fair representation, the ideal of equitable representation according to population. There is still a considerable ways to go, and no final revision has been adopted by the Government of Alberta. Still, it looks like progress is coming. It may be Pollyannaish to think it will happen now as nothing in government is ever a "slam dunk." "Major Themes" identify the complexity of the overall process in finely constructed and laudatory prose. So too have previous reports and they justified the status quo which over represented rural voters and rural concerns. The locus of government should be people; it should not be on the amount of space they occupy. This interim report will help the government increase voter parity.

Understandably rural voters are concerned about the challenges of representing large areas and long distances. They might also appreciate that urban voters have their own unique challenges. Perhaps some rural Albertans would feel claustrophobic in cities; maybe even view them as impossibly overcrowded. I see the political environment as a tit for tat world where everyone wants more. To be less than charitable: rural Albertans often vote for smaller government. Fewer rural representatives may give it to them.

To think outside the box, maybe rural Albertans would support a bicameral legislature. I would be fine with an Alberta Senate as long as it had no power, no elected representatives and based strictly on land mass. I'm sure that a computer could generate squares of equal area at a minimal cost. This would provide Albertans with exactly equal representation by area; no boundary commission needed here. Some squares might even be empty thereby reducing costs to Albertans. It would be fun to fantasize on such a new direction for Alberta.

The interim report is fine—go with it—but the process of involving the public needs work. I had challenges getting my initial comments to you in January. The web-site wouldn't accept and forward my views. I ended up mailing it, a process not identified in the web-page. To comment now, I will need to repeat this process. Will the web-page work? Will you still accept a submission at your mailing address? On your web-page, why don't the colorful highlighted areas link to maps or the report of other details? I found stuff but had to work at it. Finally and significantly, how would I know that a review was taking place? It seems to me that there was more publicity for earlier boundary reviews. And I got to make an inperson presentation. Are in-person submissions saved only for elected officials or prominent Albertans? Improvements could be made to enhance participation.

Good luck to the commission in moving Alberta forward.

On behalf of the McLeod Community League, I am providing a writing submission to the Report which recommended that the boundaries of Edmonton-Manning be adjusted by moving the McLeod neighbourhood into adjacent Edmonton-Decore.

McLeod Community League requests that the McLeod neighborhood remain part of Edmonton-Manning. The western boundary of Edmonton-Manning should be 66 Street, from the City of Edmonton boundary, south to 137 Avenue.

McLeod Community League is a non-profit organization and represents over 19,000 residents in the neighborhoods of Matt Berry, Hollick-Kenyon, Miller, Casselman, and McLeod. As a member of the Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues, we serve the social, cultural, athletic, and civic needs of our residents. Our volunteers deliver sports programs, playgrounds, a community centre, safety information, and many community events like movie nights, youth field trips and community celebrations. We support community gardens, "No Stone Left Alone", "Front Yards in Bloom", and "Snow Angels", all projects that help build community connections.

We've work hard for the past 45 years for residents to see all five neighborhoods as our <u>one</u> abundant <u>community</u>.

- (1) Our residents are best served by being within one provincial constituency, served by one MLA. It is easiest to have one point of contact for dealing with grants, legislative concerns and other provincial matters. Four out of five of our neighborhoods would be in Edmonton-Manning and one would be in Edmonton-Decore. It would be a duplication of provincial legislative resources to have two MLAs addressing the same community concerns.
- (2) 66 Street is a natural boundary between Edmonton neighborhoods. Keeping a straight line will reduce voter confusion at election time and between elections when they're contacting

their MLA for assistance.

- (3) School boards use that boundary to designate school attendance boundaries. If kept as suggested, parents would live in Edmonton-Decore, but the community's school is just across the street in Edmonton-Manning. It would be consistent for both to be in Edmonton-Manning.
- (4) McLeod residents would live in Edmonton-Decore but the McLeod community hall would be located in Edmonton-Manning.
- (4) There are about 1,400 voters (www.edmonton.ca McLeod Community Profile) in the McLeod neighborhood, and keeping them in the constituency would not significantly affect the provincial average +/- 1%. 46,066 voters (interim report) + 1,400 = 47,466 total voters.
- (5) We find our focus in northeast Edmonton concerns, rather than north central Edmonton. We're concerned with provincial education (new schools north of 167 Avenue), transportation (bridge proposal on 195 Avenue) and economic development (Heartland Industrial Area) among other issues. Our businesses and commercial centers (main streets) are in Manning Crossing and along 167 Avenue, which are both in Edmonton-Manning. Manning Drive is a major transportation route and forms the eastern side of our community league.

The interim report states "moving the boundaries in this fashion avoids splitting neighborhoods" (page 51), but in our case, it does split OUR neighborhood. We respectfully request that the boundary be drawn north/south along 66 Street.

Thank you for the opportunity to make a submission on this important matter. We hope to remain part of Edmonton-Manning provincial constituency. Please do not hesitate to contact me should you require additional information.

re: Edmonton Mill Woods - Interim Boundary Report and Feedback

I am writing on behalf of the Edmonton Mill Woods NDP with regards to the interim report released by the Boundaries Commission and the proposed map for Edmonton - Mill Woods West.

We appreciate the Commission's efforts to balance a variety of complex factors. We agree with the majority of the report's findings on the larger issues such as the appropriate number of electoral districts for the big cities. However, when it comes to the proposed map for what the Commission calls Mill Woods West, we have a few concerns and suggestions.

The biggest change proposed by the Commission would be the removal of 2/3rds of the Ridgewood community from our district (the neighbourhoods known as Minchau and Weinlos) and the addition of the Millhurst community instead (the neighbourhoods of Meyokumin and Sakaw, which are currently part of Edmonton-Ellerslie). We find this swapping of two similarly sized areas, with nearly identical population counts, as noted in the latest Census, to be without merit. It would result in over 10,000 people changing districts across these two communities, and in both cases these communities have been with their current respective districts since at least 2003. This large swapping of areas, when the population numbers of both are so very close, will only confuse the public as to which electoral district they reside in.

We understand that the constituency of Mill Woods (now Mill Woods West) must grow, to meet the new provincial average. To accomplish this, we would suggest the addition of the Bisset neighbourhood to our district. Bisset is one of three parts of the Ridgewood community, the other two of which (Minchau and Weinlos) are already part of our constituency. Adding Bisset would bring the entire Ridgewood community league under one umbrella, and solve some longstanding problems with mail routes that cross between these neighbourhoods/districts. Bisset is extremely similar in makeup to the rest of the Ridgewood community and would fit the Mill Woods West district in terms of demographics and infrastructure age.

As another form of growth, we agree with the proposed addition of the Knottwood communities of Ekota and Menisa to our district. This will bring the entire Knottwood community into one district, which will again help to solve for simpler boundary explanations and for mail routes that go throughout the community.

We have examined the population numbers from the recent 2016 federal census. Bringing the three neighbourhoods of Bisset, Ekota and Menisa into our district will lift our constituency population numbers to be almost exactly at the new provincial average. It will also result in the least amount of change required to meet that new provincial average. It will also solve for the problem of overlapping mail routes and divided communities. People in our proposed areas already use many of the same schools and other community infrastructure as our existing constituents. We believe our plan solves problems both for our constituency and for our neighbouring constituencies.

We hope you will consider this feedback.

Re: Proposed Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul and Vermilion – Lloydminster Provincial Constituency Boundaries

Lamont County Council appreciates that the task of re-aligning constituency boundaries within Alberta is a daunting process for your commission and significant changes may be unavoidable. County Council, having reviewed the boundaries for the two above mentioned constituencies however, has grave concerns with regard to the proposed boundaries.

The existing Fort Saskatchewan – Vegreville constituency contains our entire County and two of our major trading partners, Fort Saskatchewan and Vegreville. The northwest boundary of the existing constituency is the North Saskatchewan River, a natural political boundary. The northern part of the east boundary is the east boundary of our county. Elk Island National Park has road access only available from either Lamont County or Strathcona County.

The proposed Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul constituency includes St. Paul and a small portion of the County of St. Paul, both on the other side of the North Saskatchewan River. These areas have much closer natural and trading connections to the Bonnyville and Elk Point areas and to Lake Land County. The northeast corner of the proposed constituency around Tulliby Lake, also north of the North Saskatchewan River, has very limited physical or other connections to the western part of the proposed constituency. The railway line, which linked Bruderheim and Andrew to Two Hills, Myrnam and Dewberry, has been gone for at least ten years. Much of the eastern portion of the proposed constituency has a much closer trading relationship to Lloydminster than to the western part of the new constituency. The long narrow east-west orientation of the proposed constituency with its largest urban center to the extreme west, surrounded by heavy industry, becoming more and more rural to the east does not create a cohesive political entity in our opinion. The inclusion of the rural service center of St. Paul, on the opposite side of a major river with limited bridge connections, and stronger connections to areas outside the proposed constituency does not, in our opinion help create a geographically sensible political unit.

The largest urban and industrial area for this new constituency will be located at the extreme east end of the proposed constituency in and around Lloydminster, almost a mirror image of Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul proposed constituency. Areas such as Vegreville are more closely connected to Edmonton than to Lloyminster. Elk Island National Park is closely connected to the Beaverhills Initative area and the newly created Beaverhills Biosphere, an initiative of Strathcona, Lamont, Leduc, Camrose and Beaver Counties. As indicated above the national park is almost totally contained within the existing Fort Saskatchewan – Vegreville riding. In our opinion this proposed constituency does not align with existing economic, social or political connections of the residents.

Both of the proposed constituencies will require political interaction between MLAs and an increased number of municipalities increasing the workload for elected officials from both levels of government.





I would first like to extend my sincerest thanks for your efforts on the provincial electoral boundary file. I know that designing electoral district boundaries is a uniquely challenging endeavour.

I am contacting you to recommend that the provincial constituency boundaries in my region of Southern Alberta not be redrawn in a manner that divides municipal jurisdictions.

I believe that numerous difficulties could arise from drawing provincial constituency boundaries in a manner that divides municipalities. Doing so would compromise the ability of municipal officials to coordinate with their provincial counterparts, and thereby negatively impact those officials' capacity to serve their residents.

Specifically, my recommendations are that:

- Strathmore-Brooks remain united as a single provincial electoral district;
- The County of Newell not be divided at the provincial level;
- Wheatland County not be divided at the provincial level.

Ensuring that provincial electoral district boundaries remain aligned to the greatest extent possible with municipal boundaries will allow municipal and provincial officials to continue to provide their constituents with a high standard of service.

Once again, thank you for your work on this challenging file, and for considering my recommendations.

With regard to the proposed boundaries for Decore, the removal of Killarney does not make sense. By having the electoral division cross a major boundary, the rail road tracks and underpass on 127 Avenue, it isolates that community from the rest of the Electoral Division. Additionally, by crossing the Yellowhead Highway and the railway, it makes it harder for these electors to vote. By taking Killarney back into Decore, Norwood has the room to take back Spruce Avenue and Westwood. This would then give downtown more room to grow, given the new high rises being built.

Move the boundary east, to Fort Road and Manning Drive, and use 153 Avenue in the north. This respects the major boundaries in the Area. This would take some population away from Manning, which needs room to grow. Thank you for the second opportunity to provide feedback regarding the Commission's review on the electoral boundaries. We would like to take this opportunity to address the general position of the majority of the members of the Commission, as well as the changes to the constituency which affects Lac La Biche County specifically.

We are concerned with the philosophy driving the recommendations made by the majority, whereby three primarily rural constituencies will be eliminated for three primarily urban ones. We feel that interpretation of the *Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* overstated the importance of voter parity. We do, nonetheless, respect the perspective of the Commission on these matters and still support some of the individual recommendations made by the majority, including some of those directly affecting Lac La Biche County.

The Commission provided specific subjects where they are requesting input. We would be happy to share our perspective on two of these, one being the Fort McMurray-Lac La Biche population size, and the other, the orientation of this constituency, along with Fort McMurray-Wood Buffalo.

We believe that the way in which the Commission accounted for a potential population drop caused by the 2016 wildfire, by subtracting 9,000 people from the Fort McMurray area, overstates the long-term effect the fire will have on the population. We believe that the 2016 federal census numbers, unaltered for the fire, should be used to calculate the proposed constituencies given that the Commission's final recommendations will determine boundaries for the next two elections, where during this time, Fort McMurray's population can be expected to have significantly rebounded to pre fire levels.

Regarding the orientation of Fort McMurray-Lac La Biche and Fort McMurray-Wood Buffalo, we support the change and regard it as necessary if Lac La Biche County, Athabasca County and all municipalities contained within are to be included in the proposed constituency.


We feel that the Fort McMurray-Lac La Biche constituency does a good job of including local trading routes and common interests of the region. We feel that this could be improved by also including Kikino and Buffalo Lake Metis Settlement, and Whitefish Lake First Nation. The hamlet of Lac La Biche is an urban centre accessed by many of the residents of from these



communities for school, business and pleasure. This addition will increase the population of the constituency by 2,956, which will bring it closer to the average constituency size immediately, giving Fort McMurray's population a chance to rebound over the coming years.

The other improvement to the Fort McMurray-Lac La Biche Constituency is the inclusion of Improvement District 349 (ID 349). Currently, seniors housing requisitions from ID 349 support the Greater North Foundation, to which the following municipalities belong: Lac La Biche County, ID 349, Athabasca County, the Summer Village of Whispering Hills, West Baptiste, Island Lake South, Mewatha Beach, Sunset Beach, Island Lake, Bondiss and South Baptiste, the Village of Boyle, the Town of Athabasca, as well as the M.D. of Opportunity. Requisitions from ID 349 represent 22.7% (\$341,303.71) of the \$1,498,312 levied. Including the ID 349 will reflect the connection it has to these municipalities, as a contributing member to the Greater North Foundation.

We once again appreciate the effort by the Commission to listen and consider the perspectives of all Albertans and that well established and thorough public consultation process is part of the decision making process.

I did like the idea of having Vegreville in this constituency as it is also in the trading area for most of the Vermilion-Lloydminster Constituents on the West side of the constituency.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Alberta Association of Municipal District and Counties (AAMDC) is a provincial association that represents Alberta's rural municipalities which include 64 municipal districts, four specialized municipalities, and the Special Areas Board. Together, AAMDC members cover approximately 85% of Alberta's land mass and 18% of Alberta's population.

The Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission (AEBC), tasked with reviewing Alberta's electoral boundaries for provincial elections, released their *Interim Report* in May 2017. The report proposes several significant changes to current electoral boundaries that will have an adverse impact on rural municipalities and rural residents. Specifically, the consolidation of:

- Four electoral divisions into three in the central northeast area of the province. Those current four electoral divisions are Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills, Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater, Fort Saskatchewan-Vegreville, and Bonnyville-Cold Lake.
- Five electoral divisions into four in the central west area of the province. Those current five electoral divisions are Rimbey-Rocky Mountain House-Sundre, West Yellowhead, Drayton Valley-Devon, Whitecourt-Ste. Anne, and Stony Plain.
- Seven electoral divisions into six in the eastern side of the province. Those current seven electoral divisions are Battle River-Wainwright, Drumheller-Stettler, Strathmore-Brooks, Little Bow, Cardston-Taber-Warner, Cypress-Medicine Hat, and Vermilion-Lloydminster.

An additional significant change is the creation of a new electoral division to the immediate north and west of Calgary, to account for the significant increase in the populations of Airdrie and Cochrane.

The AAMDC is concerned that the consolidation of these ridings, and the resulting loss of legislative seats in rural Alberta, will impact the ability of rural Albertans to be effectively represented in Alberta's legislature.

In response to the *Interim Report*, the AAMDC would like to reiterate the importance of ensuring that Alberta's democratic institutions effectively represent Albertans from all walks of life and areas of the province. Achieving this representation by balancing population and demographics, community interest and characteristics, existing municipal and natural boundaries, and other relevant criteria is a difficult but necessary task. Over-reliance on absolute voter parity may inhibit the ability of Albertans to be effectively represented.

The AAMDC submission featured below speaks to several important points for consideration by the AEBC as they form their final recommendations.

- Balance Blended Constituencies blended constituencies can be a viable option when
 required and in those instances, the AEBC should attempt to balance both urban and rural
 populations to ensure that the elected representative has an incentive to work with both rural
 and urban communities.
- 2. Support for the AEBC's Minority Report the AAMDC asks that the AEBC consider the important perspectives raised in the Interim Report's minority report that speaks to concerns with the erosion of rural ridings
- 3. Consideration of Geographical Distances constituencies in rural Alberta are very large geographically. This can impede the ability of both constituents and elected MLAs from connecting and sharing local, regional, and provincial concerns.

- 4. Avoid Fracturing Municipalities into Multiple Electoral Districts municipal boundaries often reflect natural and community barriers. Where appropriate, municipal boundaries should act as a guide for electoral boundaries and the AEBC should avoid fracturing municipalities into multiple electoral boundaries unless the population of that municipality dictates multiple electoral districts.
- 5. Consider Unique and Special Circumstances for Deviance from the 25% Variance the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission Act allows for deviations from the 25% variance for unique considerations such as low population density. The current areas where deviations exist should continue to receive such an exemption to ensure such areas are effectively represented.
- 6. Protecting Common Community Interests electoral boundaries should reflect communities. Therefore, it is important that their boundaries reflect community interests. Although rural constituencies often incorporate more than one community, there are often unique interests and attributes that link these communities together.

INTRODUCTION

The Alberta Association of Municipal District and Counties (AAMDC) is a provincial association that represents Alberta's rural municipalities which include 64 municipal districts, four specialized municipalities, and the Special Areas Board. Together, AAMDC members cover approximately 85% of Alberta's land mass and 18% of Alberta's population. Through proactive leadership, strategic partnerships and effective advocacy, the AAMDC works to build strong, vibrant, and resilient communities.

As a voice for Alberta's rural communities, the AAMDC is well-positioned to provide a unique and necessary perspective to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission (AEBC) during the 2016/17 review of Alberta's electoral boundaries. The submission below outlines the AAMDC's input to the AEBC's *Interim Report* released in May 2017. As a provincial association, the AAMDC will not provide comments specific to individual constituencies, but instead will provide comments more general in nature.

SUMMARY OF AEBC'S INTERIM REPORT

The AEBC's *Interim Report* released in May 2017 makes several significant changes that will have an adverse impact on rural municipalities and rural residents. Specifically, the consolidation of:

- Four electoral divisions into three in the central northeast area of the province. Those current four electoral divisions are Lac La Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills, Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater, Fort Saskatchewan-Vegreville, and Bonnyville-Cold Lake.
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An additional change is the creation of a new electoral division to the immediate north and west of Calgary, to account for the significant increase in the populations of Airdrie and Cochrane.

As will be outlined below in further detail, the consolidation of these electoral constituencies raises several concerns for rural municipalities and rural residents.

DEMOGRAPHICS IN ALBERTA

In the past decade, Alberta has seen considerable population growth which has only recently been slowed by the downturn in Alberta's economy. Much of this growth has been to Alberta's largest urban centres but Alberta's rural and small communities have also seen a net-increase in population – a trend unique in Alberta in comparison to the rest of Canada.

The AEBC acknowledges these trends in the *Interim Report* and Alberta's rural municipalities recognize these shifting demographics and the potential outcomes they may produce. The AAMDC and its members, however, want to emphasize the importance of maintaining adequate and equitable representation for Alberta's rural residents and communities despite these shifting demographics. It is problematic that even though rural areas are growing (though not at the same pace as some urban areas), they will ultimately lose representation should the *Interim Report*

recommendations be adopted. Higher rural populations being represented by fewer MLAs results in a cumulative disadvantage for rural Alberta that is not necessarily warranted based on its demographic trends.

EFFECTIVE REPRESENTATION

As outlined in the AAMDC's initial submission to the AEBC and recognized in the AEBC's *Interim Report*, effective representation is the cornerstone our representative democracy. This has been outlined in Section 3 of the *Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms* and the 1991 *Supreme Court of Canada's Decision Reference Re Provincial Electoral Boundaries (Sask)*, that stated that the purpose of the right to vote is not pure equality of voting power but the right to "effective representation." Therefore, factors in addition to population such as geography, community history, community interests, and community identity need to be considered to ensure that Alberta's legislative assembly effectively represents the diversity of Albertans.

In 2010, the Alberta Electoral Boundary Commission's report outlined the following principles of effective representation:

- 1. Relative parity of voting power.
- 2. The tradition in Canada of "effective representation," not absolute parity as in the U.S.
- 3. Recognition that the process of achieving effective representation may involve altering the political power of some votes but not unduly and not without reason.
- 4. The balancing of these interests which involves an examination of the social history, geography and demography of communities.

The AAMDC would like to reiterate its support for these principles for consideration in the 2016/2017 Alberta's Electoral Boundaries Commission's review.

ACHIEVING EFFECTIVE RURAL REPRESENTATION IN ALBERTA

Alberta's rural municipalities and the residents they represent were concerned that the 2016/17 AEBC recommendations would result in fewer rural seats and by extension, a reduction in the ability of Alberta's legislature to effectively represent the interests of rural Albertans and rural communities. These concerns are realized in the *Interim Report* which has seen a reduction of rural seats. The following concerns and recommendations are provided by the AAMDC for consideration by the 2016/17 AEBC in the context of the *Interim Report*.

General Concerns

As a necessary step to improve Alberta's democratic process, the review of electoral boundaries is designed to ensure that different factors including population, community interest, existing municipal and natural boundaries, and effective representation are used in determining Alberta's electoral boundaries. The AAMDC is concerned that voter parity has taken precedence over these other priorities. The use of these different factors is essential to ensuring that Alberta's democratic process is both fair and equitable for all Albertans.

The AAMDC does not believe that the *Interim Report* reflects the best effort to achieve 'effective representation' and instead, agrees with the Minority Report featured in Appendix A which reads,

"As new ridings are added to the cities, electoral divisions must be taken from the 'Rest of Alberta'. This results in ongoing erosion of ridings in rural Alberta and is not sustainable if all Albertans are to be effectively represented."

As stated in the *Electoral Boundary Commission's Act* ("the Act", hereafter), there is an allowable variance of the population within boundaries to account for non-population variables and the AAMDC agrees with position outlined in Appendix A that states that the changes to the electoral boundaries featured in the *Interim Report* are unnecessary given the provision for variances within the Act.

Balance Blended Constituencies

The *Interim Report* has sought to minimize the creation of blended constituencies that combine a large urban area with a non-urban area. Where this was unavoidable, the AAMDC recommended, as a general principle, that the AEBC balance the rural and urban populations as closely as possible. This would ensure that the elected MLAs have an incentive to work with both rural and urban constituents and understand their issues and concerns.

The AAMDC also supports AEBC's efforts, where blended constituencies were unavoidable, to combine areas where residents are likely to have common concerns such as in a suburban community surrounding a large city whose residents work and/or commute frequently to that city. The same is true for smaller urban centres within a larger rural community.

The AAMDC is encouraged that those that made submissions to the AEBC in blended constituencies indicated that this model was working well.

Consideration of Geographical Distances

It has been the AAMDC's position that the current electoral boundaries are at their maximum size and that expanding the boundaries of Alberta's largest electoral constituencies will only exacerbate the existing challenges facing those constituents and their elected representatives. The AAMDC is disappointed that the consolidation of rural ridings presented in the *Interim Report* will only grow the geographical size of several electoral constituencies. With this comes additional challenges for elected MLAs as they would have to travel additional distances to attend community events and listen to constituent concerns.

Though advances in technology may ease this burden of distance, it is also important to remember that many rural and remote communities do not have access to high-speed broadband internet which can inhibit the use of streaming or video/audio conferencing services which MLAs may use to connect with their constituents. In addition to improving high-speed internet in rural and remote communities, the Government of Alberta should seek to ensure the Alberta Legislature is properly equipped with the technology to connect MLAs with those constituents who have the access to high-speed internet.

Avoid Fracturing Municipalities into Multiple Electoral Districts

Unlike most provinces in Canada, municipalities govern Alberta's entire landmass with the exception of national and provincial parks. This expansive system of governance reflects the communities Albertans live in and can make for logical boundaries for Alberta's provincial electoral boundaries – especially outside of Alberta's large cities and towns.

The AAMDC is encouraged by the AEBC's efforts in the *Interim Report* to align constituencies with municipal boundaries where possible, even going so far to reflect inter-municipal partnerships that exist in regions of the province.

As dividing municipalities, particularly geographically large rural municipalities, into multiple electoral divisions can create unnecessarily complex governance arrangements when municipal and provincial elected officials work collaboratively, the AAMDC recommends that the AEBC continue to use municipal boundaries as a guiding tool for establishing electoral boundaries.

Consider Unique and Special Circumstances for Deviance from the 25% Variance

As noted above, the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* requires the population of a proposed electoral division to not vary by more than 25% from the provincial average with the exception of unique or special cases. In the 2010 boundary adjustment, special and unique circumstances were used to justify the creation of two electoral districts in Dunvegan-Central Peace and Lesser Slave Lake. The 2010 ABEBC noted the scarcity of population as justification for the deviance from the 25% threshold.

The *Interim Report* reinforces the support for the two electoral boundaries that exceed this variance, Central Peace-Notley (renamed) and Lesser Slave Lake. In these instances, the AAMDC feels the deviations are appropriate given the geographic expanse that these two constituencies cover. Requiring adherence to the 25% variance target would be unreasonable and exacerbate further the challenges of large electoral constituencies.

The *Interim Report* states that, in the context of factors that determine whether the variance of above or below 25% is justifiable, "Preservation of the rural voice is not one of those factors" (p.27). The AAMDC would like to provide a more global perspective, which is that preserving traditionally "rural constituencies" and the "rural voice" is a means to preserving common community interests.

Protecting Common Community Interests

The AEBC's comments regarding "common community interests" do acknowledge that this is indeed a consideration for the determination of electoral boundaries and although, as the AEBC *Interim Report* states, "most current electoral divisions outside of Edmonton and Calgary do not contain a single common community", it is fair to say that creating larger geographical ridings into already diverse electoral constituencies only further moves away from the recognition of common community characteristics that do exist. The expansion of electoral boundaries that are already large is, more often than not, at odds the preservation of "common community interests."

CONCLUSION

The AAMDC appreciates the opportunity to provide input and comment to the 2016/17 Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission and the important questions it has been tasked with. To conclude the points above, the AAMDC would like to reiterate that much of what the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission must address is a question of means and ends in that, the core outcome and end goal for the Alberta Legislative Assembly is the ability to effectively represent Albertans from all walks of life and areas of the province. Achieving this representation by balancing population and demographics, community interest and characteristics, existing municipal and natural boundaries, and other relevant criteria is not an easy task. Over-reliance on absolute voter parity may not achieve the desired outcome and may inhibit the ability of Albertans to be effectively represented – effectively weakening Alberta's democratic institutions.

The AAMDC is pleased to provide input to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission on this important task and will continue to provide comment where appropriate.

INTRODUCTION

The County of St. Paul has reviewed the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission's (AEBC) Interim Report and has deep and abiding concerns regarding the proposed changes to Alberta's electoral boundaries. Simply, the proposed severing of the County into two separate electoral divisions, Bonnyville – Cold Lake and Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul, will have substantial, negative implications for County residents. The intent of this response is to humbly request that the Commission reconsider the proposed electoral boundaries submitted in its Interim Report and constitute a single electoral division that incorporates the entire County of St. Paul. The inclusion of the entire County in one division is necessary to ensuring a fair and effective representation for County residents.

The County strongly believes that the proposed boundaries in the Interim Report are problematic, both from a local and provincial perspective. From a local perspective, the County argues that the Commission has deviated from its mandate laid out in Section 14 of the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act.* From a provincial perspective, the decision to reduce rural representation provincewide deeply concerns the County. The County does not believe that this was necessary given the discretion allowed for variances and additional considerations besides population provided for in the *Act.* The County argues that growth in the urban population should have been managed through increased variances in the cities and not an increase in the number of ridings in the two major cities. Undoubtedly, Rural Alberta will be less effectively represented based on the recommendations of the Interim Report and the County contends that this is detrimental to democracy in Alberta.

AEBC MANDATE AND SECTION 14 OF THE ELECTORAL BOUNDARY COMMISSION ACT

Section 14 of *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* is clear and concise regarding the mandate and the factors that the Commission must follow in carrying out its tasks. By breaking down these factors individually, the County desires to demonstrate that the Commission would be sharply deviating from its mandate should it proceed with the recommendations proffered in the Interim Report. The factors include:

(a) the requirement for effective representation as guaranteed by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms;

In the 1991 Reference Re Provincial Electoral Boundaries (Sask) decision made by the Supreme Court of Canada, the principle of "one man, one vote" from the United States Supreme Court decision of Baker vs. Carr was fundamentally rejected. It was determined by the Court that the purpose of the right to vote guaranteed in Section 3 of the Charter of Rights and Freedoms is not to obtain pure equality of voting power, but the right to "effective representation."

John Courtney in his seminal work on how electoral boundaries are drawn in Canada, *Commissioned Ridings*, argues "factors like geography, community history, community interests, and minority representation may need to be considered to ensure that our legislative assemblies effectively represent the diversity of our social mosaic. These are

examples of considerations which may justify departure from absolute voter parity in the pursuit of more effective representation" (2001, pg. 159). Moreover, he argues "the exigencies of geography, very sparse population, transportation, and communication warrant deviation from the ideal" (pg. 158). Ostensibly, a myriad of factors beyond population and voter parity should be strongly considered when the Commission finalizes its recommendations. The County argues that the Commission has hewed too closely to the concept of absolute voter parity while overlooking other crucial factors that contribute to effective representation.

Rural Alberta and the County of St. Paul are witnessing their representation become less effective, not more effective. As Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission Member Gwen Day argues in her Minority Position in Appendix A of the Interim Report, "rural Albertans control the land, access to the land and provide a significant portion of the labour force that most of our primary industries depend on... in order to be "effectively represented" the rural population must be granted more than a "one person, one vote" voice in order to ensure that good stewardship is exercised over the resources that the primary industries in Alberta depend on" (pg. 69). The County of St. Paul agrees with Ms. Day; the ongoing erosion of ridings in Rural Alberta is unsustainable and will be harmful to Alberta as a whole.

(b) sparsity and density of population;

The Interim Report states "various submitters asked the Commission to recommend constituencies with a smaller geographic size overall and shorter travel distances than those experienced in the former Lac La Biche – St. Paul – Two Hills. This recommendation would help to achieve that goal" (pg. 54). The County of St. Paul vehemently disagrees with this statement. The Commission has simply taken the previous north-south configuration of Lac La Biche – St. Paul – Two Hills and flipped it to an east-west configuration in Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul; there has been no demonstrable reduction in geographic size or travel distances. The facts belie the Commission's statement.

Focusing on the distances between the largest communities in Lac La Biche – St. Paul – Two Hills, travel times from Lac La Biche to St. Paul and St. Paul to Two Hills are approximately 75 minutes and 35 minutes respectively.

In the proposed riding of Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul, travel times from Fort Saskatchewan to Two Hills and Fort Saskatchewan to St. Paul are approximately 70 minutes and 100 minutes respectively. The Commission has, in fact, increased travel times in some cases under the proposed Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul riding.

In the proposed riding of Bonnyville – Cold Lake, travel time from St. Paul to Bonnyville and from St. Paul to Cold Lake is approximately 50 minutes and 80 minutes respectively. Again, the Commission has in fact increased travel times in some cases under the proposed Bonnyville – Cold Lake riding.

The County strongly believes that given the constraints posed by sparsity and density of the population, the previous electoral boundaries of Lac La Biche – St. Paul – Two Hills were preferable to the Commission's proposal.

(c) common community interests and community organizations, including those of Indian reserves and Métis Settlements;

Over the past four years, the County of St. Paul has partnered with several neighbouring municipalities including the Town of St. Paul, Town of Elk Point, and Summer Village of Horseshoe Bay in addition to other surrounding counties on twelve (12) Alberta Community Partnership (ACP) Grants; this kind of success rate for the ACP Program is unmatched during this period. The County and its partners have even received recognition in the form of a Municipal Excellence Award for its Regional Occupational Health and Safety Initiative Project.

The proposed boundaries will see the Town of St. Paul and part of the County in one riding (Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul) while leaving Elk Point, the Summer Village of Horseshoe Bay, and the remainder of the County in another riding (Bonnyville – Cold Lake). The proposed separation of these partnering municipalities will hamper collaborative efforts that our regional partnerships have worked hard to achieve and as a result there could be a decrease in successful joint ventures moving forward. Unquestionably, the proposed boundaries proposed in the Interim Report pose challenges to the County of St. Paul's community interests.

It is noteworthy that the Interim Report recommends bifurcating the County of St. Paul while keeping other counties intact. For example, the Interim Report makes a recommendation to "keep Flagstaff County intact, an important goal given the significant work in which the County is engaged relating to inter-municipal partnerships. It is apparently regarded as a template for regionalization in other areas" (pg. 54). The County questions why the Commission placed so much emphasis on Flagstaff County's work and not any on the County of St. Paul's or other counties (such as Lacombe County, the County of Newell, County of Vermilion River, and several others) for that matter. The County strongly believes that the Commission did not adequately weigh the County's and its neighbouring municipalities' collaborative achievements before bifurcating the County into two electoral divisions.

Unquestionably, the County of St. Paul, Town of Elk Point, Town of St. Paul, and Summer Village of Horseshoe Bay have common community interests. The County implores the Commission to treat the County of St. Paul with the same regard that it treats Flagstaff County.

It is also noteworthy that the rural environment of the County of St. Paul does not share much in common with the City of Fort Saskatchewan. Fort Saskatchewan is faced with a growing population of 25,500 people in a relatively dense area of 48 km², when compared to the County with less growth pressures and a population of approximately 6,475 people within 3,309 km², the challenges facing these two municipalities could not be more different. The County believes that the current boundaries of Lac La Biche – St.

Paul – Two Hills, boasting three rural municipalities, demonstrates a much stronger alignment of community interests.

(e) wherever possible, the existing municipal boundaries;

The Commission has bifurcated the County of St. Paul into two separate ridings. It is very important to underline the language found in the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* that states "wherever possible" the existing municipal boundaries should be considered. The County of St. Paul believes that the Commission has not adhered to this language. In the County's view, it is very possible to construct boundaries that would preserve the County of St. Paul within a single electoral division. Having the County reside in two separate electoral divisions creates substantial challenges as the County will need to engage with two different MLAs.

(f) the number of municipalities and other local authorities;

The bifurcation of the County of St. Paul into two ridings will markedly diminish the County's voice by creating increased competition with other municipalities when seeking to access and engage MLAs. In the current Lac La Biche – St. Paul – Two Hills riding, nine (9) municipalities exist that require access to and representation from their MLA. Each of these individual municipalities have unique challenges and unique representational needs. The Commission's proposed bifurcation of the County of St. Paul exacerbates the County's challenges to have its unique perspective and concerns sufficiently heard.

In contrast to Lac La Biche – St. Paul – Two Hills, the proposed riding of Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul, boasts fifteen (15) municipalities and in the proposed riding of Bonnyville – Cold Lake, there are eight (8) municipalities present. In Bonnyville – Cold Lake, there are also several First Nations and Métis Settlements present that the County will also now need to vie with for representation. This means that the County of St. Paul would now compete with more than three times as many municipalities and local authorities when endeavouring to engage their MLAs.

The County strongly encourages the Commission to take the number of municipalities into account when making their final recommendations. The proposals in the Interim Report would serve to diminish both the County's perspective and voice.

(g) geographical features, including existing road systems;

The County recognizes that the proposed boundaries in the Interim Report are crafted with the intention of achieving greater voter parity, however the recommendations do not adequately consider other factors including geographical features and existing road systems.

There are now several highways and municipal roadways within the County of St. Paul that will fall within two separate ridings. Echoing the concerns above, the County will now need

to advocate to two MLAs when providing input on various road infrastructure projects. Simply, the proposed boundaries in the Interim Report are arbitrary from a geographical standpoint.

(h) the desirability of understandable and clear boundaries.

Regarding the desirability for understandable and clear boundaries, the County feels that the proposed boundaries are counterintuitive and illogical. The Commission has simply sliced out of portion of the County to achieve greater voter parity, but this has created boundaries that defy the geographical nature of the County of St. Paul. For example, there is no comprehensible difference between the north and south sides of Township Road 590. Yet under the Commission's Interim Report, residents on the north side will be in the proposed Bonnyville – Cold Lake riding, while residents on the south side will vote in Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul. From a geographic perspective, the proposed boundaries are arbitrary.

The names of the proposed ridings will also present challenges. For residents of the County of St. Paul that have been voting in a "St. Paul" riding for their whole lives, the shift to Bonnyville – Cold Lake will be confusing. Since 1913, residents in the area have been voting in a riding with "St. Paul" in its name. Residents understand where they pay their property taxes to and where they receive their services from, but they will not intuitively understand the arbitrary line that has been drawn in the current proposal. From the County's perspective, the proposed boundaries are more confusing than they are understandable.

PROPOSED SOLUTION

The County of St. Paul strongly encourages the Commission to place the County in a single electoral division, not bifurcate the County into two ridings. The County wishes to put forward a proposal that would accomplish this.

In the Interim Report, the Saddle Lake Cree Nation is located on the southwestern boundary of the proposed Bonnyville – Cold Lake riding. Saddle Lake contains roughly 6,200 residents.

In the Interim Report, the Town of St. Paul and the southwestern portion of the County of St. Paul are located within the proposed riding of Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul.

The County of St. Paul is proposing that the Town of St. Paul, with approximately 5,800 residents and the portion of the County of St. Paul with approximately 500 residents be shifted into the Bonnyville – Cold Lake riding. The Saddle Lake Cree Nation will be shifted into the Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul riding. That said, with the County of St. Paul and Town of St. Paul being moved to Bonnyville – Cold Lake, the County would recommend naming this riding Fort Saskatchewan – Two Hills and naming the other riding Bonnyville – Cold Lake – St. Paul.

This proposal would ensure that roughly the same number of residents remain in each of the two proposed ridings thereby achieving relative voter parity, but also ensures that the County of St. Paul is located in one electoral district. Neither the Saddle Lake Cree Nation nor the County of St. Paul would be bifurcated under this proposal. The County believes that this proposal is preferable to the proposed recommendations outlined in the Commission's Interim Report.

CONCLUSION

While the County recognizes the genuine effort of the Commission members to create the proposed electoral boundaries, the County strongly believes that the Commission has focused too strongly on the concept of absolute voter parity and overlooked other critical factors that contribute to effective representation. Ultimately, the proposed boundaries will diminish the representation of Rural Alberta's interests.

From the County's perspective, it is in Alberta's best interests to preserve the boundaries of as many existing ridings as achievable using the permitted variances provided for in the *Act*; the variances do not need to be extreme to accomplish this.

The County argues that the Commission has options available to preserve rural ridings while crafting ridings in Edmonton and Calgary that can provide effective representation to those urban residents. For example, a critical provision in the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* states:

15(1) The population of a proposed electoral division must not be more than 25% above nor more than 25% below the average population of all the proposed electoral divisions.

It appears to the County that, despite this provision for up to +/- 25%, the Commission has opted to establish low variances particularly in Calgary and Edmonton. As Commission Member Gwen Day writes in her Minority Position in Appendix A of the Interim Report, "the average variance in Calgary and Edmonton for the proposed divisions is +/- 5%. This is a full 20% below that allowed by the Act" (pg. 70). Based on these comments, it appears that the Commission is demonstrating an unnecessary motivation to achieve voter parity despite being provided with many options to ensure that the new boundaries reflect Alberta and are capable of providing effective representation to Albertan residents. The County questions why Ms. Day's positions have been completely marginalized.

The County also feels that it is noteworthy that the Councils for the City of Calgary and the City of Edmonton perform their representative functions admirably with fifteen (15) and thirteen (13) Council members respectively in contrast to the Commission's proposed seat allotment of twenty-six (26) ridings for Calgary and twenty (20) ridings for Edmonton.

As well, a cursory evaluation of the factors for consideration set out in Section 14 of the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* demonstrates that the Commission has sharply deviated from its mandate in drawing the preliminary electoral boundaries set out in the Interim Report. In particular, the County feels that its bifurcation into two separate ridings is inconsistent with the intent of the *Act*. If the Commission fully considers the factors laid out in Section 14 of the *Act*, the County believes that a better alternative option is available

to ensure the County is confined within one riding. Simply, the current proposed boundaries will unnecessarily dilute the County's voice and diminish the representative capacity of the two MLAs for the proposed new ridings.

In conclusion, the County strongly believes that the Commission needs to revisit their recommendations and place a stronger focus on the existing legislation and case law that have provided the foundation of Canadian representative democracy. The County encourages the Commission to balance voter parity with other elements of effective representation such as geography, common community interests, municipal boundaries, and the desirability for clear and understandable boundaries; effective representation for the County of St. Paul depends on it.

Saddle Hills County Council has studied the Commission's Interim Report and has some concerns about the impact some of the proposed changes to the electoral boundaries in the Peace Region of Alberta will have on rural representation in the legislature. We feel that there are three main issues that will affect the electorate and local representation in our riding of Dunvegan Central Peace – Notley.

Rural Alberta is the cultural heartbeat and economic engine which drives the Province and rural Alberta will be less well represented if the proposed changes are implemented.

Rural Alberta's strategic importance in terms of future development and economic growth cannot be over-stated and the proposed changes threaten to reduce the effectiveness of rural representation in the legislature.

Although we are aware that the Dunvegan Central Peace Electoral District has a population of less than 75% the provincial average, we believe that the status quo must be maintained for a number of reasons:

- a. Less access to our MLA: Personal access to our MLA is absolutely crucial in rural districts such as ours and the proposed changes will make it more difficult to have effective personal contact with our MLA.
- b. Less effective, meaningful relationship with our MLA: The size of our riding is already challenging due to the distances our MLA must travel. Adding to those challenges will diminish the effectiveness of our MLA and our ability to maintain a meaningful relationship.
- c. Threat to Natural Economic & Business Ties: The geography the Central Peace Region effectively dictates that the natural economic trade and business relationships have developed, and will continue to grow along east-west lines to the north and south of the Saddle Hills. To disrupt those natural alignments by drawing a line on a map will be a disservice to residents and businesses in both areas.
- d. Less Representation for Rural Albertans: The proposed changes will lead to more representation for urban areas and less or, at the very least, less-effective representation from rural areas.
- e. Less stability: With less effective representation and skewed local economic relationships, the proposed changes will lead to less economic and political stability in the Central Peace at a time when we can ill afford those risks.

For these reasons, we ask that you maintain an effective and meaningful rural focus to the ridings in the Peace Region by maintaining the status quo and rejecting the proposed changes.

Submission to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission:

Hythe Village Council wishes register its disapproval of a proposed electoral boundary change noted in the Commission's interim report.

The removal of our Village from a Grande Prairie area constituency to the Central Peace Notley riding does not make sense for Hythe. Our community's natural trade routes and its political identity has always been as part of the Grande Prairie area. The partnerships we form with other local governments in many areas of endeavor are based on that premise.

Grande Prairie and area were the first group of municipalities in Alberta to form a regional organization to deal with emergency response and management on an ongoing basis. Hythe has been a proud member of GPREP (Grande Prairie Regional Emergency Partnership) since its inception in 2008.

When we deal with: regional water lines; tourism promotion; physician recruitment; RCMP administration; or recreation we talk to regional organizations and intermunicipal committees based in or near Grande Prairie. We have always worked together when it made sense to do so.

We have concerns about working with an MLA who, (no disrespect intended) may not be familiar with our region's needs and history.

Presently, the office of the MLA for Dunvegan – Central Peace – Notley is based in Fairview, with a satellite office in Falher. Even if those constituency boundaries are extended southward, we could still assume that the office should be a in a central location for all its constituents. So, it could possibly remain in Fairview

That's an hour and a half drive from Hythe for us and our residents. That distance is substantially more than what we're accustomed to. It will discourage face to face meetings with our MLA.

Several arguments can be made for retaining the communities of Ranchlands, Arbour Lake, Citadel, Hawkwood, and Silver Springs within the boundaries of a single constituency. The proposal to eliminate the riding of Calgary-Hawkwood disrupts the socio-economic, infrastructure and population patterns of the various communities involved. There are several arguments in support of this statement. First, the communities of Arbour Lake, Hawkwood, Ranchlands, Citadel, Dalhousie, and Silver Springs are contiguous. They share the same schools, shopping areas and community resources such as public health facilities, churches and other religious centres, schools, and community organizations. An important, but often overlooked, aspect of the social integration of the communities of Ranchlands, Citadel, Arbour Lake and Silver Springs within Calgary-Hawkwood are youth sports. This includes baseball, soccer, and ice hockey leagues for children and teens. These association build and integrate communities. Separating these communities would be a disservice to voters familiar with neighbours and organizations within existing boundaries. It would be a disaggregation of these communities of interest. To separate Ranchlands, for example, from the other communities within the existing riding of Calgary-Hawkwood would ignore existing relationships among the communities. There is a natural flow among the people of these northwest Calgary neighbourhoods that has been created over several generations. The transportation corridors of John Laurie Boulevard, Crowchild Trail, Nosehill Boulevard, and the LRT have created one community which should not be separated. As well, services are integrated among these neighbourhoods. Voters in Citadel use the dentists located in Ranchlands and Silver Springs and many in Ranchlands have their personal physicians in Arbour Lake, Silver Springs and Hawkwood.

Children from Ranchlands attend middle and high schools in Dalhousie and Arbour Lake. Keeping Silver Springs within the proposed riding of Calgary Edgemont would preserve the diversity of the constituency. Ranchlands would be the only community within Calgary-Edgemont with social/ public housing. To hive off Silver Springs (Arbour Lake, Citadel and other neighbourhoods) would be to consolidate the wealthier communities at the expense of Ranchlands. According to Statistics Canada data Ranchlands and Silver Springs are very similar in their socio-economic make-up. Ranchlands and Silver Springs have much more in common than do Ranchlands and Edgemont. The education levels within the several communities which make-up the proposed constituency of Calgary Edgemont are quite high; but this is not reflected in the very diverse neighbourhoods of Silver Springs and Ranchlands. Once again, Ranchlands would be an outlier and not be well-represented with the new riding. As well, the income levels would rise in Calgary Edgemont skewing it toward a much higher average income level. If Silver Springs and Arbour Lake were to be separated from the constituency, income levels would rise considerably, making Calgary Edgemont much less representative of its diverse population than other Calgary ridings.

If electoral boundaries are to reflect the interests of the communities they represent, then the several neighbourhoods of northwest Calgary should not be separated, but instead remain within the boundaries of one constituency.

I would like to address some of the central issues which the Commission addresses as well as some specifics when it comes to what you are proposing in Calgary and around the province. Population Growth

The Commission is making many assumptions about population growth in Calgary and around the province, even though they do not necessarily have accurate data on growth projections or neighbourhood development and planning (p. 30 of the Interim Report). Accounting for future growth by leaving those areas with seats that are well under the quotient is rather unprecedented for a Commission to do in Alberta and the other provinces, and it is something which you state is not an enumerated factor in the Act. I would propose that you reconsider the extent to which you apply this consideration, as by doing so you are making your work more difficult and open to criticism in many circumstances than need be. Calgary Lougheed is a good example where, while there currently significant green space for the city to expand and there is a plan in place, it has been delayed for the Southwest Ring Road work since 2007. The Area Structure Plans (ASPs) for the City of Calgary has scheduled development to begin shortly but in all likelihood it will be five years before it begins. Population growth in Calgary Lougheed should be left to the next Commission. In other areas, such as the East Village, older core neighbourhoods and downtown, it appears that the Commission has not accounted for the high-density and infill developments which are occurring. The various projects now under way will rapidly increase the population counts, particularly as the economic recovery progresses and vacancy rates fall.

That said I would like to commend the Commission for its efforts to keep constituencies within a closer threshold of the quotient whenever possible. It was clear from the submissions in the first round of

consultation that balancing population between Electoral Districts is important to Albertans.

Blended Seats and Effective Representation

The Commission is also on the correct path in its efforts to employ blended seats only when necessary, and to attempt to keep as much balance between rural and urban populations when doing so, so that no one community has a majority of demand on the elected member's time and effort. Most of the questions which the Commission is seeking public input on pertain to the question of population balance, the differing communities of interest between rural and urban constituents, and the importance of effective representation and what that means for both the MLA and their constituents.

I feel that the Commission may have missed opportunities to apply these considerations in some parts of the province and could create seats that address your concerns in a more effective way.

The first is in the application of the Special Status Seats outlined in s. 15(2) of the Act. There is an argument to be made that Ft. McMurray-Conklin be given status under this section of the Act. The questions on population estimates for the seat in light of the disruption from the 2015 wildfires, and the unique economic and geographic characteristics of the region mean that the Commission could give consideration not to including the distant and distinct communities of Lac la Biche and Athabasca in Ft. McMurray-Conklin and instead create a special status seat of Ft. McMurray-Conklin. This also addresses the Commission's question to the public for input on the orientation of the Ft. McMurray seats. The Commission is correct in identifying the large, sparsely populated Electoral District which would result in the creation of an urban and a blended Ft. McMurray paring of seats, or in the east-west division which exists in the current iteration of these two seats. Dividing the region in to a northern and southern District would consolidate most First Nations in one seat, and create a more manageable constituency for both MLAs with regards to size, travel, and population.

In the Medicine Hat region the Commission has asked for input on the orientation of the Electoral Districts, and the option of creating more blended seats. The Commission's proposed boundaries create two primarily rural seats immediately surrounding an urban seat in Medicine Hat. The current map contains a blended seat and an urban seat. By expanding the population of the blended and rural seats in its proposal and having two instead of one, the Commission has drawn in communities from much further afield than the current version of distribution in this area.

Taber-Vulcan becomes geographically expansive with no natural highway corridors linking one side of the seat to the other. Brooks-Cypress, moreover, concentrates most of its population in the area opposite that of Medicine Hat, where the balance of the urban population of the city is located. A more elegant solution would be to continue the urban/blended pairing around Medicine Hat which currently exists. This incorporates the constituents and communities who surround Medicine Hat and consider the city as a service and economic centre in to one seat, and provides a single MLA who can represent and understand the interests of the city and its surrounding communities. This would mirror what the Commission is attempting for other regions such as Grande Prairie, St. Albert, Strathcona County, and Airdrie and which has proven to be an effective model.

Airdrie provides another circumstance in which the Commission has made the correct recommendation to recognize the need and effectiveness of urban and blended seats, and which should be replicated elsewhere. I would encourage the Commission to consider uniting Spruce Grove and Stony Plain as one urban seat. The surrounding region includes rural agricultural, acreages and summer communities, and bedroom communities which centre on the Edmonton.

The creation of rural constituencies which surround the major municipalities, rather than radiate away from them, better unites communities of interest and recognizes the economic, developmental and cultural ties between the major cities and the smaller municipalities immediately adjacent to them. Proposed Electoral Districts such as St. Albert-Redwater miss this fact, tying disparate and unrelated communities together in a seemingly random way, while the Commission in other proposals succeeds in recognizing it, such as with Chestermere.

Recognizing Communities of Interest

While it is of course not always possible to avoid splitting neighbourhoods or tying together different communities of interest, the Commission has done a very good job in attempting to understand and recognize the characteristics of the communities which they are considering changing.

Uniting First Nations and Metis communities together within Electoral Districts as the Commission has attempted to do is a long-overdue step to helping raise the voice and influence of this important community, as is recognizing them in the naming of Electoral Districts.

The Commission should consider the gulf between neighbourhoods which the Deerfoot Trail/Airport/commercial areas create in the northern half of Calgary. The proposed Calgary Northeast constituency, for example, pulls very distant communities together. Rather, this corridor should be treated as a natural divide and electoral districts established starting from either side, working down the east side off the city, and across the northwest respectively. This has the added benefit of better preserving existing boundaries, rather than the major disruption caused in the Commission's proposal – something the Commission has stated it wants to avoid when possible. Consistency in the neighbourhoods contained in a seat makes it easier for the MLA to be an effective representative - one of the Commissions primary considerations.

Likewise, within the major cities I would urge the Commission to keep neighbourhoods and communities together over the consideration of population variance whenever possible. The dense, urban constituencies present different challenges for effective representation. As the Commission has heard from numerous submissions, voters in urban constituencies recognize their local neighbourhood with its retail, recreational, and service centres to be the primary definition of their community, and this sometimes contradicts what the city might have labelled as the actual borders of the neighbourhood. Splitting these communities between Electoral Districts has an impact on representation for both the MLA and the constituent, especially when it comes to neighbourhood events and interests such as development, transportation, and services that might be the jurisdiction of the province.



Electoral Boundaries Comission,

In the Interim Report on Proposed Electoral Division Areas, Boundaries and Names for Alberta, the community of Capitol Hill is assigned to the Calgary Mountain View riding. Under the section on "Recommendations for Boundary Changes" the report states:

The population (of Calgary Mountain View) would be 51,478, 10% above the provincial average. The level of positive variance in population created is justified, in the view of the majority, by the fact that the future population growth rate is likely to fall below provincial average, given the "fully built-out" character of this area. Population levels will likely be at or below provincial average population by the time of the next electoral boundaries review. (Page 42)

For the community of Capitol Hill, the statement is inconsistent with the population growth observed in the community using civic census data. This civic census shows a 14% population growth in Capitol Hill from 2011 to 2016, an increase of 568 people. According to the Government of Alberta website, the provincial population increased by 10% between 2012 and 2016, less than that of Capitol Hill. The Electoral Boundaries Commission may wish to review the annual census data publically available through The City of Calgary website (calgary.ca), particularly the data set on 5 year comparative population by community.

Furthermore, the Capitol Hill Community Association has been taking active steps to revitalize our community and encourage an increase in population. In recent years we have worked with The City of Calgary to complete an Area Redevelopment Plan (ARP) in partnership with the community to the west of Banff Trail. For Capitol Hill specifically, parcels along key corridors has been identified for a city-initiated rezoning to a land use that would allow for higher density residential developments. We are already seeing these developments being built around our community.

We hope this insight into our community is helpful to the Commission as they prepare their recommendations.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback to the Interim Report. In general I find myself sympathetic to the minority Commission report where it recommends the Commission use the 25% variance provisions in the legislation to maintain more or the less the present balance between rural and urban ,and as well as existing boundaries as much as possible. The 2010 EBC Commission included in its recommendations (p 20) that :

"The Legislative Assembly needs to seriously consider how the urban/rural perspectives will be addressed in the future. The Commission believes that this is an Alberta issue which will have to be addressed, probably before the next Commission is appointed."

This has not been addressed as of yet by the Assembly, nor have the recommendations for provision for additional offices, etc. been addressed either. Therefore "countervailing factors" to effective representation known and acknowledged by both Commission reports and critical unsettled issues have been simply set aside in the recommendations. Instead the boundary recommendations merely exacerbate previously acknowledged barriers to effective representation in large rural ridings. Until this political question is settled by the Assembly - as the 2010 report recommended- it behooves the Commission to avoid anticipating the Assembly by making one particular point of view on the matter ascendant. Although the commission argues in the report that respecting urban and rural balance per se is not listed in the legislation as a factor for consideration, that the commission has the authority to assess all factors deemed appropriate is indeed explicitly provided for. In fact this distinction is acknowledged by previous commissions as we see here. Otherwise, how are we to make sense of the 2010 recommendation on rural representation I just referenced above?

Setting a precedent for ever increasing the size of rural ridings due to the lower proportion of rural residents to urban ones impacts effective representation in other ways as well. Making rural ridings even larger than at present and thus even more time consuming to represent effectively while being able to maintain anything approaching a work/life balance will deter many quality people from considering running at all - especially those with family responsibilities, mobility challenges and so on, so that diversity will be impacted. Sadly, I believe it will also give young people in rural ridings progressively less opportunity for access and mentoring in public life as opposed to urban young people, and thus fewer result in rural candidates in the future -, and more candidates parachuted from urban areas to represent rural ridings instead.

The disruption in existing relationships and communities is compounded in the present context of radical changes in other areas impacting political life in Alberta and thus impacting effective representation. The 2015 Legislature included the greatest proportion of first term members in Alberta history and it takes time for members to understand the needs of their ridings and to become effective representing them. We have also witnessed big changes in electoral expense rules and reporting requirements, political party organizations, as well as unprecedented economic challenges and disruptive natural disaster. The system is already stressed. Changing the boundaries of ridings that are within the existing variances in pursuit of a strict parity not required by legislation will have pernicious effects on effective representation in the short term as it will inordinately task the ability of political actors to accommodate to the multitude of concurrent changes to established practices and communities of interests in the present context before the next scheduled election in May 2019. In effect it will overwork the small numbers of volunteers who make democratic political life possible in rural areas and lead to lower participation generally. There is a reason that previous commissions prided themselves on causing the least disruption to existing boundaries.

This is particularly problematic for Fort McMurray which has recently gone through a devastating natural disaster that has had a severe impact on the existing networks that make up political life with key community members not returning and all citizens occupied with unprecedented degrees of change and challenge. It does not seem appropriate to then ask those in public life to adapt to a complex new riding that requires the integration of two other quite divergent regional hubs separated by long distance. Especially when the most recent numbers from the Municipality of Wood Buffalo would suggest that the existing boundaries are indeed justifiable under legislation. I would think the burden of proof in this instance would be for those seeking to change existing boundaries rather than the reverse.

I respectfully request that the Commission revisit its boundary recommendations taking into due account all factors relevant to effective representation and make appropriate use of the variances built into the legislation to avoid unnecessary disruption and give the appropriate weight to the other factors to be considered as well. This would mean in practice a requirement to justify breaking apart ridings that are in accord with the legislation and that have been proven to work well in representing the interests of constituents - such as Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater, rather than disrupting them in the pursuit of a strict parity that is neither part of our own law nor our tradition.

When the commission met 8 years ago, the Northern Hills Community Association made a submission for a Calgary-Northern Hills Constituency. However, their interim report indicated the plan was to split up the Northern Hills, designating Coventry Hills with communities east of the airport. We considered this unreasonable for a number of reasons, including not meeting the requirements of legislation, so we requested to make a presentation to the Commission, who then challenged us to come up with a new plan for all 25 constituencies in Calgary, which we did, and Calgary - Northern Hills was created. Eight years later, we find ourselves challenging the commission again, yet for the exact same reasons: the legislation. This time, the Interim Report is even worse in our opinion.

The Commission has proposed a boundary running along Harvest Hills Blvd designating Coventry Hills, Harvest Hills and Livingstone into Calgary North East, again grouping these communities with communities east of Metis Trail. Country Hills, along with Beddington, Hidden Valley and Huntington Hills are designated into Calgary - Beddington. Panorama Hills will become part of Calgary - North including Evanston, and Carrington.

The commission is required to make several considerations including: community boundaries, interests and community organizations; existing community boundaries within the City of Calgary; existing municipal boundaries; geographic features including existing road systems and the desirability of understandable and clear boundaries.

It is our opinion that splitting up our communities into 3 different constituencies does not meet the legislation. Why is this important?

- 1. As a community association, this would mean attempting to coordinate and communicate with 3 different MLA's, adding additional work to a volunteer organization already stretched thin on resources.
- 2. As constituents, we are concerned that having 3 MLA's could diminish our effective representation. Since there is no requirement for MLAs to live within the districts they represent, imagine having 3 MLA's, none of whom have a vested interest in their district?
- 3. The NHCA is concerned that in not having an MLA dedicated to the majority of the Northern Hills residents, getting infrastructure needs such as the North High School, may be lost to other communities.
- 4. Vivo desperately needs expansion and we are still hopeful for a north Greenline. However, if Harvest Hills and Coventry Hills, are represented with communities east of Deerfoot that already have LRT, a high school and a newer recreation facility as community focal points, it may be difficult to engage an MLA to represent our needs.
- 5. Not only did the NHCA successfully challenge the commission in 2010, but we worked hard to have municipal and federal boundaries changed to reflect the different needs and common interests west of Deerfoot Trail. Effective as of this October's election, the Ward 3 boundaries will finally group north central Calgary communities together, something City of Calgary Administration attempted to do many years ago. We were unsuccessful convincing the federal commission that the boundary needed to move, and we continue to have an absentee MP in Calgary Northeast representing Coventry Hills and Harvest Hills, largely due to the vast empty space, commercial development and airport lands that sit between us and those Northeast communities. It is concerning and frankly appalling that this commission wishes to go backwards and reunite us with communities east of Metis Trail.

Could there be a benefit to having 3 MLA's? Possibly, but that is difficult to determine and at face value, seems more of a detriment. The NHCA acknowledges there could be some benefit in having ONE boundary within the community. The reason is, that the current average population per constituency is 46697. The commission has a mandate to be plus or minus 25% which would put Calgary - Northern Hills within hundreds of the cap. While it could be done, this dilutes our votes in that it would mean 58000 of us are voting for our government representation, while only 35000 might be voting in another district. While we are still working on the numbers, and with the growth expected in Harvest Hills, and in Carrington and Livingstone to the north, there must be a better way to divide the community to a maximum of two MLA's.

Again, the current proposal dividing Calgary - Northern Hills fails to recognize the following factors:

- common community interests and community organizations, including those of Indian reserves and Métis settlements.
- wherever possible, the existing community boundaries within the cities of Edmonton and Calgary,
- wherever possible, the existing municipal boundaries,
- geographical features, including existing road systems
- the desirability of understandable and clear boundaries

The communities of Coventry Hills, Country Hills Village, Harvest Hills Country Hills, and Panorama Hills are an island, surrounded my major Calgary roadways to the point a vehicle trap cuts our communities off from those south of us. The Northern Hills Community Association represents all 57000 people in this area. North Central Calgary, with over 100000 people lacks medical facilities, schools, seniors services and even a public high school. Splitting Northern Hills into 3 districts is a mistake. Grouping communities from the north central region with communities east of Deerfoot and south of Beddington Trail is simply unfair and unreasonable based on the mandate. We ask that you please reconsider, as the commission did 8 years ago.

I recommend against formation of the proposed new Fort McMurray--Lac La Biche--Athabasca ED and for retention of the Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater ED.

There is little common between Fort McMurray and either Lac La Biche or Athabasca and combining these three population centres in one ED will leave many—almost certainly in the two smaller towns and all the rural population in the mid-to-southern part of such an ED—without effective representation. In addition to the approximately 350 km from north to south, a large area extending about 200 km south from Fort McMurray is very sparsely populated. Travel distances from north to south would be huge, and to provide any reasonable service to all would require three MLA offices.

The present Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater (ASRW) has, in the most part, sufficient commonality of interests and connections have been developed amongst the regions which may have had less commonality before. It is near the population required to be within the guidelines and if it's necessary to increase the population of the ED the boundaries could be extended slightly to include other populations still with a commonality of interest with the current ED. And removing Redwater from ASRW and combining it with St. Albert, with which it has little or no commonality, would violate 14(c) of the Act.

Much has been made of how Alberta has such good communications, including SuperNet that connects about 400 small communities with the large urban centres and the rest of the world. Unfortunately, however, this does not include the rural population, who won't have optic fibre connections anytime soon and for whom a microwave—or even more expensive satellite—connection is the only possible reasonable bandwidth solution. These are too expensive for many and even for those who have them there's a need for applications that can be used for anything but social networking; i.e. it's difficult, time-

consuming, or expensive, to have synchronous meetings. This makes party organization and electioneering and MLA work much less efficient and disenfanchises the population for such a large and sparsely populated area.

Recommendation: Leave Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater as is and, if necessary, extend the boundaries slightly to include sufficient additional population.

The proposed changes to the boundaries of Calgary Acadia are generally good, creating an electoral district with the natural boundaries of the Bow River and Fish Creek Park, as well as the man made one of Anderson Road and 14 St SW.

The notable exception is the notch on the west side, bounded by Elbow Drive, 75 Ave SW, Glenmore Trail and 14 ST SW, encompassing the community of Kelvin Grove. This area is cut off from the rest of the proposed new Calgary Elbow by Glenmore Trail, the second busiest road in Western Canada. In contrast, residents of Kelvin Grove can walk across 75th Avenue to Chinook Park, and have easy access to Kingsland as well. Residents of these three neighbourhoods share schools, parks and local stores. The population of Kelvin Grove in 2006, according to Wikipedia, was 2,266, and is probably not much more than that now. While it is recognized that Calgary Acadia is already above the provincial average for electoral district population, adding Kelvin Grove makes sense.

The eastern part of the northern boundary could also be improved. Calgary Acadia includes the Alyth Rail Yard. The Inglewood neighbourhood (part of Calgary Buffalo) is right next to the rail yard and is more affected by rail yard operations than any neighbourhood in Calgary Acadia. East of 11 ST SE, the norther border could be moved just south of the CP Rail main line, all the way to the Bow River. No residential areas are affected, so there is no population impact. Doing so would allow residents of Inglewood to address concerns about rail operations to their own MLA. It is recognized that railways are federally regulated, but from the perspective of logical boundaries, the point stands.

The map in the document PROPOSED_ED01_CALGARY_ACADIA-1.pdf that is provided on the web site incorrectly shows the old CN Rail line going west past Elbow Rive. The line actually ends at Blackfoot Trail.

I am writing about the proposed boundaries for my quadrant of the city, Calgary Northeast.

I want to begin by recognizing the great work you have done on redrawing provincial constituencies. However, with the greatest of respect, I do not support the proposed boundaries you have drafted for this corner of the city for reasons, which I hope to outline for you here. Also, I have some suggestions for what can be done to make this a better represented part of the city.

Our neighbourhoods and communities in Northeast Calgary are very much interconnected to each other. We shop, work and live in this region of the city east of the airport and as such the Deerfoot Trail in N Calgary serves as a natural divide between the communities across this trail. Normally, we do not access services, recreation, or schools across Deerfoot in that part of the city and it doesn't make sense to have a constituency that goes across that way. The only time I go on the Deerfoot is if I need to use that for going downtown Calgary or north towards Edmonton. For that reason, I do not like the boundary of a constituency from east of Deerfoot trail crossing over the Deerfoot and submit that Deerfoot trail should be respected as a dividing line.

I think a better way to divide the area is to take everything east of the airport and divide it into two. As its a growing area, I submit that you spread the growth out by having one seat incorporate the future growth east of 60th Street (such as Savanna) and other seat incorporate growth along northern neighbourhoods (such as Skyview / Redstone). Accordingly, the Saddleridge neighbourhood you can split along 60th, taking everything east of 60th and putting it in the southeast seat and adding everything west side of 60th in the south seat. I have lived in Tradable and know lots of people from this area who have family living in these new neighbourhoods so I would suggest keeping them together. I also suggest you should keep all of Taradale neighbourhood together within this northern constituency,

which may include Saddleridge east of 60th, and everything north, like Redstone and those neighbourhoods up there, which should be in the new seat and its own seat because it is a growth area for the city and whereas further south the houses have been around for a bit longer.

Dear Commissioners,

My name is David Cournoyer, I am a voter living in the Edmonton-Highlands-Norwood constituency. I have followed the electoral boundary redistribution process for a number of years and am very interested in the process.

I would like to thank the Commissioners for their work in this important process. The act of redistributing electoral boundaries is a challenging process and not one that should be taken lightly. In particular, this Commission faces the challenge of redistributing Alberta's electoral boundaries without having the advantage of increasing the number of districts.

I have included below my recommendations in response to the interim report released by the Commission in May 2017:

Population

I believe this Commission can improve the population balance proposed in the interim report. The previous Commission did a good job keeping the population of most electoral districts within ten percent of the provincial average population per electoral district.

I recommend that the Commission attempt to keep districts within ten percent, and ideally within five percent, above or below the provincial average population per electoral district.

New Boundaries

I recommend the Commission consider the following amendments to the proposed districts included in the interim report:

Edmonton-East, Edmonton-North West, Edmonton-South, Edmonton-South West and Edmonton-West Henday: The Commission should reconsider using these geographic directional names for proposed districts, as they could cause confusion among voters. The names of the proposed districts are not necessarily reflective of their geographical areas. For example: The proposed Edmonton-East district is located west of the Edmonton-Beverly-Clareview and Edmonton-Manning districts and much of Edmonton-Northwest is located south of Edmonton-Castle Downs and east of Edmonton-West Henday.

Edmonton-Mill Woods-East and **Edmonton-Mill Woods-West**: I believe the names in these proposed districts may cause some unnecessary confusion among voters. I recommend the names of these proposed districts be changed.

Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul, Vermilion-Lloydminster, and Stettler-Wainwright: These proposed district span from the Edmonton Metro area to the Alberta-Saskatchewan boundary, with the first two resembling a shelter-belt rather than a constituency representing communities of common interest. The Commission should consider redistributing the proposed districts in a way that would not divide communities along such oddly drawn east-west boundaries.

Highwood: It should be noted that under this proposed district, the Highwood River is no longer located within the Highwood constituency, for which I believe it may be named.

St. Albert-Redwater: The population of the City of St. Albert is too large to warrant the creation of two districts within the municipal boundaries. Instead of expanding a second St. Albert district north to

Redwater, Smoky Lake, Buffalo Lake and Kikino, I recommend the creation of a district that would include St. Albert and the municipalities of Sturgeon County, Morinville, Legal, Cardiff, Bon Accord and Gibbons.

St. Anne-Stony Plain: I expect this has already been brought to the attention of the Commission, but the correct spelling is Ste. Anne, in reference to Lac Ste. Anne. It is my recommendation that the name of the proposed district, if it remains in the final report of the Commission, be renamed Lac Ste. Anne-Stony Plain.

Wetaskiwin-Camrose: I commend the Commission for their decision in the interim report to recommend the creation of a fully contiguous proposed district of Wetaskiwin-Camrose.

Thank you to the Commissioners for the opportunity to respond to the interim report. I wish you good luck in months ahead as you consider the feedback you have received in order to create the final report of this electoral boundary review.

Dear Electoral Boundary Commission,

I am making a submission today to express my concern about the proposed your proposed St. Albert-Redwater constituency, and how I believe that the boundaries proposed should be adjusted to provide a much more unified constituency based more solidly on the principle of the representation of interests. This principle is based on the idea that populations with similar interests should be grouped together into constituencies to ensure stronger representation.

While it is appropriate that you have taken a similar approach to St. Albert as has been done in Sherwood Park and Strathcona County, Grande Prairie and Medicine Hat. It does make sense that when a municipality has enough for one full urban constituency but not quite two it may be necessary to create one urban and one blended riding instead of two blended ridings. I disagree strongly where you've put those boundaries, and suggest boundaries that would put communities that have similar interests together, rather than combining St. Albert with the Redwater area, which has little commonality with St. Albert.

You did receive submissions asking for Morinville and Sturgeon county to be included with the St. Albert area. The population around St. Albert in Sturgeon County is much better suited to make a blended riding with, due to having similar interests and alike populations. Rural Sturgeon county and Morinville have a stronger cultural, economic, and infrastructural relationship with St. Albert than the Redwater area, including highways and proximity to each other. It also includes many bedroom communities to Edmonton, with constituents who regularly use the capital for services, entertainment, and employment.

The St. Albert, Sturgeon County, Morinville and Legal corridor is an historically linked region with common travel patterns and cultural relationships that predate the creation of Alberta as a province. The region is nationally recognized as a francophone corridor dating back to the original settlement of the St. Albert area. Additionally many residents of Sturgeon County and Morinville particularly access many of their public services in St. Albert. The vast majority of Morinville residents go to the Sturgeon Community Hospital in St. Albert to access their health care services. Their children attend schools at either the Sturgeon School division or the Greater St. Albert Catholic School division.

Currently In your proposal, you've drawn the lines from St. Albert all the way out to the Kikino Metis settlement, a full 2 hour drive away from St. Albert. This is unnecessary, and in fact splits apart some historically, culturally and economically connected communities, putting them in constituencies that seriously dilute the representation of their interests, particularly in the case of Morinville and Legal. Morinville has little commonality with communities such as Barrhead, Westlock and Swan Hills. As much as we need some blended ridings, this one ignores the principle of the representation of interests, and there has been no public support submitted requesting St. Albert to be joined with rural communities so far to the east.

If the commission were to take a smaller piece of St. Albert into the riding, you could make a constituency that follows the neighbouring boundaries west, includes Calahoo, wraps around Alexander 134, includes Alcomdale and Legal, and even potentially reaches up to highway 18, then comes back down Range Road 233 on the east side. This proposed constituency would be based around the highway 2 corridor, which is a much more natural divide than reaching over to Redwater, and should still be around 10% variance under the provincial average, depending on what piece of St. Albert you use, recognizing that this is a high-growth area of the province.

Those boundaries would also serve to keep more of the area's Franco-Albertan heritage communities in one riding than the current proposal, which you noted as one of your primary concerns.

Again, thank you for the opportunity, and we hope you take steps to address the issues in this area.

Thank you for the work you've done and for the consideration you've given to the population differences in electoral districts. I'd like to commend the EBC on taking in a wealth of information and opinions and doing their best to accommodate the requests of everyday Albertans as well. As a farmer living outside Endiang, I'd like to provide some feedback on Drumheller-Strathmore, Olds-Didsbury, and Stettler-Wainwright.

I understand from your interim report that you are recommending the riding of Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills should stay the same.

I have some points regarding this:

While the current population of the riding may fall 2% below the provincial average, the growth in the Highway 2 corridor area is likely to outpace the growth of the rest of the province. Previous provincial growth has been spurred not only by the larger urban centres, but also by communities in northern Alberta such as Grande Prairie. All this growth has been spurred by energy, and we know from recent events that energy prices may never return to their former level. This strongly suggests a slowdown of growth for those areas and cities of the province specifically linked to oils sands exploration and development. While the corridor along Highway 2 north of Red Deer and south of Leduc will not be immune to this slow down, the mixed economy of the area, and its proximity to Highway 2, suggests that its growth rate over the coming years will be higher than the rest of the province. This will effectively increase the riding's population over time to be above the average.

The communities along the Highway 2 corridor are changing, and are not the rural communities they once were. They are becoming younger, and more driven by trades and business than by agriculture. This is in contrast to the communities along Highway 21 and 806, which are still largely agricultural. Lumping them in with cities like Crossfield that are largely residential does not serve the consideration of common interests.

The Commission could move the eastern border west, and run it along Highway 791. As well, they could extend the boundaries of the riding north to follow the Highway 2 corridor., taking in the communities of Bowden, Innisfail and Penhold. This would join these communities, which have a strong commonality of interest with the Olds, Didsbury and Carstairs.

It would connect communities of interest along Highway 2 and it would give the constituency of Olds-Didsbury room to grow in the coming years so that it's voting representation is not diluted. It would put those farming communities along Highway 21 and 806 into a riding with the other eastern Alberta farming communities to which they are more closely aligned both by occupation and by geography.

In regard to the proposed new boundaries for the constituency of Drumheller-Strathmore, I agree with some of the recommendations, and have suggestions for improvement in other areas:

First, in regard to the Special Areas, I applaud the Commission's commitment to keeping them together. As history has shown, this area of the province is in particular need of good management, and the Special Area Boards are not only important in themselves but as partners in keeping a very important part of the province running effectively.

In regard to the Siksika Nation, I agree with the Commission that keeping their area together in one riding is important, and giving Indigenous communities greater voice is one of the mandates that I fully support. However, expanding the riding as far south as you have puts the Siksika Nation at the far south of a very large geographic area, and cuts them off from the areas directly east and south of them like Queenstown, Rosemary and Bassano. Their needs might be better met if they were included with the towns closer to them. This could be accomplished by running the boundary a bit north of where they are, and making the Siksika Nation a bigger part of a smaller riding. Otherwise they are at the southern end of a large riding that has very little in common with them, especially when you get up into the areas of Consort and Coronation, being distant agricultural communities.

In regard to the area around Drumheller, again I think in large terms the Commission was correct in including Drumheller in this riding. However, drawing the boundary along the river beside Drumheller cuts off the little section of land right across the river. It also cuts off Drumheller from the natural transportation corridor of Highway 21 and Highway 806 and communities like Linden, Acme and Beiseker. All that area in there, going up to Three Hills, is part of a natural trading and service area. It has more in common with Drumheller and region than it does with the more developed Highway 2 corridor to the east. I believe we must strengthen rural voices when we can. Including those towns with towns along the Highway 2 corridor (like Olds and Didsbury) doesn't really do that. Highway 2 is becoming a highly developed area compared to the east of the province.

In your interim report, you said that you wanted to keep Flagstaff county intact: This recommendation would keep Flagstaff county intact, an important goal given the significant work in which that county is engaged relating to inter-municipal partnerships. It is apparently regarded as a template for regionalization in other areas.

With that in mind, I recommend using more county boundaries in that area to make a riding. That would be Camrose County, Flagstaff County, County of Stettler No. 6, County of Paintearth No. 18, and Beaver County (minus Tofield, due to the population). The population of that area should be right on the mark for the provincial average for a 0% variance, and you keep alike communities together, using existing boundaries from the counties.

Dear Commission Members,

I'm writing today to offer feedback regarding the new electoral boundary proposed for Calgary-Klein. A number of neighbourhoods to the east of Deerfoot that have now been included in the riding that are not only geographically cut off from the rest of the riding by major arterial roads (16th avenue and Deerfoot) but are of significantly different character in terms of structure and age. For example, North Airways, South Airways, McCall, Horizon, Sunridge, Meridan, Franklin and Mayland are considered major employment centres while the neighbourhoods west of Deerfoot are primarily residential and built out in the 1950s and earlier. There is evidently not only a geographical divide between these two areas but also sharp contrast in their form and function.

This would not be particularly problematic if it weren't for the exclusion of Mount Pleasant and Capitol Hill. With our current electoral boundary, most of the neighbourhoods in the riding were constructed in the 1950s and prior. More specifically, the divide between Mount Pleasant and Tuxedo Park creates an electoral divide between two neighbourhoods that are historically analogous. Furthermore, this division works to break up consistent representation according to the boundaries of the existing public school district. Were Mount Pleasant and Capitol Hill to be retained in the new riding, the electoral boundary would correspond to the school district boundary. There are a number of educational communities that will be impacted by this decision and a social fabric that will be invariably impacted by the shift in political representation.

With these points in mind, I recommend retaining 19th St NW as the western boundary of the riding to keep Mount Pleasant and Capitol Hill in the riding. Since the inclusion of communities to the east of

Deerfoot does not cleave the public school district boundaries, it may be appropriate to retain them but not at the expense of separating Mount Pleasant and Capitol Hill from the riding. The configuration I am proposing here would create a riding that is made up of two distinct areas but retains some commonality within them.

However I believe did not take into consideration the economic ties of the surrounding region, specifically the Edmonton airport lands. I also believe that the Commission's proposed riding is too large in population.

There is currently significant development close to the Edmonton airport, especially a major outlet mall. These projects are a major employer of people in the Leduc and Beaumont area, and the mall will be a major employer as well. Therefore the airport area should be back in the riding.

To the AB Electoral Boundaries Commission,

The Commission requested specific public input on the subject of the proposed ridings of Medicine Hat and Taber-Vulcan. Specifically, to choose between a geographically large primarily rural riding of Taber-Vulcan and urban riding of Medicine Hat or creating two blended rural-urban ridings out of these two ridings.

I understand the Commission's reasoning for minimizing blended ridings, but in this case two blended ridings would be the better option.

1. First, the Commission understands that while similar population size is the main concern when configuring ridings equitable work for MLAs must also be considered.

The Commission talks about the different strategies rural MLAs can take to mitigate the travel time in serving geographically large ridings. The Commission also talks about urban ridings and the other factors that could complicate an urban MLA's work. By trying to compare the work of rural and urban MLAs the Commission is trying to compare apples and oranges, but implied is that different MLAs, whatever their riding characteristics, should have roughly equal workloads. Equitable work is a part of equal effective representation.

In this case there is an easy way to ensure equitable work between the two MLAs of SE Alberta. By creating two blended rural-urban ridings you would ensure that both MLAs have a similar population to serve and a similar geographic riding size--no need to try and compare apples and oranges.

2. The Commission concedes on page 18 that "at some point increasing geographic size impedes a rural MLA's ability to continue to provide this degree of access." However, we rely on the Commission to make the judgment call on what is too large a riding size.

When the Commission visited Medicine Hat on January 26 you heard from one sitting MLA and four former MLAs. All of whom spoke that the current Cypress-Medicine Hat riding's geographic size made representation challenging. All asked to keep the riding as is.

I understand why the Commission could not keep the status quo in SE Alberta, however, the words of so many MLAs should carry considerable weight. If we take their word, then the two blended ridings option again becomes the better choice. Otherwise we have an even larger riding in Taber-Vulcan for a rural MLA to manage.

What constitutes too large a geographic riding? This question has not been definitely answered. However, there is reasonable grounds to believe that the current proposed Taber-Vulcan would be too large.

If this is a grey area, where it's unclear, the Commission can easily resolve the dilemma by choosing the two blended riding option.

Thank you for your work on the electoral boundaries here in Red Deer. After my initial presentation when the commission met in Red Deer, I was happy to see that the commission listened to the written submissions from Red Deer, and extended the boundary between Red Deer North and Red Deer South along Ross Street. Having the communities of Deer Park Village, Deer Park Northeast, and Davenport together in Red Deer South better suits the common needs of those communities and their neighbours. I know from my involvement in the past 2 provincial elections that the large majority of residents in Deer Park consider themselves residents of the south side of Red Deer, and therefore assume that they would vote in Red Deer South. Ross Street (50th street) is also a clear and distinct line through Red Deer that groups similar neighbourhoods and establishes acceptable population variances for Red Deer North and Red Deer South.

Another important factor that reinforces your plan for Red Deer is the Red Deer Municipal Development Plan. There are three new neighbourhoods planned for Red Deer, which you can see on the last page of their plan. All three of those new communities will be in Red Deer North, so they will definitely need the room for population growth. The existing, but fledgling Red Deer North neighbourhoods of Timberlands, Garden Heights, and Evergreen, are also still projected for significant growth in the short term. Moving the boundary to 50th Street to allow for that growth to happen in Red Deer North is good forward thinking that should lead to balancing the populations of each riding. Along a similar line of thinking, it would also be consistent with neighbourhood boundaries and like communities if the boundary at Taylor Drive and the Red Deer River simply followed the river to the west, and terminated at Highway 2. This slight suggested change would only add a handful of electors to Red Deer South - electors who only just went through a switch from Red Deer North (2012) back to Red Deer South (2015) and potentially back again.

Sticking to Red Deer city boundaries for both ridings is also a sound decision. Given that the city has the population for two constituencies, and that people are already used to Red Deer's boundaries for their municipal and provincial elections, using the city boundaries for these two constituencies is the correct choice to provide the strongest representation possible for city residents in the provincial legislature.

Best of luck on your next round of drafting, and thank you again for your thorough work on these boundaries. I would have taken the opportunity to join you in Red Deer again this summer, but a family commitment out of town prevents me from attending. Please keep me apprised of your progress, and feel free to let me know if you have any questions or suggestions.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback on the proposed boundaries. I have some follow-up recommendations for the proposed boundaries of Wetaskiwin-Camrose.

In some initial submissions, there were many requests that the 4 Cree Nations of Maskwacis and Ma-Me-O Beach be included in one electoral district, which would provide the best representation to the first nations communities living in the area. I would insist that this is possible, and the best possible outcome for the area. You have an opportunity here that I hope doesn't pass us by.

Right now, you have Wetaskiwin, Camrose, and Mackwacis in the same riding. If you extend the riding west, you can include Pigeon Lake and Ma-Me-O Beach very easily. The boundaries of the western portion would be: Highway 611 to the south, Highway 771 to the west around Pigeon Lake, then east across the lake to Highway 616, up Highway 778, east along the northern edge of Wizard Lake, then straight east to connect around Camrose.

This will create a riding based around the communities in the area, namely the cree nations, Wetaskiwin, and Camrose, and based around the transportation corridors in the area. We have Highway 13 connecting the whole riding east to west, and highways 2 and 2A connecting Mackwacis to the south.

While the 4 Cree Nations of Mackwacis are in your Wetaskiwin-Camrose proposal, which I'm sure those communities will appreciate, I sincerely hope you consider this option that includes Ma-Me-O beach.

For the population variance, the interim report noted that Wetaskiwin-Camrose will now have "a population of 49,058, 5% above provincial average." Under our proposal that extends west, the riding will be at approximately 10% variance, within acceptable limits.

The commission definitely has the right idea to orient the two Fort McMurray constituencies as east-west rather than north-south. However the Commission's proposal does not respect some of the historical boundaries of Fort McMurray, as well as not following county boundaries. We would re-orient the constituency along the Highway 63 and Highway 881 corridors, as the commission has done, with some changes in the city of Fort McMurray to balance the populations.

We would suggest extending the southeastern boundary to cover the entirety of Lac La Biche County. This of course would ensure that the entire county is within one constituency. Additionally we would add the community of Kikino. In the Commission's proposal, Kikino is isolated from Lac La Biche, where the people access the majority of their services. This would put Kikino back into a constituency with Lac La Biche.

We also recognize the potential difficulties that the MLA could face serving three different population centres. As proposed by the Commission, the MLA would have to serve both downtown Fort McMurray, as well as the population centres of Lac La Biche and Athabasca. We would support removing the parts of Athabasca County that the Commission's proposal puts into the riding. This will allow the MLA to only have to serve two major population centres: Lac La Biche and Fort McMurray, instead of three, and thus only require two constituency offices. Three offices would be difficult to afford and staff.

Within Fort McMurray, we would suggest removing downtown Fort McMurray from Fort McMurray-Cold Lake and instead place it in Fort McMurray - Wood Buffalo. Downtown Fort McMurray has traditionally been represented with the northern communities, as it did in the old Fort McMurray-Wood Buffalo. This would also provide a better balance of demographics to both Fort McMurray seats, as there are some

differences between those who live in the old downtown area and those in newer neighbourhoods.

To account for the loss of population from removing Athabasca County and downtown Fort McMurray, we would add the neighbourhoods on and surrounding Thickwood Boulevard, with the green space separating Thickwood and the Timberlea neighbourhoods as the new border. The southern part of Thickwood was part of the former Fort McMurray - Conklin constituency so it would remain somewhat consistent with the old boundaries. This also ensures that the communities hit hardest by the wildfire, which were Thickwood and Beacon Hill, will be represented in the same constituency.

The resulting constituency would have an estimated population of 37 600, which is 20% less than the provincial average. This is consistent with the Commission's proposal. As the Commission refers to in their questions for public input, it would be expected that homes in the affected areas will be rapidly rebuilt and re-populated, so that variance would quickly stabilize closer to the provincial average.

To the Chair and Members of the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission:

I've watched with interest the development of the Interim Report and the many submissions and considerations that the Commission has had to consider.

As a constituent of Calgary-Buffalo, I would like to point out written submission #551 from Kevin Allen, the Returning Officer for Calgary Buffalo. I believe he makes an important point regarding the projected population increase of this constituency. In his notes he projects that East Village will welcome 12,000 residents over the next few years, and that other communities like Beltline are on track to become among the largest communities in Calgary.

While I do not have Mr. Allen's expertise or knowledge of polling stations, I do know that there are at least 19 condos developments that I can name that are either built, starting to fill up, or will be completed and occupied before the next provincial election. Based on the number of units and an average of 2 people per unit, the constituency will add another 9,000 people from those developments alone.

In the Interim Report the Committee's recommendation was based on the assumption that "...the future population growth rate is likely to fall below provincial average, given the character of this central area."

I would like to suggest with respect that the Commission's assumption in this regard is inaccurate, and that a better estimate of population growth can be easily determined by either reviewing Mr. Allen's submission in detail, or by doing the simple calculations that I myself was able to do. Given that real future population growth, Calgary-Buffalo will be well over the provincial average by the time of the next

election.

While it is always difficult to adjust boundaries without making some kind of impact on neighbourhoods, I can suggest a solution to this constituency's population problem.

The area of Lower Mount Royal, south of 17th Ave. SW, and bounded on the west by 14 St. SW and on the east by College Lane SW, is an area of apartments and condos. This neighbourhood is delineated by Bagot Ave. SW and Royal Ave SW on its south side, and shares an orientation toward the 17th Ave. SW strip. The commission should incorporate all of this area into Buffalo as it shares the same downtown, higher density characteristics as neighbouring communities in the Constituency.

Directly south of this is Upper Mount Royal, which is primarily single detached homes and separated geographically from Lower Mount Royal which is at the bottom of the hill. I suggest that Upper Mount Royal and Elbow Park remain in Calgary-Elbow. This area has similar types of development and demographics to Roxboro and Britannia to the east and south, and with Bankview and South Calgary to the west.

Incorporating the East Village into Buffalo makes sense as the demographics, community characteristics, proximity to the city core, and interests of the community are consistent with other areas of the constituency. The natural divide created by the river, between the East Village and Ramsay/Inglewood, offer an easily identified boundary for the constituency. Including any of Inglewood, Ramsay, or other communities as the Commission suggests would ignore the population pressures and different communities of interest between those two areas. Therefore, they should not be included.

The development and growth projections for the East Village will more than compensate for the loss of these other neighbourhoods, as indicated above, in Mr. Allen's submission, and in the attached chart.

As an Albertan who cares about the principle of equality of representation by population, I hope and trust that you will re-evaluate your assessment of the projected growth rate of Calgary-Buffalo, and make some adjustments accordingly.

I write to express concern about the interim report's impact on one neighbourhood in Lethbridge. Legacy Ridge is a distinct and separate residential neighbourhood on the north side of the city, bordered by collector roads and the river valley. It is contiguous and is clearly distinct in terms of commuter traffic, neighbourhood parks and pathways, and the age of development of the community. It has recently developed its identity further with the addition of a new elementary school.

One small part of the neighbourhood -- around 20% of the whole community -- is separated from the rest. It is in the Lethbridge-West riding, polls 1 and 2 from the previous division map. At the time that the previous divisions were made, the neighbourhood did not exist, and it fell on the West side of an arbitrary line drawn straight north from the end of Stafford Drive. Stafford Drive does not create the division -- rather, it ends, and a line is drawn straight north, severing this small part of the community from the rest of Legacy.

In fact, there is no natural division between the major part of Legacy that is found in Lethbridge-East, and this small part of Legacy in Lethbridge-West. I live in the second last home in Lethbridge East. My residential block continues into Lethbridge West, where this small part of the community is severed from its main access points into Lethbridge, which run through Lethbridge East. Indeed, that part of Legacy has no public building suitable for a polling station. As such, they will need to leave the community to find a polling station within the Lethbridge-West riding — and ironically, will likely need to travel via Lethbridge-East to do so.

When the boundaries were last modified in the last redistribution, the boundary between East and West at this north end of the city had a small shift to bring Legacy Ridge mostly into Lethbridge-East. At that time, all of Legacy Ridge that was developed came into Lethbridge-East, but this ignored future development in the community. That problem became apparent in the last election when these brand new homes fell in Lethbridge-West. Now that the neighbourhood has fully developed, now is the time to ensure that these residents come into Lethbridge-East, where they fit more naturally.

I suspect that this will be a change that is inevitably made, both to correct the separation of this distinct community, but also as Lethbridge-West continues to grow at a faster pace than Lethbridge-East. This will be a natural fix, and we might as well ensure that these residents become accustomed to voting in Lethbridge-East now, before they gain further experience voting in Lethbridge-West and are switched later.

I understand the preference not to make a change based on the populations in each riding already being around average, but this would make a small improvement and may help a bit to maintain that average population even as the west side of the city grows at a faster pace. The simplest fix may be to bring both Poll 1 and Poll 2 from Lethbridge-West into Lethbridge-East.

Hello electoral boundary commission,

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback on the proposed boundaries.

This submission is primarily concerned with the St. Anne-Stony Plain constituency (81), and the area west of Edmonton. I have a constituency in mind that will maintain the commonality of interest between rural and urban areas, deliberately excluding Spruce Grove and Stony Plain to ensure the riding is primarily rural. There are several great natural boundaries and municipal boundaries in this area that can be used to make this happen.

The boundaries would be as follows:

From the edge of Edmonton, from 215 street and Whitemud, head south.

At 33rd ave, go east and around the Blackhawk Golf Club.

Follow the North Saskatchewan river west all the way to Northleigh, range road 63 and highway 624.

Go west to the Pembina River, then follow it north and around, all the way to Lac la Nonne.

Go around Lac La Nonne, Camp Nakamun, and Alexander 134 reserve.

Go south on Highway 779, east on Highway 633, South on Highway 44, east on Highway 16.

Then follow the Edmonton municipal boundary to complete the boundary.

From this boundary, I excluded Stony Plain and Spruce Grove, which have enough population together to be their own constituency. This better achieves the goal of not having a blended constituency.

The population of this proposed rural boundary, according to our work, would be around 51,000 as well, 9% variance above the provincial average, which is within prescribed limits, and is an area that is not growing in terms of population.

The use of the municipal boundaries of Edmonton, Spruce Grove, and Stony Plain, and the natural boundaries of the North Saskatchewan and Pembina Rivers, create a clear, focused constituency of rural folks west of the capital region. The riding captures several of the larger lakes in the region, including Wabamun and Lac Ste. Anne, which would be a great name for the constituency. It also provides good representation to aboriginal voices by putting Alexander 134 and Stony Plain 135 together.

I hope you consider this potential constituency, given the many submissions requesting less blended ridings, and the clear natural boundaries available in the area. Constituents in the area will appreciate being represented on their common interests.


Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback on your proposed boundaries. I am writing to you today with some suggestions for the Leduc-Beaumont constituency. The changes I am suggesting to your proposed boundaries are based on:

- 1. Ongoing annexation negotiations between the City of Edmonton, Leduc County, and the City of Beaumont.
- 2. The large population growth expected in Leduc and Beaumont (backed up by Capital Region Board projections).

For the land involved in the City of Edmonton annexation, I recommend that the new provincial boundary maintain the existing boundary along 41st Avenue. My rationale for maintaining the boundary there is that development in this area is far off, and in the time being people in these areas use Beaumont, Nisku, and Leduc as their primary service centres. This is especially true of the area immediately around Beaumont. Additionally, the annexation agreement is still being negotiated with respect to Beaumont.

The agreement in any case will leave the Edmonton International Airport in Leduc County, so it should stay in Leduc-Beaumont(especially given its importance to Nisku and Leduc). The map on the right is the Edmonton-Leduc County annexation, as published by the City of Edmonton.

In terms of the population growth, the proposed variance for Leduc-Beaumont is **11% above the average**, in a constituency with two of the fastest growing municipalities in Canada. Beaumont is the 5th fastest growing municipality in Canada,




and Leduc is the 14th fastest growing municipality in Canada. My understanding is that setting the boundaries as proposed now would put Leduc-Beaumont <u>around 13-14% above the provincial average in 2024</u> when the Electoral Boundary Commission meets again. Leduc and Beaumont alone are 1.48% above the provincial average this time around, and will be about 4.34% above the provincial average next time, without factoring in any rural constituents in the rest of the riding. I recommend that the commission plan ahead for this issue by pulling the

eastern and western boundaries in, as it will need to be addressed sooner or later, and constituents should not be underrepresented in the meantime.

In tables at the end of this submission, I've laid out the population growth for Leduc, Beaumont, and Alberta, followed by projected variances for Leduc, Beaumont, and the proposed Leduc-Beaumont constituency. I used those numbers to come to the conclusion that Leduc-Beaumont needs to be reduced geographically. My numbers are from Statistics Canada's population projections for Alberta, and the Capital Region Board's "Capital Region Growth Plan". I used the M1 growth scenario for Alberta; and I used Capital Region Board's 2040 population estimates to get a 2024 projection for Leduc and Beaumont.

My recommended boundary borders are in the following image. This boundary is at a 6% variance, to provide room for growth. The proposed Leduc-Beaumont boundary is in red, and my recommendation is in blue.



Thank you very much for the opportunity to make these recommendations. I hope my work informs your decision-making.

We appreciate the opportunity to respond to your Interim Report, and we commend the principled work you have done with this major undertaking.

The Sherwood Park New Democrat Constituency Association had contemplated a submission to you for Round 1 of your work, but failed to actually submit it. It would have repeated what individual members of our Board and other organizations, such as Public Interest Alberta [EBC-2016-17-174] and the Seniors' Action and Liaison Team [EBC-2016-17-754], had said, and which you have respected:

- Every vote should have nominally equal weight in determining who represents us in the Legislature. Electoral boundary populations should not vary by more than ± 5%.
- Current boundaries should be respected as much as possible, with adjustments for new ridings as required, except for those situations, such as Spruce Grove-St. Albert, where the constituency boundaries are not consistent with the interests of either community.
- We do not support creation of "rurban" constituencies because doing so would dilute the interests of both urban and rural constituents.
- Electoral boundaries should reflect the predominant characteristics of the community (urban, suburban, or rural) to ensure that MLAs can more effectively represent the needs and interests of their constituents.
- MLAs with large geographic regions should have adequate resources to ensure reasonably local constituent access to their MLA. Those MLAs should have extra allotments (mileage, additional staffed offices, etc.) to account for the size of their constituency.

First, we are content with the minor changes you have recommended for Sherwood Park itself; there is very little disruption to the population, community and physical area we currently have. We appreciate that you considered my personal wish that the entire defined urban area of the Park might be a single electoral district.


"It is recommended that the small area remaining from the former Fort Saskatchewan-Vegreville electoral division be added to Sherwood Park and that the southern boundary of the electoral division be moved to align with the municipal boundary, all as shown in Map 77.

The resulting population would be 45,951, 2% below the provincial average. The constituency would thus remain largely unchanged from its current form while capturing an "orphaned area" and producing a more logical southern boundary. The public request that the entire urban area of Sherwood Park be united into one electoral division is not possible given its high population.

PROPOSED SHERWOOD PARK 2017



It is recommended that the boundaries of this electoral division remain unchanged except to straighten out the northern boundary it shares with Sherwood Park constituency, as shown in Map 83. See discussion on Sherwood Park. This would result in a population of 47,843, or 2% above the provincial average. No submissions were received in relation to this constituency.

<u>Strathcona County</u> is a "specialized municipality" made up of the urban area of Sherwood Park and a large rural area of farms, acreages and eight smaller hamlets. Most of our area - 87,502 hectares – is designated agricultural; with another 9,000 hectares industrial, 2,000 commercial, and 18,542 residential. ³

Governance is a single County Council, with a mayor, and elected Councillors from the 8 County wards. We are represented in the Alberta government by two provincial constituencies, *Sherwood Park*, composed of a large portion of the urban area of Sherwood Park, and *Sherwood Park-Strathcona*, a mix of the rural areas, the smaller hamlets, and the eastern portion of Sherwood Park [Clover Bar Road to Highway 21, between Wye Road and Highway 16]. ⁴

In the 2016 Census, Strathcona County recorded a population of 98,044, a change of 6% from its 2011 population of 92,490. 70,618 residents live in the urban service area of Sherwood Park., and the remainder on farms and acreages and in eight smaller hamlets.⁵ Population increase has been mainly in urban Sherwood Park, but that growth will soon be constrained by its physical area. Future growth is being planned for new urban communities and subdivision development. The Bremner "urban growth node" is being planned for 54,000 residents, with significant retail development, with other residential areas north of Highway 16 and west of Highway 21 planned for an additional 11,500 people. The county's hamlets of Ardrossan, Josephburg and South Cooking Lake have been planned to accommodate an additional 5,000 more residents. Colchester, south of Sherwood Park and Highway 628 [the Whitemud Extension], remains a possible development area.⁶

The population itself Is representative of the Alberta population, with a similar age distribution between rural and urban areas, and, like the rest of Alberta, with a gradual aging. Rural residents are slightly older than those living in Sherwood Park, but this is likely to be readjusted with the planned population growth in currently rural areas.⁷

We have learned that the Sherwood Park-Strathcona NDP Constituency Association is proposing to move the area bounded by Lakeland Drive, Highway 16, Sherwood Drive, and Clover Bar Road from Sherwood Park to Sherwood Park-Strathcona. This would further decrease the Sherwood Park ED population below the existing -2% variance, and further increase the Sherwood Park-Strathcona population above the existing +2% variance. Sherwood Park-Strathcona is already facing a significant future increase when the various County development plans are implemented. We do not agree with that proposal.



Re: Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul, Vermilion-Lloydminster, and Stettler-Wainwright.

We do have major concerns about the proposed changes to these neighbouring areas east of us. We accept that changes were warranted, with the proviso that our colleagues in Fort Saskatchewan wouldn't bet the family farm on your predictions for its population growth.

It does appear that you have given thought to the issue of voter equality. What is missing, we see, is a preference for the most compact possible physical area which will also respect voter equality and community interests.

The Yellowhead Trail is a major east-west transportation route, but this does not make it a realistic regional or electoral district boundary. It cuts through the middle of the Vegreville catchment area. The proposed riding includes the northern half of Vegreville's natural trading area, while St. Paul is almost completely separated from its natural trading area.

"The current Fort Saskatchewan-Vegreville constituency is about 5,000 kilometres squared [sic]. The proposed Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul district would climb to almost 8,000 square kilometres." Although much of the additional area is almost empty of population, the proposed population would be 10 per cent above the provincial average.

The City of Fort Saskatchewan makes up 49.9 per cent of the proposed new riding with 25,553 of the 51,216-total population. Fort Saskatchewan grew by 3.9 per cent between April 2016 and April 2017. This urban area of the proposed riding is one of Alberta's high growth areas, expanding at almost three times the Alberta average rate of 1.4 per cent in the same period. It seems unwise, therefore, to make this new riding larger in population than average in anticipation of high growth elsewhere, as, should growth continue in Alberta, there is every reason to expect the new riding to grow at somewhat higher than the Alberta average rate, even with no growth in the riding outside Fort Saskatchewan.

Predominant, defining community interests are usually occupation/trading, public service areas, and other community partnerships, including those defined by historical, cultural and social characteristics, and currently being defined again by municipal regionalization initiatives.

We don't believe that the narrow, 250 km-long rectangles represent community, municipal or regional interests and concerns as well as alternative geographic boundaries possible within the combined area of two or three of the districts now defined as Fort Saskatchewan-St. Paul, Vermilion-Lloydminster, and Stettler-Wainwright.

We strongly support a reconsideration of these interim boundaries with particular attention to submissions from the persons and organizations affected as well as the premise that our votes should be as equal as possible.

I believe that the Commission is on the right track when it comes to orienting the two Fort McMurray constituencies as east-west, rather than north south. However, I believe that the Commission should include downtown Fort McMurray with the northern part of the region. The reason for that is because downtown Fort McMurray serves as the main regional hub for the northern communities. Thisis also consistent with the way Fort McMurray was divided in the 2010 redistribution. This also avoids the issue of split representation of the city of Fort McMurray. The MLA representing the proposed Fort McMurray -Cold Lake would be able to spend more time representing his or her constituents based around the Lac La Biche area, whereas the MLA for Fort McMurray - Wood Buffalo would represent the main part of the historical Fort McMurray, so that area is not under-represented. To avoid overpopulation of this new riding, we would suggest that we re-combine the Thickwood community (which was previously split along Thickwood Boulevard inthe 2010 redistribution) and put that community in the Fort McMurray - Cold Lakeconstituency. I would use the green space separating Thickwood and Timberlea as the dividing line (where Thickwood Boulevard becomes Confederation Way), with Thickwood in Fort McMurray - Cold Lake and Timberlea in Fort McMurray - Wood Buffalo. This proposal has the added affect of keeping together neighbourhoods in Fort McMurray that were relatively unscathed after the Fort McMurray wildfires. This means that the populations remained stable, so it avoids the depopulation issue that is addressed in the Commission*s questions for public input. The resulting constituency would have a population of about 45 597, 2% under the provincial average.

Submission by the Edmonton Glenora NDP.

The constituency of Edmonton Glenora captures the residential neighbourhoods just to the west of the downtown. The riding in its current boundaries and the boundaries proposed by the boundary commission ensures that the communities in the West of the downtown remain whole. The area is unique because the majority of residents shop and socialize both in the constituency but also at destinations in the downtown. The constituency is uniquely tied to the downtown core in ways that are different than neighbourhoods closer to the Hendey. This is vital for a constituency where residents identify with their neighbourhood, walk their young children to schools and daycares and get involved with local groups in their community.

The boundaries proposed by the commission continue the trend for the constituency where residents also shop within Edmonton Glenora. Residents east and west of Groat Road shop at the Groat Road Shopping Centre or the Costco that is within the constituency. Residents also use the Mayfair Common and businesses along Stoney Plain Road. More importantly, 124th Street remains unchanged in the commissions proposal. This street is increasingly becoming an important destination for Edmontonians and especially for residents of Edmonton Glenora. Shops, restaurants and bars are walkable for many residents and are often full of local customers. There is also a farmers market that serves families who live in Edmonton Glenora. The street is a point of pride for residents. As 124th street continues to grow and develop and attract new businesses it is crucial that this street remains unchanged and continues to have one MLA that can advocate for the district's interests.

Edmonton Glenora is home to young families that use community leagues, daycares and schools in the riding. Parents use their community leagues and the parks in the community leagues. Parents walk their kids to school and to daycare. This reality brings communities together. Parents and children become

friends and then use their community leagues to put on events for their entire neighbhourhood. Breaking communities in Edmonton Glenora between electoral districts would dramatically change how residents socialize and get involved in their community. They want their neighbhourhoods to remain whole in all respects.

While Glenora is diverse, there are issues that are constant throughout the constituency. Glenora and Westmount are old historic communities that are working to preserve the character of their neighbhourhood. Most other neighbhourhoods are dealing with growth and working to ensure that while their communities grow, the characteristics of their community remain unchanged. Other communities like Inglewood and communities North of 111th street are growing as young families are moving their to buy their first home. Good day,

This is Craig Coolahan, the MLA for Calgary-Klein and a resident of the community of Capitol Hill. After reviewing the proposed changes to the boundaries of Calgary-Klein, I would like to offer some insight into why I think that these proposed changes should be reconsidered, and ultimately I believe that the best solution for this constituency is to maintain the boundaries as they were in the elections of 2012 and 2015.

Firstly, as a resident of Capitol Hill, I am concerned that this community and Mount Pleasant are being removed from the riding.

This is a concern due to the fact that 16th Ave, which is the city thoroughfare of the TransCanada Highway, is a natural boundary. As such the communities north of 16th Ave. tend to hold joint community events, kids go to schools and day cares north of 16th, and they also play sports in these same areas. The point is that the communities on the north side of 16th Ave tend to stay north of 16th when going to school and participating in activities; we generally do not venture down the hill south of 16th Ave to do these things.

In addition, with the changes to municipal electoral boundaries, the proposed provincial boundary changes would make it such that Capitol Hill and Mount Pleasant would have the same Alderman and MP but a different MLA from its neighboring communities.

In terms of the Commission's understanding that the population growth of Calgary-Klein is static, I disagree.

There was a population growth of 7,000 between 2012 and 2015. What's more, these neighborhoods are becoming increasingly densified, with in-fills and apartment buildings. Also, there is a development that has been approved on the former Highland Park Golf Course that will see as many as 4,000 new

residents.

While I have no real objection to the proposal of adding the communities on the east side of Deerfoot, both north and south of 16th Ave, I do believe that the Commission should consider the fact that, like 16th Ave., Deerfoot is a natural boundary that again is generally not crossed to participate in school and activities

What's more, adding the communities east of Deerfoot and south of 16th Ave., makes the two farthest points at either end of the riding a great distance.

Again, my preferred boundaries for Calgary-Klein is to leave it status-quo; however, if growth does need to occur, I believe that the best solution is to consider this riding one that is much more urban than suburban. As such, one solution is to make the northern boundary McKnight Blvd., and then extend the riding as is being currently proposed only on the north side of 16th Ave.

In closing, Capitol Hill and Mount Pleasant must remain in Calgary-Klein. The communities north of 16th Ave have much more in common and in participation with each other than do those south of 16th Ave. Due to densification, growth will continue in all of the Calgary-Klein communities.

For these reasons, as well as the aforementioned MLA representation issue, I am submitting this with the hopes that the commission will reconsider its proposed changes and allow Calgary-Klein to remain as is, with an emphasis on Capitol Hill and Mount Pleasant remaining in the riding should any changes need to occur.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit to the Electoral Boundaries Commission on their recommended new boundaries for Edmonton-Decore.

Considerations: Add Crystallina, Kilkenny, and Killarney

Given that the Chair of the Commission said themselves in public hearings on January 16 that there was no need to ask about boundary changes for Edmonton-Decore because it was a "special constituency" nearly exactly at the provincial average, it seems odd that the Commission would recommend boundary changes nonetheless.

As quoted by the Commission themselves from Page 10 of their interim report from Justice McLachlin: "The need to recognize cultural and group identity and to enhance the participation of individuals in the electoral process and society requires that other concerns also be accommodated."

Unquestionably, one of the considerations to address when considering participation in the electoral process is continuity, and the maintenance of constituency boundaries unless it can be proven that a change is required to correct substantive issues with the riding.

In the case of the community of Killarney (bounded by 127th Ave to the south and 97 St. to the west) the consideration of continuity and the consideration of keeping urban neighbourhoods of interest together (a consideration explicitly recognized by the commission) have both been thrown out the window in favour

of a quick solution to another constituency's population shortfall.

Killarney has been part of the Edmonton-Decore constituency since 2003. It has strong ties to its neighbouring communities of Balwin and Glengarry, and with them shares a service orientation toward Northgate Centre and the businesses along 97 St.. There are also many common schools in the area.

In contrast Killarney is situated across two natural boundaries from Highlands-Norwood where it is suggested it move - the CN rail tracks and the Yellowhead Trail. This move is not justified except on the sole basis of population, and as has been stated in many contexts in the Commission's deliberations, population should not be the only consideration used.

For the above reasons I strongly urge the Commission to keep the community of Killarney within Edmonton-Decore.

The Commission has also proposed moving the communities of McLeod and Kilkenney into Edmonton-Decore.

These recommendations seem less problematic in regard to splitting communities. However, the proposed boundary for McLeod runs down 58 St.. This is not physically possible, given that 58 St. does not extend south of 149 Ave.. In addition, this partition, if extended to 59 St., would effectively cut the community of McLeod in half, with the community hall and school on one side and the residential neighbourhood on the other.

Instead of cutting this community in half we strongly recommend running the eastern boundary of Edmonton-Decore straight down 66 St. NW. This would simplify the boundary and align it with a natural transportation corridor.

For many of the same reasons as noted above, we recommend that the community of Crystallina Nera remain within Edmonton-Decore. This area has similar development patterns with Ozerna to the south, and it has been in the riding for some time.

Thank you again for allowing me to submit these opinions, and thank you for the hard work that you are doing on behalf of all Albertans.

I wish to thank the Commission for their time and commitment in preparing their Interim Report. As a long-time resident of Sherwood Park, and a realtor in the area, I appreciate this opportunity to make my submission in response to that Report.

Strathcona County is a specialized community made up of urban and rural hamlets. Strathcona County members attend meeting of both the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association (AUMA) and Alberta Association of Municipal Districts and Counties (AAMDC) so that Council can work together to meet both urban and rural needs.

Sherwood Park itself is made up of a variety of communities, some being older, established neighbourhoods, while others are newer developments, built with walkability and sustainability in mind.

The communities of Summerwood, Aspen Trails and Emerald Hills are three such newer communities, all with similar construction timelines under Strathcona County's North of Lakeland Drive Area Concept Plan. The Interim Report recommends splitting these communities between two Electoral Constituencies, being Sherwood Park and Strathcona-Sherwood Park.

I would recommend that the electoral boundaries for Strathcona-Sherwood Park be revised to extend

west along Lakeland Drive to Sherwood Drive, north to Township Road 534 and east to Highway 21. These boundaries would then align perfectly with the Ward 4 boundaries in Strathcona County and would also be very similar to the Elk Island Public School Board Trustee boundaries.

Including Aspen Trails and Emerald Hills communities in Strathcona-Sherwood Park Electoral Constituency, together with Summerwood, would provide clear and understandable boundaries and at the same time keep communities of interest together. In marketing homes for sale to residents of these areas, I like to highlight the many community-connected features of these three neighbourhoods. Residents enjoy access to the same shopping district, sports and leisure activities and schools.

As previously mentioned, Strathcona County is a specialized community made up of urban and rural hamlets. I believe that, in this instance, having a "rurban" MLA is not out of the norm of how constituents' needs are represented in our area.

Thank you to the Commission for the work they've done to review the electoral boundaries in Alberta, and thank you especially for taking the time to hold hearings in many rural communities in Alberta.

I find the Commission's recommendation for the riding of Fort Saskatchewan-Vegreville troubling for just that reason. After listening in on some of the hearings and reading the transcripts, I don't think anybody suggested that the riding be stretched out so far east-west like it is.

Instead, I heard a lot of about natural trading areas and areas of common interest. In fact, when asked the specific question about how to adjust boundaries, neither of the Mayors of Cold Lake or Lloydminster suggested that the boundaries be extended west to take in Fort Saskatchewan. Gerald Aalbers, Mayor of Lloydminster, suggested following the natural trading corridors north and south, and recognized the natural trading and service area of Cold Lake, Bonnyville and St. Paul. Craig Copeland, Mayor of City of Cold Lake, talked about those areas as well as Lac la Biche as a natural service and trading area.

As far as I can tell from the public hearings, there wasn't one suggestion to change the riding orientation the way that the Commission has recommended. This point of view was reinforced by Mr. Preston when he appeared on January 23, and stated "It is my opinion and that of many others in this constituency (Lac la Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills) that the current boundaries are a fair reflection of the lifestyles and beliefs in this northeastern area."

As noted by the Commission itself, keeping communities of interest together and respecting natural boundaries are important considerations. The presenters at the public hearings have largely noted that commonalities of interest in rural Alberta are organic. The presenters at the public hearings dealing with

eastern Alberta primarily noted that those natural trading and service areas run north-south, and are grouped in patterns that do not fall along strict east-west corridors.

The Commission's recommendation separates St. Paul from its surrounding area and the communities with which it shares services and transportation.

It also imposes an artificial barrier between the large Ukrainian populations of the area and Vegreville, which is the centre of Ukrainian culture in eastern Alberta.

In the Commission's recommendations it states that the new riding "...would follow the path of the Yellowhead Trail, a major highway, between Sherwood Park and the border." In fact it does not do this. It splits Highway 16 in half.

Highway 16 East does create a natural travel and trading pattern in that area. Highways 15 and 16 form a natural link between the communities of Bruderheim, Lamont, Chipman, Hilliard, Mundare and Vegreville. Indeed that corridor forms the basis for much of the travel in the area.

The Commission stated that the new design reduced travel for constituents in Lac la Biche-St. Paul-Two Hills, but this map - which stretches from the Saskatchewan border all the way to Edmonton - would make it difficult for the MLA and constituents to reach each other. It is standard practice to follow travel corridors and highways as the stem of the leaf, so to speak, when forming rural boundaries for any level of government. The proposed design bisects highways almost at random, creating an almost incongruous seat from a travel standpoint. Where constituency offices will be located is troubling, as one would almost certainly have to be in Ft. Saskatchewan because of its population, leaving essentially two thirds of the area to be served by a second office should there be a budget for one. The MLA would face disparate demands on their time trying to service the major centre of Ft. Saskatchewan, located at the extreme far end of the seat, and balance that with the many other communities spread out along the constituency.

The Commission's recommendation would also see the seat spread across 6 regional municipal districts and multiple towns, some districts only being of a small portion of the seat.

For all the reasons above, I strongly recommend that the Commission consider the map I am proposing for this riding. It meets the criteria of:

keeping communities of interest together along Highway 16

incorporating the counties of Lamont and Minburn

respecting the communities of interest that have been identified in eastern Alberta around St. Paul. accommodating travel consideration for the more elderly population the Commission took note of respects cultural, economic, and service habits in the region by centring on Vegreville

While I respect the Commission's integrity and commitment to creating balanced and fair representation, I feel that in this case they have erred in creating something that nobody wants, and which does not respect several important considerations.

Given the changes I'm proposing for Fort Saskatchewan-Vegreville, I have recommendations to adjust Bonnyville-Coldlake, and Vermillion-Lloydminster. Both of these constituencies are best suited to a north south orientation down the border, as Highway 41 carries all the way through both.

Vermillion-Lloydminster should take Highway 41 as the north-south trunk of the seat, and the branches of Highway 13, 14 and 16. This would include the communities of Innisfree, Vermillion, Kitscoty, Lloydminster, Irma, Wainwright, then Hardisty down to the end of the Provost Municipal District. The constituency would be at around the average population, and cover the southern half of the County of Vermillion River, the Municipal District of Wainwright No. 61, and the Municipal District of Provost No. 52. It could also optionally extend to Two Hills and the highway 45 corridor to unite all of Two Hills and Vermillion Counties in to one seat, with a population a bit over the average but consistent with what the Commission has done elsewhere with rural seats that are not going to experience growth as strong as the provincial average.

Bonnyville-Coldlake should have the west side up Highway 28 around St. Paul pulled in, to prevent St. Paul from being as isolated. The boundary would come down from Lakeland Provincial Recreation Area, come east across Highway 881 before Highway 28, then run parallel to Highway 881 down to the Vermillion-Lloydminster border. The constituency would be at around the average population and of a compact geographical size to aid in effective representation for the MLA.

I appreciate the Electoral Boundary Commission's work thus far in developing a more neighbourhood sensitive boundary between Red Deer North and Red Deer South and keeping both Electoral Districts within the City of Red Deer boundaries. I expect with the development of the city in the next few years, with more neighbourhoods planned for the North, that the minor population disparity between the two ridings should disappear in a meaningful sense.

Although positive steps have been taken to rationalize the boundaries between city neighbourhoods, particularly in the Deer Park area of the city, the section of Deer Park to the east of Donlevy and Dodge Avenues, north of 39 Street remains in Red Deer North on Maps 75 & 76 of the interim report. At this time 50 Street (Ross Street) does not extend to the city limit, when it does this part of the Deer Park neighbourhood will be South of it, and, like the rest of Deer Park, fit into Red Deer South in a more organic manner. I would ask the commission to consider adding this area to Red Deer South at this time, rather than including it with Red Deer North, from which it is, and shall remain a distinct neighbourhood. Again, the present proposal is an improvement, but still seems, according to the map in the interim report, to fall short of incorporating the whole neighbourhood into one electoral district.

It would also make sense that the boundary between the two Electoral Districts follow the Red Deer River, upstream (west) from the Taylor Drive Bridge. This would also rationalize the boundary along neighbourhood lines as the few electors on the north side of Cronquist Drive west of 60 Ave, the current proposed boundary, would be lumped in with electors far from them on the north side of the river, rather than their neighbours across the street. Most of this area, aside from the north side of Cronquist Drive is, and shall remain municipal park and contains no other electors.

Keeping the two ridings within the City of Red Deer is also a sound decision, though, as commented in the interim report they each exceed the average population for Alberta ridings. For the time being this discrepancy is more than off-set by the representatives being able to have a more singularly urban focus in advocating for their constituents.

Again, the hard work of the Commission is appreciated. It is hoped that these minor, but meaningful, suggestions may be incorporated into your final review.

I find that the constituency has a lot of issues, namely how it crosses county lines, and breaks apart the rural community around Medicine Hat. We would be better served if we were combined with the people next to us around the city, rather than with Brooks.

Brooks should be the centre of its own constituency, as the crossroads between highways 36 and 1. Why not try to pull together the counties of Newell and Taber? These have a lot in common regarding their economic interests.

To the south, it is true that Taber-Vulcan is a bit large geographically but the fact is that south-eastern Alberta is a sparsely populated area. Going back to one seat surrounding Medicine Hat would keep all of those who use the city as the centre for services closer together with one MLA, and give the Commission the ability to create other seats for further-flung communities. It is also curious why you used highway 4 as the border in Warner rather than Warner County. Including either all or none of the county would make sense and give the county one MLA to deal with.

There are a few natural boundaries that can be used with the county lines to provide a common-sense boundary near the provincial average for this corner of the province. You can follow the Red Deer River

or Cypress County line to the north heading west as you have proposed, go south along the Cypress County boundary, follow the Old Man River to the west, cut south before Taber because the population would be too much, then follow the Count of Warner No 5 to the provincial border, then the along the provincial border to finish the boundary. This proposed boundary would nicely combine all of the counties in southeastern Alberta - Cypress County, County of Warner No. 5, and County of Forty Mile No. 8.

In terms of Medicine Hat, your proposal there seem very reasonable, with that one corner being added to the constituency for the extra population.

This recommendation ignores common community interests and the challenges the physical size of this new riding present. The majority report chooses to discount and disregard the very valid concerns expressed at the public hearings by rural Albertans, including those in this region. Your report says it's time to stop thinking of Urban and Rural but then goes on to state a goal of eliminating split ridings seemingly because the Mayor of Edmonton doesn't like them. Cypress-Medicine Hat has functioned very well as a split riding for many years. Your rationale in this area is contradictory and doesn't hold up. This riding could have met the required population number or a slightly lower number, which is of course allowed, with some less drastic geographic changes.

Finally the proposed name serves to ignore the identity of a large portion of the riding. That makes no sense at all. Cypress-Vulcan? Cypress-Taber-Vulcan?

How about Cypress-Taber and put Vulcan in with Highwood or Strathmore?

This has been a tough job, no doubt about that and we knew that some urban areas needed new ridings. If the recommendations of this report are adopted in entirety, the urban-rural divide in Alberta will simply widen.

Re: Redistribution of Provincial Electoral Boundaries in Southern Alberta

The Mayors and Reeves of the communities listed below meet on a regular basis regionally and jointly once a year. The objective is to share information for the betterment of our communities and to work toward jointly solving common problems. The proposed redistribution of electoral boundaries in the south will have a major impact.

At a recent joint meeting of the Mayors & Reeves groups of Southwest and Southeast Alberta, a great deal of concern was expressed about the Commission's proposal for redistribution of electoral boundaries in Southern Alberta. While the group certainly understands the Commission has parameters to work, we feel some important points have been discounted, including common community interests and effective representation. A resolution passed instructing the chair of that meeting to write to you, expressing our concerns.

The report seems to treat the concerns that creating large geographic ridings as only a minor inconvenience that can be addressed by increasing the MLA's budget and staff. The very significant increase in the geographic size of some ridings is astounding, especially the so-called, Taber-Vulcan constituency. The current riding of Cypress-Medicine Hat has functioned well as an urban-rural split and could have met the population criteria with a modest increase in geography. It seems rather simplistic to combine Little Bow and Cypress Medicine Hat to fit the population criteria when there is precedent for having a riding with lower number. An MLA representing this proposed constituency would, in our view, be hard-pressed to adequately visit and represent each of the communities within this new boundary let alone be on top of local issues and concerns. This puts a large constituency such as this at a significant disadvantage.

On page 26 of the Report in the section on Rural Concerns, it is stated that: "The majority accepts that the time has come to stop treating differences between rural and urban Albertans as a main driver in setting the boundaries of electoral divisions." This is commendable and could be seen as a way to address the growing rural-urban divide in this province, however the Commission's stated desire to eliminate split ridings is contrary to the statement above and simply serves to widen that gap. This section of the report goes on to discount and disregard the very real concerns of rural Albertans that made submissions at the public hearings. For many

communities in Southern Alberta, the recommendations in this report are very disappointing and we believe will weaken our voice on Provincial issues.

I believe the interim report recommends Skyview Ranch, Coventry and Harvest Hills would be a Constituency. This is a bad idea. Deerfoot trail should be a diving line in making Constituency boundries. There are the following differences between the communities on the east side of deerfoot trail and those on the west side.

There are the following differences in these communities:

Recreation: VIVO for Healthier Generations is the community hub for Calgary Northern Hills. It would be part of the proposed Calgary-North East riding. It has very little connection with Redstone and Skyview Ranch. There is too much distance between Coventry Hills, Country Hills Village, and Harvest Hills and the other communities across the Deerfoot, and past the airport north commercial district, and Metis Trail to the NE communities of the proposed riding. VIVO should be closely connected to the communities it serves. Redstone and Skyview Ranch communities are more oriented to go to The Genesis Centre in the Saddle Ridge, Martindale and Taradale neighbourhoods, rather than VIVO in the Coventry neighbourhood.

Community Associations: The Northern Hills Community Association is serves Panorama Hills, Coventry Hills, Country Hills Village, Country Hills and Harvest Hills. It has no connection with communities East of Deerfoot. The proposed boundary changes would split this community association and its political advocacy into 3 Electoral Districts.

School Infrastructure: The Notre Dame High School (Calgary Catholic School District/CCSD) and the future North Calgary High School (Calgary Board of Education/CBE) are both provincially funded school systems, and their source communities are/will be Panorama Hills, Coventry Hills, Country Hills Village, Harvest Hills, Country Hills. The students in Redstone and Skyview Ranch communities are more oriented to go to the new Nelson Mandela High School in Taradale.

Transportation- These communities have different needs and concerned in regard to transit routes and

services.

Rather than dividing Calgary-Northern Hills North/South along Harvest Hills Blvd, we recommend that the division should be West/East along Country Hills Blvd.

This would keep Panorama Hills, Coventry Hills and Country Hills Village together, and cover future growth of Livingston and Carrington – to the Northern Calgary Boundary.

2016 Civic Census Results:

Panorama Hills (25,729) + Coventry Hills (17,459) +

Country Hills Village (2,689) + Livingston (0) + Carrington (0) = 45,877

The Eastern boundary could be A. CPR tracks, B. Deer Foot Trail or C. 36th Street NE.

The Western boundary could be Range Road 14 and Stoney Trail connecting to Country Hills Blvd. Calgary-North should be renamed to:

- A. Calgary-Northern Hills
- B. Calgary-Panorama Hills
- C. Calgary-Buffalo Rubbing Stone
- D. Calgary-McDougall (named after Rev. Geo McDougall, the site where he passed away in 1876)

After reviewing the recommendation of the Commission, I support the continuation of the Edmonton-McClung constituency centered on the Callingwood neighbourhood. However, the proposal by the commission fails to account for a significant barrier: Whitemud Drive. There are only a few places to cross Whitemud Drive from the current Edmonton-McClung and it allows a natural border to neighbouring constituencies, as it did after both the 2003 and 2010 Electoral Boundary Commission changes.

I would propose new boundaries for Edmonton-McClung using Whitemud Drive as a natural barrier. I would keep the constituency as proposed by the commission, with the subtraction of neighbourhoods north of the Whitemud, and the addition of the Jamieson Place, Glastonbury and Granville neighbourhoods. This creates a constituency with a population of approximately 45 479, 3% under the provincial average.

This proposal establishes Whitemud Drive as the primary barrier. To account for the loss of population from removing the neighbourhoods north of Whitemud Drive, this proposal would add the Glastonbury / Granville neighbourhood to the west of the 2010 Edmonton-McClung. Glastonbury / Granville is still under development so there is room for some growth in the community. It also fits in the characteristics of the current Edmonton-McClung, which has mostly single-family, detached homes. There neighbourhoods were also part of Edmonton-McClung until the 2010 redistribution.

This proposal also restores a major community of interest that the Commission's recommendation split up. The Commission's proposal removes the neighbourhood of Jamieson Place from Edmonton-McClung. Jamieson Place has significant ties to the rest of the Edmonton-McClung constituency. Along with the Ormsby Place neighbourhood, it forms the Willowby Community League. Additionally, most

Edmonton Public School students living in Jamieson Place would attend S. Bruce Smith School, which is also within the Commission's proposed boundary. Residents of Jamieson Place would also use the Marketplace at Callingwood as their primary shopping destination for groceries and services, including the office of their current MLA.

Finally, the proposed Edmonton-McClung is roughly in-line with city of Edmonton municipal ward boundaries. This proposal would put Edmonton-McClung entirely within the city's Ward 5, whereas the Commission's proposal would split it between Wards 1 and 5. Keeping the riding within one municipal ward would foster better cooperation and coordination between provincial and municipal representatives to serve their constituents and address local concerns.

My submission today concerns the proposed boundaries for Spruce Grove and Stony Plain. On one hand, you did a great job separating Spruce Grove from St. Albert, as was recommended by several written submissions (88, 99, 164, 279, 434, 455, 616, 640). However, I and many other submitters feel strongly that the communities in Stony Plain and Spruce Grove are better aligned with each other than with the far corners of Lac Ste. Anne county and the rural areas to the north east, and that they should be combined into one constituency. This is echoed in several of the first round written submissions (164, 267, 279, 546, 616, 707).

Stony Plain and Spruce Grove currently have around 51,000 people together, around 9-10% variance if they were to be combined. This warrants Stony Plain and Spruce Grove being their own urban constituency, as the variance is within acceptable limits, and the area's growth is stable enough that the riding would not become oversized for 15-20 years, after several rounds of the electoral boundary commission.

This also avoids creating any mixed urban-rural constituencies where there doesn't need to be. Constituents in these rural and urban areas deserve representation aligned with their own interests, rather than having two mixed constituencies. The municipal boundaries themselves provide an easy, clear outline for a new boundary, too.

I appreciate very much the hard work you've done creating these new boundaries, and hope you keep my recommendation in mind when you are re-drafting.

These communities, and the rural County population, have significant geographic, economic and social ties to Grande Prairie. In speaking with my neighbours about the redistributing, I've found a few issues with the redistribution of our area in SE Edmonton.

The first issue that arose, which has by far the broadest agreement, is that the name Mill Creek should continue to describe the constituency. Residents feel Mill Woods East and West are insufficiently descriptive or unique, and the Mill Creek is a well-loved local geographical feature of the area. This is one point I am entirely in agreement with and I hope the Commission reconsiders the proposed name.

The second issue comes from residents of Maple and Tamarack. They feel more connected to the rest of the Meadows area than with the much older neighbourhoods of Edmonton Goldbar. In character and geography, those two neighbourhoods are closer to Laurel, which is part of the proposed Edmonton Ellerslie riding. The residents of The Meadows I've spoken with feel being split into three constituencies is detrimental to their ability to get their voice heard at the provincial level. I agree with their point—neighbours shouldn't have to manage advocacy efforts across three MLA offices. Their ideal is one, but two is understandable and acceptable.

The third issue is Minchau being included in Mill Creek. The residents there feel they have a more natural relationship with the neighbourhoods of Mill Woods West. It is a significantly older neighbourhood by build date than the rest of the proposed Mill Woods East constituency. I found residents of Weinlos and Bisset indifferent, in my conversations.

The other residents I've spoken with in the other neighbourhoods of the proposed constituency are satisfied with how they are affected (or unaffected) by the changes for the most part, other than the

name, which was almost universally unpopular. Even those unopposed to the name aren't very strong supporters of it, and would be just as happy with returning to "Mill Creek."

On behalf of my neighbours in southeast Edmonton, thank you for the hard work by all members of the commission.

It is unfair that MLAs in rural areas have constituencies with far fewer voters than urban constituencies.

It should be the case that MLAs represent roughly equal populations, even if this means making rural ridings larger overall (perhaps offset by larger staffing and travel allowances for some rural MLAs). I understand that the current allowable deviation in riding populations is now at 25%, and believe this should be lowered to 15%, with a goal of achieving 10%.

Urban areas should have more ridings. At least two ridings should be added in Edmonton. Calgary likewise needs additional seats.

My own riding of Fort McMurray-Conklin should be changed so that it better represents the urban area of Fort McMurray, while our sister riding of Fort McMurray-Wood Buffalo should be changed to represent the surrounds rural area, while balancing the population in each.

Redistricting should end with more seats in the legislature, not less.

Another consideration is that another seat could also be added to specifically represent our indigenous population, without being tied to geography, as is done in Nova Scotia. However I understand that in the twenty-plus years this seat was created, no one has ever been elected to it as it goes against the idea of a nation-to-nation relationship. Consultation with indigenous groups would be essential before the creation of such a seat.

And while this may not be the proper venue for such comments, it is time that we end the first past the

post system. A campaign to educate voters on the merits of ranked ballots (my preference) and proportional representation should be commissioned, along with a timeline for a referendum.

After reviewing the Interim Report of May, 2017 from the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission in regards to the Highwood Constituency I suggest the following:

With respect to the North-eastern boundary of the Highwood riding:

As suggested in first round submission I maintain that, as is tradition, electoral boundaries for the Highwood riding should be set using natural boundaries. In the north-east quadrant of the riding, this would include using the Bow and Highwood Rivers.

There are a number of concerns I have with a move away from using these natural boundaries, opting instead as currently proposed, to us Highway 2 as the eastern boundary. As you are no doubt aware the proposed change would remove the communities of Davisburg, Artisia, and Heritage Pointe from the Highwood riding, adding them to the Chestermere riding. In addition to there being no natural socioeconomic relationship between these communities and the community of Chestermere, in order for these constituents to connect with the rest of the Chestermere riding, they would need to circumvent the natural river boundaries and drive through the city of Calgary including 3 - 4 other constituencies.

Given that these communities again have no socio-economic relationship with Chestermere and that it is in fact fairly difficult for these communities to physically connect with that riding, I have undergone an extensive review of the first round submissions to better understand why such a decision, to use Highway 2 as the eastern boundary of Highwood, might have been made. It was indicated in the interim report that using Highway 2 as the eastern border "was requested in various submissions" however I was unable to find any such request. The only request I have been able to find included in the first round of submissions to respect Highway 2 as a boundary was much further north (100 KM) in relation to the Airdrie area. Given the concerns expressed above, I strongly recommend that the north eastern border of the Highwood riding respect both the natural boundaries set by the Bow and Highwood rivers as well as the

socio-economic relationships in place and leave the Davisburg plain and the communities of Heritage Pointe and Artesia in the Highwood riding.

With respect to removing the Town of High River from the Highwood riding:

I was also unable to find, in the first round of submissions, any request or recommendation that the Town of High River be removed from the Highwood riding. A similar change was proposed during the 2010 electoral boundary changes but it was quickly decided that such a change would be a mistake. As raised by then Highwood MLA George Groeneveld, a historic economic synergy between High River, Aldersyde, and Okotoks has existed for generations. The space between the three communities acts as an economic corridor as demonstrated following the floods of 2013. High River residents, relocated to temporary housing in Aldersyde, depended heavily on goods and services found in Okotoks both immediately following the flood to provide basic daily living needs, and for years to follow as the community rebuilt. While this is a very pointed example of the economic relationship between the three communities, trade between these communities continues to grow stronger and more entrenched in the fabric of High River, Aldersyde, and Okotoks every day.

In addition, the MD of Foothills and the Foothills and Christ the Redeemer Catholic School Divisions all have responsibility for the schools in, and land surrounding High River, Aldersyde, and Okotoks. Removing High River from the Highwood riding would interrupt the opportunity these groups would have to seek representation from a single MLA for issues impacting the three communities together. Attached is a proposed boundary as per my earlier submission, utilizing the Highwood River (East) and Bow River (north) as natural boundaries, and the existing eastern/southern boundary including High River, west to 552, would give the constituency an average population of 54,815, well within the +25%, -25% average population of 46,697.

I request you consider this submission, as a more accurate and proper representation of Highwood based on historical content, natural boundaries, representation from the MD, School Divisions and various elected officials, concerned citizen and business owners.

The Electoral Boundary Commission has focused too heavily on population parity within Edmonton and Calgary, unnecessarily taking seats away from rural Alberta.

Despite the Commission's insistence on population parity within the two largest municipalities almost a third of the proposed boundaries in Calgary have a double digit population variance. The aggregate ridings vs. population currently hold between 5%-6% for each city. The Commission could and should redraw the boundaries to accommodate these numbers since they are well within the ±25% found in section 15(1) of the Act.

Constituents, municipal leaders and MLAs must make submission that show the Commission the unique challenges in governing Alberta's rural communities. One provincial riding could have dozens of municipalities and municipal leaders, many school divisions and school trustees, distinct communities and community celebration. All Albertans deserve fair and effective representation.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit to the Electoral Boundaries Commission on the recommended new boundaries for Airdrie and Airdrie-Cochrane.

I'd like to commend the EBC on following the major considerations with which they were tasked in both spirit and application.

Not only is equity of population seen as a criteria for equity of representation by the Commission, but the majority of people who submitted in writing viewed equity of population as an important value as well. From a cursory survey of the approx. 750 submissions, it appears that close to one third expressed their support for using population as the primary consideration for constituency boundaries. This is by far the largest single issue that was raised in written submissions.

Secondly, the Commission moved ahead with creating a riding completely within urban boundaries for this constituency, and recommended a second riding of Airdrie-Cochrane to accommodate the population of the City above the recommended limit. This recommended limit also included room for growth, which is vitally important in this area north of Calgary.

This approach was not only a consideration of the Commission, but was echoed at public hearings in Olds on January 25, 2017 by Michael Robertson, President of the Olds-Didsbury-Three Hills Wildrose Constituency Association. He pointed out that the boundaries in 1993 split Airdrie, creating...two urban ridings where you had these large population basins at the bottom which really needed a more urban representation and had particular needs in trying to align a transportation policy with Calgary and all sorts of things like that.

Other presentations at the public hearings talked about the unique nature of Airdrie, and that it was not simply a bedroom community of Calgary but a City in its own right, drawing people from its own rural area who did not and would not necessarily go to Calgary, and deserving of a strong urban voice in the Legislature.

While some people at the public hearings suggested splitting Airdrie down Highway 2, we support the EBC's majority report in its recommendation to create one urban riding sticking with the existing municipal boundaries. While Highway 2 may be considered a natural boundary in some ways, it is certainly not a deterrent to effective representation on the part of the MLA, nor is it a deterrent for constituents who want access to their MLA. There are many bridges over Highway 2, as well as public transit. If anything, one MLA representing both sides of Highway 2 in Airdrie can be seen as a force for cohesion, and in no submissions was the concern raised that the current MLA was not able to effectively represent both sides of the highway.

As the Commission experienced from the public hearings, there is a lot of debate about Airdrie and about the best ways to split it. I think the Commission has done the best job possible within the context of their guiding considerations and taking into account the overriding factor of population growth.

As for your proposed Airdrie-Cochrane constituency, after reviewing the other submissions from the area on the ECB website, I think it's obvious that there are several good arguments for this new constituency, and that it largely meets the criteria established by the Commission itself.

The new electoral division will have a population within 10% of the provincial average.

Given the necessity of creating a riding that is closer to the population average, it does a good job of respecting natural boundaries and keeping communities of interest together. As pointed out by submissions to the EBC, the Town of Cochrane shares many similar interests with the City of Airdrie. The rural area encompassed by this new riding was already represented by an Airdrie-based MLA, so constituents should be used to dealing with an MLA representing a blended riding.

In regard to the Commission's specific questions for public input for this riding:

-This recommendation raises a concern, however, that 'a single MLA could not effectively represent this area, a blended constituency containing not just a portion of a city but also a town of significant size.' It has been made clear by the EBC's own review of the situation that Cochrane and Airdrie are already "enjoying a cooperative working arrangement between their two administrations." This should help alleviate the challenges of one MLA representing both parts of the constituency, and indeed should help foster that cooperative spirit, which is an important element of planning and growth management for the future.

It is important to point out that other constituencies have similar mixtures of larger and smaller urban centres. The current constituency of Highwood, for example, contains both the larger bedroom community of Okotoks and the smaller town of High River. Nowhere in the written submissions or public hearings was it mentioned that this situation caused concerns for the constituents or other stakeholders. Indeed, Wayne Anderson, the MLA for Highwood, raised no mentions of those concerns in his public hearing presentation. In addition, constituencies such as Spruce Grove-St. Albert contain a mixture similar to that proposed for the new riding of Airdrie-Cochrane, with part of a City, a small town and rural areas. The submissions to the EBC about Spruce Grove-St. Albert largely focused on the desire to keep communities of interest together. The issue of the current MLA being unable to represent such a blended riding was not paramount.

The boundaries of the new riding in the rural areas are largely similar to the existing boundaries, and seem to mirror major roads in the area. Again, rural constituents should be used to dealing with an MLA from a major population centre.

In regard to the major change that this new electoral division proposes 'the inclusion of Cochrane in a blended riding with part of the City of Airdrie as opposed to being part of an electoral division with Banff

and the Bow Valley' there are arguments that support this move.

As pointed out by Adam Linnard (358), the town of Cochrane did not share a strong community interest with its previous riding of Banff-Cochrane and the other towns in the Bow Valley. This was echoed by Tamara Ross (428) and Jocelyn Poissant (244).

Of the approximately 27 submissions that identified themselves as being part of the current ridings of Airdrie or Banff-Cochrane, more people identified the criteria of keeping communities of interest together as more important than any other consideration.

In addition, as pointed out by the Commission themselves, Cochrane and the rest of the rapidly growing areas North and Northwest of Calgary share common interests and challenges.

For these reasons I support the Electoral Boundary Commission's proposal for Airdrie-Cochrane, too, and hope that it is approved.

Thank you again for allowing me to submit these opinions, and thank you for the hard work that you are doing on behalf of all Albertans.

Please leave Cypress-Medicine Hat the way it was, and educate Albertans about the fact that not all constituencies can have the same number of voters. It just isn't practical. We live in a very beautiful, diverse province, where much of it is sparsely populated. Those living in sparsely populated areas contribute to Alberta's economy and their communities, just as those living in urban areas do. All Albertans deserve to have an MLA they can get to know and talk to when necessary. They deserve to have their MLA attend functions in their area without needing to hire an airplane to attend multiple functions in a day. They deserve to have their MLA represent their issues and views, without different circumstances creating conflicting views in the same constituency 4 hours away! This would make it a less effective position than those representing a portion of a large urban centre, such as Calgary or Edmonton where there are many commonalities and short distances to travel. One of the main concerns raised at the Electoral Boundaries Commission open house in Medicine Hat in January was that any changes in the boundaries should not increase the local ridings in size because of the problems it creates for effective representation.

We agree with the statement in the Medicine Hat News which said, "Ensure the City of Medicine Hat has two constituencies with its name in it. The plan proposed by the Electoral Boundaries Commission would have Medicine Hat reduced down to one seat in the legislature."

The new name of Brooks-Cypress and Taber-Vulcan do not indicate that Medicine Hat is the area's hub for Cypress County. It is a city of roughly 63,000 people and the riding should use both Cypress and Medicine Hat in the name. Who would ever imagine that Taber-Vulcan included the area around Medicine Hat? Taber and Vulcan are associated more with Lethbridge and much of that area uses that city as its hub. To extend a riding from the U.S. and Saskatchewan borders up to 20 minutes south of Calgary is far too large to provide fair and equitable representation.

We are asking you not to take three seats out of rural Alberta. Leave them as they are, possibly with

slight adjustments, rather than making such large geographical ridings which become ineffective and complicated.

Dear Members of the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission:

This is the submission of feedback on the proposed electoral boundaries, as outlined in the May 2017 Interim Report to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly. Minister Christina Gray from Edmonton-Mill Woods, Minister Marlin Schmidt of Edmonton-Gold Bar, MLA Rod Loyola of Edmonton-Ellerslie, and I, MLA Denise Woollard of Edmonton-Mill Creek discussed and reviewed the proposed electoral boundaries in our affected constituencies. Following this meeting, each of us reached a consensus on a proposed redistricting of electoral boundaries that we believe to be better suited for the constituencies of Edmonton South.

Firstly, in regards to the re-naming of the proposed electoral boundary of new Edmonton-Mill Woods East, I would propose that the name of the constituency <u>remain</u> Edmonton-Mill Creek. This constituency will be referred to as Edmonton-Mill Creek hereafter, in the submission below.

I have summarized the alternative redistricted electoral boundary for Edmonton-Mill Creek below:

- ➤ Northern boundary is the Whitemud Drive from 50th street to City of Edmonton boundary.
- ➤ Western boundary runs south of Whitemud Drive NW and extends along 50th Street NW, Mill Creek, and 34th St NW.
- ➤ Southern and eastern boundaries are the Anthony Henday Freeway extending east and north along the City of Edmonton border to the Sherwood Park Freeway.

The areas presently proposed to be designated to Edmonton-East—the area bound by Whitemud Drive to the north, 17^{th} street to the northwest, 34^{th} street from the southwest, and the Anthony Henday to the south—would be better suited for Edmonton-Mill Creek constituency. This area includes the Tamarack neighbourhood and other emerging neighbourhoods that access schools, recreation centres, community leagues and other amenities within the proposed boundaries of Edmonton-Mill Creek. These neighbourhoods also share similar demographics with the neighbouring communities in Edmonton-Mill Creek. Furthermore, it would be more convenient and practical for the Member of Edmonton-Mill Creek, rather than Edmonton-East, to reach these neighbourhoods.

I propose that the following areas be made part of Edmonton-Mill Woods:

The neighbourhood of Minchau, located east of 50th street, west of 46th street, and north of

34th avenue.

- ➤ The neighbourhood of <u>Weinlos</u>, located west of Mill Wood Road East, east of 50th street, south of 34th avenue and north of 23rd avenue.
- > The neighbourhood of Bisset located east of Mill Woods Road East, west of 34 street, south of 34 avenue and north of 23 avenue.

I propose that the following areas be made part of Edmonton-Ellerslie:

➤ The neighbourhood of <u>Daly Grove</u>, located between Mill Woods Road East NW and 34th Street NW, south of 23rd Avenue NW and north of 16A Avenue NW).

Attached is a map outlining the proposed amendments to be made to the electoral boundaries the Edmonton-Mill Creek constituency.





Progressive Conservative Caucus – Reply to the EBC Interim Report

The PC Caucus is pleased to receive the interim report of the Electoral Boundaries Commission. We understand that reviewing Alberta's constituencies is a large and important undertaking, and we appreciate the work of the commission represented in this report. That work will help to ensure that Albertans have the best possible representation when electing future representatives to serve their constituents.

Although there is much in the interim report that our caucus supports, our reply is focused on areas where we believe there is room for improvement. We understand there is a balancing act that goes into making sure Albertans across regions and demographics are represented, but we do believe that there are some instances where the report does not adequately take into account the unique challenges faced by rural constituencies. We would like to commend Commissioner Day for setting out some of these concerns in her minority report, and would certainly encourage the Commission to find some way to incorporate Commissioner Day's suggestions to lessen the impact on rural constituencies.

Specifically, our caucus is concerned that constituencies have been redrawn so that many of the ridings in Edmonton and Calgary are at or below the average population, while new rural ridings are faced with populations exceeding the average. The new rural constituencies of Drayton Valley-Rocky Mountain House and Drumheller-Strathmore are now the most populous constituencies in the province, with 17 and 16 percent over the provincial average respectively.

The Electoral Boundaries Commission has stated that this is to account for the possibility of higher population growth in our major urban centres, but it will have an immediate and negative impact on the effective representation of Albertans outside Edmonton and Calgary. While it may be that the Commission is attempting to take into account the future effectiveness of the constituency, we do not believe that the response is proportionate to the need. In order to maintain the ability of Albertans outside Edmonton and Calgary to have their voices heard in government, we ask that the commission consider having the urban constituencies drawn so that they have a higher population than the average, while still remaining within the 25% variance.

We contend that the desire for perfect population parity will damage parity of representation. As Commissioner Day notes on page 70 of the Interim Report:

The increasing geographical size of some rural ridings has made it even more unmanageable for the MLAs to effectively represent their constituents as we heard repeatedly in our hearings. Conversely, in the densely populated urban divisions MLAs are more able to well represent their population even with a larger positive variance because of easier communication and travel logistics, shared responsibilities amongst neighboring MLAs, ease of access to other levels of government officials and the availability of other resources to meet the constituents' needs.

The increase in size for many of the redrawn rural constituencies will further strain an MLA's ability to interact with their constituents. Where an MLA from Calgary or Edmonton could meet multiple groups and attend numerous events in their constituency within the span of a day, the same number of meetings and events result in significant travel time for a rural MLA, if it was in fact possible at all. While there is increased funding for rural MLAs to help compensate for these challenges, the MLA is a single

person and no amount of funding can substitute for the in-person presence of an elected representative.

We ask that the Electoral Boundaries Commission reconsider the removal of rural constituencies in favour of more representatives for Calgary and Edmonton. In accordance with Commissioner Day's minority report, we suggest that the Commission strive to preserve as many of the existing ridings as possible using the acceptable population variance. We believe that this could be accomplished without unduly disadvantaging either rural or urban ridings, balancing population parity with the need for effective representation. The PC Caucus considers itself responsive to the interests of all Albertans, regardless of region, and we encourage the Commission to ensure that all of those interests are fairly represented in the make-up of our government.

Additionally, we are disappointed to see that not only was our suggestion to rename a constituency in honour of the late Manmeet Bhullar ignored, but that the constituency which he so ably served has been dissolved and renamed. While we believe the slight to be unintentional, it is a disservice to a man who gave so much back to his province. While we understand the reluctance of the commission to name more constituencies after politicians, we believe the unusual and tragic circumstances of Mr. Bhullar's passing combined with his exemplary dedication to public service make him a worthy recipient of such an honour. We hope that the commission will take this into consideration in their final naming decisions.

Once again, we would like to thank the commission for their hard work on behalf of Albertans, and we hope that you will give serious consideration to the concerns we have raised.

Currently, my constituency includes the town of Stony Plain and the vast majority of Parkland County (I reside in Parkland County). This is an effective constituency for size, population, and commonality. I believe that the population of the area is almost spot on average, and the traveling area for constituents is reasonable. With the proposed changes, Stony Plain will leave the Parkland County area and be paired with Lac Ste Anne. I disagree with this option. Typically Lac Ste Anne residents do not use Stony Plain as a business center, nor share school districts nor are part of the very effective "Tri" region. From my Parkland County point of view, Stony Plain is the natural center for business, schooling, recreation, etc. Having our center in Devon with areas that have different school divisions and no natural common sharing of recreation and industry makes no sense at all. While I understand that changes are inevitable, our current Stony Plain constituency seems to be one of the few that "didn't need fixing". I submit that Stony Plain and Parkland County remain a single constituency.

MLA Wes Taylor Battle River-Wainwright (BRW) Riding

Thank you for the opportunity to forward a submission in response to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission 2017 Interim Report (IR).

The majority of the current riding of BRW includes areas that are sparsely populated inter-dispersed with Towns ranging from a few hundred to Wainwright just in excess of 5000 souls. Despite the demographics, BRW makes a substantial and vital contribution to Alberta's agricultural and energy markets.

The Commission highlights, as it should, the importance of providing "effective representation". The Commission's primary function is to achieve effective representation via a process of analysis, deliberation and decision making.

While the provincial average population, or quotient (Section 13, Part 2, of the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission Act – "the Act") is a consideration its purpose is to act merely as a jump off point for debate.

Clear indication of this is the facility provided by Section 15(1), the 25% variance rule. I quote the Commission's own words (page 14):

"Simply put, the Commission is required to undergo the analysis imposed in Part 2 of the Act, which sets out certain factors that the Commission must consider when setting boundaries; however, that list is not exclusive and the Commission is free to consider any other facts that assist in achieving the goal of effective representation."

Therefore the quotient is to be adjusted, riding by riding, through the provisions in Section 14 of the Act; the "certain factors" referred to above. These are otherwise referred to as "countervailing factors" i.e. offset the effect of (something) by countering it with something of *equal* force (my italics).

In addition it is not be unreasonable to expect to see detailed commentary relating to these factors when changes are proposed. Indeed Section 6(1) Part 1 of the Act stipulates that:

"6(1) The Commission shall, after considering any representations to it and within 7 months of the date on which the Commission is appointed, submit to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly a report that shall set out the area, boundaries and names of the proposed electoral divisions and reasons for the proposed boundaries of the proposed electoral divisions"

I italicize the last sentence as this clearly refers to consideration of Section 14's "countervailing factors". These factors allow for adjustment of the quotient - the quotient is not a "holy grail', nor an immutable number.

The vast distances between population centres in BRW create challenges that effect the ability of the MLA to attend events, meetings and other functions. These range from town council meetings, town halls, rodeos, centennials, graduation ceremonies, general school visits (all grades), historical societies, cattle auctions, hockey teams, and charitable events for and at hospitals, senior homes and emergency services locations. These challenges are amplified in the winter months when at times conditions can be prohibitive.

The proposed Stettler-Wainwright (S-W) riding would see a significant increase in the number of counties, MDs, Towns, Villages, School Boards, High Schools and Elementary Schools that the MLA must either represent, work with, and/or is requested to attend community and local authority events (e.g. council meetings, anniversaries, etc.) It would also mean increased involvement with energy based businesses either in regard to their proposed expansions/downsizing, or their community support activities.

The proposed (S-W) riding would present a more disrupted topographical scene than is currently the case. There is some illogicality around the inclusion/exclusion of certain roads (and/or parts thereof).

Exacerbating the issue of the number of boards and councils is the vast distances required to travel to and from the locations in question. The proposed S-W riding is now in area some (my estimate) 25% larger than its predecessor. I argued at the public hearing in Wainwright that this was at the capacity one could provide effective representation to. The distance between the two largest conurbations, Stettler and Wainwright, is almost 200kms, a return drive of over 4hrs.

With a population of 50,607 (8% above the quotient) and no town larger than 6000 the S-W riding is, notwithstanding the invention of the internal combustion engine or the (entirely unrealistic) provision of a driver, simply too large an area for one person to provide effective representation.

Modern communication tools can ameliorate these issues to some degree however, people have an innate preference to see other people in person. Electronic solutions are, frankly, no substitute. Witness the Commission's own remit to have both pre and post report public meetings; there are deep psychological reasons for this instruction.

The current population of BRW riding is 39,037 (2016 census). Though under the provincial average, this is still more than recorded by the previous census and, crucially, is within the prescribed variance of +/-25%.

The Commission's mandated consideration of sparsity of population must reasonably be applied to BRW and there has to be clear and stated reasons for changing the riding boundaries. I see no reasons stated, other than population which, as I have just identified, has increased.

Significant change to BRW and other rural ridings carried out to solve a perceived issue elsewhere in the province is not the something the Commission should be considering without exhausting all other options first. I use the word perceived as the Commission's rationale is not supported by its own 'population average measure test' in both Calgary and Edmonton.

The proposed changes to the BRW riding will affect the local political and administrative stability of the riding. More importantly it will most certainly have an effect on achieving the ultimate goal of effective representation as guaranteed by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

In support I include letters and emails I have received from some local authorities which reflect the opinion expressed here.

Thank you for your consideration in this matter and your commitment to the democratic process in the province of Alberta.

RE: Interim Report of the 2016/17 Electoral Boundaries Commission

Since the tabling of the Interim Report of the 2016/17 Electoral Boundaries Commission to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta on May 23, 2017, the County of Wetaskiwin has been made aware of significant questions and concerns from the over eleven thousand citizens that we represent and have been asked to comment regarding the aforementioned report and initial conclusions made by the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission.

Overall, the County of Wetaskiwin is greatly disappointed and concerned with the initial conclusions that have been made by the Commission for several reasons. First, in regard to specifically the County of Wetaskiwin, the municipality under the conclusions of the Interim Report would be a part of five different constituencies being Devon-Parkland, Drayton Valley-Rocky Mountain House, Lacombe-Ponoka, Stettler-Wainwright, and Wetaskiwin-Camrose, which is an additional constituency from the current situation where the County of Wetaskiwin is located in four constituencies. In all of these proposed constituencies aside from the constituency of Wetaskiwin-Camrose, the County of Wetaskiwin makes up a very small and insignificant portion of the constituencies, making up approximately less than ten percent of the total land area of each constituency. Combined with the fact that the constituencies of Devon-Parkland, Drayton Valley-Rocky Mountain House, Lacombe-Ponoka, and Stettler-Wainwright cover land areas that stretch over hundreds of kilometres, this will undoubtedly leave the County of Wetaskiwin and the citizens who call the area home to be represented by their Member of the Legislative Assembly (MLA) in a severely ineffective manner as the MLA will have to cover an unreasonable amount of distance to interact with the citizens and representatives of the County of Wetaskiwin, a County that is proposed to be an insignificant part of the overall constituency.

Secondly, the County of Wetaskiwin strongly questions the majority opinion of the Commission to base the proposed electoral boundaries based solely on achieving an equalized population amongst all constituencies. In the case of the County of Wetaskiwin and many rural municipalities being ineffectively represented if the proposed constituencies were established, the Commission in our

opinion has made a glaring error in not taking other factors into consideration as mandated by the Electoral Boundaries Commission Act such as sparsity of population, common community interests, trading areas, and geographic size. The County is also highly concerned that the Commission believes, as stated on page twenty-six of the Interim Report, "that the time has come to stop treating differences between rural and urban Albertans as a main driver in setting the boundaries of electoral divisions." This statement by the Commission strongly implies that the Commission has the opinion that rural Albertans do not matter to the same extent as an Albertan who lives in the Calgary and Edmonton areas, an opinion that appears to be confirmed as being true as the Commission believes this is an "inevitable result" as stated on page twenty-seven. Clearly, the Commission does not realize that rural Alberta, including the County of Wetaskiwin, does indeed matter to the overall strength of the entire province as a whole. With the two main economic industries of agriculture and resource extraction being located almost exclusively within rural Alberta, rural Alberta should be recognized for being home to the main economic drivers of this province with effective representation through their MLA. Instead, the Commission appears to be labelling rural Albertans as second-class citizens just because they do not live in an urban metropolis that has led to unmanageable urban sprawl, which has led to a significant negative impact on the agricultural and other industries that have made Alberta the prosperous province that it is today. The Commission needs to realize that rural Alberta does indeed matter and that effective representation should be a right based on more factors than just how many citizens call an area home.

Thirdly, the County of Wetaskiwin has concerns as to the constant change in electoral boundaries in Alberta. The County recognizes that the Commission as mandated under of *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act* must review the existing electoral boundaries established, but are not legally required to change said boundaries. In the past two reviews, the County of Wetaskiwin have gone from being within three constituencies to four constituencies currently, with the proposal being that the County will be split amongst five constituencies. These constant changes from review to review have left citizens in the County of Wetaskiwin and possibly elsewhere in Alberta to be confused as to who their elected representative is and what constituency they are a part of. The County does note that citizens can easily access this information from Elections Alberta, but the ongoing changes to what constituency a person resides in and who their MLA is can and undoubtedly has led to dissatisfaction in the democratic electoral process throughout Alberta as can be extrapolated through increased voter apathy and lower voter turnout. Stability in electoral boundaries would allow for people to remain interested, informed, and connected to the issues within the constituency and how their MLA is dealing with said issues and concerns, therefore leading to a higher voter interest and turnout and an overall healthier democracy.

In summation, the County of Wetaskiwin is immensely concerned with the position that the Commission has taken in regard to basing the proposed new electoral boundaries for the Province of Alberta almost exclusively on population. Without taking additional factors such as, population sparsity, geographic size, trading areas, common community interest linkages, the uniqueness and importance of rural Alberta to the overall strength of Alberta as a whole, and the continued increase in splitting up the County of Wetaskiwin into five constituencies from three as was the case only two reviews or less than a decade ago, the Commission will ultimately fall far from their goal of providing effective representation for all Albertans, particularly rural Albertans, as set out as the single most important goal of the Commission in the Interim Report. The County of Wetaskiwin would strongly recommend that the splitting of our municipality be held at the current four constituencies or preferably reduced to the County of Wetaskiwin being contained completely within three or less constituencies in order to effectively represent the citizens of the County of Wetaskiwin to an even greater rate than what is proposed in the Interim Report.

If there are any questions or concerns regarding the position of the County of Wetaskiwin, please advise. The County of Wetaskiwin hopes that the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission under your leadership does take both our concerns and the concerns of all affected Albertans seriously and look forward to a resolution that can be accepted by all parties.



Majority - Minority Issues





Protecting the rights of minorities is a fundamental problem of a democracy. In a situation where "majority rules," how can a nation ensure that *all* citizens have equal treatment and equal opportunities, even those who are not part of the majority?

Democracies and Majority - Minority Rights:

- Majority rule is a way of organizing government and making public decisions. It
 does not mean that the majority has the right to practise oppression. No
 majority, no matter how large, should take away the basic rights and freedoms of
 a minority group or individual.
- Minorities, based on factors such as race, ethnic background, culture, language, religion, geographic location, income level, or simply because they were the "losers" in elections or in political debates, are entitled to rights that may not be denied by government. In Canada these rights are protected by constitutional law.
- Minority rights need to be protected to ensure that all citizens are able to fully
 participate in the country's democratic institutions.
- All democratic governments should take measures to protect the basic human rights of citizens, whether of the majority or of a minority (e.g., freedom of speech and expression; freedom of religion and belief; due process and equal protection under the law; freedom to organize, speak out, dissent, and participate fully in the public life of their society).
- Democratic principles recognize that a key responsibility of government is to protect the rights of minorities to uphold their cultures, social practices, individual consciences, and religious activities.
- Acceptance of ethnic and cultural groups that seem strange or unusual to the
 majority can represent one of the greatest challenges that any democratic
 government can face. But democracies recognize that diversity can be an
 enormous asset. They treat these differences in identity, culture, and values
 not as a threat but as a challenge that can strengthen and enrich them.
- There is no single solution to dealing with minority-group differences in perspectives, beliefs, and values. Only through the democratic process of tolerance, debate, and willingness to compromise can free societies reach agreements that embrace the twin pillars of majority rule and minority rights.

INTRODUCTION

On behalf of the County of Grande Prairie No.1, we respectfully submit this response to the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission May 2017 Interim Report. The County sincerely respects the complexity of the Commission's task in its work to establish boundaries that allow for the voices of all Albertan's to be fairly and equitably represented. In our review of the Commission's recommendations, the County considered an approach that would both provide effective representation for Albertans as a whole and provide for the preservation of our democratic principles.

COUNTY POSITION

The Commission has aimed for equal representation through population equity, and has established recommended electoral boundaries with this goal in mind. However, the County maintains that when setting electoral boundaries, more than just population must be considered. Effective representation involves many factors; equalizing population is just one. The creation of electoral boundaries must take into account the economic, social and cultural interests of an area, the natural geography, weather, transportation networks, communication linkages and reasonable access to the MLA.

Under the Commission's recommendations, a new urban division of Grande Prairie would include only City of Grande Prairie residents, with a section of the City becoming part of a new rural-urban Grande Prairie-Smoky division. The northwest section of the County would become part of Central Peace-Notley.

The County's primary concern with these electoral boundaries is that these divisions

Section 3 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, as well as the Supreme Court decision on the topic of Electoral Boundaries (Sask) (1991), states that effective representation takes into account "factors like geography, community history, community interest and minority representation" (page 12, Interim Report)



COUNTY PREFERRED OPTION - MAINTAIN THE STATUS QUO

With this in mind, the County's preferred option is to maintain the status quo – an option also supported by many of our neighbours. Our region, under the current electoral boundaries of Grande Prairie-Wapiti and Grande Prairie-Smoky, has been very effective at developing partnerships that promote shared goals between our municipalities, while supporting each municipality's autonomy and perspectives. This is a formula that has proven to be very successful. It can be measured by our region's strong economy – one of the most robust and fastest growing in the nation – an unemployment rate that sits below the national and provincial average, and our competitiveness on a global scale.

Two MLAs working on behalf our region (where Alberta's primary industries are located), both representing an urban and rural voice, have been key to our success and our ability to optimize our region's assets. As many residents live in rural areas and work in urban areas, or vice versa, they have shared rural and urban concerns; under the current divisions, the breadth of their priorities can be represented by both MLAs. These priorities include regional health care, education, transportation and highway improvements, municipal sustainability funding, policing, resource issues affecting agriculture, forestry, oil and gas, and FireSmart work addressing Mountain Pine beetle to name only a few.

We believe that increasing the size of Grande Prairie-Smoky and taking in more communities will make it very difficult to achieve proper and fair representation in this rural area. Extensive travel would significantly add to the workload of one MLA, and make it increasingly difficult for rural constituents' voices to be heard and fairly represented.

The City and County populations continue to see an above average growth rate, increasing at 13.5 percent and 13.1 percent respectively. It is expected that this high growth will continue in both municipalities; as such, the population increase will be balanced between the two divisions.

Under this proposed recommendation, Central Peace-Notley would remain below the provincial average population and maintain its special status.

ALTERNATIVE OPTION

nce is to maintain the status quo, should this not be an option unty presents an alternative. This option recommends the Prairie division that includes all of the City of Grande

Prairie, and a Grande Prairie-Smoky division that includes all of the current rural-small urban Grande Prairie-Smoky as well as rural-small urban Grande Prairie-Wapiti.

While this alternative increases the size of Grande Prairie-Smoky, it does take into account Greenview's natural boundaries along with Valleyview and Fox Creek, which are part of our trading corridor. This alternative recognizes that sharing common ground facilitates tackling complex problems, taking advantage of opportunities, and advocacy work. An electoral division along an east-west axis aligns with the many current partnerships and agreements. Aligning the current northwestern part of the County with the electoral division to the north, as recommended in the report, would have a significant detrimental impact on the collaboration in our region.

As noted in the City of Grande Prairie's February 8, 2017 submission to the Commission, the City anticipates that with the creation of an urban Grande Prairie electoral boundary, a second urban MLA will be required within 10 years. We are concerned that this additional urban MLA could mean the further erosion of the voice of rural Albertans. However, this would not be the case should we remain status quo.

ELECTORAL DIVISIONS WITH SPECIAL STATUS

In our initial submission to the Commission, the County of Grande Prairie stated our opposition to the loss of any ridings in Northern Alberta. We appreciate that the Commission has recommended maintaining the special status of the current Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley and Lesser Slave Lake. These divisions are home to Alberta's primary industries, and as such, play an integral role in Alberta's economy. It is imperative for all Albertans that voices within these divisions are fairly represented.


CONCLUSION



At their July 10, 2017 Council meeting, Council for the Town of Cochrane unanimously resolved to submit feedback to the Electoral Boundaries Commission as follows:

that Council direct Administration to submit feedback to the Electoral Boundaries Commission, requesting revisions to the proposed boundary adjustments which would create a Cochrane riding that encompasses Cochrane, Airdrie Rural (East), a portion of Rocky View County Wards 6 and 9, as well as Wards 7 and 8, as presented.

This document is being submitted in conjunction with the submission from the City of Airdrie for consideration of an alternate Electoral Boundary for the Cochrane and Airdrie electoral area.

The Town of Cochrane has reviewed the 2016-17 Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission Interim Report to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta, dated May 2017 and recognizes that boundary adjustments are inevitable with a Province experiencing 14% growth since the last electoral riding review. We also note that Cochrane alone has had the privilege of being a significant contributor to those provincial growth numbers with a population increase of 49% since the 2011 Federal Census.

Understanding that the Commission recommendations are based upon many factors, including the 2016-2017 population established at 46,698, the proposed Cochrane-Airdrie riding would contain two of the fastest growing areas of the province and at its inception, would be 6% over that target.

The Commissions interim report identified that the creation of this constituency "arises from the requirement to divide the city of Airdrie" and goes on to acknowledge "that a single MLA could not effectively represent this area, a blended constituency containing not just a portion of a city but also a town of significant size".

Cochrane firmly believes the above statement to be true and will prove to be an increasing challenge given the rate of population growth both in our community and the City of Airdrie. Further, Cochrane is concerned that the issues and priorities of Town residents, will be overshadowed by the City of Airdrie initiatives and dual MLA representation.

It is therefore recommended that the Commission propose an alternate boundary alignment creating a Cochrane-RVC West riding (map attached).

As proposed, this riding would divide the geographical area population as follows:

- Cochrane-Rocky View County West 41,662
- Airdrie West 46,923
- Airdrie East-Rocky View East-Chestermere 45,911

Resulting in an even distribution of the area's population of 31%, 35% and 34% respectively, while providing effective representation for all constituents.

The significant growth in our Province and being experienced directly by Cochrane residents comes with many pressures, inclusive of the need to work collaboratively at all levels of government for the benefit of all citizens. The Town of Cochrane believes it is imperative to ensure adequate representation now and into the future as this region will continue to grow.

The Town of Cochrane respectfully requests the Alberta Electoral Boundary Commission amend its recommendation to support the creation of the Cochrane-Rocky View County West, Airdrie-West and Airdrie East-Rocky View East-Chestermere ridings, as identified in the attached map.

The County of Newell wishes to express its strong desire to keep all of the communities within its boundaries as part of one electoral division. The 2016-17 Electoral Boundary Commission's recommendations affect our southern areas of Scandia, Rainier, Bow City, Tilley and Rolling Hills, moving them to the proposed Taber-Vulcan electoral division. Although this would boost the Taber-Vulcan population a small amount, the resulting increase is not significant enough to justify the separation of these hamlets and/or surrounding areas from the Brooks-Cypress proposed division. Important to note is that this change not only removes these communities from the County of Newell, but also moves them across the Bow River, a natural boundary.

Our local municipalities, Bassano, Brooks, Duchess, Rosemary and the County of Newell, as well as our Eastern Irrigation District, continue their work together with the focus of improving the lives of our ratepayers through effective and efficient delivery of services to all of our region's residents. Along with collaboration and cooperation, inter-municipal initiatives and shared revenue have become the norm. The seamless dissolution of the Village of Tilley in 2013 and our County's current on-site assistance of the administration of the Town of Bassano are two examples of our regional focus. We note your comment on page 61 of the EBC report that supports why Flagstaff County remains intact and respectfully ask that the County of Newell be afforded the same consideration.

Issues with the EBC's Majority Report in South-Eastern Alberta

Overview

- As proposed by the Electoral Boundaries Commission (EBC), already large constituencies will become massive, far-flung constituencies.
- Some of these constituencies are not 'natural,' with disparate interests.
- Some of these constituencies are hugely overpopulated (Drumheller-Strathmore, 16% over), while others are underpopulated (Taber-Vulcan).

Drumheller-Strathmore

- The EBC's proposed constituency of Drumheller-Strathmore (D-S) is 16% over population, or 7,500 people more than the average.
 - According to the 2011 census, 7500 people is the equivalent of having a town the size of Coaldale, Banff, Innisfail, Drayton Valley or Drumheller added to a constituency.
 - O It is highly unusual for large, rural constituencies to be *over* populated. The +/- 25% variance accorded to the EBC is normally used to ensure that large rural constituencies are not too large geographically, and the communities composing them do not have interests too disparate from one another.
 - D-S is not a 'natural' constituency.
 - Strathmore is culturally both a small prairie town, and a suburban commuter town, as a part of the Calgary Regional Partnership.
 - Drumheller is a small Badlands community, largely independent of any other large metropolitan influence.
 - Hanna, Acadia, the Special Areas and other rural county areas have little in common with Strathmore, the largest single population centre of the proposed D-S
 - There are a total of 38 municipalities in the proposed constituency.
 - 6 towns
 - 14 villages
 - 10 unincorporated communities
 - 5 counties and special areas

- There are approximately 97¹ elected officials that the MLA would have to know and work with.
- County lines are not kept in tact.
 - An area of northern Vulcan County is added to D-S, alienating those people from the MLA representing the vast majority of that county.
 - Stettler County is divided.
- Siksika Nation could naturally be a part of the current constituencies of Strathmore-Brooks (S-B) or Little Bow (LB), or the EBC's proposed D-S or Taber-Vulcan (T-V).
 - With the current S-B and proposed D-S already overpopulated, it is advisable that Sikika Nation be a part of the currently underpopulated LB or proposed underpopulated T-V.

Brooks-Cypress

- Newell County is arbitrarily divided, with a section south of Brooks taken from the current S-B
 and moved to T-V, alienating those people from the MLA representing the vast majority of that
 county.
- Brooks could naturally be joined to either Strathmore or Cypress County.

Proposal for a More Effective Redistribution of South-Eastern Alberta

Overview

- Equalize the populations of the proposed, large south-eastern constituencies.
 - O Currently there is a variance of up to +16% (D-S) down to -11% (T-V).
- Where possible, restore municipal county boundaries.
- Ensure that as much as possible, the communities have common interests.

Maintain Strathmore-Brooks (S-B)

- S-B is a natural constituency.
 - o Both Strathmore and Brooks are of nearly equal size.
 - Both Wheatland and Newell counties, with their inlaid smaller municipalities, are of nearly equal size.
 - O Both ends of the constituencies are connected by a major and obvious transportation and trade corridor, the TransCanada Highway.
 - o Both the northern and southern boundaries of the constituency have natural barriers; the Bow River in the South and the Red Deer River in the North.
 - o The municipalities in S-B are entirely intact, encompassing all of both Wheatland and Newell counties with their inlaid communities.

¹ 42 in towns, 42 in villages and 13 in Siksika

- The population in S-B is the only current south-eastern rural constituency that is close to the average provincial population (+/-2%).
 - With strong population growth in Strathmore and western Wheatland County, the population of S-B should not vary significantly from the provincial average before the next EBC.
 - Strathmore is expected to grow by 7% over the next 5 years.²
- Under the proposed boundaries, southern Newell County will be separated from Brooks and the rest of Newell County, substantially impacting effective representation in the area.
- Return the southern portion of Newell County given to T-V back to S-B.
 - The MLA for T-V would have to know the Newell Council and be familiarized with Newell regional issues for only a few hundred constituents.
 - Likewise, the MLA for D-S or S-B would have to know the Vulcan County Council and be familiarized with Vulcan regional issues for only a few hundred constituents.

Constitute Drumheller-Cypress (D-C)


- D-C is a more natural constituency than D-S.
 - The eastern parts (Special Areas, Acadia) of the proposed D-S have more shared interests with Cypress County than with Strathmore, Wheatland County, Vulcan County and Siksika Nation.
 - D-C is entirely within the Eastern Alberta Trade Corridor.
 - o D-C is a more congruent constituency than D-S, with the mushroom-shaped D-S.
- D-C would be +10 over the average provincial population, contrasted with the extremely overpopulated D-S at +16%.
 - o While still overpopulated, it is not as unreasonably so.
- The geographic size of D-C would be approximatly the same size as when it was Drumheller-Stettler

Modify Proposed Taber-Vulcan (T-V)

- As proposed by the EBC, T-V is massive and so any changes should not significantly add to its size.
- As proposed by the EBC, T-V would be -11% underpopulated, while it would be -2% under this
 proposal.
 - This would not materially affect the geographic size of T-V.
- Return northern Vulcan County to its current LB or proposed T-V.
 - o Northern Vulcan County is currently detached from the rest of Vulcan County.
 - This proposal keeps the municipality together, opposed to the EBC proposal which keeps T-V under-populated at the expense of an overpopulated S-B/D-S.
- Return Siksika Nation to its current LB or proposed T-V.
 - Siksika Nation could naturally be joined to either LB/T-V or S-B/D-S, however it has traditionally been a part of LB.

- As it straddles both banks of the Bow River, there is no natural boundary for it to be associated with either constituency over the other.
- With S-B/D-S overpopulated, it is logical that it should be joined to underpopulated LB/T-V.



I am writing to the Commission to support the recommended changes to my riding, Banff-Cochrane.

There are a number of strong reasons to support the new riding, Banff-Stoney.

The distribution of population is fair as the population in the proposed riding is close to the provincial average. Banff-Stoney will be 5 per cent below the average, which will allow room for future population growth in this high-growth part of the province.

Omitting Cochrane and keeping the other Bow Valley communities together is supportable because it keeps communities with like concerns together. In the Bow Valley, there is a common interest of concerns. Issues related the Bow River, wildlife, tourism, and emergency services, to name a few are common to the Bow Valley communities.

I am pleased to see the addition of the Tsuu T'ina reserve to Banff-Stoney. It will lead to a higher proportion of visible minority voters in the riding, which will likely lead to stronger relations with the MLA and better democratic representation in the Legislative Assembly.

I have two reservations about the proposed changes, however.

First, the Banff-Stoney name seems appropriate given the size of Banff National Park and the Stoney-Nakoda reserve. That said, it would be reassuring that the name is appropriate after consultation with local Indigenous leaders and elders.

Second, Kananaskis Park is not part of the riding even though the administration and supports for the Park are by and large located at the Provincial Building in Canmore. I believe the Banff-Stoney MLA would be in the best position to effectively represent the Park. The addition of the Park would not lead to a drastic increase in the population, either. The Park should be added to Banff-Stoney for these reasons.

In sum, I support the proposed change from Banff-Cochrane to Banff-Stoney. With the two reservations, I believe that the recommendations in the Commission's Interim Report address the need to have an average number of people in the riding, and keep together communities with common concerns.

On behalf of Rocky View County (the County) I would like to thank you and the Electoral Boundaries Commission members for the opportunity to comment on the Interim Report of the 2016/17 Electoral Boundaries Commission (the Report). I understand the complexities of the review and the multiple considerations that the Commission must take into account when making its recommendations.

Rocky View County has approximately 40,000 residents making it the 3rd largest municipality in the Calgary region by population and the largest municipality by size. As a consequence of its size, the County's residents are represented in four different ridings. County Council has reviewed the interim report and concluded that, overall, the proposed changes are an improvement on the current electoral boundaries that encompass the County. However, there are two areas of concern Council has identified.

- Chestermere Boundary (Map 55). The proposed Chestermere boundaries include land west of QE2 Highway and north of the City of Calgary (Attachment 1). The proposed boundary separates the Bearspaw community into two different ridings.
 - Council requests that this area be added to the Airdrie Cochrane Boundary (Map 48) as shown in cross hatching on Attachment 1. The rationale for this request is the commonality of this area with Bearspaw residents and the shared services (schools, shopping, and recreation etc.) between County residents and residents of the municipalities of Airdrie and Cochrane.
 - This change would result in an additional 4,467 residents (based on the County's 2013 census), which pushes the number of residents beyond the average riding population target. The County suggest this number could be offset by moving the area in the County west of Highway 22 and north of Cochrane from the Airdrie Cochrane Boundary (Map 48) to the Banff Stoney Boundary (Map 49) as shown on Attachment 1. There are 1,285 County residents in this area.
- Proposed name change from 'Chestermere Rocky View' to 'Chestermere'. Rocky View County is opposed to this change for several reasons.
 - First, the rationale for the change as stated in the Report is factually incorrect.

"The west and northwest sides of the constituency – from where the Rockies can be viewed – would not remain within the constituency. Hence, the name should be shortened to Chestermere." pg. 45. Views of the Rocky Mountains from the north western portion of this riding are spectacular as evidenced by a drive on Highway 1a. Furthermore, the views of the mountains on the east side remain in much of this riding. As stated in the Report

"No name change should be recommended for constituencies where boundaries continue to contain the geographic feature or geographic orientation or city/town for which they are currently named" (pg. 33).

Secondly, the naming convention used in the report, with a few exceptions, recognizes only urban municipalities as worthy of naming. Within the proposed 'Chestermere' riding, Rocky View residents account for approximately 18,000 constituents or 40% of the riding. In general, the County's suggests the naming convention be reconsidered and specifically, for reasons outlined above, the name of this riding should remain Chestermere – Rocky View.

Re: Proposed Fort Saskatchewan – St. Paul and Vermilion – Lloydminster Provincial Constituency Boundaries

Bruderheim Town Council appreciates the opportunity to review the draft copy of the information outlining possible re-aligning of constituency boundaries within Alberta. We would like to share the following concerns we have with the proposed changes to the above noted boundaries.

Currently the Fort Saskatchewan - Vegreville Constituency encompasses our boundaries and two of our major partners, Fort Saskatchewan and Vegreville. Geographically the North Saskatchewan River is a natural political boundary on the northwest and the northern part of the east boundary is the east boundary of Lamont County. Road access to Elk Island National Park is only available through Lamont County or Strathcona County.

The proposed Fort Saskatchewan to St. Paul Constituency includes St. Paul and a small portion of the County of St. Paul, both on the other side of the North Saskatchewan River. The eastern portion of the proposed constituency has closer trading relationships to Lloydminister than to the western part of the proposed new constituency. The narrow east-west orientation of the proposed constituency has its largest urban center to the extreme west, surrounded by heavy industry, becoming more and more rural to the east which does not create a cohesive political entity. The inclusion of the rural service centre of St. Paul, which is on the opposite side of a major river with limited bridge connections, and strong connections to areas outside the proposed constituency does not seem to be an effective geographically sensible political unit.

The proposed Vermilion – Lloydminister constituency will also have a negative impact for us as it will remove the areas immediately south of Mundare and Elk Island National Park. With the proposed constituency changes, the largest industrial area and largest urban area, will be located at the extreme east end of the boundary, in and around Llodyminister. Areas such as Vegreville are more connected to

Edmonton than to Lloydminister. Elk Island National Park is totally contained within the existing Fort Saskatchewan – Vegreville riding and is closely connected to the Beaverhills Initiative area and newly created Beaverhills Biosphere, an initiative of Strathcona County, Lamont County, Leduc, Camrose and Beaver County.

Both of these proposed changes to the constituency boundary do not align with the existing economic, social and political connections of the residents that reside within the existing boundaries. It will require MLA's to interact with an increased number of municipalities which will increase the workload for elected official from all levels of government. It is already challenging for our MLA to provide service to the municipalities within the current constituency boundaries due to the distance between communities and the changes to the constituency boundaries will add to these challenges. Additionally, in rural municipalities, the council members often work during the day and the distance they would need to travel to attend meetings could compromise their ability to attend meetings, which results in the possible lack of rural input on important discussions and their access to critical information.

Our council is requesting that the Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission reconsider the proposed Fort Saskatchewan – St Paul and Vermillion – Lloydminister constituency boundaries and consider a constituency similar to the existing Fort Saskatchewan – Vegreville Constituency.

Submission to Alberta Electoral Boundaries Commission Post the 2017 Interim Report

I am grateful for the opportunity under the Act to make this submission to the Commission. In doing so I am hoping to alert the Commission to the potential disservice their current proposal will do to rural ridings and, more importantly, to the principle of effective representation.

I believe that the current Interim Report proposals leaves the Commission open to a legal challenge. This challenge would take the form of a reverse Electoral Boundaries (Sask) (1991) 2 S.C.R 158 scenario.

Commission Options and Choice.

The Commission appears to be between the Scylla and Charybdis of these 2 options:

- 1. Reconfiguration of all 87 ridings to accommodate the population increase.
- 2. Reconfiguration of urban ridings to accommodate the population increase.

It is important to note that while the vast majority of the population increase has occurred in urban areas it is by no means exclusive to urban areas.

Option 1 is the path outlined by the Commission in their Interim Report (IR).

Commission Rationale for Option 1 – The Process

The Commission examined Alberta as three separate entities; namely Edmonton, Calgary and Areas outside Calgary and Edmonton (Rest of Alberta).

For both Calgary and Edmonton they took the total population and divided this by the average population (46,679) to ascertain the number of ridings that they believed ought to be allocated.

The Commission refers to this as the "process". See calculations below:

(all population figures taken from IR 2017 http://abebc.ca/about/stats/)

The process informed the Commission majority that Edmonton required 1 more riding, an increase to 20.

In Calgary the Commission's process informed them that 1.5 was required, an increase from 25 to 26 (or 27) ridings.

For reasons which are unclear, the Commission did not apply their process in precisely the same fashion when dealing with the Rest of Alberta.

For consistency of comparison I have applied it for them here below, in two forms;

A. Using the current all-inclusive total

and

- B. Using a reduced population number, achieved by removing the populations of the 15(2) areas and Fort McMurray-Conklin (the Commission agrees that this is a unique case see page 31 of the IR 2017). This is the more equitable comparison as these are 'outliers'.
- A. 1938073 divided by average population 46697 = 41.5 ridings
- B. 1841672 divided by average population 46697 = 39.4 ridings half a riding below the existing 40 which cater for this population.

The chosen process, exclusively population driven and carried out in this particular format, is not what the Redistribution Rules require of the Commission. To begin, population is only a start point for further analysis it is not the primary factor and it is not inviolable.

This chosen process "frames the question" in a manner which has a seductive and simple appeal, but is flawed. This process simply serves the Commission majority's selected aim of "minimal deviation from the average number" (page 67 of IR 2017).

This aim is however, not an explicit requirement of the Act. Indeed the rules in Sections 14 and 15(1) render greater implicit legitimacy to the notion that "minimal deviation from the average number" is not to be the aim of this, or any, Commission. As Commissioner Day states:

The *critical* (my italics) provision in the Act to ensure that effective representation is granted to all Albertans is the use of variances"

(page 69 IR 2017 - Commissioner Day minority opinion)

A recalculation using the Commission's stated population figures and applying, appropriately, rule 15(1) percentage metric as a guide, looks like this:

Calgary

Total population 1,239,185 divided by 25 existing ridings = 49,567

Using 15(1) metric this equates to 6.1% above provincial average.

6.1% is well within the 15(1) variance.

I am uncertain why any further action, other than reconfiguring Calgary's 25 existing ridings, is required.

However, the Commission proposes adding a riding, giving this calculation

Total population 1,239,185 divided by 26 = 47,660

Using 15(1) metric this equates to 0.02 above provincial average.

Edmonton

Total population 933,128 divided by 19 existing ridings = 49,112.

Using 15(1) metric this equates to 5.1% above provincial average.

5.1% is well within the 15(1) variance.

I am uncertain why any further action, other than reconfiguring Edmonton's 19 existing ridings is required.

However the Commission proposes adding a riding, giving this calculation

Total population 933,128 divided by 20 = 46,627 Using 15(1) metric this equates to 0.15% below provincial average.

Rest of Alberta

For the purpose of this current round of deliberations I suggest Lesser Slave Lake, Dunvegan-Central Peace-Notley and Fort McMurray-Conklin are treated separately when considering the average population of rural ridings. The first two are 15(2) areas and Fort McMurray-Conklin is acknowledged by the Commission (page 31), in similar fashion to the 15(2) areas, as 'outliers'.

Total population 1,841,672 divided by 40 = 46,042

Using 15(1) metric this equates to 1.4% below provincial average.

Summary

By applying Sections 13 and 15(1) of the Act to the population in the three discrete areas (as identified by the Commission) we see that the only exercise that is required is the redistribution of populations within those three discrete areas.

This enables the end result to be better aligned with the law and avoids unnecessary conflict arising via an urban v rural divide debate.

Analysis and Critique of Commission majority's proposals

The above calculations demonstrate that the Commission fails to justify its proposals both when framing the question in a way not laid out by the Act and when Section 15(1) rule is applied appropriately.

This section now considers aspects of failure specific to the Act in respect of Section 14 and in regard to the primary principle of "effective representation".

By selecting Option 1 the Commission majority is suggesting that it is proper for all province ridings to be included in absorbing the, mainly urban, 765,037 population increase. I disagree.

My argument is based first on the primary principle of "effective representation" over the improperly named or, at the very least, poorly defined term "voter parity".

Secondly I would like the requirement to treat ridings uniquely through the application of "countervailing factors' (referred to as "other considerations" by the Commission) to be fully upheld. In the Commission's proposal my contention is that this is not the case.

I'm pleased to see that the Commission agrees in spirit, if not in practice, with me. See the statement quoted below:

"... if absolute voter parity in each electoral division were achieved, the population in each division would be 46,697. Absolute voter parity is relevant because it is the place where the Commission began its analysis of the boundaries of each electoral division before beginning to apply other considerations, (my italics) as mandated by the Act."

(page 12 IR 2017)

However, contrast that statement to these two insights from Commissioner Gwen Day in her minority dissenting submission:

- 1. "We began the work with the priority of voter parity carrying the most weight, which of course led to the desire to have a minimal deviation from the average number of 46,697 people per constituency".
- 2. "In spite of the provision for up to 25% +/- variances, a priority by the Commission was set to achieve the lowest variances possible, particularly in Edmonton and to some extent in Calgary, thereby justifying an additional riding in both cities"

(page 70, 2017 IR).

now consider these two statements by the Commission majority:

1. "The majority is pleased that the proposed recommendation would result in 57 of Alberta's 87 electoral divisions having a population within 5% of the provincial average, or 61% of the total"

(page 64 2017 IR)

2. "Alberta is no longer rural"

(page 16 IR 2017)

The second statement has all the charm of the late Jim Prentice's "look in the mirror" comment.

The Commission compound this provocative, and meritless, statement with this paragraph and the opinion contained therein:

While consideration of "common community interests" is such a factor, most current electoral divisions outside of Edmonton and Calgary do not contain a single common community in total, or individually... Some are primarily agricultural in focus, but others have an oil and gas or forestry or mining focus, or some combination of all these factors. As a result, the majority could not conclude that those Albertans living outside of Edmonton or Calgary share a common community of interest for that reason alone or that each of these 43 constituencies currently share a common community of interest one with the other.

This temerity of this comment is breathtaking. In any independent quantitative survey of a rural town hamlet or village regarding ties of consanguinity, work ties, school ties, church ties, 4H ties, who knows their neighbor, who has these same connections with the conurbation s North, South, East and West of them and compared this with a similar independent study in either Edmonton or Calgary the results would demonstrate the absolute nonsense of this paragraph.

I believe a retraction of this paragraph is in order.

By linking all the statements together it becomes clear that the commission majority believe that absolute voter parity is the priority. In addition, and quite arbitrarily, they set 5% as the optimum variance.

It is noted that 19/20 ridings in Edmonton made that cut. Indeed none are higher than +4%, while the lowest is at -8. The mean is precisely 0%.

In Calgary, by contrast, only 6 of the 26 ridings are at +/- 5%, despite the overall percentage by overall population being 6%.

The Rest of Alberta, having been denuded in service of the process, has 21/41 within the +/-5%. The variances in the remaining ridings are quite stark ranging from +17% to -15% (I have omitted the 2 x 15(2) areas and Fort McMurray-Conklin replacement).

In doing so the Commission has adopted the Egalitarian* approach toward redistribution. I wish to highlight that this perspective was rejected by the Supreme Court in their Electoral Boundaries (Sask) (1991) 2 S.C.R 158 decision. That decision provides the framework for the Electoral Boundaries Commission Act at Part 2 (Redistribution Rules).

*(a useful term used in this review of the Sask (1991) case; http://lawjournal.mcgill.ca/userfiles/other/1448357-39.1.Johnson.pdf. Contrast this with Pluralistic)

1. Legal

(i) Effective Representation

It is worth bearing in mind this explanation of the goal of redistribution as contained on an Elections Canada website:

"The right to vote under Sect 3 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms guaranteed the right to "effective representation" The goal of redistribution is the constitutional right of *effective representation*" (my italics).

http://www.elections.ca/content.aspx?section=res&dir=rep/off/recom_redis&document=ch2&lang=e

and, for assistance, this summary by the 2009/10 Commission on what effective representation is:

In summary, the principles of effective representation were, to the 2009/10 Commission, as follows:

- 1. Relative parity of voting power.
- 2. The tradition in Canada is "effective representation," not absolute parity as in the U.S.
- 3. The process of achieving effective representation may involve diluting the political force of some votes but not unduly and not without reason.
- 4. The balancing of these interests is a delicate one, which involves an examination in depth of the social history, geography and demography of communities in every sense of the word.

(page 3 IR 2009/10)

Key here are the statements at 2 and 4. The 2009/10 Commission themselves give clear indication that the exercise is not one purely of

mathematics. Indeed, while cognisant of the mathematical average population 'jump off point', they appear to have run the "countervailing rules" over all ridings, urban and rural.

This is the pluralistic* approach toward redistribution. It should be recognised that this perspective was confirmed by the Supreme Court by their Electoral Boundaries (Sask) (1991) 2 S.C.R 158 decision which provides the framework for the Electoral Boundaries Commission Act at Part 2 (Redistribution Rules)

(*http://lawjournal.mcgill.ca/userfiles/other/1448357-39.1.Johnson.pdf.

Further evidence for this pluralistic approach is in the options the 2009/10 Commission considered. Despite a similar urban population increase bias the rural (Rest of Alberta) ridings were considered either for addition of one riding or for no change:

In summary, three general options were considered by the Commission:

Option 1 – increase Calgary by 2 additional divisions, Edmonton by 1, Rest of Alberta by 1

Option 2 – increase Calgary by 2 additional divisions, Edmonton by 2, Rest of Alberta no change

Option 3 – increase Calgary by 3 additional Divisions, Edmonton by 1, *Rest of Alberta no change*

The importance of the *No Change aspect* is that, despite recognizing the need to increase ridings in the urban areas due to population increases, they saw no need to re-examine the rural ridings. My sense is that they considered the integrity of those ridings to be sound having (i) not seen a fall in overall population and (ii) there being no change to the countervailing factors - as is the position currently.

Ultimately the 2009/10 Commission favoured and proposed Option 1, which was adopted.

In reality this was unavoidable because the population increase in Fort McMurray had taken it beyond the +25% variance allowed by Section 15(1) of the Redistribution Rules.

(ii) Voter Parity

In response to the Commissions comment re absolute voter parity relevancy I would offer this observation made by Justice McLachlin in the Electoral Boundaries (Sask) (1991) 2 S.C.R 158 decision:

"First, absolute parity is impossible. It is impossible to draw boundary lines which guarantee exactly the same number of voters in each district. Voters die, voters move. Even with the aid of frequent censuses, voter parity is impossible."

So, while absolute voter parity has an intuitive appeal - one person, one vote (OPOV) - it is no more than a numerical start point. Incidentally nowhere in the Redistribution Rules is the concept of voter parity even mentioned. Further, population and voter (parity) numbers are two entirely different measures. More on this later.

The real problem however, comes with the Commission majority's desire to achieve minimal deviance and their arbitrary 5% target.

In Dixon v. British Columbia (A.G.) the permitted variance from absolute voter parity was set at 25% +/-. This number is embedded in the Electoral Boundaries Commission Act at Part 2 (Redistribution Rules) Section 15 (1).

<u>Unsubstantiated Incursion on Areas outside of Calgary and Edmonton based on Population numbers</u>

For this section, as indicated before, I would like to exclude the 15(2) ridings and Fort McMurray-Conklin which the Commission recognizes as unique currently.

Of the remaining 40 rural ridings only two, Drumheller-Stettler (-1284) and Lac la Biche-St Paul-Two Hills (-1823) have seen a fall in population. Overall the Rest of Alberta ridings have grown in number.

This suggests, to paraphrase Twain, that the reported death of rural Alberta is greatly exaggerated.

Rural Alberta is growing - simply not at the pace of urban areas. None should be surprised about this.

With an almost universal increase in each existing rural riding's rural populations, and those populations still being comfortably within the 25% variance under 15(1), where is the legal or moral justification for redistributing/reducing the number of rural ridings?

The Commission majority's arbitrary 5% target may have some appeal to those who believe that equality of outcome is all. Yet this is scant legitimacy, if legitimacy at all. Indeed if the rural ridings are viewed through the lens of the countervailing factors which by law enable them to be above or below the average - and there is no evidence to support otherwise - then there is no legitimacy in the equal outcome philosophy whatsoever.

Few Section 14 reasons for change are articulated in the IR Section entitled "Recommendations for Boundary Changes". The one constant refrain in almost all ridings (page 35-63) runs thus, either:

[&]quot;this variance can be supported as this is an area where future population growth is likely to fall" (page 36 Bonnyville-Cold Lake)

or

"this degree of negative variance from the provincial average is justified because this electoral division contains areas of future high growth" (page 44 Calgary-South East)

While the Commission may, under Section 14, take into consideration any factors it considers appropriate there is no data published in the IR to support the contentions made in respect of population increases and/or decreases.

Without such data to underpin these comments they merely educated musings. Only time will tell if they are right or wrong.

Yet these population prognostications are not something the Commission are explicitly mandated to involve themselves in, something they themselves acknowledge:

"The Commission agree that, while not expressly listed in the Act, it would be proper to consider other factors in the design of electoral division boundaries, including, projected growth rates..."

(page 15 IR 2107)

Notwithstanding the clause inserted by the Commission to justify attention to population rates I am perturbed when, in the riding by riding Recommendations (page 35-63), consideration of this selected factor is overwhelmingly the sole justification offered for boundary changes.

I believe investing too much in population projections is both not in the spirit of the Act and, irrespective of its legality, unsound. My understanding is that the function of each Commission is to reset the electoral map based on the activity occurring between Commissions. It is not to try and solve issues which may face the next Commission.

It is important to remember the Law:

The Act directs the Commission to divide the province into 87 electoral divisions, with a population within 25% of the provincial average, in a way that will ensure effective representation for Albertans.

(page 1 IR 2009/10)

No mention of voter parity primacy is made, nor is there a direction to get numbers close to or near the average population found anywhere in the Act. For those who argue this is implicit I might agree – but I would not agree that the Commission can make changes to achieve these goals for the next Commission.

The Voter Parity Canard. How it is used to justify the Commissions Egalitarian proposals

During my initial reading of IR 2017 I was confused by the phrase 'voter parity'. I find I am in good company.

SCOTUS in its Evenwel v Abbott (2016) decision, upheld the voter parity by population principle. However as this review explains, http://www.heritage.org/courts/report/evenwel-v-abbott-what-does-one-person-one-vote-really-mean, this is due to the recent history of the US, in particular, precedents set in civil rights cases.

So officially, in the US, voter parity doesn't have anything to do with actual voters. Alberta is however, not subject to US law. Her, while

population is a jumping off point, it is, as I have oft repeated in this submission, not the sole arbiter of riding size. Population variance is allowed.

Section 14's countervailing factors are there to provide recalibration of any inequity brought about by an anodyne numbers calculation. The ultimate aim is to produce "effective representation".

In my opinion using the phrase voter parity to describe the exercise of dividing up populations confers upon it a legitimacy that is, at best, tenuous.

When an election takes place pollsters do not ask the population who they will vote for, they only ask voters. Note, when selecting Commissioners to carry out a redistribution exercise the post is not open to the population at large:

Commissioners must be:

"Persons appointed under subsection (1) must be Canadian citizens, residents of Alberta and at least 18 years of age"

(page 1 Electoral Boundaries Commission Act)

Not all the population can fulfill these requirements - but all voters in the population can. If this standard and status is considered important for law makers why is it not used for quantifying the community who elect the law makers?

When the public hears voter parity they think "one person - one vote" (OPOV). In this exercise this is far from what they get. Ridings are allocated an MLA post based on their population size. Yet it is the voters

(or at least those who turn out) that select which of the candidates becomes the MLA. These are two different metrics.

While urban areas will still edge the voters versus voters comparison they are comfortably ahead using the false voter parity by population number.

I bring this subject up as I was shocked by this specious comparison below, clearly intended to sway debate in favour of the Egalitarian position - despite the fact that population and OPOV are mutually exclusive terms:

"Populations now range from 28,858 in Lesser Slave Lake to 92,148 in Calgary-South East. An election held based on those constituencies would result in a vote cast in Lesser Slave Lake having 3.5 times the effect of one cast in Calgary-South East"

(page 16 Interim Report)

This comparison is both false and wrong. Patently, the entire population of any riding is not the electorate. The electoral list (Elections Alberta web site) tells us that Lesser Slave Lake has 19303 registered voters (67% of the population) while Calgary-South East has 46555 (51% of the population).

The resultant comparison is now 19334 v 46995. This means that the effect is not 3.5 : 1 but 2.4 : 1.

Continuing to use these *voter* percentage number as the true metric of voter parity, and substituting the Commission's proposed population for Calgary-South East of 40,309, it would result in that riding having 20,557 voters (51%). This means Calgary-South East has just 1254 more *voters*. The quoted 3.5 : 1 disparity now drops to just 1.06 : 1.

It is also important to note that Lesser Slave Lake is a riding which attracts the special provisions of Section 15(2). As such the comparison was grossly unfair from the start.

Considering the countervailing factors pertinent to this Section 15(2) area and, using the voter metric rather than population, I consider my harsh criticism of the comparison fully justified.

Law of Unintended Consequences? The effects on rural ridings

As I am resident in Battle River Wainwright (BRW) I carried out a comparison of the effect of the proposals for BRW against all the proposed Edmonton ridings using both a population comparison and an (estimated) voter comparison.

The percentage range difference in population ranges from +16% to +4% in BRW's favour (perhaps that should be disfavour).

As regards voters the percentage difference in the proposed ridings is greater as the estimated mean % of voters in Edmonton is currently 64% versus BRW's 67% (Edmonton-South West is, like Calgary-South East, low at 51%)

So to solve a non-existent problem in Edmonton; recall that reconfiguring the 19 ridings would result in a 'voter parity' variance of just +5.1% (adding one riding takes the figure to 0.15% below the average, well within Section 15(1)) - some 17 of the 40 rural ridings now find themselves well in excess of the average population. 7 of these are in double figures.

This "robbing rural Peter to pay urban Paul" approach fails using either an accurate definition of voter parity i.e. comparing voters with voters,

or the 'imprecise' definition which chooses to compare population to population.

We should recall that these ridings are geographically far larger already than any urban riding. Crucially, they also possess more layers and points of contact in the municipal, school, support services and social milieu.

Each town, BRW has 24, while part of the larger community, sees itself as independent. This is understandable when the distance between most towns in BRW is greater than the total distance across the majority of urban ridings. They each have their Rodeos, Centennials, Graduation Ceremonies historical societies, cattle auctions, hockey teams, charitable events for and at hospitals, senior homes and emergency services locations.

Edgerton High School had 7 graduates in 2017. The MLA was invited to attend and bring greetings. To turn down such an invite could easily be interpreted as rude and divisive particularly when the MLA is seen accepting invites from the remaining 13 high schools.

By contrast Mr. Taylor's Wildrose colleague Prassad Panda (MLA for Calgary-Foothills population currently 41,273) has just 1 High Schools in his urban riding. The proposed enlargement of BRW exacerbates this situation as the High Schools of Tofield, Stettler and Donalda are added.

In respect of other social invites, taking Saturday 10th June this year as an example the MLA attended 4 separate events that day. He travelled a total of 370km. His day began at 0730 and did not finish until 2200hrs.

On that day he had to refuse invites to Hardisty's 150 celebration, Edmonton's Pride Parade and, if he were the Stettler-Wainwright MLA, he would have to choose between attending the Stettler Rodeo parade (200km away) or the 4 events he did attend that day.

The proposed ridings are even larger. If BRW morphs into Stettler-Wainwright it adds significant numbers of counties, towns and school divisions.

The Commission majority made an attempt to diminish the geographic, municipal and social difficulties. They reminded us that a riding was named originally for the distance taht could be covered by horse in one day. They suggested that motor vehicles had increased scope. Superficially this is true.

Unhappily the Commission majority failed to recognise that the length of a working day has not increased concomitantly. Expecting a constituent, or the MLA, to spend 4 hours experiencing "windshield time" to attend a meeting or an event, certainly gives added poignancy to the Robert Louis Stevenson quote "it is better to travel happily, than to arrive".

Further comments regarding providing, better allowances, more staff, satellite offices and video conferencing etc., none of which is in the Commission's gift, were made previously in the 2009/10 IR. More notably, this aspect was fully examined in the Sask 1991 case, where they cut no ice.

The interesting thing to note about these comments is how they tacitly confirm the reality of the countervailing factors. And yet, while doing so, these factors which "shall (my italics) be taken into consideration" (Redistribution Rules Section 14) are being subtly ignored in favour of a mathematical calculation.

Summary

I have tried to explain and offer justification for my contention that the current "robbing rural Peter to pay urban Paul" proposals are at best unfair and, at worst, possibly breach the Redistribution Rules.

I believe that there is adequate evidence here to demonstrate that the Commission majority adopted the Egalitarian mindset in their approach to this matter. This approach does not mesh with the legal requirements

The Commission majority appear to be prepared to minimise the inflection of Section 14 and play very loose with section 15(1). To wit, insisting on taking Edmonton from a very acceptable 5% over the average down to 0.15% below and Calgary from 6% down to 0.02% by using a calculation that has no standing.

As regards the Rest of Alberta I have made the case that a failure to properly apply Section 14 factors, allied to the Egalitarian mindset, is providing a rationale to rob some rural ridings of their current status. In turn this is diluting, perhaps in some cases removing effective representation, the goal of the Redistribution Rules.

Put candidly I believe that the Commission is opening the door to a "reverse" Sask 1991 legal challenge.

Suggestions to the Commission:

1. Please apply rules 13, 14 and 15(1) as there were intended. In suggesting this I am endorsing the view of Commissioner Day. In particular this aspect, actually highlighted by the Commission majority:

"Commissioner Day's minority report ("the minority"), found in Appendix A, recommends that electoral boundaries be set in each of Calgary and Edmonton in such a manner that no additional electoral divisions would be required to be added in either city. That would result in most or all of the electoral divisions in each city containing populations above provincial average population size but below the 25% maximum size permitted under the Act. As a result, no amalgamation of electoral divisions outside of these cities would be required. The populations of many of those electoral divisions would be left at current levels, some well below provincial average population size."

(page 5 IR 2017)

This method may however, require a redistribution of population in all three discrete areas in order to pander to the zeitgeist fixation over OPOV and voter parity.

2. In view of the circumstances uncovered via this exercise i.e. increased population growth and restriction on number of ridings a recommendation should be made by the Commission that a wider and more reaching review of the Act be undertaken.

The issues arising here from the restriction placed on the number of riding's highlights an Act too inflexible for a modern, and fast moving society, faced with a range of issues the original drafters could not be expected to envisage. Elements for inclusion could be:

- 1. Perhaps a set lower and higher population/actual voter number could be set for urban and rural ridings?
- 2. If 40,000 persons justified a riding in 2009/10 how is it we now countenance populations at circa 55,000 a 37.5% increase without murmur?

In addition recognition of the voter profile when comparing ridings should be included as a countervailing factor.

I thank the Commission in anticipation of their serious consideration of this submission.

Please leave Cypress-Medicine Hat the way it was, and educate Albertans about the fact that not all constituencies can have the same number of voters. It just isn't practical. We live in a very beautiful, diverse province, where much of it is sparsely populated. Those living in sparsely populated areas contribute to Alberta's economy and their communities, just as those living in urban areas do. All Albertans deserve to have an MLA they can get to know and talk to when necessary. They deserve to have their MLA attend functions in their area without needing to hire an airplane to attend multiple functions in a day. They deserve to have their MLA represent their issues and views, without different circumstances creating conflicting views in the same constituency 4 hours away! This would make it a less effective position than those representing a portion of a large urban centre, such as Calgary or Edmonton where there are many commonalities and short distances to travel. One of the main concerns raised at the Electoral Boundaries Commission open house in Medicine Hat in January was that any changes in the boundaries should not increase the local ridings in size because of the problems it creates for effective representation.

We agree with the statement in the Medicine Hat News which said, "Ensure the City of Medicine Hat has two constituencies with its name in it. The plan proposed by the Electoral Boundaries Commission would have Medicine Hat reduced down to one seat in the legislature."

The new name of Brooks-Cypress and Taber-Vulcan do not indicate that Medicine Hat is the area's hub for Cypress County. It is a city of roughly 63,000 people and the riding should use both Cypress and Medicine Hat in the name. Who would ever imagine that Taber-Vulcan included the area around Medicine Hat? Taber and Vulcan are associated more with Lethbridge and much of that area uses that city as its hub. To extend a riding from the U.S. and Saskatchewan borders up to 20 minutes south of Calgary is far too large to provide fair and equitable representation.

We are asking you not to take three seats out of rural Alberta. Leave them as they are, possibly with slight adjustments, rather than making such large geographical ridings which become ineffective and complicated.

Attention Minister McLean:

I understand that the Alberta Government is currently reviewing electoral boundaries to balance the workload for the MLAs within Alberta. A review of the changes reveals that the community of Montgomery is recommended to be moved to join with communities south of the Bow River. As President of the Montgomery Community Association, I request that this decision be reconsidered.

The Community boundaries have been moved three times in the last four elections (Calgary Bow; Calgary Mountain View/Calgary Varsity; Calgary Varsity). We have developed a positive, solid working relationship with Calgary Varsity representative and constituency office.

Montgomery Community borders major provincial properties including University District, Alberta Children's Hospital, Foothills Medical Centre, Alberta Cancer Centre, and the University of Calgary. The Community is actively engaged with the major provincial projects and properties. Montgomery Community is a recognized stakeholder within the current and planned construction within the provincial holdings including West Campus Development Trust/University District, Calgary Cancer Centre, Foothills Hospital Parking Lot 1, Alberta Children's Hospital Parking upgrade, and the University of Calgary developments. Given the close proximity of these significant provincial projects to the community it is imperative that we as a community remain fully engaged. All of the projects are north of the Bow River and it would continue to make sense for the community to be connected to the other communities north of the Bow River where there is significant engagement in these projects.

The Community is represented on the South Shaganappi Area Strategic Planning Group which includes representatives from Calgary Varsity, University District, Foothills Medical Centre, Cancer Centre Project, University of Calgary, City of Calgary (Planning, Roads and Transit departments), Vecova, Market Mall, Innovate Calgary, and the Communities of St. Andrew Heights, University Heights, Parkdale, Varsity, and Montgomery. We have forged strong attachments and alliances within this larger community. To move to join communities south of the river would separate Montgomery from the representative of the provincial projects bordering the community. Additionally, the proximity of the projects to the other communities' south of the river would perhaps make the impact of the development less of a concern/priority for the Calgary Bow representative and could ultimately result in an increase in the workload of the Calgary Bow MLA.

Justice Bielby and members of the Commission;

I thoroughly appreciate the value of equality of vote and representation based upon population, and that changes may be necessary to electoral boundaries to adhere to those principals. As for the proposed realignment of our current constituency of Athabasca-Redwater-Sturgeon for the Town of Athabasca, I would like to take opportunity to draw attention to some concerns.

Within our current boundaries it cabe stated that similar economics of industry and commerce exist with good connectivity of roadways between communities of similar population densities and reasonable distances. The proposed changed will erode these attributes.

Vastly extended boundaries will cause travel issue and less ease for direct MLA interaction with constituents. The Town of Athabasca is located somewhat centre of the Athabasca County and works closely and effectively with that municipality, and together we are served by one MLA. Proposed changes will take that number to three. Aspen View Public Schools, predominately within our current constituency, will see further division under current proposal. This overall fracturing will provide obstacles and place the greater community of Athabasca at disadvantage.

Besides aforementioned considerations, I ask that final designation of our constituency include Athabasca being named.
